

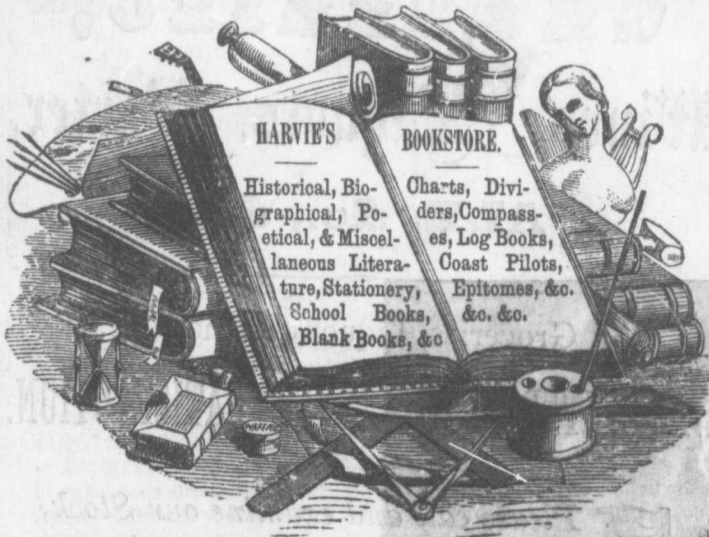



EXPLANATIONS.

All the calculations are reduced to local mean time for Charlottetown, lat. $46^{\circ} 13' 55''$ N., long. $63^{\circ} 7' 23''$ W., with the exception of equation of time in Sun's right ascension and declination, which are given for apparent noon. The Sun's apparent semi-diameter is also inserted on the respective days for each complete second of arc.

The time of High Water is given for once in the 24 hours; the intervening tide being readily found by taking half the nominal interval between the two tides. The tides for the following places will be found by subtracting from Charlottetown time as follows:

Pinette, Bedeque, Pictou, Tatmagouche -	0h. 45m.

At the head of each month, beside the changes of the Moon, are given the Moon's bearing at the time of change, the Perigee or Moon's nearest approach to the earth, and the days when the Moon crosses the Equator, and reaches her greatest north or south declination; on which point Saxby's system of Lunar Equinoctials is founded; the principle being that on these days the Moon's influence on the atmospheric tides is most marked; and when these times fall close upon the time of Moon's change or Perigee, this disturbing influence is proportionally increased. These cases are marked ** or ***, according as two or three of these influences combine. When *** occur, a gale or other strong atmospheric disturbance may be expected with considerable certainty.

In addition to the general local disturbance on these days, the

effects of a storm generated within the tropics is sometimes propagated so as to arrive in about two or three days—it having been found that the average rate at which these travel is about 16 miles per hour.

PLANETS AND OCCULTATIONS.

MERCURY. The apparent motion is alternately direct and retrograde between the following dates, when he will be stationary either to the east or west of the sun: February 9th, E.; March 3d, W.; June 11th, E.; July 5th, W.; Oct. 8th, E.; October 28th, W.; these being the most favored times for seeing the planet. It is an evening star when to the east, and a morning star when to the west of the sun.

VENUS. Direct throughout the year, being a morning star from the beginning of the year till the time of her superior conjunction with the sun on the 8th of May; after which she will reappear as an evening star till the end of the year.

MARS. Retrograde from 5th January till 26th March. Direct during the rest of the year. He will be in opposition to the sun on 13th March, coming to the meridian at midnight, and most favorably placed for observation. On the 18th May will be an interesting occultation of the planet by the moon, visible at Charlottetown; the immersion occurring at the darkened side of the moon, at about 5h. 40m., p. m. The re-appearance at the illumined edge at 6h. 47m.

JUPITER. Retrograde from September 9th till the end of the year. Being in opposition on the 7th November. He is a morning star from the 1st January till his conjunction on the 17th April. After that an evening star.

SATURN. Retrograde from 26th March till 14th August; being in opposition to the sun on the 4th June.

URANUS. Motion direct from March 21st till October 27th. Retrograde during the remaining parts of the year. In opposition to the sun, and consequently most favorable for observation on the 5th of January. Its position may be readily found on that night by drawing a line between the two twins, and another line from the southern of these two stars (Pollux) at exactly a right angle towards the west, and taking a distance along this line, (almost exactly) double the distance between the two stars; this will give the position of the planet.

NEPTUNE. This newly discovered planet, invisible except by the most perfect instrument, will be retrograde from July 24th, till December 27th, being in opposition on 8th October.

Besides the occultation of Mars already noticed, there will be two occultations visible to the naked eye, of stars of the first magnitude:

ALDEBARAN. Feb. 20th, at about 1 o'clock in the morning.

REGULUS. March 25th, at about 2 o'clock in the morning.

ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses this year.

I. A partial eclipse of the moon, January 27th. Greenwich mean time of opposition in right ascension, 13h. 15m. 36s. Magnitude of eclipse, .45 of the moon's diameter—to the North.

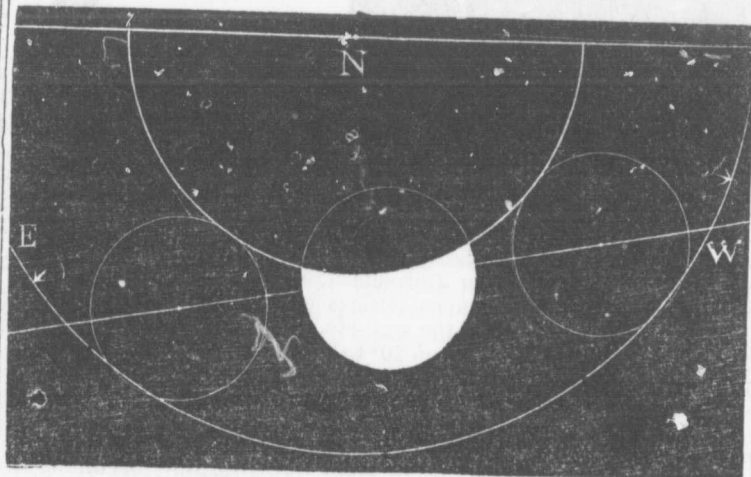
II. An annular eclipse of the sun, February 10. Greenwich date of conjunction, in right ascension, 1h. 28m. 47s. Visible only as a partial eclipse to the southern parts of South America, Africa, and Madagascar. The line of centrality passing from south of Capes Horn and Good Hope, and the southern extremity of Madagascar.

III. A partial eclipse of the Moon, July 23. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 2h. 12m. 5s. Portion eclipsed, .559 of D diameter, south.

IV. A total eclipse of the Sun, August 7. Greenwich time of conjunction in right ascension, 9h. 45m. 59s. Visible from N.E. of Asia and Japan, and the whole of Northern and Central America. The line of Centrality passes across the American Continent, from Northern Sound—Russian America, to Cape Hatteras.

The eclipses of January 27th and August 7th being visible at Charlottetown, the following particulars are added, reduced to local mean time:

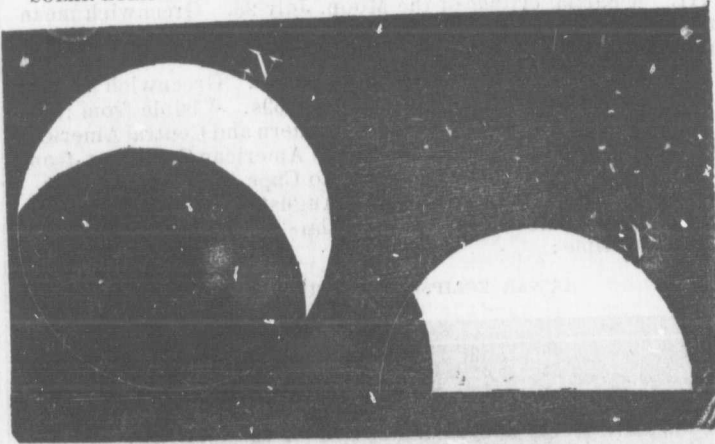

The diagram represents the appearance for direct vision—the earth's shadow being supposed stationary; the moon moving past it from West towards East.

The Solar eclipse of August 7th will be seen as a partial eclipse at Charlottetown; the disc of the moon reaching that of the sun, about the middle of the SW. quadrant at 46 minutes past 5, p. m. The time of greatest obscuration 6h. 36m., when .73 of the sun's diameter will be covered. The appearance of the eclipse at sunset is given, but owing to refraction it is likely that the eclipse will be more nearly ended at apparent sunset than is here represented.

THE ZODIACAL LIGHT will be an interesting object in the evenings of March. This is the name given by Cassini to a faintly luminous cone, visible soon after sunset, on the fading of twilight, pointing in the direction and sometimes extending to the Pleiades from the quarter in which the sun sets, nearly along the ecliptic; the breadth at the base is from 20° to 30° , its height, occasionally 50° . It was at one time supposed to be a projection of the solar atmosphere, but Laplace has proved that that could not extend to such a distance as the Zodiacal light has been observed to pass. Some have also imagined it a nebulous appendage of the earth itself, something of the nature of Saturn's ring, only becoming visible when the sun crosses its plane.

It will be most favourably observed, during the early part of March, till about the 15th, before it becomes obscured by the increasing moon light. In the Spring of 1868 it could not be well discerned, owing to the refulgence of Venus in its immediate neighbourhood. The Zodiacal Light may also be seen about the time of the Autumnal Equinox, a little before sunrise.

THE SEASONS.—The annual revolution of the earth is accomplished in 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 51 seconds. In those countries which lie in the southern hemisphere November, December and January are the summer months, while in the northern hemisphere, where we reside, these are our months of winter, when the weather is coldest, and the days shortest. During six months, from March 21 to Sept. 23, the sun shines without intermission on the North Pole, so that there is no night there during all that interval, while the south pole is all this time enveloped in darkness. From Sept. to March the south pole enjoys the solar light, while the north, in its turn, is deprived of the sun and left in darkness. The sun is at different distances from the earth at different periods of the year, owing to the earth's moving in an elliptical orbit; but it is not upon this circumstance that the seasons depend. For on the 1st January we are more than three millions of miles nearer the sun than on the 1st July, when the heat of our summer is generally greatest.

To improve Bad Butter.—Butter that has not been properly churned, or that has not been carefully separated from the buttermilk, or has been improperly packed, and is turning rancid, should be immediately washed and kneaded in spring water, changing the water two or three times, then re-salted with salt pounded very fine, so that it may impart its antiseptic properties the more speedily.

Crumb Pudding.—The yolks and whites of three eggs, beaten separately, one ounce of moist sugar, and sufficient bread-crumbs to make it into a thick but not stiff mixture; a little powdered cinnamon. Beat all together for five minutes, and bake in a buttered tin. When baked, turn it out of the tin, pour two glasses of boiling wine over it, and serve. Cherries, either fresh or preserved, are very nice mixed in the pudding.

Chocolate Butter.—Stir quarter of a pound of butter over the fire until quite soft and creamy: put two cakes of good Vanilla-flavored chocolate on a tin plate, and sprinkle them gradually with milk until they become so soft that you can mix them with the butter, then stir them well into it. Serve it cold, in whatever shape you like for eating with bread or biscuits.

Pig's-Head Baked.—Let it be divided and thoroughly cleaned; take out the brains, trim the snout and ears, bake it an hour and a half; wash the brains thoroughly, blanch them, beat them up with an egg, pepper and salt, and some finely-chopped or powdered sage, and a small piece of butter; fry them, or brown them before the fire; serve with the head.

Pig's Head Boiled.—This is a more profitable dish, though not so pleasant to the palate. It should first be salted, which is usually done by the pork butcher. It should be boiled an hour and a quarter; it must be boiled gently, or the meat will be hard; serve with vegetables.

Sago Jelly.—Boil a teacupful of sago in three and a half pints of water till done; when cold, add half a pint of raspberry syrup; put it into a shape which has been rinsed in cold water; when turned out into the dish, pour a little cream round it.

Soda Cake.—Half a pound of butter, half a pound of flour, three-quarters of a pound of loaf-sugar, four eggs, one teaspoonful of Soda, and the rind of one lemon, grated. Beat the eggs for twenty minutes, the yolks and whites separately, melt the butter, and add the ingredients to it separately, beating them all the time. Bake for two and a half hours in a moderate oven.

Delicious Dish of Apples.—Take two pounds of apples, pare and core them, slice them into a pan; add one pound of loaf-sugar, the juice of three lemons, and the grated rind of one. Let these boil about two hours. Turn it into a mould, and serve it with thick custard or cream.

so tenacious of the adhesive principle that the most robust powers of digestion can scarcely act upon it; and yet it is eaten by the most delicate females, who find themselves indisposed after it, but never impute their ailment to the potatoes, "which," as they say, "never can do any harm." Potatoes for mashing should be as nicely boiled as if they were intended to be eaten without further preparation; only they should be dressed a little more, though care should be taken not to let the water get into them. The farinaceous part only should be used, and with it a small quantity of the freshest butter. It is customary in some families to brown with a salamander the top of a dish of mashed potatoes. This is by no means objectionable,

though we are of opinion that by adding a little cream, and putting the mashed potatoes into the oven to brown them, a great improvement would be made. Mashed potatoes are also very nice if made up into round balls, covered with yolk of egg, and fried a light brown. They might with great advantage be mixed with cold fish finely shred, and a little chopped parsley, then dipped in yolk of egg, and fried. In many families the cold remains of fish are often thrown away, which would answer this purpose extremely well, and form a very savory dish for the next day's dinner. These two latter preparations should be garnished with fried parsley.

Treatment of Soft Corns.—A small piece of sal ammoniac dissolved in two tablespoonfuls of spirits of wine, and the same quantity of water. Saturate a small piece of sponge or linen rag, and place it between the toes, changing it twice a day. This will cause the skin to harden, and the corn may be easily extracted. A good remedy for soft corns is common chalk rubbed on the corn every day, and a piece of cotton wool worn between the toes affected, to prevent pressure—the chalk appears to dry up the corn.

Calf's Head Hashed.—Calf's head, one egg, a teaspoonful of flour, a grating of nutmeg, three tablespoonfuls of milk, some slices of bacon, a dozen forcemeat balls, pepper, salt, mace, an onion, bunch of herbs, one wineglass-full of port-wine, eight mushrooms, pint of gravy, lard. Carefully cleanse the head of a freshly-killed calf, boil it three quarters of an hour, let it stand till cool, then slice it up into nice-looking pieces. Peel the tongue, and cut it into thin slices. Boil the brain in a cloth, chop it fine, and beat it up with the egg, flour, milk, and nutmeg. Have ready a frying-pan of boiling lard, and fry the mixture in fritters the size of a crown piece. Flavor the gravy

Place the head in this, and let it heat gently for ten minutes; serve in the centre of the dish, with the brain fritters, bacon, forcemeat balls round; strew little egg balls over the whole.

Flour Pudding.—Four spoonfuls of flour, six eggs, two pints of milk; line a basin with buttered paper, and boil an hour.

Chicken Baked in Rice.—Cut a chicken into joints, as for a fricassee, season it well with pepper and salt, lay it into a pudding-dish lined with slices of ham or bacon, add a pint of veal gravy, and an onion finely minced; fill up the dish with boiled rice well pressed and piled as high as the dish will hold, cover it with a paste of flour and water; bake it one hour, and serve before taking off the paste.

White Fricassee.—Boil a chicken; joint it and lay it into a sauce-pan, with a piece of butter the size of an egg, a large spoonful of flour, a little mace and nutmeg, white pepper and salt; add a pint of cream; give it one boil.

Lobster Rissoles.—Extract the meat of a boiled lobster, mince it as fine as possible, mix with it the coral pounded smooth, and some yolks of hard-boiled eggs pounded also. Season it with Cayenne pepper, powdered mace, and a very little salt. Make a batter of beaten egg, milk and flour. To each egg allow two large tablespoonfuls of milk and a large teaspoonful of flour. Beat the batter well, and then mix the lobster with it gradually, till it is stiff enough to make into oval balls about the size of a large plum. Fry them in the best salad oil, and serve them up either warm or cold. Similar rissoles may be made of raw oysters minced fine, or of boiled clams. These should be fried in lard.

Sea-pie of Veal.—Take a scrag, breast, or neck of veal; cut it into slices, about an inch thick; fry some slices of salt pork in an iron pot; flour the veal, lay it into the hot fat, and let it brown a little; add water enough to just cover the meat; let it simmer about half an hour; season it with pepper and salt; dredge in a little flour. Have ready a common paste; roll it about half an inch thick, just large enough to cover the meat; cover the pot with a hot iron cover. Let it cook gently about three-quarters of an hour.

To Pickle Beet-root.—This vegetable makes an excellent pickle, and from the brightness of its color has a very pretty effect in a glass pickle-dish or jar. Wash the beet perfectly; do not cut off any of the fibrous roots, as this would allow the juice to escape, and thus the coloring would be lost. Put it into sufficient water to boil it, and when the skin will come off it will be sufficiently cooked, and may be taken out and laid upon a cloth to cool. Having rubbed off the skin, cut the beet into thick slices, put it into a jar, and pour over it cold vinegar, prepared as follows: Boil a quart of vinegar with one ounce of whole black pepper, and an equal weight of dry ginger, and let it stand until quite cold. The jar should be kept closely corked.

Sea-Pie of Veal.—Take a scrag, breast, or neck of veal; cut it into slices about an inch thick; fry some slices of salt pork in an iron pot; flour the veal lay it into the hot fat, and let it brown a little; add water enough to just cover the meat; let it simmer about half an hour; season it with pepper and salt; dredge in a little flour. Have ready a common paste; roll it about half an inch thick, just large enough to cover the meat; cover the pot with a hot iron cover. Let it cook gently about three-quarters of an hour.

Peel and slice eight potatoes; wash them in warm water; add them to the soup, with a seasoning of salt and pepper; stir it frequently; boil another hour, and then serve.

Beef-Steak Smothered with Onions.—Cut up six onions very fine; put them in a sauce-pan with two cupfulls of hot water, about two ounces of good butter, some pepper and salt; dredge in a little flour. Let it stew until the onions are quite soft; then have the steak broiled, put into the sauce-pan with the onions; let it simmer about ten minutes, and send to the table very hot

To the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, Bermuda and the West Indies, twice every alternate week throughout the year.

Letters to be registered must be posted at least *half an hour* previous to the closing of the Mail by which they are to be sent; the postage as well as the registration fee *must be prepaid*. The registration of a letter to any place in this island, British North America, the United States, or the United Kingdom, is Sixpence currency.

Attention to the following remarks, by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail, is strongly recommended.

Registration is applicable to all descriptions of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced when one unregistered cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or any other error, may effect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees, a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one—an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter, and the nature of its contents, are, to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest as though the letter had been singled out, and marked with the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense to ensure, as far as possible, the sure and safe transmission of money by mail—the safest mode of remitting is by Money Orders—where there are no Money Order offices, the Registration system is available.

SUGGESTIONS TO THE PUBLIC, &c.

Facility is given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the Public, by careful attention to the following recommendations :—

To post all letters, &c. as early as practicable ; especially when sent in large numbers, as is frequently the case with newspapers and circulars. The trouble of the office is much diminished, if circulars, before being posted, be tied in bundles with the addresses all in one direction.

To see that every letter, newspaper, or other packet sent by post is securely folded and fastened. Sealing wax will not easily adhere to the gummed portion of an envelope. When postage stamps are remitted, they should be enclosed in paper sufficiently thick to prevent them from being seen or felt through the cover. It should be remembered that every packet has to be several times handled, and that even when in the mail bag it is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or some other material which will not readily tear or break. The observance of this precaution is especially necessary whenever any fragile articles are forwarded by post. These should always be enclosed in a wooden or tin box. Owing to the neglect of these precautions, many postal packets burst open, causing much trouble to the department and risk to the owners, it being sometimes impossible to determine to what packet a particular article belongs.

To fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent the contents from slipping out.

In affixing the stamps, to wet slightly the corner of the envelope and the front, as well as the gummed side of the stamp, and then gently to press the stamp till it is firmly fixed. The practice of dipping the stamp in water is objectionable, because, unless the stamp be immediately withdrawn, and care be taken, by the use of blotting paper or some other absorbent, to remove any excess of moisture, the gum may be washed off, or the stamp may be rubbed off the letter.

Never to send money or any other article of value through the post, except either by means of a money order or in a registered letter. Any person who sends money or jewelry in an unregistered letter, not only runs a risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter carrier to moral ruin. Every letter which contains money or other valuable articles, even when registered, ought to be securely sealed.

When complaint is made of letters or newspapers lost, miscarried, or delayed, to furnish information as precise as possible regarding all the facts of the case, and to enclose whatever documents may throw light upon it. The day and hour at which the letter or newspaper was posted, as well as the office at which,

and the person by whom this was done, should always be stated; and when possible, the cover or wrapper in an entire state should be sent, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the stamps. Cases frequently occur in which complaint is made against the Post Office, and redress expected, although little or no means of tracing the error, and of guarding against a repetition of it, are supplied by those who alone are able to do so.—*British Postal Guide.*

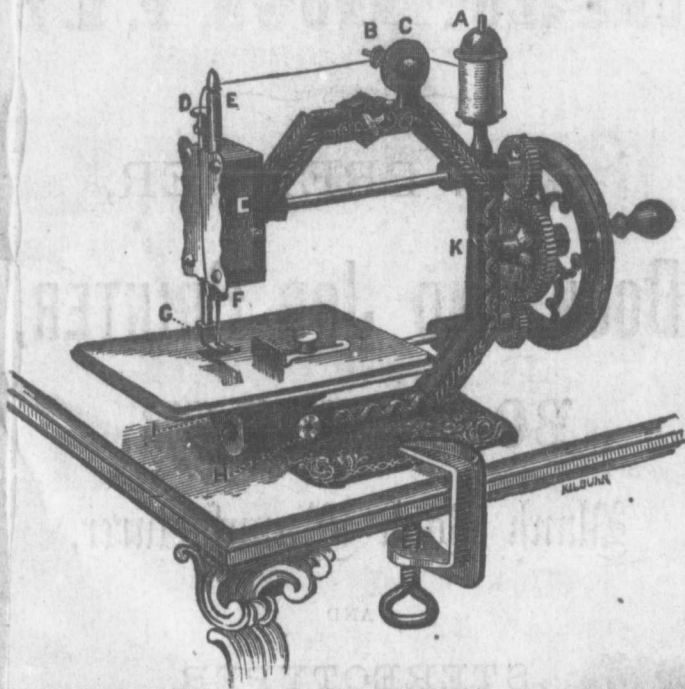
