

Thursday, the Thirteenth day of January, in the Fiftyfourth year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great 1 ritain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith—Being the Fifth Session of the Seventh Provincial Parliament of Lower Canada, as continued by feveral Adjournments and Prorogations, to this day.

The Honorable the Speaker acquainted the House that there was a Member without, ready to be introduced;

When the Honorable Mr. Blackwood was introduced between the Honorable Mr. Baby and the Honorable Mr. Duchefnay.

Then the Honorable Mr. Blackwood prefented to the Speaker his Writ of Summons, who delivered it to the Clerk, and is as follows:

JEORGE the THIRD, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, To our beloved and faithful Subject John Blackwood, Efquire, GREETING : Whereas by the advice and affent of our Council for certain arduous and urgent affairs, Us, the ftate and defence of our Province of Lower Canada and the Church thereof concerning, our Legislature at our City of Quebec, on the Twenty-fifth day of May next, we have ordained to be holden, and there with you and other great men and our Legislative Council of our faid Province, to have conference and Treaty, you on the faith and allegiance by which you are bound to Us, firmly enjoining, we command that the difficulty and dangers of the affairs aforefaid confidered, laying afide every excufe whatfoever, on the aforefaid Twenty fifth day of May, at the meeting of our faid Legislature you be perforally prefent with Us and the great men and the Legislative Council aforementioned, upon the faid affairs to confer, and your advice to afford, and this as Us, and the honor, fafety and defence of our faid Province and the Church of the fame, and the dispatch of the affairs aforementioned, you love, you are in no wife to omit. Witness our trufty and well beloved SIR GEORGE PREVOST, Baronet, our Captain General and Governor in Chief, in and over our faid Province of Lower Canada, &c. &c. &c. at our Caftle of Saint Lewis, in our City of Quebec, in our faid Province, the Ninth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, in the Fifty-third year of our Reign.

Then the Honorable Mr. Blackwood came to the Table and took the Oath prefcribed by the Statute of the Thirty-first of His present Majesty, which was administered by David Monro, Esq. one of the Commissioners, and took his Seat accordingly.

Then the Commissioner withdrew.

The Houfe was adjourned during pleasure.

After some time the House was refumed.

His Excellency SIR GEORGE PREVOST, Baronet, Governor in Chief, being feated in the Chair, on the Throne, the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, to let the Affembly know, it is His Excellency's pleasure, they attend him, immediately, in this Houfe.

Who being come with their Speaker,

His Excellency was pleafed to deliver the following Speech :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I have great fatisfaction in again meeting you in Provincial Parliament, from an affurance that your deliberations will be influenced by the fame principles of loyalty and affection to your Sovereign, and of active zeal for the fecurity and welfare of this Province, which have hitherto diffinguished the people of Lower Canada.

His Majesty still suffering, to the great regret of all his Subjects, under the malady with which he has so long been afflicted, the Government continues to be administered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, with a wisdom and energy which promise the most lasting benefits to the British Empire.

Upon the Continent of Europe, a formidable confederation of Military Talents and ftrength has been formed, by the union of Ruffia, Pruffia, Auftria and Sweden, for the purpofe of refifting the further attempts of the Ruler of France to obtain Universal Dominion; and the brilliant fuccess which have hitherto invariably attended the Arms of the

the Allies in this momentous conteft, afford the well grounded hope of a reftoration of independence to the Nations fo long oppreffed, and of a return of Peace to that part of the World.

In Spain, and in the Territory even of France herfelf, into which His Majefty's victorious Arms have been carried, the fplendid achievement of the Marquis of Wellington, and of the united British, Spanish and Portuguese forces, in the Victories of Vittoria, and of the Pyrenees, and the fall of Saint Sebastian, have rivalled those of any former period, and are just subjects of congratulation.

In turning our eyes to our own fhores, we have abundant caufe for gratitude to the Supreme Giver of all good, for the termination of the late Campaign in a manner fo glorious to the British Arms, and so difaftrous to those of the enemy.

The defeat fuftained by him on the Chateauguay, where a handful of brave Canadians repelled a powerful division of his Army, and the brilliant Victory obtained by a small corps of observation, on the banks of the Saint Lawrence, over the formidable Armament commanded by General Wilkinson, have at the fame time nobly upheld the honor of His Majesty's Arms, and effectually disconcerted all the plans of the enemy for the Invasion of this Province.

It is also matter of further and fincere congratulation, that, notwithftanding the various events of the last fummer, by which a footing was gained by the enemy in the Upper Province, they have fince been compelled to abandon the greater part of it, and that the Theatre of War has been transferred into their own Territory, where Niagara, the'r ftrongest Fortress, and the important Posts of Black-Rock and Buffalo, have lately been wrested from them by British Valor and Enterprize.

In reviewing these events, I cannot but contemplate with pride and fatisfaction, the zealous discharge of duty which I have witnessed as well in the militia, as in all classes of His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, and which I confider the furest indication of their loyalty to their Sovereign, and of their determination to defend, to the last extremity, this valuable portion of his Dominions.

Mr.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I shall direct to be laid before you, a statement of the Provincial Revenue of the Crown, and of the expenditure for the last twelve months.

One of the measures adopted by you during the last Session, for supplying the exigencies of the Public Service has only lately come into operation, and as it promises to become a highly productive fource of Revenue, I confidently rely upon your liberality for such appropriations for the defence of the Province, as the nature of the contest in which we are engaged, and the circumstances of the times, may require.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

Notwithstanding the present favourable aspect of our affairs, and the fecurity in which the Province is now placed, from the discomfiture of the enemy's late attempts to invade it, we must still be prepared to meet with firmness, and to repel with vigour, whatever measures his presumption may again dictate for the accomplishment of his avowed object.

I truft, therefore, to your wifdom and vigilance to fuggeft whatever may be neceffary for this purpole, and to your loyalty and patriotifm to fubmit to whatever further facrifices the war may require;—Affuring you, that His Majefty's Government, not unmindful of the exertions the Province has hitherto made in its defence, is using every possible effort, confistent with the important demands upon it for other fervices, to ftrengthen and increase the Military Eftablishment under my Command.

Deeply fenfible, that the fituation in which I am placed, is as arduous and difficult as it is important—I am, notwithftanding, cheered and animated in the difcharge of its duties, by the conviction that I fhall always meet with your fupport, in maintaining the honor, and promoting the Service of my Sovereign. To forward the profperity, and to preferve the integrity of this Province, are objects of which I fhall never lofe fight; and confidently relying on your cordial affiftance for their attainment, it will be my great ambition to be able-faithfully to reprefent to His Royal Highnefs the Prince Regent, the loyalty, zeal and

unanimity of His Majefty's Canadian Subjects, and to carry with me, whenever I shall return into the Royal Fresence, the good opinion and the affection of the People of this Province.

Which being ended. His Excellency was pleafed to retire, and the Houfe of Affembly withdrew.

The Speaker then informed the Houfe that he had received a letter from Major General Sheaffe, dated, York, Upper-Canada; 23d March last, in answer to that which he had transmitted to him, conveying the thanks of this House-He then read the letter, the purport of which was, that he had received the notification of the diffunction conferred by the vote of thanks of this House, on him, the officers, non-commiffioned officers and privates of the regular and militia forces, whom he had the honor to command, on the 13th of October, in the battle of Queenstown-That he would not fail, to make known to the troops, the honor that had been conferred on them-That as feveral of the Six Nation Indians, were then affembling at Fort George, he would convey to them, alfo, the thanks of this Houfe in a folemn manner befitting the dignity of this House. He returns the Speaker his warmest thanks for the very flattering and polite manner, in which he had been pleafed to communicate to him the Refolution of this Houfe. The

The Speaker also informed the House, that he had received a letter from Brigadier General Proctor, dated, Sandwich, 13th April last, in answer to that which he had transmitted to him, conveying the thanks of this House. He then read the letter, the purport of which was, that he had received the Retolution, conveying the thanks of this House, for the fignal Victory obtained by the force under his Command, on the 22d January last, at the battle of Frenchtown—That he had communicated the thanks to those, to whom it had reference, and requested the Speaker to acquaint the House how fensible he was of the honor conferred on fiim and those under his command—That he would communicate the vote of thanks to the Indian Chiefs and Warriors who fought at the battle of Frenchtown, on the first proper occasion. He then returns the Speaker his warmest Thanks for the very polite manner in which he had been pleased to communicate to him the Resolution of the House.

We perfectly concur in opinion with your Excellency, that, notwithftanding the present favourable afpect of our affairs, we must still be prepared to meet with firmness, and repel with vigour, whatever meafures the prefumption of the Enemy may dictate, for the accomplishment of his avowed object; and your Excellency may be affured of our zealous co-operation in every measure which may tend to the fupport of His Majesty's Government, and to the vigorous defence of this Province. The

The efforts which your Excellency has been pleafed to affure us are now making by His Majesty's Government to ftrengthen and increafe the Military Eftablishment under your Command, we acknowledge with the deepest gratitude.

Fully aware of the difficulties and importance of the fituation in which your Excellency is placed, we beg leave refpectfully to affure you, that you may confidently rely on our support in maintaining the honor, and promoting the fervice of His Majesty; and we beg leave to return to your Excellency; our most fincere thanks for the gratifying affurances which your Excellency: has been pleased to give us, that it will, at all times, be your object to forward the prosperity, and to preferve the integrity of this Province, and your ambition to be able faithfully to represent to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, the loyalty, zeal, and unanimity of His Majesty's Canadian Subjects, and to carry with you, whenever your shall return into the Royal Presence; the good opinion and the affection of the people of this Province.

Witnefs our trufty and well beloved SIR GEORGE PREvost, our Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over our faid Province of Lower Canada, &c. &c. &c. at our Caftle of Saint Lewis, in our City of Quebec, in our faid Province, the Nineteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thoufand eight hundred and fourteen, and in the Fifty-fourth year of our Reign.

 - 11, After "Office" infert, "Provided always, that no-"thing in this Act contained, fhall extend or be conftrued to extend to prevent the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Perfon administering the Government of this Province for the time being, from nominating and reappointing the fame perfons, or any of them, to be Directors and Wardens, if "fuch perfons shall be willing."

- Prefs 7, line 10, After "die" infert, "or shall be permitted by the "Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person adminif-"tering the Government of this Province for the "time being to refign the faid appointment of Di-"rector and Warden."

ORDERED, That the faid Bill be read for the third time, on the next fitting day.

TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS

THE PRINCE REGENT,

Of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Sc. Sc. Sc.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS,

WE, His Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Representatives of the Commons of Lower Canada, in Provincial Parliament afsembled, humbly beg leave to approach the Person of Your Royal Highness, and to be permitted to express the very humble acknowledgments and sentiments of Gratitude of the Inhabitants of this Province, for the benefits they have had the happiness to enjoy during more than half a Century, under His Majesty's Paternal Government. So deeply are these feelings engraven on the Hearts of His Majesty's Subjects, that we venture to assure Your Royal Highness, that their conduct

duct will ever justify the confidence which His Majesty and Your Royal Highness have reposed in their loyalty and courage.

Among the benefits arifing from His Majefty's Government, we place the Administration of His Excellency SIR GEORGE PREVOST. On affuming the reigns of the Colonial Government, His Excellency Sir George Prevost, applied himfelf by Acts of Justice, to merit the confidence of the Canadians, and afforded them a new opportunity of evincing their attachment to their Sovereign, and of developing in their full extent and energy, the internal relources of the Province, against the attacks of its Enemies.

However inviolable the attachment of His Majefty's Canadian Subjects to His Government, we fhould deem ourfelves wanting in the Allegiance due to our well beloved Sovereign, as well as in our duty towards those of His Subjects whom we represent, if we abstained from exposing to Your Royal Hishness the state of distress to which this Province is reduced through the extraordinary efforts it has made, and facrifices it has undergone, in supporting the burthen of the War; Efforts, which, without speedy Relief, may terminate in the ruin of Agriculture. in distress among the People, in Famine, and the depopulation of the Province, and may moreover expose to subjugation, by an abhorred Enemy, this portion of His Majesty's dominions.

Within a fhort period after the Declaration of War on the part of the United States of America against Great Britain, the Commons of Lower Canada, upon a Communication from the Governor in Chief, on the want of the Monies neceffary for the Service of Government, zealoufly concurred in paffing a Law for facilitating the circulation of Army Bills. Notwithstanding the repugnance of the Inhabitants of the Country to Paper Money, a repugnance arising from a former circulation of that kind, the law in question had at first all the effect that could be expected, but the depreciation which these Bills soon experienced has made the fame articles dearer when purchased with Paper than when purchased with Specie It has also created a difficulty amounting nearly to impossibility, of obtaining Specie for Paper. With pain we behold this Paper threaten to diminish in utility to Government, notwithstanding the earness intention of the House of Affembly to communicate to it, the highest degree of Credit.

A

A fhort time before the Declaration of War, the Commons of Lower Canada concurred in paffing an Act declaring every Man between the ages of fixteen and fixty, a Militia-man. By this law the Governor of the Province is empowered, in certain cales, to call out the whole or fuch part of the Militia as he may deem expedient; and there are now embodied under this law about Six thousand Men. By taking into confideration the Carpenters and others employed by Government in Public Works, also those employed in Corvées for transporting effects belonging to the Army, we afcertain the number of perions conftantly employed in Services relating to the War, to be at least Ten Thousand. add to these, the feveral Corps which, within a few years, have been raifed in the Province, as the 104th, the Canadian Fencibles, the Glengary Regiment, chiefly raifed within the Province, the Canadian Voltigeur Corps, also the Men annually employed in the Fisheries, and in the Fur Trade, and it will be found, that Agriculture is at this moment deprived of more than Fifteen Thousand Men, being one third of the whole Militia, and being the most effective portion of the Male Population. In a Country as yet covered with Forests, it is palpable, that fuch levies do confiderably impede the cultivation of the Soil; and the failure of our Harvests may in part be reasonably attributed to a want of hands for Tillage. The accumulation of fo many evils, well may produce uneafinefs among the Inhabitants of the Country, notwithftanding their zeal, their courage and their loyalty.

May we also be permitted to represent to Your Royal Highness, that the failure of feveral fucceffive Harvests in this Province, has occasioned a confiderable rife in the price of Grain and other articles of confumption. The *levy en masse* of the Militia, which the approach of the Enemy last Autumn rendered necessary, in one of our most fertile and populous Districts, has prevented the complete Tilling of the Soil; and as the present position of the Enemy on our Frontiers, indicates his intention of making an attempt early next Spring, to penetrate into the Province, it is to be apprehended, that a *levy en masse* of the Militia in the fame District (should a recourse to that measure be again unhappily compelled) may prevent the fowing of the greatest part of the Grain in that District, whence a Famine will inevitably enfue.

We therefore approach Your Royal Highnefs with confidence, for H the

the purpose of most humbly befeeching Your Royal Highness to take into Your most gracious confideration the present situation of His Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects in this Province, and to provide therefor such Remedy and Relief as Your Royal Highness in your wisdom may deem adequate.

The Committee have further to remark, that on Thursday the tenth February, a Bill was brought up from the House of Assembly, intituled, "An Act for appointing an Agent in the United Kingdom of "Great Britain and Ireland," which Bill was read for the first time, on Tuesday the 15th February, and then ordered to be read for the second time on the Tuesday following.

That on Tuesday the 22d February, the second reading of the Bill, "for appointing an Agent in the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* " and *Ireland*," was postponed to the first day of August next.

That in fearching for Precedents, the Committee have judged it advifable, in the first instance, to examine the Journals of the Legislative Council, and those of the Assembly of this Province, and they find,

That on the 11th April, 1793, an Addrefs and Petition to His Majefty, relative to the Property posseffed by the Jesuits, for the Education of Youth in this Province, was voted by the Assembly, whereupon it was RESOLVED, "That a Message be fent to the Legislative Council, "with a Copy of the said Address, requesting the Council to join in "the same."

That a Meffage was accordingly delivered to the Legislative Council, on the 12th of the fame month, with a Copy of the faid Addrefs, which Documents were immediately referred to a Special Committee.

That on the 17th of April, 1793, the Committee made their Report thereon, in confequence whereof, it was ORDERED, "That the Hono-"rable Mr. *De Lanaudiere* do go down to the Affembly, and inform "that House, that the Legislative Council have resolved to express "their defires on the Subject of promoting the means of Education, in "a separate Address."

The Committee further report, that in following up the Proceedings of the two Houfes, on this fubject. they find, that although feparate Addreffes were made, the object of them both was the fame, viz. the obtaining from the Crown, the means of eftablishing Seminaries throughout the Province, for the Education of Youth; the only difference being, that the Address from the Assembly specifically pointed to "the reversion of the Jesuits' Estates, as a means of contribu-"ting " ting to fo defirable an end," whilft that from the Legiflative Council fupplicated only in general terms, " for aid" to form fuch Eftablishments as might be required.

It further appears, that the faid Addresses were not transmitted to His Majesty by a special Messenger, but in the ordinary course, through the medium of the then Lieutenant Governor of the Province.

Another cafe, applicable to the prefent question, will be found on the Journals of the Assembly, in the Session of 1810, in the Address of that House, prefented to the Governor in Chief, on the 23d February of that year, praying him to transmit certain Address therein referred to, and in His Excellency's Answer.

The Committee alfo report, as applicable to this Cafe, the Reafons offered by the Commons, in a Conference with the Lords, as stated in the Journals of the House of Lords, on the 12th January, 1666, the Lords having gone by a Petition to the King, for a Commission for taking the Public Accounts, there being a Bill sent up from the House of Commons, and depending before the Lords, for taking the faid Accounts in another way, the Commons vote that this proceeding " is " unparliamentary, and of dangerous confequence."

Lastly, the Committee report, as applicable to the present case, the Report agreed to in the House of Lords, on the 2d January, 1691, as Heads for a Conference with the House of Commons, concerning Votes of theirs for incorporating the East India Company.

And that the Committee had also come to feveral Resolutions, which they offered to the confideration of the House.

Thereupon it was moved,

That the question of concurrence be put upon each Resolution, separately.

It was Refolved in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That the matters contained in the Address of the Assembly, to His I Royal

Royal Highness the Prince Regent, now read, are not fuch as have a peculiar and exclusive relation to that House, but such as materially affect the Interests of the Province at large.

The question of concurrence being put,

It was Refolved, unanimoufly, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That an Address to the Throne, by one branch alone, of the Provincial Parliament, upon any subject of general Colonial Interests or Policy, in which the other branch is equally concerned, is unconstitutional and dangerous, and necessfarily tending to produce discord in Counsels, disunion and disorder.

The question of concurrence being put,

It was Refolved, unanimously, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That this Houfe was Conftitutionally, entitled to expect, that the Address of the Affembly to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, would not have been concluded upon by the Affembly, without its concurrence.

The queftion of concurrence being put,

It was Refolved, unanimoufly, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That the faid Addrefs appears to this House to cover an attempt on the part of the Affembly, to appoint an Agent for this Province, without the concurrence of this Houfe, whofe right to give or to with-hold fuch concurrence, the Affembly itfelf has recently recognized by the Bill which they fent up to this Houfe on the tenth February inftant. intituled, "An Act for appointing an Agent in the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*," which Bill, at the time of prefenting the faid Addreffes, was ftill pending in this Houfe.

That the faid Address doth not contain, nor consist with the sentiments of this House, upon the several matters to which it relates.

It was Refolved, unanimoufly, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That the application of any fum or fums of Money, under the pretext of defraying the expences of the Perfon or Perfons, who shall be the Bearer or Bearers of the faid Address to England, without the concurrence of this House, would be a manifest and alarming violation of one of its most important Rights, calculated to effect its total extinction as a Constituent Branch of the Legislature of this Province, and utterly subversive of that grand principle of the Constitution, that the Collective Body of the Legislature alone, can dispose of the Public Money of the Province.

The question of concurrence being put,

It was Refolved, unanimoufly, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That this House will not concur with the Assembly, in making provision for the reimbursement of any sum or sums of Money that may be applied out of the Public Revenue of this Province, for defraying the expences of the Bearer or Bearers of the faid Address, because, in the judgment of this House, there is no necessity for a Special Messenger, for the purpose of conveying that Address. Because, applications to His Majesty's Government, which are of a Public Import, can only be properly and Constitutionally conveyed through the medium of the Governor of this Province. And because, this House has had no intercommunity with the Assembly in their Address.

The question of concurrence being put,

It was Refolved, unanimoufly, in the Affirmative.

It was moved to Refolve,

That this Houfe views with equal aftonifhment and concern, the acquiefcence of his Excellency the Governor in Chief, in the Vote of the Affembly, which requefts him to appoint a Meffenger for the purpofe above mentioned, an acquiefcence, which they cannot but confider to be an unequivocal abandonment of the Rights of this Houfe, and a fatal dereliction of the first principles of the Conftitution.

Becaufe, the Act which this Bill in part repeals, was introduced into the Provincial Parliament, which passed it, under such fanction.

Duchefnay and Caldwell, who are to meet as Managers for the Affembly the number required by Parliamentary Ufage, and that the time of faid Conferencebe this day, at half path four o'clock in the afternoon, and the place, the Great Committee Room, in this Bifhop's Palace.

The Honorable Mr. Duchesnay reported, that the Honorable Mr. Caldwell and himfelf attended the Conference defired by the Affembly, as Managers for this Houfe, and that they met Meffrs. Papineau, Tafchereau, Irvine and Mure, who delivered a Writing. and received for anfwer, by the Managers of this Houfe, that they would report it to the Council; which Writing being read, was in the words following:

Reafons to be offered at a Conference with the Legiflative Council, on the fubject matter of the Amendments made by their Honors to the engroffed Bill fent up by the Houfe of Affembly, intituled, "An Act to amend the Militia Acts now in force in this Pro-"vince."

The House of Affembly does not concur in the Amendments made by the Honorable the Legislative Council to the Bill, intituled, "An "Act to amend the Militia Acts now in force in this Province," for the following Reasons :

First. Because, in point of fact, it is generally known, and it has, moreover. been incontrovertibly proved before a Committee of this House, that in the execution of that part of the Law asit now exists, many acts of partiality of the most unjust nature, have been committed. And in point of principle. it is at all times dangerous to leave such an arbitrary power in the hands of individuals, who, however respectable their fituation in fociety, and however impartial they may be in the exercise of their official duty, will be generally or partially sufpected of the contrary.

Secondly, Becaufe, experience has shown, that in this Province, few persons under eighteen years of age have acquired sufficient strength to undergo the fatigues attendant on Military Life, and great numbers of fix-

fixteen and feventeen years of age were, in confequence thereof, lait year; fent back to the Divifions whence they had been ordered to join the Embodied Battalions, and men of forty-five years of age and upwards, have much lefs facility of acquiring a knowledge of the ufe of arms, and the other duties of an Embodied Militia-man. Moreover, becaufe Bach-lors make a lefter facrifice in quitting their homes, than men having families to bring up and support, and are also lefs burthenfome to the Country.

- An Act further to continue for a limited time, an Act paffed in the fifty-first year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for ef-"tablishing Regulations respecting Aliens and certain Subjects of "His Majesty, who have resided in *France*, coming into this "Province or residung therein."
- An Act to continue two several Acts therein mentioned, for regulating the Fisheries in the inferior District of Gaspé.
- An Act further to continue for a limited time an Act passed in the forty-fifth year of His Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to ra-"tify and confirm the Provisional Articles of Agreement entered into by the respective Commissioners of this Province and of *Upper Canada*, at *Montreal*, on the fifth day of July one Thoufand Eight Hundred and four, relative to Duties, and for carrying the fame into effect," and also further to continue an Act passed in the Thirty-feventh year of His Majesty's Reign.

An Act to establish Post Houses in the different parts of this Province.

- An Act further to continue for a limited time two feveral Acts therein mentioned, to provide temporary Houses of Correction in the several Diffricts of this Province.
- An Act to exempt Salt imported for the use of the Fisheries in this Province from the Payment of certain Duties imposed thereon, and for other purposes.
- An Act to grant to the Ladies of the Order of Charity of the City of Montreal, a lum of Money for the purpoles therein mentioned.
- An Act to grant a further fum of Money for the more effectual attainment of the purpoles of the Act of the fifty-first year of His Majesty's Reign, which provides for the relief of Infane Persons, and the fupport of Foundlings, and others therein mentioned.

An Act for applying a further fum of Money towards the erecting aP common

common Gaol with a Court Hall, at New Carlifle, in the inferior Diffrict of Ga/pé.

To thefe Bills the Royal Affent was feverally pronounced by the Clerk of this Houfe, in the words following :

In His Majesty's Name, His Excellency the Governor in Chief doth Affent to this Bill.

Then the Deputy Clerk of the Crown read the Title of a Bill in the words following :

An Act to regulate perfons engaged in the bufinefs or trade of Baking and Selling Bread within the Cities of *Quebec* and *Montreal*, and in the Town of *Three Rivers*.

To this Bill, the Clerk of this Houfe thereupon did fay :

His Excellency the Governor in Chief doth with-hold His Majefty's Affent from this Bill.

Then the Deputy Clerk of the Crown read the Title of another Bill, intituled, "An Act to repeal and amend certain parts of an Act paffed "in the Thirty-fourth year of His Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An "Act for the Division of the Province of *Lower Canada*, for amend-"ing the Judicature thereof, and for repealing certain Laws therein "mentioned."

The Clerk of this Houfe did thereupon fay:

His Excellency the Governor in Chief doth referve this Bill for the fignification of His Majefty's Pleasure thereon.

Then the Speaker of the House of Affembly, on prefenting a Bill, intituled, "An Act further to extend the provisions of two feveral Acts "therein mentioned, for facilitating the circulation of Army Bills," made the following Speech:

May it Pleafe Your Excellency,

The Affembly of this Province, having ferioufly confidered Your Excellency's Meffage stating the expediency of extending the Provisions of

the

the Act of the fifty-fecond of His Majesty, to facilitate the circulation of Army Bills, have given a latitude thereto, which they humbly hope, will enable Your Excellency to meet the encreasing and extraordinary demands of the times, and relieve His Majesty's Subjects in this Province from the difficulties they have lately laboured under.

The Bill which I have the honor to prefent to Your Excellency, is intituled, "An Act further to extend the Provisions of two feveral Acts "therein mentioned, for facilitating the circulation of Army Bills."

To which the House of Assembly humbly defire Your Excellency to give, in His Majesty's Name, the Royal Assent.

Then the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's Command, did thereupon say,

In His Majesty's Name, His Excellency the Governor in Chief, thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and affents to this Bill.

Then His Excellency the Governor in Chief was pleafed to deliver the following Speech :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Affembly,

The different Subjects fubmitted to your confideration having been difpoled of, I am happy to be enabled to close the Selfion, and to permit your return to your families and homes.

It would have afforded me fincere gratification to have witnessed that unanimity and dispatch amongst yourselves, and that liberal confidence in me, which the emergencies of the times, the fituation of the Province, and the assure contained in your Addresses, gave me a right to expect from you, and I have feen with regret, that my disappointment in this expectation has been attended with ferious inconveniences to the public fervice.

Gentlemen of the Haufe of Affembly,

I cannot but lament, that the course of proceeding adopted by you, has occasioned the loss of a productive Revenue Bill, and of the hbe-

ral.

ral appropriations you had made for the defence of the Province, and for ameliorating the fituation of the Militia; and I regret, that in facrificing these defirable objects, you should have been swayed by any confiderations which seemed to you of higher importance than the immediate security of the Country, or the comfort of those engaged in its protection.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

The pacific rumours which have prevailed fince I last addressed you, not affording any certain ground for belief that Peace is at hand, our vigorous and united exertions will still be required to maintain the decided ascendency with which the Divine Providence has been pleased to bless our efforts in the present contest; I therefore earness by your precept and example, on all around you, a respect for the Laws by which they are governed, as well as a just confidence in those who administer and execute them, and to cheriss and encourage that spirit of loyalty and attachment to His Majesty's Person and Government, which has hitherto proved the firmess barrier against all the attempts of the enemy.

As the period fixed by law for the duration of the Provincial Parliament will fhortly expire, I fhall avail myfelf of an early opportunity to recur to the lenfe of the people, for the election of a new Houfe of Affembly. It is therefore my earneft recommendation to you, to endeavor in your leveral flations, to give to the Inhabitants of this Province, a true idea of the nature and value of the Conftitution which they possible size to those, who, duly estimating its advantages, will endeavor faithfully to uphold it, and thereby effectually to promote the fafety, welfare and prosperity of the Province.

Then the Honorable Mr. Hale said :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

It is the Will and Pleafure of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, that this Provincial Parliament be Prorogued until Thursday the Seventh Day of April next, to be then here held, and this Provincial Parliament is hereby prorogued accordingly until Thursday the Seventh Day of April next. . ۰ ۰ ۰
