CANADA LIFE HAS RECORD YEAR

Another Splendid Statement Submitted. The Canada Life Assurance Company had a splendid year in 1913, and in a number of important departments established new records. The new policies actually paid for totaled \$15,349,000, which brings the business in force up to \$150,121,364. The income for the year reached the enormous total of \$8,094,886, an increase of about \$700,000 over that of the previous year. The assets were increased in the year by over \$3,860,000 and now stand at \$25,161,795. It was estimated at the beginning of the present five-year period that at its end the surplus would reach \$6,000,000. Only four years have passed, and it has already exceeded that amount, being now \$6,183,378. The surplus earnings of 1913 surpassed those of any previous year. An important announcement made by the President, Mr. E. S. Cox was that all bonds and debentures will in future be valued on the Amortization system. Market values, with their fluctuations, will be disregarded, and the actual value of the security, on the assumption that it will be held till maturity, will in future be used by the Canada Life in its accounts. Mrs. Adams, the secretary, wrote in part as follows: "Ten meetings have been held during the year with an average attendance of thirty. Most interesting programs have been given, making new persons taking part. The February thank offering was a decided success, there being an attendance of 85, and an offering of \$100. When we read of the wonderful way in which the supplies for the carrying on of the work of the Mission to Lepers, have always been met, it is pleasing in God's sight. He that fed the five thousand with a few loaves and fishes, goes far beyond our expectations. Trusting that we may be blessed in our own lives by thus trying to alleviate the suffering of others, we enter upon the work of another year." Mrs. Ritchie, the treasurer, gave a full and detailed account of the year's finances. The sources of income are personal gifts, the yearly thank offering, the mite boxes in homes and in public offices and stores, the surprise soap wrappers, and "Without the Camp" subscriptions. The grand total is \$401.87. Mrs. Warnie reported nearly four hundred subscribers for one paper, and a sum of \$66.50. Mrs. Sickle reported 3,700 soap wrappers collected, which yielded a sum of \$18.50, half of which comes to our special work and half to the W. C. T. U. mission, Toronto. Mrs. Baird, as superintendent of the mite box department, reported that the scripture lesson was given by Mrs. Anderson, Miss Leone Bremner favored us with a beautiful piano solo. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. G. W. Baker; vice-presidents, Mrs. C. W. Rose, Mrs. Baker, Mrs. La Vie, Mrs. Yeigh; secretary, Mrs. J. Adams; assistant secretary, Mrs. W. H.
