**Make it Practical.**

Wm. D. Lewis, a prominent educator in Philadelphia, writes a very interesting article in the Saturday Evening Post on 'The High School and the Boy.' The most interesting part of the article is that which relates to the boys who are not fond of the ordinary course of study, and for whom so little is done.

Mr. Lewis tells of an experiment with 30 boys who had proved average failures in the traditional course. They had become typical school loafers, and were deriving no benefit whatever from school attendance. They were placed in a thoroughly equipped wood-working shop, in charge of a man who was not only a good teacher but had a thorough knowledge of wood working. Of these 30 boys the shop failed to reach only one. The other 29 took to the work with delight. Not only did they become proficient in wood-working, but they were easily induced to take a lively interest in subjects of importance, especially to those relating to civic affairs and the government of the city and country. Instead of loafers they became alert, practical and ambitious. Mr. Lewis contends that the high schools of the United States are not giving enough practical education.

**Value of Forests Proved.**

While the rainfall of any region is dependent on dynamic influences in the atmosphere, and can be affected only in a slight degree, if at all, by the extent of that region covered by forests, it has certainly been shown that woods and forests conserve rainfall. The briefest consideration indicates the likelihood that this must be so, because vegetation and the ground covered with vegetation absorb water and allow it to percolate slowly to the lower levels, whereas on bare ground the rainwater runs quickly away to sea. But trees serve another purpose in aid of agriculture, because, as some recent experiments show, they act as windbreaks and shelters to growing crops. The distance to which the protective influence of trees extends is estimated at twenty times their height, though complete protection, such as might be afforded to growing wheat in a gale extends only to a distance of eight times the height of the trees. Partial protection is about twelve to fourteen times the height. They also check evaporation of rainfall, their influence extending five times the height to leeward, and preserving as much as 70 per cent. of moisture ordinarily lost. Finally, their influence heats both air and soil, increasing the diurnal range of temperature by as much as nine degrees Fahrenheit.

**School Essay.**

Not often are schoolroom competitions as startlingly original as the boy's essay on Sir Walter Raleigh. 'Sir Walter Raleigh,' wrote the boy, 'was a great man—he discovered America—then he discovered Virginia—he discovered tobacco. So he went back to England and showed them how to smoke, exclaiming, 'My friends, be of good cheer, for we have this day in England lit such a game as I trust by God's grace shall never be extinguished.'

Mr. C. A. Patriquin, the new Inspector for Kings county under the Canada Temperance Act, is carrying on very aggressive work and doing his utmost to prevent the sale of intoxicants within the county. The work is by no means an easy or pleasant one and Mr. Patriquin is certainly to be commended upon the faithfulness to duty which he displays in this regard. No work that can be done is of greater importance to the county and every assistance and encouragement should be given to the Inspector by citizens generally. There are in all cases many who are ready and willing to offer criticism but few who are willing to render help. Let every citizen who believes in law and order and who is in favor of temperance and morality feel his duty to hold up the hands of the Inspector and render every assistance possible in securing evidence to convict those who are debasing the manhood of our country.

It is understood that at the spring session of the Municipal Council, which is to be held next week at Kentville, a proposition will be made for some plan for providing facilities so that in the case of criminals imprisoned within the county, hard labor may be imposed. At present and during past years violators of law have had the privilege of living at the public expense and spending their time in idleness. Such a state of affairs is injurious both to the physical and moral condition of the prisoners. At the present session of the provincial legislature provision is being made that when any person is committed to any jail or lock-up under a commitment requiring hard labor, such hard labor may be performed either in such jail or lock-up or in any place within the county in which such jail or lock-up is situated. The council of any incorporated town is also empowered to make by-laws and regulations for the proper enforcement and carrying out of commitments requiring hard labor in the lock-up, or within the town in which such lock-up is situated. We believe that this step is one that will appeal to the business sense of our people generally and that the application of methods suggested will have the effect of greatly reducing minor crimes and add materially to the prosperity of the county. At the present time the illegal sale of intoxicants is very largely in the hands of irresponsible men from whom it is exceedingly difficult to collect fines. With provision for imposing and enforcing hard labor from these gentry it will be much easier to deal with the liquor business as well as other offences.

The annual report of the Secretary for Agriculture for the Province of Nova Scotia has been issued. It contains a review of the work of the various departments of the Agricultural College, including a report of the experiments carried on with field crops, fertilizers, live stock, etc., as well as a statement of the number of students attending and the character of the work done by the college students during the year. One of the most striking paragraphs of this part of the report is that which deals with dairying in the Province of Nova Scotia, in which it is shown that, despite the drought of 1911, 50 per cent more butter was manufactured in the creameries than in the previous year. The report also contains an outline of the work connected with the various agricultural societies and associations in the Province of Nova Scotia and a most flourishing condition of affairs is indicated.

In accord with the practice established five years ago, of introducing into the annual report a series of popular articles on the topical subjects, the present report contains a series of very interesting and valuable articles on horse breeding in Nova Scotia. These articles deal with almost every phase of the horse breeding business, including a description of the various phases of the management of horses and a practical discussion of the methods of treatment of the ordinary diseases of horses.

The whole report is well illustrated and will prove a most interesting and valuable document to the farmers of Nova Scotia. It is free of charge and distribution will be sent free to those who make application for it.

## Wolfville 'Friendless' and Indifferent.

EDITOR ACADIAN.—With your permission I will undertake to give your correspondent of last week all the information I can on the proposed abattoir, but hope he will recognize the difficulty of fully covering a large question in the limits afforded by a column or so in your paper.

No, I will not admit that the Wolfville site is the best on 'every count.' If I were taking a bird's eye view of the river and this part of the county I would say that the Kingsport site was better than that at Wolfville and secondly that the Wolfville site was better than that at Port Williams. But when I come down to earth and look into the practicability of the three sites, I have no difficulty in definitely favoring the claims of Port Williams.

Your correspondent objects to my statement that Wolfville is 'friendless' in this matter. Then I suppose I must explain.

A year ago the Wolfville site was strongly urged by the representative of the Federal government and houses

It is understood that at the spring session of the Municipal Council, which is to be held next week at Kentville, a proposition will be made for some plan for providing facilities so that in the case of criminals imprisoned within the county, hard labor may be imposed. At present and during past years violators of law have had the privilege of living at the public expense and spending their time in idleness. Such a state of affairs is injurious both to the physical and moral condition of the prisoners. At the present session of the provincial legislature provision is being made that when any person is committed to any jail or lock-up under a commitment requiring hard labor, such hard labor may be performed either in such jail or lock-up or in any place within the county in which such jail or lock-up is situated. The council of any incorporated town is also empowered to make by-laws and regulations for the proper enforcement and carrying out of commitments requiring hard labor in the lock-up, or within the town in which such lock-up is situated. We believe that this step is one that will appeal to the business sense of our people generally and that the application of methods suggested will have the effect of greatly reducing minor crimes and add materially to the prosperity of the county. At the present time the illegal sale of intoxicants is very largely in the hands of irresponsible men from whom it is exceedingly difficult to collect fines. With provision for imposing and enforcing hard labor from these gentry it will be much easier to deal with the liquor business as well as other offences.

The annual report of the Secretary for Agriculture for the Province of Nova Scotia has been issued. It contains a review of the work of the various departments of the Agricultural College, including a report of the experiments carried on with field crops, fertilizers, live stock, etc., as well as a statement of the number of students attending and the character of the work done by the college students during the year. One of the most striking paragraphs of this part of the report is that which deals with dairying in the Province of Nova Scotia, in which it is shown that, despite the drought of 1911, 50 per cent more butter was manufactured in the creameries than in the previous year. The report also contains an outline of the work connected with the various agricultural societies and associations in the Province of Nova Scotia and a most flourishing condition of affairs is indicated.

In accord with the practice established five years ago, of introducing into the annual report a series of popular articles on the topical subjects, the present report contains a series of very interesting and valuable articles on horse breeding in Nova Scotia. These articles deal with almost every phase of the horse breeding business, including a description of the various phases of the management of horses and a practical discussion of the methods of treatment of the ordinary diseases of horses.

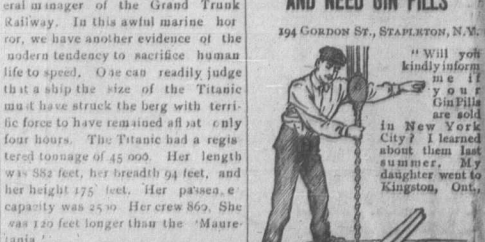

It is pleasing to learn from the officers of the Canadian Association that the children throughout Canada are taking a keen interest in the essay competition on 'What Good Roads Mean to Canada,' and that in all parts of the Dominion papers are being forwarded to the headquarters of the association at New Westminster, B. C.

As an encouragement to the children to busy themselves in the preparation of these essays, the president of the Canadian Highway Association, Mr. W. J. Kerr, is offering valuable gold, silver and silver gilt medals, and also a souvenir silver pin to all competitors whose papers attain a certain standard of merit.

While it should not be necessary for this incentive to interest the young people of Canada in Good Roads, and their relation to the well-being of the country, the fact remains that in this, as in other things, some inducement is often necessary in order to awaken the younger generation to the economic needs of this country.

Good Roads, as everyone will admit, are badly needed in Canada at the present time, but it is only when the people at large are ready to demand this—and merely to request it, but we can not do the ambitious, whether local, municipal, provincial or federal, to set up on anything like a large scale. The aim and purpose of the Canadian Highway Association, as is well known, is to establish a Transcontinental road that will reach from Halifax, N. S. to Alburny, B. C. and while it is not the intention of this organization to do more than educate the public and act in an unofficial advisory capacity, it is yet doing much good in this cause and will largely instrumental in getting this Highway, four thousand miles long, completed within five years.

We in this district must do our share of this work, and it behooves the Good Roads' advocates of Kings county to build, themselves and lend all the assistance they can to the officers of the Canadian Highway Association in the good work they are doing for Canada.

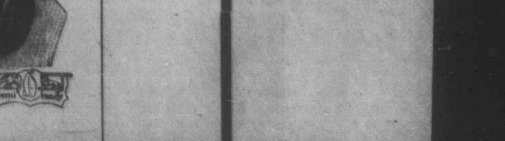

**Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.**

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or of any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made, or occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

In certain districts a homesteader of good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead for pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homesteaded patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on the land and erect a house of 2000 sq. ft.
