The fish consumers are, after all, the people to be considered first. Yet the basic facts of the decline of Gloucester made necessary by the passage of this measure seem to be conceded. 

Now that typhus fever appears to be spreading in the city, people should lency Sir Ralph Williams was touchbe careful not to visit houses where cd as he read the story in Saturday's been propagated in a great measure cangerous character when first it appeared and to-day with its ravages and virulent character self evident many cannot be brought to realize how, contagious it is. The presence of this pest in our midst attacking residents in sections more or less remote from each other suggests a terrible ossibility, and one which a warning made in season may help materally to obviate. In a few weeks' time thous ands of outharbor men will collect in St. John's to prepare for the scalfishery and they should take every precaution to avoid becoming infected for if the disease should break out in one or more of our sealing steamer the outcome would be terrible to contemplate. A large percentage of the men have friends in the city, and in many instances remain domicile with them for days before sailing or the voyage, while others rent rooms There is always the danger of con tracting disease and we do not wis to appear as an alarmist in warning these men to be careful. Carelessnes or indifference on their part may b fraught with dire results, and w hope this friendly hint will be received ed in the spirit in whch it is mad For weeks past there has been a ri mour going the rounds of the cit, that during the fall several persons had suffered from a disease which was accompanied by a high fever, bu no doctors were called and the pa tients were very weak while recover ing. Many believe it is possible that this might have been typhus. If such were the case and these residence still remaining without disinfection the germs of disease must be still about them, and hence the necessity for greater care on the part of citi Typhus is a scourge which should render the people of St. John' wary, for some 45 years ago man its ravages

The Herring Fishery

The herring fishery is prosecute at present in Bay of Islands in the following manner: The fish ar caught by residents with nets se through the ice. The herrings ar then bought by local firms and b agents for American firms. Th Gloucester buyers load their purchases on board railway cars and ship them to Port aux Basques, where they have American vessels awaiting to convey them to Boston, New York and other ports as the product of the fisheries of the United States. Our local firms ship their purchases various places including Chicago Philadelphia, St. Louis, Nova Scotia New Brunswick, Montreal, South Coast, and St. John's.

Forty cents per hundred on th ice is the price paid to the fisherme for the herring. Then teamsters ar paid ten cents per hundred for hau ing them to the premises or railwa station; while laborers are paid 2 cents per hour for packing and load ing them on board cars.-Western

The Haffnia Arrives.

The s.s. Haffnia, Capt. Garth, arriv ed here vesterday morning after run of 14 days from Trow, Scotland with a cargo of coal to Crosbie & Co. The hull, rigging, winches, boats davits, bridge and other parts of the ship was encased with ice in som places to the thickness of 6 inches The ship had stormy weather al through the voyage with head winds and a mountainous sea. While com ing in over the Banks it was very frosty, the glass registering severa degrees below zero. It was difficult nt times for the crew to work the ship owing to the ice forming on the decks and gear. The ship after discharging will be laden with fish for the Mediterranean by A. H.
