Mr. J. C. Morris addressed the members on the "Influence of the Press" yesterday afternoon at the Pleasant Sunday Afternoon meeting. He traced the growth of literature and showed that more had been done the past 150 years to advance literature than for a thousand years previous. With the growth of literature came the growth of education. In the early days learning was confined to the few, whereas in modern times the masses enjoyed literature as well as the classes.
