

#### Mr. Bennett and City Improvement.

We turned to the official Assembly report of the speech of Mr. Bennett, M. H. A., on the bill to amend the Municipal Act, with interest, because of Mr. Bennett's experience in City Council work, and his opportunities to judge how municipalities are conducted elsewhere. We cordially agree with his view that the time is rapidly approaching when the best interests of the community demand a material enlargement of the powers of Minicipal Government. Mr. Bennett strikes the keynote in his exhortation for the display of greater public interest in municipal matters. He said:

"I think the citizens of St. John's have not been sufficiently active. I do not think they are awake to their the Palace and announced the death responsibilities. Enthusiastic civic affairs should be second only to the private affairs of the individual citizens. Indeed the civic affairs are the private affairs of the citizens, who a brief speech he paid a tribute to his are anxious to have their homes comfortable and attractive and everything of succeeding such a ruler and condesirable. But while active in our private affairs we have no public spirit about the affairs of the city." As to what is needed Mr. Bennett

declared :-"I have always held that St. John's is to-day a city that requires an improved condition both as regards its sanitary arrangements and general upkeep' and care of the city. Comparing St. John's with other cities of similar size, I am afraid the comparison is very bad as far as we are concerned."

Mr. Bennett was especially emphatic on the desirability of extending the paving of Water Street at both ends, and of paving Duckworth Street and of the cross-street connecting the latter wih Water Street. He said there was plenty of paving material in the suburbs of the city. In refer ence to this matter, we would suggest that while such material would do well for the foundation of the street pevements, it is worthy of consideration, whether the surface layer should not be of material that would render

the traffic practically noiseless. The experience with the hard stone sets of Water Street, with the almost intolerable noise of the traffic pas sing over it, should act as a warning to the City Fathers.

As to the financial aspects of such civic improvements. Mr. Bennett contends that the present sanitary staff would be sufficient to look after the sanitation and the general clean-up. But he appreciates that it will be necessary to have additional money for these improvements.

His remarks were not made in the spirit of petty fault-finding. He paid satisfaction." a tribute to the advances made in civic administration since the passing of the present Municipal Act, and points to the fact that the City now pays regularly the interest on the civic debt and has done a great work in establishing the new water service. Yet he holds there is room for reform.

Here are his words:-"With the revenue the Council have at their disposal I have no doubt they are doing the best they can, but, sir, that revenue is yearly increasing, and I question very much whether the general condition of affairs is improving proportionately with the rev-



# Cable News.

In the Titanic inquiry yesterday, charles Grove, third officer of the Californian, on watch when the vessel now called the ship of mystery vas first sighted the night of the atastrophe, was called to the stand. Ie testified that he told the captain of the Californian that the vessel was passenger steamer, but the captain lought otherwise. He also said that at 11.40 on the fatal night, almost at ne moment when the Titanic struck the iceherg, lights of a steamer which e was watching from the bridge of he California was shut out. He be leved the altering of the steamer's ourse two points to port would ac that when the vessel struck her helm also said the steamer he saw had two nasthead lights, which gives further evidence that it was a passenger steamer. When first sighted by the California, Grove reported to the captain, who came on the bridge. He tried to signal her with the Morse amp but failed, and the captain said he did not look like a passenger steamer. Grove replied: "It is, sir; out she has put out her lights." The captain then said the only passenger steamer in the vicinity was the Tianic. Grove further testified that he also told second officer Herbert Stone, who relieved him, that the vessel was passenger steamer, and that she had shut off her lights at 11.40. At the time it was his impression that the lights had been out out, which is generally done about that time, bu after reflection he concluded that the lights had been shut off by the steamer changing her course. When called next morning and told the Titanic had gone down, he went to Stone's oom who told him he had seen rock ts sent up during his watch. Lord Mersey: "My impression is that when Stone said that he believed the ockets were from the Titanic. Do ou believe the steamer you saw was the Titanic?" Grove: "After what I



Bank Use Finger Print System.

And Customers Seem to Like it-Invented by an Englishman Named Flack.

New York, May 9.-The fingerprint system for the identification and the protection of depositors is being rapidly adopted by New York banks. The North Side Bank is the latest institution to adopt the fingerprint system, regarding which Secretary Arthur Ekirsch said to-day: "It is not the Bertillon system used by the police, but was devised by an Englishman named P. A. Flack, who

for fifteen years was employed by the British Government at Singapore, India. Instead of the thumb, we take the imprint of three fingers of the right hand-the tips of the index, middle and third finger. "We provide blanks for our de-

positors upon which they write their signatures and leave their finger prints. These we keep on file, to have in case of emergency, as when, for instance, the genuineness of a signature may be questioned. We have yet to come across a depositor who objects to this. In fact they seem to like the idea immensely."

Wytheville, Va., May 7 .- Further evidence that Floyd Allen wore bullet proof protection in the Hillsville court when the shooting up of the court took place March 14 was brought out during the trial of Allen here to-day for the murder of Prosecutor Foster. Deputy Sheriff Gillespie testified that after the shooting began he had fired four shots point blank at Floyd Allen. Gillespie said he had wondered why the shots had not taken effect.

e made a careful examination of the court room but could find no shot in the wall opposite the point from which he had shot at Allen. Before Allen was arrested he changed his clothes and Gillepie firmly believes the Allens clansmen wore breastplate or some other armor protection.




