

RULES and REGULATIONS!

Under the authority of Chapter 36, Section 14, of the Consolidated Starulations have been made by the un lersigned Stipendiary Magistrate:

1. Within the Municipal Limits no person shall "Coast." Skate or Slide lown the hills or highways or streets, except in the West End of the City from the crest of Palk's Hill to the Cross Roads, and in the East End down Robinson's Hill, under a penalty not exceeding Five Dollars fo every breach hereof.

2. Within the Municipal Limits any exceeding Five Dollars for each of

3. No person shall play games in the highways or other places calculated to inconvenience or annoy under a penalty not exceeding Five Dollars for every breach of this Regula

NOTE.-The property of parents may be liable under distress for any penalty imposed on a minor.





NEW YORK, Jan. 26. The Prince of Wales kicked the winning goal at the Association Football match for Magdalen College eleven against Keble College second eleven. His shot was the only score in the game.

DOMODOSSOLA, Italy, Jan. 26. Jean Dielovucci, the Peruvian aviator, flew across the Swiss Alps from the Brig in the canton of Valaisjavalais, to this city, in less than half an hour. He ascended at Brig exactly on the stroke of noon, landing here at

LONDON, Jan. 26.

The first report of the Radium Institute, published in the British Medical Journal, indicates the addition of a long list of minor non-malignant conditions, such as birthmarks, eczema, tubercular glands, etc., which radium often cures. It almost always improves the health of patients suffering from cancer of a deadly type. Out of 539 patients treated, 53 were apparently cured, 28 certainly cured, 245 improved, 70 not improved, 88 abandoned the treatment and 55 died. By "apparently cured" are meant those cases of cancer where all traces of the original disease have disappeared, and no signs of any recurrence, so far as can be ascertained. Those who abandoned treatment include those cases in which the patient had to leave London, or could not afford to travel repeatedly from the country to the Institute.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26. Chairman Adamson predicts that one of the first requests of Presidentelect Wilson will be for the repeal of the free passage provision, applying to American ships in the Panama Canal, If Secretary Knox succeeds in avoiding or postponing Britain's demands, it is said by Adamson that the President will undoubtedly remove all foundation for illogical claims of those people who, professing themselves opposed to subsidies, are still in favor of discrimination. England may justly claim that if the Canal is to be used as an instrument to distribute subsidies under treaty, these must be equal to all nations. The true issue is, shall we rob our own people by unjust discrimination to enrich a coastwise shipping trust. I would, not, says Mr. Adamson, at all object to a brush with England, if we had just cause but it looks very foolish and unprofitable to maintain any sort of a row with her to defend the immoral and unjust robbery of our treasury and the masses of our people to confer benefits upon special interests.

VIENNA, Jan. 26. Advices from Constantinople say that the Young Turks Party, is, thus far, backed only by a part of the Army, and that the majority of the Army, including the older officers in high positions and the majority of the influential clergy are against the Young Turks. Enver Bey's following, adds the despatch, consists of several hundred officers, infatuated b the cry of liberation of the sacre places, and these by men who ar likely to turn against the Young Turks, if they do not succeed in say ing Adrianople.

BERLIN, Jan. 26. In view of the suddenness of the change in the Turkish situation, officials here believe that the new administration should be given time to work out an answer to the joint not of the Powers. It is understood that the Balkan officials hold the same view, and will not crowd the Young Turks. Regarding the proposed naval demonstrations by France, it is believed that they are not authorized by the French government, and the opinion is expressed that there is no likelihood that the consent of all the

LONDON, Jan. 26. The Balkan plenipotentiaries, who have received full powers from their Governments appointed a committee to-day to draft a note to the Turkish plenipotentiaries, explaining why the Peace Conference must now be con sidered as broken off. It is hoped that the draft will be ready for the approval of the full delegation on scorer!' Monday. This action on the part of the Allies is one of a series of well considered forms of pressure by which the Balkan delegates hope to obtain their object without resuming war. The meeting to-day lasted for an hour and a half, and the course followed was given earnest consideration. Two distinct views were manifested, one for an immediate rupture of negotiations, with a view to resumption of war, and the other favoring a temporizing policy in order to avoid any irrevocable steps. The latter course triumphed, and a committee was appointed, consisting of on member from each delegation.


