THE GREATER QUESTION.

At this season of the year for Farmers with up-to-date ideas is, what are the best means to use to get the best returns from the land.

Fertilizers must be used liberally If large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sulphate of Ammonia has been proved to give the best returns, and is the most valuable and economical source of Nitrogen for agricultural purposes.

For vegetables, grass, and all leat) crops, about one and a half cwt. pe; acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant s making it's g.owth, as well as before sowing the seed.

If a liquid manure is preferred, a 14 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quantity should not be exceeded.

It is a good plan to reduce the Sui phate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful.

For potatoes the following mixture is strongly recommended: 40 lbs. Superphosphate.

10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia. 15 lbs. Sulphate of Potash. 21 lbs. SULPHATE OF AMMONIA.

Apply at the rate of 10 to 11 lbs. to 43 square yards.

The use of Carbonate of Magnesia, in conjunction with Sulphate of Ammonia, is of great importance in po-

tato culture. For turnips use the following:-66 lbs. Superphosphate. 13 lbs. Fine bone meal.

NEWS BY CABLE.


BOSTON, To-day. The mystery surrounding the idenfire in the west bound trans-atlantic steamer lane, south of Sable Island, solved to-night when a wireless message from the Cunard Liner Franconia told of the burning of the freighter Columbian, and the rescue of thirteen members of the crew from a small boat. The death of chief stewvivors had in charge, the disappearance of a second boat with nineteen men: including the first and second officers is also reported. Whether boat commanded by Captain McDonald of the Columbian. The Survivors were so exhausted by their experience they could tell little of what happened. The steamship officials expressed the opinion that the omission in the wireless messages of a mention of the Captain might be laid to this fact. After rescuing the occupants of the first boat, the Franconia searched until nightfall for the rest of the crew, but without result. Then Captain Miller, Cunarder, sent word ashore he had given up the search and would proceed to Boston with the survivors and his 1733 passengers. He said he expected to arrive at Bostop Lightship at midnight Wednesday. The the Columbian has not been given up however. Before turning for his destination Capt. Miller had notified the steamers Manhattan and - Haverford. both East bound, of the missing boats. They sent word they had changed their course and were heading toward the burning steamer.






