Master of Words.

Death of Sir James Murray.

We regret to announce that Sir James Murray, the maker of the "New English Dictionary," died at Oxford yesterday, aged 78. There is pathetic in the fact that Sir James Murray should have died on the day that Volume 10 of his gigantic work, which deals with words from trunk to turn-down, and is not yet the end of the work, was reviewed in some morning newspapers.

Thirty years ago Sir James Murray went to Oxford, but his life's work was begun in 1879: it was the making of the "New English Dictionary"—a catalogue of the English speech—Sir James built an ugly tin house at Oxford—at which he was jibbed—and there he kept his word and their biographies and quotations by the hundred thousand. For thirty-six years he worked at his task with great courage. In 1913 he prophesied that the last volume would appear on his eightieth birthday.

As soon as each volume appeared it was immediately revised, increasing the labour tenfold. Lately American influence complicated the task by introducing new words and giving new meanings to old ones.

Sir James Murray sabbled libraries for derivations and wrote to all parts of the world in search of information.

Only a few weeks ago he was tracking down "Sufragette" which was first used by Mr. Charles Hand in a despatch from Manchester to The Daily Mail in January, 1906.

THE LASTING FAME.

I'd like to leave behind me some work that will endure, but being a tax-dropper, blind me, the prospect is so poor! *Mainly lates to think of sleeping through the ages four or five, with nothing brilliant keeping his memory alive.

But there is no standard, or who has built the dwelling upon the shifting sands. One's highest conception of the beautiful, one's finest ideals and aspirations, one's purest longings for peace and happiness ought to have expression in one's ideal of Heaven. If you set up any rigid ideal for everyone you make that impossible.

"I am going a long way With these thou seest—if indeed I go (For all my mind is clouded with a doubt) To the island-valley of Avalon, Where falls not hail or rain or any snow, Nor ever wind blows loudly; but it lies Deep-meadowed, happy, fair, with orchard lawns And bowery hollows crowned with summer sea, Where I will heal me of my grievous wound."

Suddenly it came over me. "Why, that's Heaven!" and I can't tell you what a different feeling it gave me about death.

"A place where you want to do what's right" was the wistful ideal of an impulsive little friend of mine. Not so bad an ideal, is it?

I know some of my more conservative reader friends are calling all this irrelevant. Let me tell you something, folks. Some of the sweetest, solemnest thought I have ever had came to me when I was brooding over this matter. Is that irrelevant?

DECLARES WORLD TO HAVE PERIOD OF RISING PRICES.

Oxford, Eng., Aug. 10.—"There will be no more cheap prices; after this war the world is in for a period of rising prices," declared Dr. Slater, principal of Ruskin College, Oxford, in the first of a series of lectures on economic phases of the world war.

"I do not believe," Dr. Slater said, "that there will be a period of poverty after the war. There will be no necessity for poverty, and such poverty as there is will be due to misapplication of the productive powers which will be available. It will be the poverty which comes from wasted resources, and not from inadequate resources.

"There will be no return to pre-war prices. That means that there will be a permanent rise of wages and other permanent readjustments to meet the higher prices. The proper policy of the Trades Unions is to accept the war bonuses, not for the war duration, but for the duration of the higher prices."

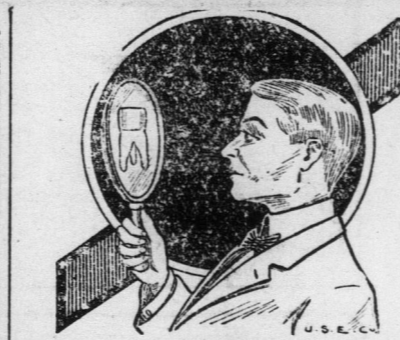

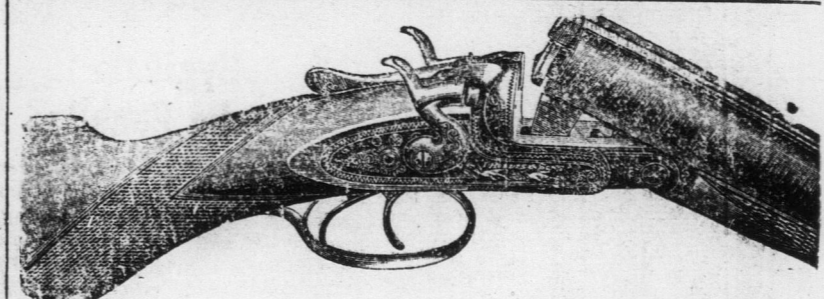

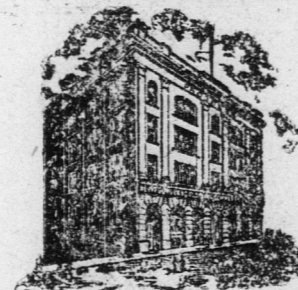
