





Educating Oysters.

Teaching Them to Make Pearls.

In Japan there is a great oyster arm where the bivalves are taught to nake pearls. It was Dr. Mikimoto, a well-known scientist, who conceived he idea that oysters might be educated and made to work for man. Afer many years of costly experimentaion he discovered the method in use o-day.


The farm has an area of about fifty quare miles and the water varies in epth from five to fifteen fathoms. The armer selects the spots where the larvae of oysters are most numerous and then he plants small rocks and stones. These are soon covered with

A naval division took part in the breaching of the original Ger-man main line, north of the Ancer. Nov. 13, and the capturing of Bean-court, the following morning, after 24 hours of continuous fighting when the Germans hoisted a dirty handkerchief on a long pole as a signal of surren-der.
