FRENCH SOCIALISTS.

STATEMENT EXPECTED FROM HENDERSON.

LONDON, Aug. 13. A statement by Arthur Henderson was expected to be made this afternoon in Parliament, and it was assumed that the Premier would reply immediately. It is reported that Henderson would demand the production of all communications between the British and Russian Governments with reference to the Stockholm conference, with a view to showing that the Premier put a wrong interpretation on the Russian telegram he quoted in his letter to Mr. Henderson. If the Commons endorses the demand a secret session is likely to be held for the communication of certain documents. Reference is being made in the morning papers to a telegram, which it is stated M. Kerensky, Russian Premier, sent to Albert Thomas, French Minister of Munitions, declaring that the Russian Government not only was not interested in the Stockholm meeting, but that Premier Kerensky himself hoped the
