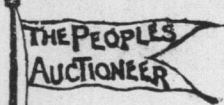

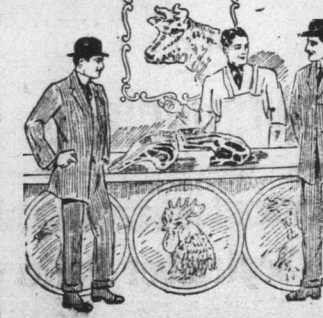

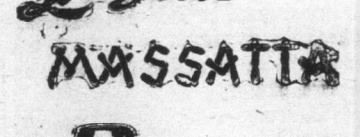

"He said you were ill—that you wanted me!" panted Maida. "Oh, Carrie, I am so glad that you are here! I am not afraid now. I do not care for anything now."

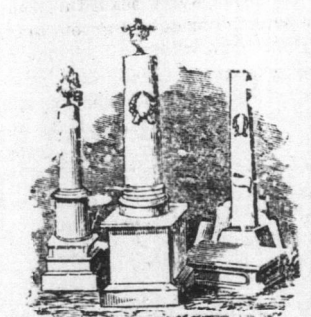
Robert regarded the two girls under his knit brows. Then he turned to Carrie.

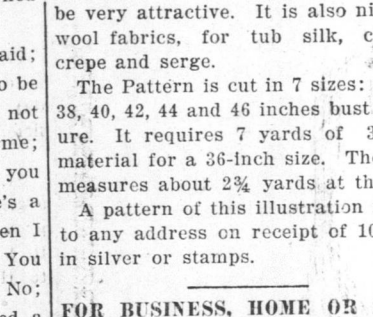

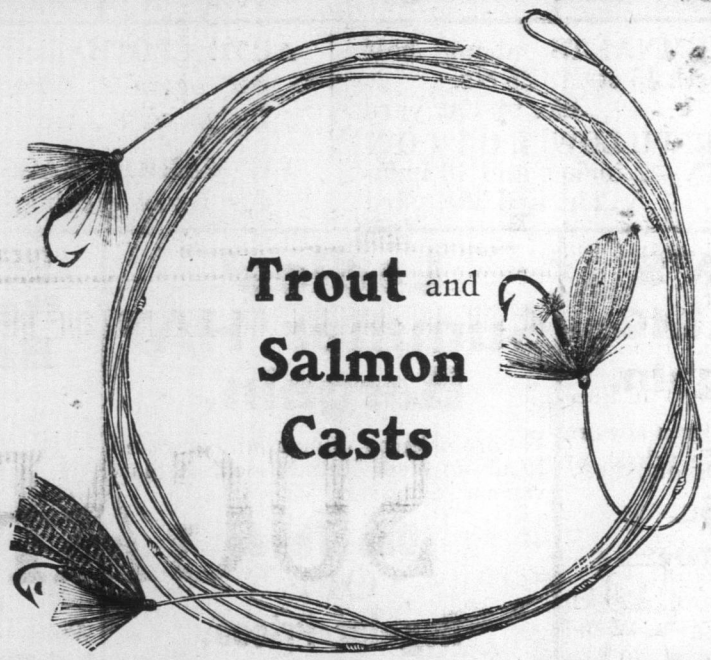

**Tacoma Mariner, Descendant of Edward I., Dies.**

Death Comes to Capt. Alfred Brotherton—Widely Known Mariner and Pilot Descendant of Plantagenets.

Last, with the exception of one, of the descendants of King Edward I. of England, "the house of Plantagenet," Captain Alfred Brotherton, widely known Pacific coast mariner and pilot, died at his home, 701 South J street, Tuesday evening, of heart failure. He was 67 years of age. While Captain Brotherton had been in poor health for several months, he was thought to be on the road to recovery, and his death was entirely unexpected to family and friends. In his life, say his friends, he had lived to the motto of the Plantagenets, "Assiduita Vincimus" ("We Conquer by Perseverance.")

Captain Brotherton was born in Liverpool July 25, 1850, and had been a resident of Tacoma for eight years, coming here from Port Townsend, where for a number of years he was engaged as a pilot and in the stevedoring business. The advent of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway was the direct cause of Captain Brotherton coming to Tacoma, as he interested himself in inducing the Oaaka Shosen Kaisha line to operate its steamers out of Tacoma in connection with the railway company. It is said by shipping men that it was through the hard work and perseverance of Captain Brotherton that this line was brought to Tacoma. During the time the line has been here Captain Brotherton had been pilot for

the company and contracting stevedore, the latter taking up his time entirely the past few years.

**Widely Known on Coast.**

The death of Captain Brotherton marks the passing of a mariner known all over the Pacific coast. He was a certified master mariner and during his life had commanded vessels sailing nearly all the seas. Captain Brotherton and his brother, Gildart, are declared to be the last direct descendants of King Edward I. of England. The family traces its ancestry back in English history to the famous Plantagenet, it is stated.

Captain Brotherton is survived by his widow and two daughters, Mrs. Thomas C. Hammond, of Seattle, and Mrs. Robert Watkins of Port Townsend, and by a brother, Gildart Brotherton, of Rhosygadfa, England.

The body was taken to the Buckley King company's. The funeral services will be private and held Thursday morning at 11 from the residence. Rev. Clarence W. Weyer will officiate. It is requested by the family that no flowers be sent. The remains will be cremated.

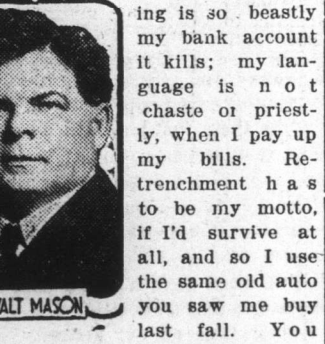

INCORRIGIBLE.

DUBLIN, To-day. J. J. Walsh, a prominent member of the Sinn Fein party, whose death sentence for participation in the recent rebellion was commuted to ten years' penal servitude and who was lately granted an amnesty, was arrested here yesterday in connection with the formation of Sinn Fein Clubs in the south of Ireland.

SPAIN UNDER MARTIAL LAW.

MADRID, To-day. The whole of Spain has been placed under martial law following disorders resulting from a general strike which is spreading. This decision was reached at a meeting of the Cabinet.

KERENSKY'S CONFIDENCE.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Premier Kerensky in replying to the message of good will which King George sent him at the beginning of the fourth year of the war, said: "I am certain the Russian people will find the necessary strength to surmount the serious trials of the present time and conduct the world war to an end which will be worthy of the terrible sacrifices already made by every nation which is struggling for right against might."

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, To-day. An official statement from British Headquarters in France issued last night reads: "The hostile artillery showed increased activity during the morning south east of the Arras-Cambrai Road and in the Neuport Sector. Our airplanes and balloons carried out a great deal of successful work yesterday in conjunction with our artillery. Many photographs were taken and four aeroplanes were bombed heavily. Enemy air craft again were particularly aggressive in the fighting in the air. Nine German aeroplanes were brought down, two of which fell within our lines and eight others were driven down out of control. Seven of our machines are missing."

FIGHTING AT LENS.

BRITISH FRONT, FRANCE, BELGIUM.—(By Associated Press).—Lens was the centre of main activity on the British front last night. The Germans continued to exhibit apprehension in the heavy bombardment of the town, and approached near Lens and to the West and North West of the city. The Canadian lines have been gradually fighting about this important French mining centre and the Canadian lines now hold strong positions in the western environs of Lens. This apparently has been disturbing the Germans, who have placed a high value on the retention of Lens because of its strategic position in the Pas de Calais coal fields. Yesterday was another big day for the British Air Service. A large number of battles were fought over this front with honours decidedly in favor of the British. At least six enemy planes were destroyed and others were damaged. The British fighters were brought down out of control. In the course of last week's air fighting one brilliant young Britisher accounted for his fortieth machine.

TURNED AWAY FROM LONDON.

LONDON, To-day. Another official statement issued this evening says: "The reports of our pilots show conclusively that the enemy air craft formation which attacked the eastern counties yesterday was making for London. On sighting a large number of our airplanes, which were sent up against them, they turned abruptly and made their way out to sea, again dropping some bombs on the southern counties and unloading the rest when out at sea. The action of our anti-craft guns was of great assistance to our fighting squadrons."

A Ship-Wrecked Crew Arrive in Halifax.

Went Down in a Storm, But on the Same Steamer Which Landed Them at an Atlantic Port, There Were Crews of Six Other Vessels That Had Been Torpedoed.

Halifax, August 10.—The mate, cook and crew of three men, John Murphy, A. Tucker, T. Eison, William Turpin and P. McLennan, of the schooner Conqueror which was lost at sea when on a voyage from Cadix, Spain, for St. John's, Nfld., with a cargo of salt, arrived in Halifax last night and are at the Sailor's Home. They are all Newfoundlanders, and will be sent to their homes this week. They came from Boston via Yarmouth, and were landed at an Atlantic port on Monday by a French steamer, which took them on board at the Azores islands on her voyage across. The Captain, James Kent, was brought across with his men and will reach Halifax in a day or two and will accompany the men home.

The Conqueror was a vessel of 35 tons, sprung askew in a storm, was abandoned and went down off Flores, June 11. She encountered no submarine, according to the crew.

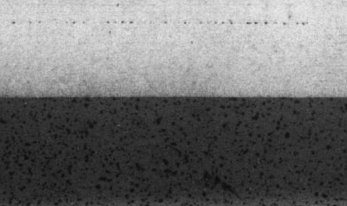

Prior to the outbreak of the Civil war this country was full of able-bodied jingoes who wanted everybody to get into the thick of the fray with a flag in one hand and a meat axe in the other. Every town and hamlet had its star jingo who mounted a cracker box and hurled defiance at the foe between copious chews of tobacco. As soon as the call for volunteers came, however, thousands of these orators disappeared from sight and had to be dragged out of a hair trunk in the attic, with terror written all over their knee joints. This impresses the lesson that you never can tell by the size of a man's mouth how far his spinal column will carry him in the hour of need.

The jingo has always tried to plunge this country into a war which other people would have to fight. This is because the average jingo has never been in battle himself and doesn't know what it feels like. If all the jingoes who have been doing business on the American continent for the past twenty years could be gathered together and thrust into the first line trenches in northern France, those who returned home in one piece would have more respect for war and would not be so anxious to introduce their friends and neighbors to a life-sized specimen.

The jingo is sometimes a politician who started out by bunking the common people and is unable to learn any of the new steps. It isn't always the man with the largest flag and the loudest voice who got into the recruiting office first. America has millions of patriots who are not saying anything about it. The real fighting over in Europe is being done by the quiet men, the farmers and clerks and day laborers, the obscure men who want nothing so much as peace and the privilege of returning home to their families. If the jingo exists in Europe to-day, he will be found far from the front, within easy reach of a bomb-proof basement, and don't you forget it.

### From a Newfoundland Prisoner of War.

Kriegsgefangenenlager, Langensalza, June 12, 1917.

My Dear Aunt,—A few more lines to let you know how things are going. I have not told you yet anything of how we were captured. It was like this:—We were about 3,000 feet over the lines under some clouds, when we were attacked by some 8 or 9 machines, my engine started giving trouble and we got separated from our own lot. Once were were separated we were in for it, and some five machines set on us. Several bullets came through the radiator, one of which knocked my observer unconscious. Of course that put the hat on it. Then another hit the engine and fixed it. Well there was nothing left to do but to endeavour to get down our side of the line without further damage. But, in every rose there is a thorn, and our old bus settled down 10 yards behind the German front line. We were both thrown out and stunned slightly. We were both very lucky indeed to come off so lightly. They treated us very decently in the trenches, patching us up and sending us to a field hospital. From there we went to a clearing station and then here. Of course there are some funny instances I have to tell you when next we meet in dear old London. It hasn't spoilt my love for flying at all and the next opportunity for a flip I'll take it. I don't know quite when we shall move to a permanent camp but I don't think it will be long. My bruised ankle is quite all right and I have it massaged every day. There are two observers here, from our squadron, one is Moody (my observer) and the other is Smith, the first chap to go over the lines with me. There are 7 other officers in this hospital and we are all a happy lot, so don't worry. If possible I shall enclose cheques in my letters at different times. Of course you know very well what I expect in the contents of parcels. If you send them to this address the English Committee here will send them on to me. If you could manage it I should like two parcels a week, but if it is not possible, why don't worry.

We can only write a certain amount, but we are lucky to be able to write as much as we can. We are allowed six pages in a letter. I shall finish this letter to-morrow.

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

#### NO PASSPORTS.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The first hint of the Government's attitude regarding the granting of passports to delegates to the Stockholm Conference was given during question time in the Commons to-day when A. J. Balfour, British Foreign Minister, in reply to a question asked by Joseph King, said, no passports had been granted to delegates to the Irish Trade Union Congress to attend the Stockholm Conference, and that none would be granted if applied for.

#### BELGIAN LAWYER TO ADDRESS AMERICAN BAR.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 13. Gaston Delavale, noted Belgian lawyer, who was counsel for the United States legation at Brussels and who acted as legal adviser for the English nurse Edith Cavell, who was executed by the Germans, arrived here to-day on a British ship. He comes to address the annual meeting of the American Bar Association at Saratoga in September, upon Prussian law as applied in Belgium.

#### ORDERS REVOKED.

BOSTON, Aug. 13. The orders closing this port between sunset and sunrise were revoked to-day by the Navy Department, it was announced by port officials.

#### ARTILLERY FIGHTING.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 13. A frontier correspondent sends telegraphic reports that terrific artillery fighting began yesterday evening in Belgium, between Ypres and the sea and that it showed no signs of diminishing to-day.

#### MORE CHANGES.

LONDON, Aug. 13. In well informed circles, says the Times, further changes in the personnel of the Admiralty Board are expected shortly. Admiral Jellicoe, First Sea Lord, feels that he is in urgent need of rest. In the event of Admiral Jellicoe's resignation, says the newspaper, Admiral Sir David Beatty, Commander of the British Grand Fleet, probably may succeed him.

#### HIDDEN GERMAN WIRELESS STATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. Renewed reports of hidden German wireless stations or supply bases on the Mexican Gulf coast, may lead to a search of these waters by American warships. The reports to the State and Navy departments contain no confirmation of the report of the discovery of wireless stations on Lobos Island, and the coast of Campeche, but it was indicated that a careful scrutiny of the southern waters might be made for traces of German raiders and supply craft.

#### GREECE AT WAR.

LONDON, Aug. 13. In reply to a question in the Commons to-day Foreign Secretary Balfour said Greece was now definitely at war with Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. In a statement at the time of the assembling of the Greek Parliament last month, Premier Venizelos said Greece was in the war with the Entente. No formal declaration to this effect was considered necessary, the Venizelos Government, established at Salonika before the deposition of King Constantine, having declared war and placed troops in the field.

#### AIRPLANE EXPORT PROHIBITED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. Neutral countries have been pouring in orders for American airplanes at such a rate that an order has been issued prohibiting the export of aircraft except by license.

#### THE AIR RAID.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The text of the statement issued by the British Admiralty says: One hostile airplane of the Gotha type was destroyed during the return of the raiders to the Belgian coast, and one hostile seaplane was destroyed off the coast of Flanders at approximately the same time. A large number of naval machines engaged the other raiders over the sea without decisive result. The pilot who destroyed the Gotha and who was flying in a land machine reports he fired on and pursued an enemy airplane flying at 12,000 feet, from North Foreland to about 15 miles off Zeebrugge where he lost the hostile aircraft. Returning to the mouth of the Thames he observed anti-aircraft fire bursting in the vicinity of Southend. He flew in that direction climbing. He observed eight Gotha airplanes followed by four British machines steering northeast. The enemy machines were about 2,000 feet above him when he got beneath them. He pursued, climbing to 18,000 feet and attacked without result when about thirty miles seaward. At this moment he saw a single hostile machine 4,000 feet below the enemy formation, but flying with it. He attacked it from the front and drove the enemy into the water where he observed him turn over and saw one of the occupants hanging to the tail. He thereupon threw in his lifebelts, and did two or three circuits around him before returning to England. While returning he endeavored to communicate the position of the hostile machine to British destroyers.

#### PACIFISTS HOLD DEMONSTRATION.

GLASGOW, Aug. 13. Pacifists in this city held a large open air demonstration yesterday to protest against the authorities ban on the conference convened by so-called workers, and soldiers' council, which is an off-shoot of the Pacifists' Independent Labor Party. James Ramsay MacDonald, Socialist Labor Member of Parliament, was received with cheers and waving of red flags when he arose to address the meeting. He said, we are called enemies of the soldiers, but in reality we are their greatest friends. Our enemies have tried to bamboozle the labor movement and prevent our delegates from going to Stockholm. They got their answer, and that answer was not for peace at any price but peace at democratic price that would settle the problem of Europe for ever and never call upon our women again to give up their children to death.

#### NOTHING TO REPORT.

LONDON, Aug. 13. There is nothing special to report from the Franco-Belgian front, says to-day's official communication.

#### BULGARIAN KING INTERVIEWED.

BERLIN, Aug. 13. In the course of an interview with a Stuttgart editor, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, who has been visiting the King of Wartenburg, said, he believed the desires for expansion would continue to assert themselves in liberated Russia, and also that the smallest states must constantly be on their guard. The economic future of

his own country, the Bulgarian King said, was dependent upon close association with Germany and Austria-Hungary, which countries would prove ready markets for Bulgaria's agricultural products.

#### ROUMANIAN TOWN CAPTURED.

BERLIN, Aug. 13. Troops under Field Marshal von Mackensen yesterday captured the Rumanian town of Pantiu, a railroad junction in southern Moldavia which has been desperately defended by the Russo-Rumanian forces. The capture of the town is reported officially to-day by the German general staff.

#### MISSION ARRIVES.

A PACIFIC PORT, Aug. 13. The Japanese mission to the United States arrived here to-day headed by Viscount Ishi, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, and was received by a State Department representation and city officials.

#### THE SPANISH SITUATION.

MADRID, Aug. 13. The news to-day from the provinces indicated that railroad trains were running under almost normal conditions, following the strike of railroad employees on Friday night. Premier Dato says the Government has taken all measures to avert a general strike which it is reported the workers wish to undertake.

#### DIPLOMATS ON THE MOVE.

LONDON, Aug. 13. A despatch to the Times from Odessa dated Saturday, says the diplomatic body at Jassy, Romania, was expected in Odessa yesterday, the situation being regarded as dangerous.

#### RAIDERS DESTROYED.

LONDON, Aug. 13. Two of the German machines which yesterday evening raided the English southeast coast watering places, were destroyed by British Naval airplanes. An official statement issued by the Government to-day says that one of the machines was a Gotha airplane and the other a seaplane.

#### SOCIALISTS' OPINION.

LONDON, Aug. 13. Commenting on the decision of the British Labor Conference to send delegates to the Socialist meeting at Stockholm, Yarrow, the Socialist organ of Berlin, says, according to a despatch: "We hope when the delegates arrive that they will understand their mission in quite a different spirit from that indicated by Henderson. They must understand that it is impossible for them to preach a continuation of the war. By giving the German minority Socialists additional evidence against the German Government one single discussion with the Germans will show the English how naive they are. This is an advance we hope for from the coming discussion, therefore, we rejoice in this step forward. It cannot remain the only step."

#### FRENCH SOCIALISTS.

PARIS, Aug. 13. After prolonged discussion the Permanent Administrative Committee of the French Socialist Party has adopted a resolution stating among other things that French Socialist delegates will go to the Stockholm Conference to demand that the government which will refuse to make known their war aims, and whether they are prepared to make reparation in accordance with the rights of the people, be made to do so by Socialist action.

#### STATEMENT EXPECTED FROM HENDERSON.

LONDON, Aug. 13. A statement by Arthur Henderson was expected to be made this afternoon in Parliament, and it was assumed that the Premier would reply immediately. It is reported that Henderson would demand the production of all communications between the British and Russian Governments with reference to the Stockholm conference, with a view to showing that the Premier put a wrong interpretation on the Russian telegram he quoted in his letter to Mr. Henderson. If the Commons endorses the demand a secret session is likely to be held for the communication of certain documents. Reference is being made in the morning papers to a telegram, which it is stated M. Kerensky, Russian Premier, sent to Albert Thomas, French Minister of Munitions, declaring that the Russian Government not only was not interested in the Stockholm meeting, but that Premier Kerensky himself hoped the conference would not be held.

#### COTTON SEED CROP PURCHASED.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Aug. 13. The Government has purchased the 1917-18 crop of Egyptian cotton seed.


