British Naval Casualties. LONDON, Nov. 26. British naval casualties from the outbreak of the war to Nov. 11, 1918, were: Officers 2,466, men 30,885, and 5,383. In addition 14,000 officers and men of British merchant vessels and fishing boats lost their lives pursuing their ordinary white pursuit by enemy action, and were taken prisoners.

Peruvian Government has not received official despatches from Chilean representatives in Chile for some time. The newspapers in Chile and it is believed that a strict censorship is in force in Chile have been ordered to stop the steamer Urubamba, now at Valparaiso, has been ordered to bring all Peruvian citizens who are in Chile to leave Chile. The reported form of a Peruvian Government in Peru is incorrect.

Settlement Assured. NEW YORK, Nov. 26. Difficulties between Peru and Chile which resulted yesterday in the resignation of the Peruvian minister to the United States, have been overcome by the part of the Peruvian Government, Carlos Castro, minister for Chile, announced tonight. The governments of the two countries are advised by the Peruvian minister to proceed quickly to the ratification of the treaty of 1883 and the open question of the possession of the provinces of Tacna and Arica. BERNE, Nov. 25. ## BRUTAL TREATMENT OF PRISONERS.

LONDON, Nov. 25. (British Wireless Service). Many shocking stories of ill-treatment are told by British prisoners who have reached England from Germany. Unfortunate Britishers who arrived at Friederichsfelde, Prussia, after hostilities ceased had a hard lot. They had been taken prisoners shortly before or during the British advance and were compelled to work behind the lines being driven from place to place "like something lower than beasts." Of one working party of 1800 only 282 came into Friederichsfelde. From twenty to thirty daily went into hospitals and fifty of the party died during the first week in camp. Several of the men said that they caught snails and ate them while on the march. They were admitted by the German doctors, current advice state, that a large portion of the 800 British prisoners at a camp at Lasquin, nine miles from Brussels, died from starvation or exposure.

The Admiralty has issued a message congratulating officers and men of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines on the completion of their great work, and a triumph for which there was no parallel in history. The recognition that this consummation is due to the steadfastness with which the Navy maintained its pressure on the enemy through more than four years of warfare, a pressure maintained no less insistently during the long monotony of waiting, than in the rare opportunity of attack.

CLOSER RELATIONS. LONDON, Nov. 26. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.) Hon. Mr. Burton, South African Minister of Railways, on his return from England, was given a luncheon by the Mayor of this city. Referring to the Imperial Conference, he said he did not know of a single step that had been taken, which was capable of being interpreted as a serious step towards South Africa. The representatives of the Dominions sat in the War Cabinet on a footing of absolute equality with the British Cabinet, and of ceasing to be mere permanent contacts, but of becoming public and British Cabinet, was the best and most practical solution for securing to the Dominions the Imperial status which they have long desired.

A FRENCH TRIBUTE. PARIS, Nov. 26. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.) In connection with the forthcoming visit of the British Government here, a well known writer known as "Lecho de Paris" deals with the services of the British Empire during the war. This assistance, he says, covers many fields of activity and taken as a whole was always the determining factor in events. The co-operation of the fleet for example conferred upon the mercantile marine supplied us with foodstuffs, raw materials and munitions, and brought over the American army. The vast British financial system assured us almost unlimited credit, and the British Empire, in the Alliance with Britain became a world wide one. Slowly but surely the French Republic has been the decisive factor in the great final defeat of the enemy. The British Empire, he says, has few equals in that in its greatest material prosperity never lost its high regard for moral force, and its sense of duty.

WILLIE'S ST. HELENA. AMSTERDAM, Nov. 26. The tug bearing the former German Crown Prince to the island of Wierum, was unable to make the harbor there last night, owing to the fog. It turned back and spent the night at Maasdam. The Crown Prince, who arrived this morning, is expected to give an icy reception by the stolid islanders. Frederick William is not supposed to leave the island, except in 1919. He agrees that the guilt of Germany and Austria, persistently denied during the past four years, has been proved by the Bavarian Government. "Germany has been challenged again and again to produce the whole correspondence between Berlin and Vienna during July 1914," says the Times. "She has never dared produce it but will the new Government dare, just to show the difference between it and its predecessor. Bavaria has proved she was an accomplice of Berlin and Vienna. She supported them until they lost, and now she is not white herself in the eyes of the Allies by blackening the records of her confederates." "The Kaiser, after taking every possible step to throw the Allies off their guard, struck, expecting in a few weeks to have the world at his feet," says the Daily Mail. "The revelations made by Bavaria will not surprise the Allies, nor disconcert them. They are neutral countries; thus was the bloody bath prepared." "In the Kaiser to be allowed to go without trial," is the comment of the Express. The Morning Post says that Dr. Solf in appealing for modification of the armistice terms, is following exactly the tactics disclosed in published telegrams. It now appears that his representations of starving conditions in Germany are false, the newspapers continue.

IN FULL ACCORD. AMSTERDAM, Nov. 26. Premier Cerbul, of the Ukraine, has decided, in an interview, that the Ukraine is already in full accord with the Entente, whose representatives are expected at Kiev soon, according to a Kiev despatch to the Russian newspaper, Ukraina, which says the agreement with Ukraine will bring to the new Russian Federal States.

SOONER THAN EXPECTED. PARIS, Nov. 26. A League of Nations is likely to figure before the Peace Conference very early in the proceedings. It is likely to be relegated to the close, after the territorial aspirations of the various powers are settled. It is stated that the League of Nations, which originated in America, has found warm supporters in England and France, though there is also another viewpoint, which clings to the old procedure, under the Vienna Congress, whereby individual aspirations for territory should have first consideration. According to this view, an early peace agreement on essentials is necessary in order to release the armies holding the occupied countries.

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LANDED AT PALMOUTH. LONDON, Nov. 26. Thirty-five members of the crew, and three passengers on the steamer Cascapedia, which fouled the Newfoundland coast Nov. 17th, have landed at Pالمouth.

WHAT MESSAGE COULD HE SEND? AMERONGEN, Holland, Nov. 26. William Hohenzollern's entourage has been asked by the Associated Press, if the former emperor has any message to send to the British people. The following reply was received to-day: "His Majesty's suite regrets to be unable to submit a demand to His Majesty." On the forenoon of Wednesday last, the former Emperor accompanied by his host, Sir Edgar R. Bowring took passage by the steamer "Lion" where he goes to take up the duties of High Commissioner for Newfoundland, Bon voyage.

Unsung Heroes ---the Tank Mechanic. If you have visited the in-furrows of a tank on a hot day—clambering down through the emergency trapdoor in the roof which is reserved for life and death exigencies in action, and for the convenience of civvy personages, ladies late, and "brass hats" above the rank of colonel during moments of inaction—you must have remarked the excessive temperature, says E. T. Broadson, in the December Popular Mechanics Magazine. Even when the engine is not running, the steel takes up all the heat the sun will furnish. When all of the 400 horsepower is being furnished by the gigantic cylinders of the engine inside, the heat becomes truly terrific. Ventilation is of the same kind found in the whale. Add to this obvious discomfort the din of an engine seven times as powerful as your touring car, consider that no provision is made for muffling the explosions, and think that this noise is confined within steel walls five feet by seven feet in dimensions, and you will lose most of your envy for the crew.

It is impossible to give any account of a battle as seen from the inside of a tank. Even the commander and driver see next to nothing. The gunners are concerned with the immediate radius of their fire, while the mechanics have no means whatever of knowing what transpires, except by the "feel" of an explosion near enough to jar "Niello"—as the tanks are called from Waterloo to Lunenburg—thoroughly. They can do nothing except watch the machinery and hope for the best.

And then at R's she had had to spend half an hour getting a mistake corrected on her charge account corrected. Such a silly mistake in the first place, and the girl simply couldn't get it through her head. Probably she was new, too. And then the elevators! Good Lord, how she did hate the way those girls jerked them up and down! She made a complaint about it at one store.

### She Must Have Made Their Work Harder.

Martin Battistini, the world's greatest living operatic singer, has never been heard in America because he fears to cross the Atlantic.

He has an unconquerable fear of the sea. Small fortunes have been offered to him again and again in days gone

That single experience sufficed him. ### Milady's Boudoir

The purpose of the finger nail is to protect the tips of the fingers against pressure and to give them firm support. It is said that they actually add to the facility of the fingers, making more acute the delicate sense of touch. Finger nails are made of the same substances as those which go to form the feathers of birds, the claws of animals and the fins of fish.

Healthy nails are not flat, but curved slightly, of light rose color, and of smooth surface. Brittleness is a defect which is usually due to a depleted state of the health.

Absolute cleanliness is a hygienic principle which should never be disregarded, since the space between nail and flesh forms a lodgment for disease germs. Soiled nails are not only evidence of contempt for your friends good opinion of you, but they are often the source of infection and sickness.

With a thorough manicure once a week and three minutes attention every morning the coral tips can be kept in perfect order. For the home manicure the following instruments are necessary: A pair of pointed scissors, a thin, sharp, flexible file, an orange wood stick, sandpaper, beveling files, a polisher, and a jar of powdered pumice stone and a small bottle of peroxide or hydrogen. The first matter to be considered is the filing, which must be accomplished while the nails are hard. The hands must not be plunged into the soapy bath until after the filing. When using the file see that the flesh at the side of the nail is pressed down, so the instrument will achieve a straight, smooth line, leaving no raggedly jagged places on the edge. A little scarf skin or thick cuticle will cling to the outline of the nail, but that is afterward removed with the beveling file. The shaping depends, of course, upon personal taste.

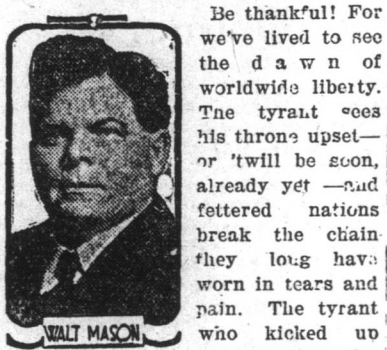

It's root such causes to advance—be thankful that you have the chance.

### The President at His Post.

(From the New York World.) The report went out from Washington two or three days ago, and has since been repeated, that the President might or would attend in person the forthcoming peace conference in Europe the representative of the United States. The persistence of this report gives to it the character of a "feeler" of public opinion in the matter. The opinion of the United States during and in relation to the peace conference is in this country and at the seat of the government of whose vast affairs he is charged with the direct administration. There is no express constitutional requirement preventing the President from leaving the country during his term of office. But there is a tradition of this kind which goes back to the beginning of the Republic, and which through all the time following has steadily grown in force from the substantial respect shown to it by every occupant of the presidential chair down to this movement. Nor is it a rule or practice having no better basis than a mere force of tradition. Its validity has been repeatedly recognized in respect to the personal safety of the President, and particularly in respect to his continuously intimate official relations with all the affairs of the Federal Government under the constitution. Our ordinary business with foreign nations, through the development of means of instantaneous communication, has more and more come under the direct transaction of the State Department in Washington through Ministers abroad no longer called to act upon their own unaided discretion or unstructured judgment. The President can perform no service to the United States or to the world in personal attendance at the peace conference in Europe which he cannot as well perform from his official post in Washington.

## The German A Failure

Their own personal advantage, but the result has proved, for all that the moment the call to arms sounded the peoples of the numerous colonies rose in their might to defend their own rights and to defend Ireland and the rest of the Empire. South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and every other dependency hurried off either contingents or their financial support to the supposed invincible machine of the German Empire to crumble, and at last was broken up into pieces, and the British Empire built upon a foundation of blood and treasure, for all that they planned, those of the German Empire, for the world of Germany, perfect as they were in every detail, completely

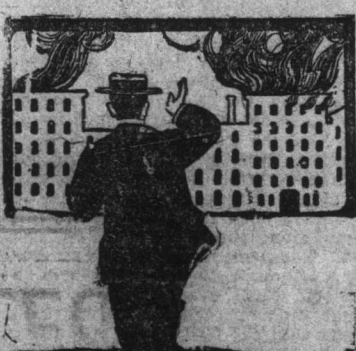
