

Newfoundland Medals. WAR MEDALS GRANTED BY HIS

MAJESTY THE KING TO THE MERCANTILE MARINE. Persons now resident in this Do-minion whose qualifying service was spent in Merchant Ships regis-tered in the United Kingdom or in any of the other oversea Domin-ions, may submit their application to the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries at his office, St. John's.

Service in foreign ships does no count as qualifying service for the medals in question.

Allies and neutrals who have qualified by service in British Ships are eligible for the medals.

WAR SERVICE CHEVRONS MER-

1. One Chevron may be worn in re-spect of sea-going service, or cap-tivity or internment in an enemy country, during the period from the 4th of August, 1914, to 31st December, 1914.

2. One Chevron may be worn in respect of each or any of the three calendar years 1915, 1916 and 1917, provided that at least three months of the year have been spent affoat in sea-going service, or in captivity in an enemy coun-

 One Chevron may be worn in respect of the remainder of the war, when twelve months have been spent since 1st January, 1918, in sea-going service (with or with-out a period of captivity in an enemy country), provided that the period of twelve months has commenced before 11th November. 1918, when the armistice was

(2) For men, red worsted. The Chevrons for the other years, 1915-1918: (1) For Captains and Officers



The Disaster of the "Jena."

The 12,000 ton French battleship "Jena," Rear-Admiral Manceron's flagship, was blown up in Toulon Harbor, at haft-past one on the afternoon of March 12, 1907. The "Jena" was lying in the Missiessy dry dock No. 2, where her engines had been repaired and her bottom scraped. The workmen at the Arsenal and on board the "Jena," had been to lunch, and were just returning to work. Some of the men had already resumed their duties, when suddenly there was an explosion—apparently in the magazine of the after 12-in, gun barbette. At first the men thought that only a slight accident had happened, and that the noise and shock had been caused by the "Jena" slipping over in the dock. A moment's terrible pause, and then there was a second explosion—many times more powerful than the first—which literally ripped up the after-deck, and hurled her crew into the air. Those who had escaped instant death were seized with wild panic when they say smalls or the constantly hear it said that "this is the twentieth century; superstition and all that sort of thing died out long ago." Yet there is hardly a person in the country without his pet belief—that misfortune follows stooping over a baby or spilling salt, or that a black cat brings good luck, for example. Only a few weeks ago an old dame in the Fen county was boycotted by the whole country-aide because she had the reputation of being a witch and of throwing spells over people's children, stock and crops. No one would go near her or let her have food or ciothing, and she nearly starved to death.


