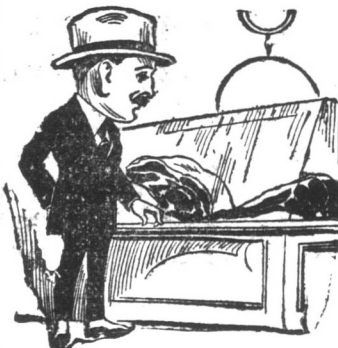

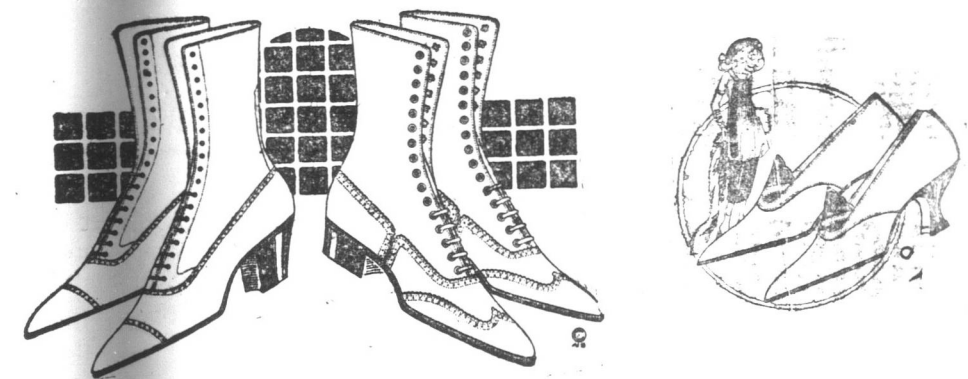

Split Herring \$7 Barrel on Labrador.

SOME BRINGS 150 PASSENGERS.

With about one hundred and eighty passengers on board, the S.S. Home, Capt. Norman, docked here from Straits about 8 o'clock on Saturday night. She brought along a full load of freight. The Home encountered fair weather except the last couple days of the trip when gales of wind and heavy seas were experienced. Codfishery operations on Labrador are now over and most of the fish has been made ready for market. The catch was a small one. Most of the people who were operating in the Straits have returned to their homes. The herring fishery along Newfoundland section of Labrador was a small one. The herring were plentiful, but they struck in about the middle of August, and had passed on by the time the season for packing by the Scotch method (Sept. 1) opened. There is a big school of herring at Long Point and other sections of Canadian Labrador; these fish are of a smaller run than what are usually taken on Newfoundland section of the Straits. The residents are doing well, the fish are being split and packed for the Canadian market, and buyers there from Montreal and Quebec are paying seven dollars per barrel of 200 pounds of fish.

At Port aux Choix, Brig Bay and

other places on Newfoundland North West Coast herring have struck in and fishermen are doing fairly well. James Barry's crew on Thursday had a hundred tubs at Port aux Choix. The Home also passed a school of herring off Cow Head.

Operations at the Hawke Bay Pit-prop cutting have been considerably curtailed and the number of men working there now is about thirty or forty.

Salmon fishing along the coast the past season was good. Only a few caribou have been killed so far. Many of the people are now in the woods trapping.—Western Star, Oct. 18.

WRITE ROMANCE OF NEWFOUNDLAND. Captain Wallace with "Viking Foot", "Blue Water" and other books to his credit, is seriously considering the advisability of sojourning for a time in Newfoundland, for the purpose of portraying in a romantic and attractive manner the life, industries and the romances of the oldest colony. He is the publisher of the United States and Canada have agreed in advance to issue this work, which will eventually be re-issued in Great Britain, Australia and other countries, thus duplicating the desirable conditions which have already been obtained by Capt. Wallace's previous novels.

Referring to the proposed undertaking, Mr. Wallace writes as follows: "With regard to the epic story of Newfoundland, I have been turning this over in my mind. The background is there and the characters are there. I have many already in

mind. There are the Banks fishermen and the spring sealers, the "rum runners" of St. Pierre & Miquelon, and the men who run dried fish across to Portugal, Spain and the Levant in small schooners, also down to the West Indies and the Brazils. I could put a character through all these and give a patriotic tinge to him by having him a Naval Reservist and one of the North Sea Patrol (I have had four or five of these men as crew with me—all "sea boat" crews) in examination service during the war. Great boat-men. Lower away in a gale of

wind. All the Newfoundland Reservists were placed in this work. "The Banksmen of Avalon" or some such title. As Editor of Fishing Magazines for 10 years I have had to keep close tab on Newfoundland activities and would make no breaks. But—and here's my thoughts on the subject. "If I undertook to write a story on this, I would want it to be the best ever—the epic story of the Grand Banks and the Newfoundland fishermen. While I would be more than glad to have you point out what is necessary for the screen, and would endeavour in every way possible to incorporate them, yet I wouldn't want to append my name to any story, which is palpably a series of screenable incidents hung together and dished up as a novel. I'd be damned for all time then. When I write a story, I must live it and put into it the best that is in me. You can appreciate my point of view on this.

"As far as a film is concerned, I believe a Newfoundland film would go big. It would be a great off-set to the Labrador stories and the pictures of sterile, bleak and barren, fog and ice-bound coasts, which Dr. Grant and others have given the world. Where is there a prettier place for foliage and water than Humber Valley in N.F. It's worthy of a Government subsidy to refute that impression."

SALISBURY MAY BE CALLED.

LONDON, Oct. 20. The Canadian press learns from reliable authority that if Bonar Law declines to form a ministry, His Majesty would, on Lloyd George's advice, send for the Marquis of Salisbury. Salisbury was under Secretary for Foreign Affairs from 1900 to 1903, Lord Privy Seal, 1903 to 1905, and President of the Board of Trade since 1905.

ENGLISH POLITICS.

LONDON, Oct. 20. Bonar Law appeared to-day to be making rapid progress in forming a new Cabinet, as evidenced by the announcement that Curzon and Derby would serve under him. Law cannot officially announce the formation of his ministry until he is elected head of the Conservative Party, succeeding Chamberlain, but it is generally conceded that his election will be only a formality.

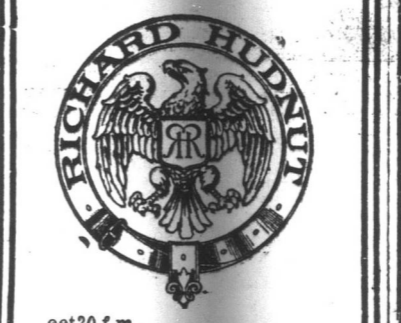

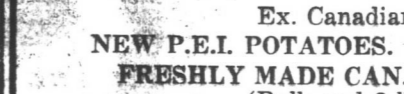



I have the honor to report that on the 11th of July Mr. Bellew telephoned me to my house, and asked me to meet a party of Americans from New York State, who were proceeding to Labrador Coast on a timber limit investigation and asked me to accompany them. I answered that I would meet his party at Queen's Hotel, Montreal, at 11.30 the 12th of July, and talk the matter over. On the 13th as promised I met Mr. Bellew at Queen's Hotel, where he introduced to me Messrs. Richard Edwards, agent, of Lowville, N.Y.; Denis Moynahan, of Mohawk, N.Y.; J. G. Hoffman, New Hartford, N.Y., and James Cannon, of Utica, N.Y., all experienced lumbermen. After consultation with Mr. Bellew and approval of all the interested parties, I was employed as expert for the trip, (being understood trip was to be made in 15 days, and not 28 days) at a fee of \$250 and all expenses paid, and of which I received \$100 on account of said fee on the said 12th day of July, 1921.

WELSH HARD COAL HOTTER THAN U.S.
Less Ash and Much Better Heat, Says Ottawa.
GREAT DIFFERENCE
Six Tons of Welsh Gives Same Heat as Seven Tons U.S. Coal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—That the Welsh Anthracite delivered already in Ottawa has a much lower ash content and a much higher heating value than American anthracite received in this country for the past few years, that it is a true anthracite but breaks easier on handling and produces more fines than Pennsylvania anthracite coal, are the summarized results of an analysis of samples of Welsh coal submitted to John McLeish, director of the mines branch of the Dominion Government for testing. The report of the analysis is signed by R. E. Gilmore, chief engineering chemist, and B. F. Haemel, B.Sc., chief of the division of fuels and fuel testing.

An equal quantity of the lump and "fines", or "st", as some Ottawans who have received a delivery of the Welsh anthracite are disposed to call it, were submitted to the director of mines for testing. From the analysis given and from conversation with an official of the testing branch, it is claimed that the fines have excellent heating properties and should be extremely serviceable for the purpose of banking furnaces.

From further tests made it is seen that compared with Pennsylvania anthracite such as Ottawans have been used burning the Welsh anthracite has practically 10 per cent. less ash and about 10 per cent. more fixed carbon.

The British thermal unit is the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of a pound of water one degree. Under this test it is found that the calorific value of the Welsh anthracite is given as 14,860 as compared with 12,490 for Pennsylvania anthracite "as received", or 15,200 for Welsh as compared with 13,000 for Pennsylvania when dried at 105 degrees Centigrade.

According to these tests therefore the Welsh anthracite has from 17 to 19 per cent. more heat producing properties than that from Pennsylvania, so that six tons of Welsh anthracite should produce as much heat as seven of the Pennsylvania coal.

The Gallant "Arethusa"

For over a century and a half our navy has never been without an "Arethusa" to show the world how British sailors can fight. That tradition is well maintained was proved during the recent war when the fifth warship of the name engaged two German cruisers, more powerful than herself, and after a fierce struggle of half-an-hour, put them to ignominious flight, then crowned her way of glory by helping to sink the "Mainz". The first "Arethusa" had done donkey work for France before she was made to change her flag and allegiance on October 20, 1919, and she had to be hotly chased for four hours before she was captured. During the next twenty years the captured "Arethusa" had little opportunity of winning laurels. In 1918, France and England being at war, Keppell's fleet, including the "Arethusa" cruising off the Lizard, sighted two French frigates. One of the latter was quickly overhauled, but the "La Belle Poule" one of the finest ships in the French navy, showed a swift "pair of heels". The little "Arethusa" gave chase and stuck to her with grim tenacity. It was like a fox terrier chasing a mastiff, but at last the "La Belle Poule" was brought to bay, and compelled to fight. Very soon the decks of the "Arethusa" were strewn with dead, but she gave full change, and by perfect seamanship and the deadly precision of her guns, pounded "La Belle Poule" to a condition of wreckage as complete as her own, until all the shot on both ships were expended. Then the "Arethusa," gallant as she was, could do no more, and with difficulty dragged herself back to the British fleet. Although she took no prize with her, that four hours' naval duel won immortality for the name "Arethusa," the proudest borne by any British man-of-war.

Mr. Coaker says that he is now giving \$4 for Labrador fish. Let us analyze this by actual facts and figures. Here is an account supplied to two Labrador fishermen the past spring, dated May 23rd, 1922.

These men have to pay an account of \$440.90, or \$220.45 each. The cash price of these goods if they had had the money to buy would be 20 per cent. less—that is to-day, instead of getting \$4 for their fish on a cash basis they get the price that will be shown in a simple question in proportion. As 100 lbs to \$0, so is \$220.45 to the result. This gives each man a purchasing power out of his summer's catch of \$176.36. If \$220.45 worth of fish gives a price of \$4 per quintal what will \$176.36 give? The answer to this problem is \$32.29, which is exactly what Mr. Coaker is offering today for Labrador fish, \$32.29 cents. The price of fish is surely what Coaker makes it.—COM.

terially, loading and cause great delay and expense.
Operating bush work here would be very objectionable as provisions, horses, etc., could not be brought up by the river only for a mile or two, and a land road would cost many thousands to build, as in any low ground the soil is extra soft, requiring corduroy, and the hills peaky, and heavy slopes towards the river bank. Winter roads could be operated on the ice, which would oblige you to put in all your working plant, horses, etc., over the ice to a central depot up river one season ahead. Considering everything carefully, cost of operation here would be very high and after taking cognizance of the report made by Mr. James and Mr. Arthur, without any prejudice, and without any favor, I condemn the whole proposition. I have no pecuniary interests with any of the parties and give my opinion to the best of my belief and knowledge, from experience gained in the lumber and pulp wood business for the past forty years. The whole most humbly submitted.

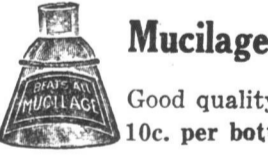

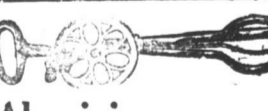

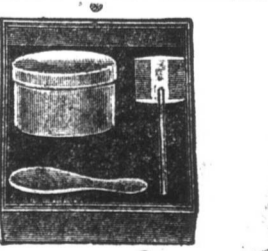

An Old Newfoundland Retired

Recalls the Days of His Illustrious Father.

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

MR. BLACKADAR'S LETTER.

Four months after this date all the time I could spare from the mining office, I labored at the key, under the supervision of Capt. John, and when it was considered safe to leave me alone, he went west. The mine worked till Nov. 1859, when Ripley and party abandoned it, and in January, 1860, I took charge of the remains in behalf of the heirs, "the New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Co." The year of 1860 was very pleasant, many families remained on the mine, including the mining captain and family. Line worked fairly well that year, leaving me all the time to explore with Capt. Harvey. The following year I went into harness. The Associated Press opened Cape Race office for the interception of Atlantic steamers, and as the line was becoming inoperative, I was pressed, and became a full-placed repeater, and the following three years I earned my money. Every blizzard and gale took the line down. I had only one regular line man and many a time went out with him, and I carry a remembrance on my forehead to-day. After a heavy gizzard-storm, I went with my man, Walter Herron,—he was a powerful and big pugilist, but couldn't climb a pole worth a cent—hence my accompanying him in cases of emergency. At the first break, the windward side of the pole, had a coating of ice five inches thick, and as I was chopping it before mounting, a piece 18 inches long struck me on the forehead and killed me, for a time, as dead as Julius Caesar, and when I came to my pugilist was bathing ice water on me with his sou-wester. I will not pen the many trials I saddled upon myself—they would fill a dime novel.

WORKED DAY AND NIGHT.

Interruptions were frequent, but we repaired them with little delay, working day and night. How nice it was when Sunday came round. In 1864 I fell in love and married. In 1866 the second cable landed at Trinity Bay, hurried in the Islands Secretary came west to see the state of the line and remedy required, and told me he could reply to that in two words, "Rebuild it," and rebuilt it was, and my station removed to Come-by-Chance, 12 miles westward. Stations were multiplied and manned with three line men each, who were always in light marching order and started any hour, day or night, if the line was visible. I was boarding nearly two years at Come-by-Chance, while my wife and two little girls lived at LaManche. I often asked permission to spend Sunday with them, but the risk was too great, so finally the kind-hearted Superintendent said, "We will settle at Black River again. Send a plan of your house and it will be sent round with the carpenters immediately." Four months after I removed office and family to Black River, and appreciated the change immensely. Line worked charmingly, and in case of interruption, my man being always ready, like firemen at the first alarm, had only to slide down the pole and be off. Our second Christmas here was eventful. The line was working well at 11.30 a.m., and we dined at 2. I went into the office often and adjusted and found O. K., but quiet, and concluded that business was resting too. At 2 I was called by Heart's Content to tell me my west section was down. I tested and found it so, and immediately my man Pat hoveled himself out, harnessed his dog team and was away, and two hours after westness was full steam ahead again, and I asked an explanation and was told that a service was sent from Port Hastings, Canso, via Valentia, Ireland. Our mutual friend, T. D. Scanlan was in charge at Port Hastings station, and reported his east line in air, and Mr. Scanlan, knowing we were of a jovial disposition, and had company to dinner, considered it prudent to notify Heart's Content, for fear my west line might fall on good soil, and from a steady ground and deceive—and in

order to reach Heart's Content he wired via Duxbury, thence to St. Pierre, thence to Brest (France), thence to Valentia (Ireland), thence to Heart's Content—crossing the Atlantic twice and travelling over 4000 miles to tell me that the line was down at my western elbow. I don't suppose there is a similar case on record.

INCREASED FACILITIES.

Business was on the increase, and our land line being subject to interruption, it was necessary to increase the facilities, and in 1857, an office was established at historic Placentia, with two more air lines from Heart's Content, and a cable was laid across Trinity Bay, hurried in the Islands dividing Trinity and Placentia Bays, and on to Placentia, from where two cables were laid, one landing at St. Pierre, the other direct to Sydney, Cape Breton and business worked satisfactorily. In the fall of 1871, the old Gulf cable died, and foreign business went Placentia route, and our good old through country line became a purely local institution, and a portion of the old hands remained to transmit the country business. It

was not bulky. About enough to buy the grub and "moisture." This continued for six years, during which time I turned my attention to exploring this district, but it turned out "rain," though I found magnetic, white and specular iron, molybdenite, but not in paying quantities; also discovered richly mineralized quartz, yet waiting capital and enterprise.

ATTRACTED GLOUCESTER MERCHANTS.

During those years, I also commenced farming, and whittled out a six acre lot, that supplied us with vegetables, fruit and fodder and it said to be a very pretty place. In 1877 a line was built from here North, connecting eleven settlements, and I went into repeating harness again, and am still so, at the age of 64, and things go merry as a marriage bell. I have been blessed with ten children, three in Heaven, seven living (four of them telegraphers—one of them my own right hand). During 1887, I induced Gloucester merchants to embark in the winter herring fishery of this Bay (Placentia) and since then, they have disbursed, during four of the winter months of each year, the sum of \$35,000. This old-timer was the collector of the port. While the winter fishery is on, we do a very decent Telegraph business outside of our repeating, that keeps our noses well to the grindstone. But, thank God, I'm healthy yet, barring a little rheumatism and liver trouble at times. Should any of you "Old-Timers" happen at this jumping off place, I will gladly take you to my "Ohms" and provide you with the best our dots and dashes afford. But in the meantime, should I turn up my toes, my successor will notify you of the departure, and you will then kindly aid me with your prayers, if you have any to spare.

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

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
