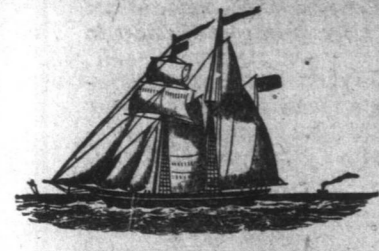

Houses Made of Cork the Latest

Houses built of cork with a steel framework are the newest development of the builder's ingenuity.

Two working-men's homes are in course of erection on an exposed site at Betreshanger, near Deal, for Messrs. Pearson and Dorman Long's colliery. The skeleton is of steel, and the insulation core of the walls is formed of slabs of compressed cork. On the exterior the cork is enclosed in solid concrete to a depth of an inch and a half by a "cement gun," which applies the concrete under pressure.

The cork itself, having been pressed in a mould, will not swell and cannot

be burnt. Calculations show that its insulation value saves 25 per cent in heating costs.

Another advantage of the cork house is that it is sound-proof in comparison with the ordinary brick structure. As it can be built by unskilled labor under skilled direction its cost is low.



Communist Mischief-Makers to Be No Longer Tolerated in Great Britain.

In Earthquake Two Months Ago in China 6,500 Were Killed—Free State Police Chief Says Ireland is Free of Troubles—French Birth Rate Increasing.

6,500 KILLED IN EARTHQUAKE.
PEKING, May 15. The famine relief commission here received an estimate to-day that 6,500 persons were killed in an earthquake at Talfu, in Yunnan Province, on March 16. The report said the shocks lasted an hour, wrecking nearly every house in the city.

PITCHED BATTLE IN MOROCCO.
PARIS, May 15. Official information reaching Paris to-night from Morocco, says that the engagement which commenced Wednesday along the Rifian front, between the French forces and the Rifian tribesmen, is assuming the proportions of a pitched battle. Marshal Lyautey, the French Governor-General, reports that the tribesmen in the Bidano sector alone, who offered such stubborn resistance to the French, numbered 35,000 men, armed with rifles, machine guns and artillery. It would seem that the Rifan post, besieged by the rebels, has not been completely liberated, as to-night's communication from the Rabat Headquarters in Morocco mentions it as having been recaptured yesterday by the troops of General Golbat.

HICKS WARNS COMMUNISTS.
LONDON, May 15. The Home Secretary, Sir William Joynson Hicks, uttered a frank warning to Communists during a speech at Queen's Hall to-day, saying, "We are willing to let other countries of the world live, but we will not allow them to interfere with our constitution. We are bound to take notice of the Communist movement controlled by Moscow, and we shall arm ourselves with the proper authority to deal with it. We are tired of the influx of men to this country who are coming here to embitter class hatred and destroy our constitution."

PRINCE IN GRAHAMSTOWN.
GRAHAMSTOWN, Union of South Africa, May 15.—This most remote town of all South Africa, gave the Prince of Wales a rousing welcome to-day, and the British here received it in happy mood. He shook hands with 525 ex-Service men and did not seem to mind the fatigue of this exercise, although he can still use only his left hand because of recent injury to his right.

GENERAL MILES DEAD.
WASHINGTON, May 15. General Nelson A. Miles, famous soldier of the United States, dropped dead to-day while attending the performance of a circus.

PETERSON WOULD BUY CANADA'S FLEET OF FREIGHTERS.
OTTAWA, May 15. An offer to buy the whole fleet of freighters in the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, was made to the Minister of Trade and Commerce on February 7th last, by Sir William Peterson, with whom the Government made last September an agreement to subsidize freighters for the trans-Atlantic trade. The fact that the offer was made was revealed to-day when a copy of Sir William Peterson's cable was laid on the table in the House of Commons.

FRENCH BIRTH RATE INCREASES.
LONDON, May 15. The statement often made that fewer babies are born in France than in any other country, is described by the Paris correspondent of the Manchester Guardian as a legend that is hard to kill. The correspondent declares France alone among the European

countries has an increasing birth rate. Since 1915, the French birth rate has risen from 151 to 194 per thousand of population, while the German rate is 209, Britain's 187 and Norway's 188. None of these countries has as great an increase as France. France's increase is attributed to her recovery of Alsace-Lorraine and the influx of Polish people and other foreigners. The increase in the rate of births in France is more than counter-balanced by bad hygienic conditions. The death rate of 170 per 10,000 population is second only to Spain.

COLT BREAKS RACING RECORD.
JAMAICA, May 15. Sting, a handicap colt, owned by James Butler, to-day broke the world's record for a mile and seventy yards in the fourth race at the local track. The time was 1.41 1-5.

EARTHQUAKE IN NEGROS.
MANILA, May 15. Weather Bureau officials to-day reported that ten persons were killed by a series of earthquakes in the Province of Oriental, Negros. Many buildings were seriously damaged.

CONTROL OF ARMS.
GENEVA, May 15. The International Conference for traffic in arms and munitions to-day decided in favor of control of all armaments of potential military value.

THREE KILLED IN AIRPLANE CRASH.
TRANTON, Neb., May 15. Three persons were burned to death when an airplane piloted by L. L. Helling San Francisco, fell near here yesterday and burst into flames. The accident was caused by the collapse of one of the wings of the plane.

ABSOLUTE PEACE IN IRELAND.
NEW YORK, May 15. (Canadian Press)—"There is absolute peace in Ireland to-day. I know that disappoints a number of people who would like disruption and constant warfare in the Free State, but it can't be helped." General Owen O'Duffy, Chief of the Civil Guard of the Free State, at present here attending the International Police Conference, painted a picture this afternoon of an Ireland where the wicked had ceased from troubling and where despite the fact that it is only recently that the country was in a turmoil not one of his 7,000 police carried a pistol. He has been head of the Free State's Constabulary for two years. Prior to the Irish Treaty he was one of King George's most rebellious subjects, carrying a price of one thousand pounds on his head. General O'Duffy is 32 years old. The Free States Police Chief admitted modestly that he had no special qualifications for a policeman, his particular "forte" was Guard needed, he said. The Royal Guard needed, he said. The Royal Irish Constabulary could not be taken back, he declared, "on account of the part they had taken in the trouble with Great Britain, and since the Irish people were looking for an unarmed, non-sectarian, non-political police, we gave them it." The Irish police, said General O'Duffy, are hard worked but they are young and have the confidence of the people. They are known as the Chief, for their courtesy and efficiency.

THE ROMANCE OF HELIUM

PRaises Effect of British Rule in India.
PALL RIVER, May 2.—Dr. George L. Richards, of Pall River, who has just returned from India, reports a great lack of facilities in that country for the treatment of diseases of the ear, nose and throat. This phase of medical work has been neglected by the missionary medical colleges and the hospitals, he said. Dr. Richards went to India mainly to arouse interest in this department of medicine and to give instruction in it. Mrs. Richards accompanied him. He visited hospitals all the way from Neyoor in the Travancore district of the extreme south to Ludhiana in the Punjab of the north. He gave instruction in the medical schools and performed operations in the hospitals, doctors and patients coming from miles around to benefit by the operations. "Whatever mistakes Great Britain has made in the administration of India—and there have been some—she has nevertheless established a stable government and has done much for the development of all the way from the South to the North, and for the well-being of the Indian people, who now have a large share in the management of their own affairs."

Helium is used nowadays to fill dirigibles, for its lifting power is almost as great as that of hydrogen. A hydrogen-filled airship is, of course, liable to disaster, but helium does not

Commodity Prices

Prices in the wholesale commodity markets continue to show a downward tendency. 22 out of the 58 changes that appear this week in the list of quotations compiled by Dun's Review being declines, against 25 advances. In last week's tabulation, 29 reductions contrasted with 18 increases. In a similar comparison for the corresponding week of last year, 51 out of 82 changes were toward lower levels.

Unfavorable reports regarding the condition of winter wheat this week were largely accountable for a rise in quotations, and the strength of this grain, together with renewed buying for export, resulted in sharp advances in corn, oats, rye and barley. In live meats, beef and hogs advanced moderately, and prices of sheep were firmly maintained. Provisions developed a strong upward trend, reflecting conditions in the raw material. Butter and cheese were weakened by fairly liberal offerings, although price changes were not important, but a growing shortage in supplies imparted considerable strength to the finer grades of eggs.

There has been no material change in iron and steel conditions, competition for business still having a tendency to weaken prices on some kinds of material. Except for some decline in tin, an improved laundry is reported to have had a strengthening effect on the miscellaneous metals, although as yet, there has been no important change in quotations.

Speaking of Short Waves--

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

The amateurs of the country have just been assigned a new wave-band. This band includes all wavelengths between 0.7477 and 0.7496 meter! When we speak of wavelengths in terms of less than one meter we are really speaking of wavelengths in terms of less than one meter we are really speaking of short waves. The shortest broadcasting wavelength is about 600 feet long. This new amateur wave-band will be in the vicinity of 2 1/2 feet long. The broadcasting stations antenna for the shortest broadcast wave is around 150 to 200 ft. long. This new amateur wave will require an antenna less than three feet long. It is impossible to predict what the amateurs will do in the way of long distance transmission on a wave length of less than one meter. We feel safe in thinking, though, that before 1925 has passed by that two way communication across the Atlantic will be established, on this wave, by amateurs. Already they have done two-way work from this country to England in broad daylight (noon) at a wavelength of 20 meters.

Quite a number of interesting possibilities present themselves when thinking of antenna systems for a 1-meter wave-station. It may be that

the so-called beam system of transmission will prove possible. In this system, by means of a set of reflecting wires and the proper location of the antenna, it is possible to concentrate the signals emitted from the antenna into a narrow band or beam so that they are transmitted with great intensity in a certain direction, and not transmitted at all in directions behind the reflector. The reflecting system must be physically of the dimensions of the emitted wave. A reflector to work with an antenna sending out a wave length of 200 meters would consist of a set of wires strung in the shape of a parabola. Each reflector wire would have to be 600 feet high. Quite obviously this is not possible except in trans-Atlantic communication work. But with the short wave newly assigned to the amateurs, a reflecting wire would need be only 2 1/2 to 3 feet high.

Another possibility lies in the use of loop antennas for transmitting purposes. A loop is more or less directional and it is easy to design one to work on the short wave lengths. By utilizing the directional properties of the loop it might prove very valuable as a transmitting antenna.

Scratching Off the Parasites

From reports in recent press messages it would appear that the British bulldog has at last awakened to the fact that the greater part of his present discomfort is due to the parasites which have rapidly been distributing themselves over his body, and he has decided upon effective measures to get rid of the pest.

Slow to anger and inclined to ignore the enemy that resorts to underhand methods, the Britisher is not infrequently regarded as dull of comprehension or too indolent to exert himself, and those, intent upon doing him an injury, have sometimes been led to believe by his attitude that they can go to any lengths with impunity. Treading too far, they have quickly been made to realize that when once aroused the Britisher is terrible in his wrath, and in his methods of retaliation is not inclined to be satisfied with half measures.

For months the Bolshevik representatives have been taking advantage of the privileges allowed them in London, with the result that they have poisoned the minds of some of the people with their mischievous creed, and, with glib promises of a new heaven and a new earth under their regime, have fostered discontent among others. Apparently they are provided with unlimited means, and have been thus enabled to carry on very extensive operations. In fact, it is not an exaggeration to say that the Moscow "missionaries" are to be found in every country in the world, attempting by insidious methods to undermine the authority and influence both of Church and State, and sowing the seed of disaffection particularly among the working classes.

The plain warning issued to these unwelcome visitors by the Home Secretary, following upon the vigorous measures taken against them a few days ago, will be heartily approved by all who respect law and order and who are loyal to the constitution to which we owe our freedom and happiness.

The Right of Way

The necessity for giving the Fire Department vehicles the right of way when they are responding to a call cannot too strongly be emphasized. The drivers have no easy task to manipulate the ponderous vehicles through the streets at a high rate of speed, and to add to their responsibilities by making it necessary for them to dodge obstructions is most inconsiderate, tends to endanger life and limb and results in the loss of valuable time.

During the return of the firemen yesterday morning an accident was narrowly averted near the Brewery on Water Street West, when the apparatus, travelling at considerable speed, passed a street car from which a number of passengers were alighting. The responsibility in such a case rests, we should imagine, on the conductor who should close the exit of the

car, but the question may also be asked whether the fire fighting appliances, returning from a fire, should not conform to the regulations which apply to other vehicles. Section 38, sub-section (j) of the Traffic Regulations gives them the right of way over all other vehicles, but makes no reference to pedestrians, and in Section 40, Sub-Section (b) reference is made to the right of a vehicle of the Fire Department to pass to the left of a street car stationary or in motion in the middle of a highway, but it clearly states that this right may be exercised while proceeding to a fire or answering a fire alarm call.

Naturally there are many details which cannot be included in the most comprehensive book of traffic rules, and the factor which counts for most in preventing accidents is common sense. The regulations are in the main for those who do not possess or who will not exercise judgement, but we fear most of us come within one or other of those categories, as common sense does not appear to be as common a virtue as is generally supposed.

Conviction in Brewing Case

The case of the Orange Crush Bottling Company, for a breach of the Alcoholic Liquors Act, was concluded at the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon, and the defendant was fined \$10 or thirty days' imprisonment.

This matter has been pending since February last, when the police seized several bottles of beer, made by the Orange Crush Company, from a store on Waterford Bridge Road. Two of the bottles conformed to the standard, but a third was found to be overproof.

The Manager of the Crush Company, in giving evidence yesterday, gave two possible reasons why one bottle in a batch may be overproof. In making the beer a uniform amount of mixture is put in every bottle before they are filled up with soda water. He stated that it would be possible for a bottle lying in a case to get broken and its contents, leaking in the bottle below, would put a greater amount of mixture than usual in such a bottle, or one bottle might be smaller than the regular size and as it would contain a smaller amount of soda water than the others the beer must necessarily be stronger. The fact that beer taken from the same batch as the overproof bottle was found within the law was given as proof that it was only by mistake that such a bottle went out. His Honor, in summing up the case, took into consideration these circumstances, and imposed the minimum fine.

Mr. Joyce, who was also present, and Mrs. Joyce, responded in terms of grateful appreciation. Refreshments were served and a very pleasant social hour followed.

B.I.S. L. and A. Meeting

A special meeting of the B.I.S. L. & A. Committee, was held at the Club rooms last night, Chairman W. J. O'Neill, presiding. The matter of the next dance was discussed, and special preparations will be made and many new novelties introduced in same. He also announced the executive of the Athletic Association, of which Hon. W. J. Higgins is Honorary President and E. P. Phelan, Chairman. The Club recently won the championship in the Bowling League and the presentation of the cup will be marked with an appropriate programme.

The football teams, Senior and Junior, will meet in the course of a few days to elect their executive, and great preparations are being made for the season's sporting programme.

The Budget at a Glance

The following admirable summary of the Budget is compiled by the Daily Chronicle:—

Skipence of Income Tax—Relief of 10 per cent. on earned incomes (up to maximum of £200) increased to 14 2/3 per cent. or one-sixth (up to maximum of £250), estimated to mean another 6d. in the £2 of taxpayers under £1,000 a year.

Investment Income of Taxpayers aged 65 or over, whose total income does not exceed £500, to be regarded as earned income. This relief granted to married couples if either is 65 or over.

Return to Gold Standard, but no gold cologne yet.

Pensioners for Widows—10s. a week for life, with allowances of 5s. per week for eldest child and 3s. a week for each other child, up to age of 14. This is a part of extended Insurance Scheme. This will benefit about 200,000 widows and 350,000 children, and begins on January 1, 1923.

Allowances for Orphans—7s. 6d. per week for the first and 6s. for the second. About 30,000 children to benefit.

Pensioners at 65—10s. a week for insured persons.

Extension of State Insurance, to provide above pensions and allowances, men to pay 4d. and women 2d. and employers 4d. and 2d. respectively.

Old Age Pensions.—Abolition of present impositions, restrictions and means tests from July, 1923. About 100,000 would then become old age pensioners who are at present barred.

Higher Death Duties, to balance increase in death duties.

McKeena Duties (import duties on musical instruments, clocks, watches, films, motor-cycles and motor-cars, abolished last year by Mr. Snowden) to be reimposed on July 1.

Tax on Imported Silk (natural, artificial, partly manufactured or manufactured) on basis of 4s. a pound on raw silk.

Import Duty on Hops (24 per cent) and small additional duty on foreign beer.

Imperial Preference.—Recommendations and proposal of Imperial Conference in 1923 to be given effect to, so far as they do not involve duties on food.

Duties on all Dried Fruit to be removed. Preference on Empire sugar to be restored. Increased preference on Empire wines and tobacco.

Magistrate's Court

Douglas Walsh, aged 42, labourer, who gave his home address as Placentia Harbor, was arraigned before Judge Morris this morning and charged with the following larcenies:—(1) Larceny of 1 pair boots, valued at \$3.00; 1 top shirt, valued at \$1.00; 1 cap, valued at \$2.50; all to the value of \$7.50, the property of Wm. Keefe on the 15th inst.; (2) larceny of 1 valise and contents, valued at \$24.00, the property of Thos. Williams and F. Griffin, on the 15th inst.; (3) larceny of boots, valued at \$8.00, the property of Michael Ryan, on the 15th inst. When the accused was called upon to answer to the above charges, he pleaded "guilty" but had nothing else to say. His Honour Constable Byrne, who was called, stated to the court that he had received complaints of articles being stolen from boarding houses in the city, and at the same time had obtained information of a man named Walsh, posing as a doctor, who had visited these places of lodging, secured a meal, and then left the house to go elsewhere. These complaints became very frequent, and in one instance the man was actually reported missing. Witness further went on to say that the defendant has been going this morning to the city like a crazy man, hiring motor cars and other means of conveyance, for which he did not pay. In one case he owed a taxi driver the sum of \$18.00. Witness also stated that the man left Newfoundland about eleven years ago, and returned to the city from New York by the Silvia on the 23rd March, last. With the exception of a few days, when the man went to his home, he has been living in the city by his wits ever since. Last night the same man was proceeding from the city in a motor car, when he jumped out with his valise. He was recognized by some taxi drivers to whom he owed money, but he quickly fled and was later captured by the police, hidden in a hen house in the West End. Two taxi drivers were present in court and gave evidence against the prisoner. In each case the prisoner hired a motor car for several hours and fooled them by pretending to visit a certain place, only to go around the back way, jump the fence, and disappear. Judge Morris, in summing up, stated that the prisoner was a rogue of the worst type, and sentenced him to the penitentiary for six months, with hard labor. According to the statement made by the prisoner to Supt. of Police, the man has been out of the country for eleven years. On one occasion he was arrested on a charge of stealing golf clubs, but sentence was suspended.

A drunk was discharged.

A second drunk was fined \$1.00 or 3 days.

Two men, charged with indecency, were allowed to go on paying costs.

U. S. Deportations

Gen. "Emir of Kurdistan," for Second Time in Few Weeks.

New York, May 2.—Three men—Turk, an Arab and a Russian—were deported by the government today. One was a prince, another a reputed millionaire and the third an opponent of the Soviet Government in Russia.

Prince Mohammed Said Zerdecho, who insists he is the Emir of Kurdistan, was the Turk; Alexis Mockinoff, secretary of the Russian Peasant Association, was the Russian; and the Arab was the stately Facaration Abed, silk mill owner, who has returned to his home in Puebla, Mex., by way of Europe, all because Uncle Sam's immigration officials found some technical defect in his passport. All were third-class passengers on the liner Majestic.

This is the prince's second deportation within a few weeks. His first occurred when the United States sent him to England on the Celtic after declaring he had been engaged in questionable financial deals in England, France and the United States. The English wouldn't accept him, insisting he hadn't cleared from any British port, and he was returned. After a 2 1/2-week stay at Ellis Island the prince was re-deported to Cherbourg. It was from Cherbourg that he sailed to this country. After bidding his wife, the former Kitty Spiegel of Kentucky, a tearful good-by, he told all who would listen that it was "an insult" and "an indignity" to send him back to Europe in the third class, as he always traveled first cabin. The charges resulting in his deportation had been "trumped up," he insisted, and intimated that he might claim indemnity of the United States for "the shame and indignity" to which he said he had been subjected.

The government said the Russian, Mockinoff, had been here a year, thus overstaying his passport privilege. Mockinoff insisted that his deportation was the result of soviet intrigues.

Encarnation Abed had nothing whatever to say. A reputed millionaire and the owner of a silk mill employing 600 persons at Puebla, the stately Arab went to Europe a few months ago and decided to visit the United States on his homeward journey. When he arrived in New York the authorities found his passport bore the name of "Bashara" Abed instead of Encarnation Abed, whereupon entry into this country was denied him and his deportation ordered.

Germany Seeks to Include
Austria in the Republic.

British Foreign Secretary Favours Military Pact With France--Children Unconcerned by Earth Shocks Calm Their Elders.

GERMAN PROPOSALS A MENACE TO EUROPE.

PARIS, May 16.—The Petit Parisien says, Germany is considering making a proposal to guarantee Polish and Czech Slovak frontiers as they exist, on conditions that the Allies consent to Austria being united to the Reich. The paper observes, "This is as yet only a suggestion without tangible shape, but it has already received wide circulation in diplomatic circles both here and abroad." It accepted, declares the newspaper, the reported German proposal would amount not only to the first serious blow to be delivered against the peace treaties, but would give Germany territory equal to all she lost by the cessation of Alsace-Lorraine, Silesia and Schleswig, and instal her in the very heart of Europe with command over all routes.

PERSISTENT RUMOR OF CHAMBERLAIN'S RESIGNATION DENIED.

LONDON, May 16.—There are persistent rumors, the Daily Chronicle says, that Auston Chamberlain is likely to resign the Foreign Secretaryship in consequence of a divergence with his colleagues regarding the French attitude. Chamberlain, according to the Chronicle, is so much more pro-French than most other British Cabinet Ministers, that they had to restrain him from making a military

pact guaranteeing France's eastern frontier. Such a pact would have been aimed at Germany, and the Cabinet decided against it. When Chamberlain went to France two months ago, he was charged to tell the Foreign representatives that such a pact was outside the limits of the British policy, according to the Chronicle, which adds, his resignation was then accepted.

WITHOUT FOUNDATION.

LONDON, May 16.—Renter's News Agency declares it learns that British official circles dismiss as without foundation, the rumor of the approaching resignation of Foreign Secretary Chamberlain.

CHILDREN SING TO REASSURE TERRIFIED PEASANTS.

LENIKA, Armenia, May 16.—Three violent shocks were felt here yesterday causing houses to tremble and windows to rattle. Peasants, becoming alarmed, fled from their homes and took refuge in the massive stone buildings of the American Near East Relief Committee where the nurses had 6000 Armenian orphans sing songs to give the inhabitants an example of calmness and courage.

NOTED FRENCH AIRMAN KILLED.

RABAT, May 16.—Commandant Meserimes one of the best known French military aviators has died from wounds received in an engagement at Bibane on Wednesday, an official announcement says.

Soviets Admission of Failure

The soviet government has decided to return all factories, plans and institutions to their former owners, thus moving further from the idea of common property, according to information from Moscow. Dzerzhinsky, chief commissioner of public economy, made this announcement, saying 80 per cent. of the members of the soviet congress now in session favored returning the property and abandoning the idea of state ownership.

The reason given is that the Government is unable to operate the plants at a profit. Since the soviet constitution doesn't permit private ownership, the property is being turned over to its original owners on a lease bearing no termination date. On account of the run-down condition of the plants the government announces the owners will not be taxed for three years in order to allow them to make repairs.

Return Apartment Houses. After the announcement of the property return, the government gave over the leases to more than 2000 apartment houses in Moscow alone to their original owners or their heirs, allowing them to rent the apartments without the sanction of the government housing committee. These properties will also be free from taxes for a three-year period in order to give the owners a chance to make repairs. The labor unions believe the permission granted to employers to hire men without government restriction on wages will cause a demand for workers and will increase the present low prices, making the lot of the laborers better.

Safe-crackers took all the gold, foreign currencies, jewels and platinum kept in the safe of the Third Internationale by the foreign propaganda committee, it was learned here to-night from Moscow. It is known that the amount stolen totals many millions, but the committee does not give any information. The safe-crackers used acetylene torches, making a hole through the door large enough for a man to enter. The safe was guarded by Red soldiers, an entire detachment of whom have disappeared. The loss is so serious that for the present foreign propaganda activities must be curtailed and probably abandoned.

Trains That Get Lost

All Britain is still laughing at the prank played on the passengers of the Southern railway train which, recently made by mistake a detour of over seventy miles in reaching a destination only ten miles from its starting point.

But the incident is not unique in railway history. On an August Bank Holiday some years ago an excursion train left Chelmsford for Ipswich, roughly thirty miles distant. For several hours after it had started the train was completely lost sight of by the officials.

By midnight a crowd of some thousands of people, mostly relatives and friends of the excursionists, had gathered at Ipswich station, waiting for news. This was not forthcoming until daybreak the following morning, when an inspector on a light engine reported having located the lost train in a siding near Bury St. Edmunds. An official investigation revealed the fact that the driver of the train was suffering, at the time of the occurrence, from the effects of drink, and he was accordingly suspended.

At the Wrong Conference. Equally astonishing was the experience that befell a party of clergymen who, one summer's day, set out by train for Exeter, where an important conference was being held. On the same day a meeting of publicans was

Advance in Can common to 188 has directed attention to revived reports of the possibility of a split-up. Dividend situation has not changed and the directors are not likely to make any change until approximate figures for the year are available, which will not be until the final quarter. Granted that results are as now indicated, stockholders are sure to get some benefit, but this may merely be by way of a larger extra. Can now pays \$5 regular a year. At the end of 1922 it declared \$1 extra and last December \$2 a share extra.
American Can shows an interest in American Motor Body Corporation.

KENNECOTT COPPER.
NEW YORK, May 8.—Kennecott Copper directors were re-elected. Steven Birch pointed out that earnings of the company, pro-rated from subsidiaries, were at the rate of \$5 a share in 1924.
In reply to a question from a stockholder, Mr. Birch said that while the company was not as yet in a position to increase its dividend rate, the company's condition was growing better constantly and he thought higher dividends could be expected when the whole organization had been rounded out. He stated that cash assets, pro-rated from subsidiaries, now came to \$35,000,000, with notes outstanding \$12,000,000 that had been reduced by approximately \$1,000,000 received from the Alaska Steamship Co. The money, however, is not as yet in Kennecott's treasury. There is also matter of federal taxes for the last few years still to be finally settled with the federal government.

Don't Let Hungry Boy Eat Everything

A hungry boy is a joy to the cook. He eats with such zest and is so extravagant in his praise of what he likes most that he makes a direct (though unfortunate) appeal to the vanity of the cook, whether she is his mother or his mother's servant. It is hard to resist the boy who bounds into the kitchen with a "Whoop-pee! that's a regular cake! Gimme a chunk. I could die eating your chocolate cake!" But the wages of dietary sin is not death, at least not immediate death! And the growing boy who fills his stomach and tries to satisfy his almost insatiable appetite with too many sweets, too many fats and too much everything, lives on to reap the full harvest of the wild oats of his eating in middle life. The gout, dyspepsia, diabetes and kidney disorders of late middle life, so prevalent in men, may sometimes be traced to the misdeeds of early food habits.
Very often, however, faulty food habits bring on evidences of malnutrition before the youth reaches his maturity. This is the hardest truth for the person untrained in the principles of nutrition to believe. Mothers who have seen their boys eat so heartily that they seem literally to fill themselves up to the collar line are slow to understand how these same boys could be undernourished. Good nutrition comes not alone from quantity; it is realized only in the presence of quality, the wise use of these foods needed to promote growth, development and good health. The right sort of food must be provided to build firm flesh and muscles, to enlarge the bone structure, to keep the teeth whole and healthy, and to protect the body against diseases which are the result of deficient diets.
Fortunate it is that the growing boy has such a voluminous appetite that he is not finicky in his food likes. He will eat all wholesome foods with relish. Of course, he may prefer sweets if he has been allowed to acquire a taste for them; he may be "crazy" about pies, cakes and other rich foods. But given his choice between going hungry and eating the plain, wholesome diet provided by sensible mother, his animal instinct will get the better of him and he will eat what is put before him.
The rapidly growing boy needs a large quantity of food to help him grow and also to supply him with his boundless energy. His needs are much greater than those of his younger brothers and sisters. Since he is

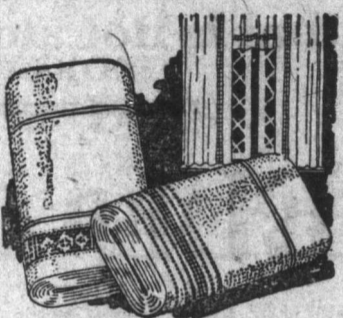

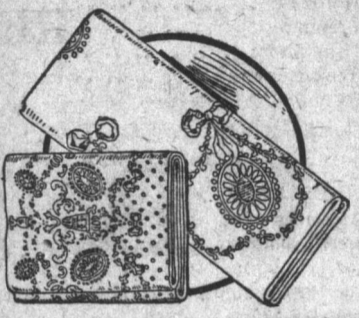

The Great Men of Letters in the Victorian Era

MATTHEW ARNOLD, CARLYLE, YEWMAN, ROSSETTI, CLOUGH, LANDOR, AND THOMAS HUGHES.

Professor Stanley T. Williams, of Yale University, in his book, *Studies in Victorian Literature* (George Allen & Unwin, Ltd., 12s. 6d. net), has some fine essays on those whom the Church Times describes as "The Victorian Victorians." The reviewer in that paper, so impressed is he with their

Victorians they are, having triumphed over oblivion. They may be misunderstood, belittled, derided, but

assuredly they are not forgotten. There are many Victorian writers, in their own time accounted outside the first rank, who were not expected, and probably did not themselves expect, to be read carefully half a century after their death. And for a while there seemed no chance of it.

"When they died, the sales of their works almost ceased. There were copies still upon the shelves of older folk, and of those to whom they had been bequeathed, but the dust began to gather thickly on them.

"Then, of late years, the twittering attacks of little critics and little essayists on all things Victorian had the unforeseen result of giving the things attacked a new vogue. From mere curiosity, maybe, people took down these books from the upper shelves, and glanced through them

in order to see, as the critics had advised, how amusingly rapid and conventional was the Victorian literature.

"Instead, many who had come to scoff remained to praise. They were frankly astounded by the quiet charm of books in which they had been taught to look only for absurdity. Not only the greatest Victorians, but a host of their lesser contemporaries were vindicated in this way, and their assailants made to look uncommonly foolish.

"First of all the public—the younger public—laughed with the critics. Now it has begun to laugh at them. For a time this younger public thought the attacks vastly clever. Then they began to examine for themselves what they supposed to be comic works held up to just ridicule. And the result of the study was quite unexpected.

"It showed that, after all, the gibes were undeserved, and that, whatever their limitations, these old Victorians were not the ignorant twaddlers they had imagined them. In fact, even those who had no claims to be in their front rank knew their business, did their work solidly well, provided what proves to be even now uncommonly good reading.

"The great men were found to be really great. Sneers at Tennyson and Dickens, for example, from silly little people who did not know genius when they met it, soon lost their point. And men of the second rank—a sound Victorian novelist like Trollope, for instance—again became popular, and have been more widely read within the last ten years than at any time since their deaths. The attacks recoiled upon the attackers. All along the line these Victorians are proving victorious, and the 'revaluations' of them are being revalued.

"It contains fifteen essays, four of which are on Matthew Arnold, and two on Carlyle. There is one, rather strangely, on Landor, whose first book was published in 1785; he was no more a 'Victorian' than Wordsworth. The three chapters we found most interesting are those on George Brimley, an almost forgotten critic, of remarkable astuteness and provision; on Tom Brown's School-days; and on Newman's Literary Preferences." The general public will probably consider the four essays on Matthew Arnold the best in the book, for Professor Webster gives a searching, incisive account of the many sides of Arnold's life and work, and this applies also to his essays on Carlyle. Clever, shrewd, and convincing as these are, the last chapter of all, which deals with The Parent of

Schoolboy Novels, Thomas Hughes, and Tom Brown's School-days, will give as much pleasure as any of the other essays in this worthy volume. The author sums up by saying:—"Hughes is known now for Tom Brown. Literary form was sacrificed to what Hughes had to say. The book is without artistry of any kind. It is, indeed, if one is hostile, a 'preachy' book. But the advice that Hughes gives is profound, and is opposite to-day. Pick up at a bookstore the yarns of school and college, the volumes of vapid counsel on school life; you may return thoughtfully to the advice Tom's father gave him as he placed him on the coach for Rugby, or to the lessons which Tom learned at first hand from his fellows, and from the greatest of schoolmasters, Thomas Arnold.

"Moreover, Tom Brown is not merely the best, it is the first school-boy book. Nothing of this sort had ever been written, save Lamb's account of Christ's Hospital or Dickens's tales of Squeer's school in Nicholas Nickleby. Hughes was the

pioneer. Tom Brown ran through five editions in nine months. A copy, it is said, is still given to every boy at Rugby; it is the parent of all schoolboy novels." It will be seen by the above the book by Professor Williams is likely to provide real interest to all who purchase it from their booksellers.

A Giant Telescope

It was as long ago as the beginning of the seventeenth century that Galileo turned out his first "optic glass," and must have been delighted to find that the tiny lens, little more than two inches in diameter, magnified objects about three times. Since that innovation, starting to everybody who heard it, there has been steady advance in the size of telescopes and in their enlarging powers. To-day, for example of that growth, we turn to the refractors and reflectors which must be reckoned in feet rather than inches—to the forty-inch Hooker glass of Chicago—Un-

iversity, the seventy-three-inch instrument at Little Saanich in Canada, or to the 100-inch telescope at the observatory on Mt. Wilson.

Now comes a mirror which is to surpass all these, as they surpassed predecessors, for it has a diameter of 120 inches and will go into the astronomical record as the largest telescope in the world. It owes that distinction to Charles H. Frye, a resident of Seattle, who financed the construction of the glass and has built and endowed the observatory where the mirror will be put in place. It had been his dream for years to make just such a contribution to science; he is now to have the satisfaction of seeing the telescope suitably mounted and turned to the heavens. The observatory which will shelter it is also unique in its way, Mr. Frye having undertaken to maintain it primarily for educational purposes and in the interest of the people. With an exterior which has been called "a work of architectural beauty," the edifice will contain "one of the finest collections of astronomical photographs thus far brought together."

Galileo with his improved glass magnifying thirty times did wonders as a pioneer, for he discovered the four satellites of Jupiter, revealed the phases of Venus, saw the rings of Saturn, and went far to confirm the Copernican theory. He also added to the 6000 stars which show themselves on a clear night to the unaided vision. The Mt. Wilson mirror brings 320,000,000 of these distant worlds into view, and that number is now to be increased to at least 400,000,000 by the Frye telescope. What more can come from the turning of its gigantic eye to the night skies may be easily gathered from what has already been done by lenses and mirrors of smaller penetrating power.

Not many years ago, working at the Mt. Wilson Observatory, Dr. Shapley, now of Harvard, revealed the existence of a star cluster or nebula so remote that its light, travelling at the rate of 186,000 miles a second, takes a million years to reach the earth. Only the other day observers were enabled to reach out from our own planet, not more than 8000 miles in breadth, to the star Mira, 165 "light years" distant from us, and announce that it has a diameter of 250,000,000 miles. Figures like these recall Jean Paul Richter's story of that earth-born mortal who, guided by an angel through the celestial spaces, "stopped, shuddered and wept" as their riches unfolded before him. Our astronomers feel the same awe, yet

In the evening a private dinner was given in the prince's honor in the parliament building, the historic chamber where the old Cape Parliament assembled. The Speaker of the House presided, and the Earl of Athlone, governor-general, and all the members of the Assembly and Senate attended. The tables were decorated in flower designs of the prince's colors, royal purple, red and gold.

Dr. Grenfell's New Boat

TO UNDERTAKE ADVENTUROUS VOYAGE TO LABRADOR.

Strathcona II is the name of a steel vessel, only 9 feet long, which is to cross the Atlantic to Labrador, a distance of over 2,500 miles, under her own power, for she is fitted with a compound engine to drive a screw. As her bunker capacity is limited, she will make the passage out via the Azores, where she can replenish her supply of coal. Formerly a yacht, she was bought by Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell to take the place of a former Strathcona which, after many years' service, was nipped in the ice off this formidable coast and lost.

Strathcona II will be used to visit all the stations the doctor has set up, carrying necessities to the people, and conveying to hospitals he has established those who are ill or injured. There is no sea transport for Labrador, and at present an old Canadian drifter is trying to do the duty which the Strathcona will perform when she gets out to this remote colony, where Dr. Grenfell is working up to the Arctic fringes and the Esquimaux. Not only has he cared for the bodily life of the population, but he is organizing them industrially, and making their lives less primitive, as well as establishing schools and orphanages.

The vessel will sail from Yarmouth on June 1. It was from Yarmouth that "Grenfell of Labrador" made his first trip to the colony, going out in a North Sea sailing trawler of 97 tons, the Alport, in 1882, and this craft on her return trip from St. John's made a record by reaching this country in 12 1/2 days. Strathcona II will make the voyage under command of Captain Kirby, a volunteer, who will have a volunteer crew of five, who have offered themselves in appreciation of the splendid work Dr. Grenfell is carrying on with the aid of other doctors, nursing sisters, and helpers, many of whom have also given themselves to this work. Dr. Grenfell started his sea work from Yarmouth by ministering to the crews of the old Short Blue Fleet of smacks, which ranged up and down the North Sea, and the place has ever since been connected with his work. From this port shipments of stores, necessities, and comforts are still being made to Labrador.

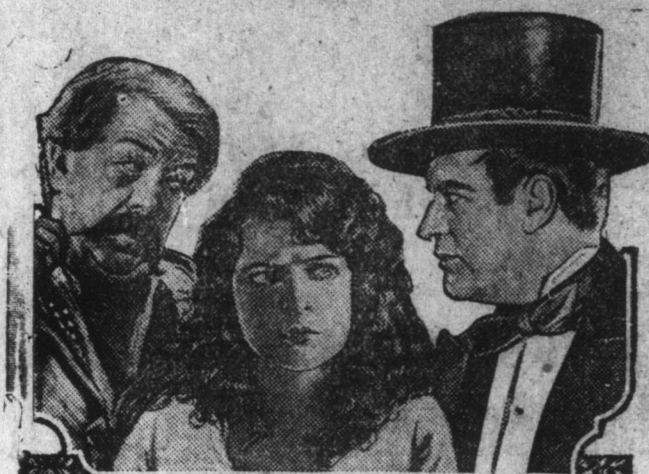

Pola Negri Fails to Declare Jewels

SCREEN ACTRESS FACES FINE TO-MORROW—HER RARE WINES POURED INTO HARBOR.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Pola Negri, the screen star, who arrived here Friday night on the Berengaria from a trip to Europe, was detained shortly after disembarking by the customs authorities for neglecting to declare three pieces of jewelry valued at 300,000 francs, it was learned to-day.

Miss Negri, after a brief questioning, was allowed to go to her suite in the Hotel Ambassador after giving assurance that she would appear at the customs house Monday and pay whatever fine is assessed. In the meantime the customs authorities are appraising the jewels.

The actress will also have to appear before the officials of the legal department in the customs house to explain why the jewels were not declared.

Miss Negri was very much distressed over the matter to-night. She said she had made several trips to and from Europe, and had never before been questioned by the officials about her jewelry.

The jewelry episode was not the only one which caused annoyance when the Berengaria docked. At that time the authorities discovered 15 bottles of liquors in Miss Negri's trunks. As she looked on the forbidden bottles were seized and ruthlessly struck them against the deck railing. Champagne, sherry and other choice beverages trickled into the sea. She was then fined \$5 for each bottle.

Testing Their Honesty

Intelligence tests have often been tried in schools, but a "test for honesty" carried out by a certain newspaper seems to have been more costly than educational.

A hundred-dollar bill was sent to ten clergymen, ten lawyers, ten journalists, ten scientists, and so on, with the untruthful explanation that it was "in adjustment of the error complained of in our account." The different professions were then placed in order of merit, on the score of "honesty," according to the percentage of the recipients in each class who returned the bill.

Twenty-five per cent. of the people who received the bill returned it, and the clergy came top with a percentage of 66. Not a single man of science returned it, and that group therefore figures at the bottom of the list.

It is arguable that the 75 per cent. who did not return the bill imagined that it referred to a transaction they had forgotten, and gave the windfall the benefit of the doubt. The fact that the clergy came out best in this "honesty test" perhaps only shows that they have more time to attend to small matters, and the opposite fact, that men of science are too busy to bother about their private accounts. Few people will regard the results seriously and refuse to trust a scientific man in future.

Hardy Sealers Gamble With Death on Savage Atlantic

Nervy Newfoundlanders Each Spring Defy Blizzards, Fogs and Treacherous Ice "Pans," to Load Their Sturdy Steamers with Skins and Gain "Highline" Shares—Great Herds Set up "Nursery" on Floes Fresh from Arctic—Crews May Win Rich Rewards, but Disaster Ever Threatens—"Neptune" Brings in 20,604 Pelts and Returns for More.

Danger and sometimes death. Yet, with it all, Newfoundlanders, generation after generation, continue to go out each March for four to six weeks and brave hardships, the very mention of which causes the city man to shiver—just to add a bit to a hard-won livelihood. The catch of seals this year is estimated at 120,000 skins, 18,000 more than last year, with a net value close to \$250,000.

 As baseball is to Boston in the early fall, so is sealing to Newfoundland in the early spring. But, though the money stakes are large, and the "sporting" interest runs as high, the rugged Newfoundlanders play out on the bitter ice floes, for even more serious stakes—human life.
 Sealing—and the season now just closing is no exception—has on the surface something of the holiday aspect. When it begins, in early March, hardy fishermen from towns far and near flock to St. John's to sign up with the sealing crews. When it nears a close, only a few weeks later, excitement is at fever pitch. Lotteries, their proceeds going to charitable and social organizations under government sanction and control, begin to pay off to the lucky ticket holders, on the biggest hauls, the quickest trips, the days or return, and whatnot.
 The excitement runs high—no batting average was ever followed more closely than the cargo tallies—beneath it all lies a suppressed dread, for scarcely a season passes in which the insatiable ocean does not take pay in the lives of the sealers.
 That the 1925 season, now virtually over, will have gone into history as one of the exceptional seasons in that those who set sail came back, is merely a matter of chance. Sealing, with all the precautions flung about it by modern science and governmental control, has not yet, and never will be, a safe means of livelihood. In Newfoundland they base lotteries upon it, but the greatest lottery of all is sealing itself.

EVERY VOYAGE A STRUGGLE WITH BOISTEROUS OCEAN.
 Begun as it is in the stormy month of March, often amid intense cold, the sealing voyage cannot be otherwise than perilous. It is indeed a voyage of hopes and fears, trials and disappointments, and the pursuit of it engenders more anxiety and solitude, with all the excitement, than any other occupation on the island, given in most of its endeavors to a herculean struggle with the boisterous Atlantic.

With the shrill scream of sirens and loud tooting of whistles the fleet edges out of the harbor. This year it was March 3, the date set by the government, which also forbids any killing before March 13. The 10-day interval is needed, for the fleet must sail easterly and northerly, till it makes contact with the vast icebergs, and with the faster, yet rough, pans and floes of ice on which the young seals are congregated.
 From each ship, when the word is given, dash scores of men out over the ice, which, though it may be described as "pans," is yet most irregular, with its rough hummocks and hillocks, concealed holes and traps, and broad leads of open water which must be leaped with the sure-footedness of a goat. As the killing of the seals progresses, the early approach of night may find whole groups of the sealers three to eight miles away from the sheltering sides of their vessel. In favourable weather they are almost sure to get back, dragging behind them the bundle of pelts they have obtained. But, in the event of fog, sudden gales or sudden thick snow, the return becomes a big gamble.
 The seal-killers may lose their way. They may freeze to death before they can get back. Or, greatest tragedy of all, they may find themselves marooned on a pan that the gale, or the action of the waves, has separated from the main floe. If the pan breaks together, they yet have a chance for their lives, if the search for them be prosecuted

Though latest reports are that the 1925 season has been without casualties, it was not without danger. The Stella Maria, with 30 men, was caught in the grinding floes, fortunately in calm weather, and so crushed that she took water rapidly. The men had barely time to jump to the floor and watch her sink. Three other steamers took them aboard. Such are common occurrences.

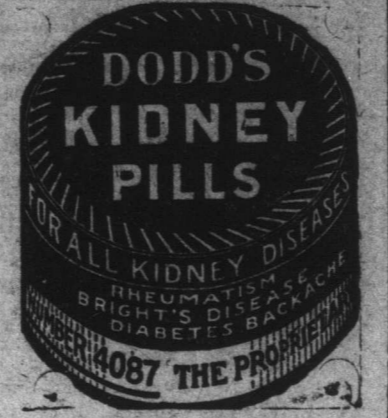
YEAR'S CATCH \$250,000.

But with it all, Newfoundland, as it has for generations, continues to go out each March for four to six weeks and brave hardships the very mention of which causes the city man to shiver—just to add a bit to a hard-won livelihood. The catch this year is estimated at 120,000 skins, 18,000 more than last year, with a net value close to \$250,000.

Most interesting, too, is the circumstance that the high liner, and therefore the first prize-winner, is the Neptune, toughest of them all, which has gone to the ice fields each spring but one since 1873. Her cargo of 20,604 seals brought her total up to 995,967—service at \$2,650,000. Back early, she promptly got up steam and sailed on a second trip, confident of bringing her grand total to an even million of seals before the season fully closed.

In years now far gone the Newfoundlanders set sail, rather than getting up steam, when the sealing season came. For nearly a century sealing was done from the comparatively frail though wonderfully seaworthy sailing craft. As many as 300 set out in a single season.
 But to-day the fleet scarcely numbers a dozen; yet may carry nearly as many men, for it is made up of large steamers, each equipped with wireless and every other helpful device, and some carrying airplanes for scouting out seals or discovering the approach of dangerous ice conditions. Needless to say, such vessels, especially built to combat fearful ice pressures, are owned to-day, not by individuals, but by companies in St. John's with heavy financial backing.
 Getting them ready is a long process, begun almost with the first stroke of the new year. The ship is prepared to receive a sealing crew numbering from 150 to 240 men, who, with the space reserved for seal pelts, pretty much tax her capacity. And not one of these men, signed up for the sealing season, receives a cent of wage. The lure is both that of adventure and that of the game of chance.
 If the ship is successful, against the keenest rivalry, in stuffing its hold with seal skins, each member of the crew receives a share of the profits. Yet, these shares are meagre at the best. The high line voyage of the Neptune this year afforded each on her roster about \$94. When the vessel takes a slim loading of pelts or, as sometimes happens, comes home practically empty, the men who signed on have not a penny in cash to show for their hardihood and hourly risk of life.

MAY LOSE SMALL FORTUNE.
 This sounds one-sided. Yet the owner advances to each man his "crop," or outfit of clothing and accessories with which to carry on the hunt. He also provides food and the cramped lodgings aboard. From the gross proceeds, if the trip be successful, the owner deducts these costs. But, if the trip ends in emptiness or in disaster, the owner has lost a small fortune.
 The actual taking of seals seems ruthless until it is considered in the same light as the countless other sacrifices of animal life on an even larger scale to warm, feed and clothe human beings. And it depends upon the use—strange dictate of nature that the baby seal be born on the bleak, wind-swept, ice floe that has just come down from the Arctic. Where the human babe could not survive 15 minutes the seal babe flourishes.
 On these floes, which may be so terrible to foodless and shelterless man, are born each year, between the 15th and 25th of February, thousands of seal "cats." At first the little seal is covered with long white hair, but this soon gives place to a thicker and closer covering, so that the seal of more than a fortnight's growth is known as a "white coat." If they escape the fishery—they reappear with bluish black coats, with a darker marking on the back, so shaped as to earn for them the name of "harp." The older seals, which with their age have taken on an aggressive tacking in the young seals (no sealer thinks of tackling them without a gun), are marked by a gristly head cowl, which is often puffed out in anger. Thus they are termed "hoods".
 It is the young seal, however, that the sealer seeks so adventurously.
SAME GOAL EACH YEAR.
 That the great herds of "harp" and "hoods" should each year without fail gather in exactly the same spot to form their nursery almost beggars be-



liefs, when it is considered that men for more than a century have hunted them there. But because it is so, the fleet always seeks an area a few miles square, northeast of Cape John, which is on the 60th parallel of latitude, and about equally distant from Belle Isle, 50 and 100 miles distant. In this area the seals are sure to be.
 Reaching it, however, may be easy or difficult. Conditions vary each season. Some years the pans on which the seals are colorized are buttressed about by miles upon miles of ice fields, through which the ships must but their way.
 As the vessels approach the seal does all eyes peer sharply ahead and all ears are tuned finely from word

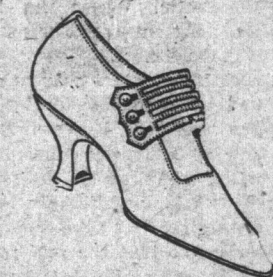

Conditions Grave in Cape Breton

With protective work definitely abandoned at one mine, No. 2, at New Aberdeen and with the maintenance forces at several others reduced to a minimum through the picketing, pot-guy put into effect by the U.M.W. last Tuesday; with the Government, through Premier Armstrong, threatening to send the militia or provincial police into the district for protective purposes and the miners replying to the threat with a message which can only be interpreted as an invitation to the Government to do its worst, the situation in the Cape Breton coal field at the end of the ninth week of the cessation of work is, to say the least, extremely serious, and the future presents most alarming possibilities.

A report from the office of the Dominion Coal Company this morning states that No. 2 is the only mine tied up at present although the situation at No. 10, Reserve Mines is very grave at this mine since the miners walked out, the maintenance work was carried on by 19 men working 10 hours a day. Since picketing started Tuesday last, this number has been reduced to ten who have to carry on for 16 and 18 hours daily. In addition, the members of the electrical or mechanical staffs of the mine are prevented by the pickets from attending their duties and that therefore no repairs could be made to machinery, and should a breakdown occur, maintenance work would have to be abandoned.

The maintenance men at Dominion No. 6, who were sent back to Glace Bay by pickets on Big Glace Bay Beach yesterday succeeded in getting thru' early this morning by losing several hours' sleep and sneaking across before the pickets got on the job. All quiet was reported from Glace Bay this morning.—Sydney Post, May 9.

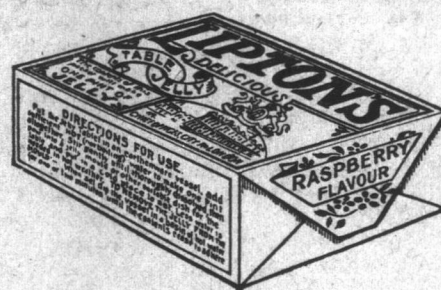

Preserving Eggs

As a good preservative for eggs add to four quarts of unsteaked lime two tablespoonfuls of cream of tartar, two of salt, and four quarts of cold water. Put perfectly fresh eggs

into the stone jar, pour the mixture over them, and the eggs, if quite fresh when put down, will last for many months. If the water dries up so as to leave the top layer of egg uncovered, add more water to above quantities. These are enough to preserve nine dozen of eggs at one time.

NURMI AND MENTOR HAVE PARTED.

FITCHBURG, Mass., May 10.—Paavo Nurmi and his manager, Hugo Quist, have parted, the Finnish runner said yesterday. Asking to explain why Quist had not accompanied him to Fitchburg for his appearance, the runner said:

"We have parted. I will be in this country only two weeks more, and I will no longer need any interpreter or manager."

MAKES PREDICTION.

Hype Igoe, New York writer of note, says:—Jack Dempsey has sailed for Europe, and while abroad he is almost certain to take on some heavyweight for what he terms "target practice." Negotiations are on foot to have Jack meet Hans Bristenstrader, the best man in Germany. Paul Sampson is over there, and there is a third heavy named Rossman.

CRACK PICARON SCRATCHED FROM ENGLISH DERBY.

Removal of Manion Star Will Make The Big British Classic More Open Race.

LONDON, May 11.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Picaroon, A. B. Cox's good three-year-old, was scratched from the Derby to-day. Picaroon, by Bep-Clooneretta, was the champion two-year-old, and throughout the winter was favorite for the Derby, and for the two thousand guineas. He won the Graven Stakes three weeks ago, at Newmarket, since when he has had to stop fast training on account of leg trouble. Picaroon was scratched from the two thousand guineas, and as his leg has not seemed to progress as favorably as it might, he was knocked down to a 66 to 1 Derby candidate.

His removal will make this year's great classic a more open race, for the Manton crack is admittedly superior to some of the prominent contenders.

YOUNG STRIBLING SURPRISED FANS.

Georgian Punched Harder Than Ever Before and Retained Speed and Cleverness Against Rojas.

"Ma's" boy, Willie (Young) Stribling, always popular in Boston, handed the Bean Town fans a real shock last Thursday night when he flattened the tough Chilean, Romero Rojas, in four rounds. The young Georgian was favored to outpoint his opponent by a considerable margin, but very few fans expected a knockout.

Rojas, who had been knocked out only once before, and then by Floyd Johnson, when the Iowa was at his best, was expected to stand up to any attack Stribling might present, but the Western invader stepped into the Chilean from the start and astonished the fans with the way he polished off the man who had survived the attack of some of the hardest hitters in the heavyweight class.

Stribling, conceding 12 3-4 pounds to his opponent, pushed harder than ever before and still retained his speed and cleverness. According to Boston sport writers, the young Georgian is destined to carve his name in heavyweight fighting circles. Boston promoters are now trying to match Stribling with Jim Maloney, sensational heavy star.

Woman Assassinate

"Prince of the Macedonians" in a Box at a Theatre in Vienna After Inviting Him and His Wife to the Performance.

Vienna, May 11.—Six shots from a revolver, fired by Anna Karlinicu at a man named Alautovic or Panizza at the Burg Theatre here, Friday night, during a performance of Henrik Ibsen's "Peer Gynt," were not heard by the audience, owing to the noise being made on the stage. It was only when a woman's screams continued, and she was seen leaning across the edge of the box with blood streaming from her face, that the audience became aware that a tragedy had been enacted.

A Bulgarian vendetta of many years' standing thus reached its climax during the performance of the Norwegian dramatist's masterpiece, under circumstances and with a background no dramatist could emulate.

The assassin, a beautiful, slender, pale woman of 28 years, elegantly dressed, was arrested immediately, offering no resistance. She had succeeded in killing Rodora Panizza, alias Alautovic, the surviving leader of the Macedonian Federalists, several of whom—Daskalov, Tchaulev, Alexandrov and Yankov—have been killed in the course of the last year. After the assassination of the great Alexandrov, Panizza was regarded as the "Prince of the Macedonians."

Madame Karlinicu has been in Vienna several months, and she is believed to be a secret agent of the Bulgarian Government. Panizza, with his wife, arrived in Vienna three weeks ago, to attend the wedding of his sister.

Madame Karlinicu approached the couple and they became friends. She bought a box at the theatre and invited the couple, with Panizza's sister and her husband, to attend the performance. Madame Karlinicu sat between Panizza and his wife, and as the climax came in the play she rose and fired six shots, killing Panizza and wounding all the others in the party. After her arrest she said that as Panizza was always surrounded by a body-guard, and had she made a suspicious move in the street, in a restaurant, or elsewhere, Panizza's friends would have killed her, she chose the theatre instead.

Loaded revolvers were found on Panizza's body and also in the possession of his wounded wife and brother-in-law. The Karlinicu woman told the police she carried her revolver concealed under her silk underwear.

Mme. Karlinicu is of Macedonian origin. She told the police she killed Panizza because he had murdered "two good Macedonians." It is believed Panizza was the assassin of the renowned Macedonian leader, Boris Sankof, twenty years ago.

Panizza was the last surviving leader of the Federalists, who want a United Macedonia within a Balkan Federation, comprising both Jugo Slavia and Bulgaria. They are opposed both by the Jugo Slave and Bulgarian Governments. His death is equally welcome to both Governments.

"I'm glad he's dead. My life does not matter," she said. She is said to be ill of tuberculosis and kidney disease.

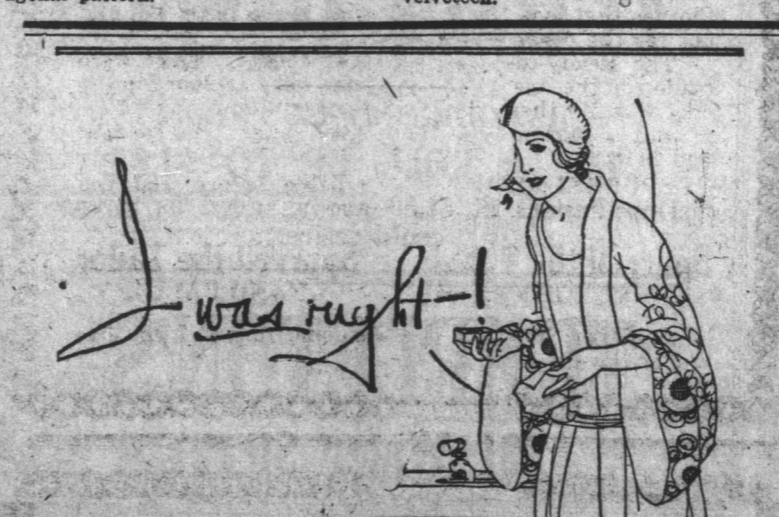

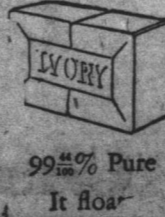

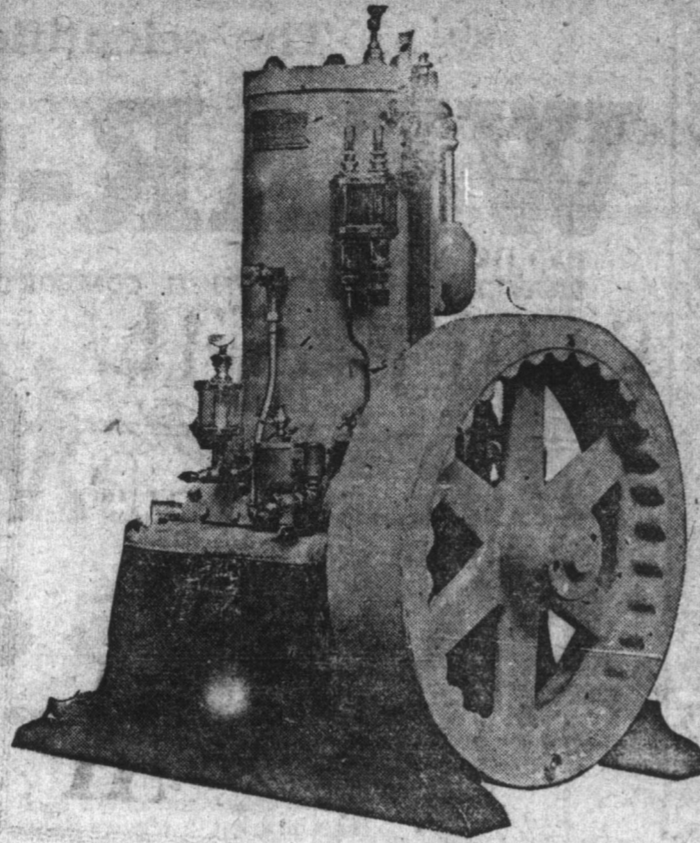
