RACING SEASON OPENED IN NEW YORK

Some Splendid Horses in the Metropolitan Handicap
New York, May 13.—The Metropolitan handicap, the first real handicap of the year, was opened today by brilliant sunshine and gentle breezes, and scores of special trains carried many thousands to the beautiful Belmont Park track.

This is officially the first outdoor day of the season and the select set made their summer salutation at Belmont Park. It also opened the coaching season, the first drive being made in the races. The Metropolitan has always called out the best horses in training and this year's no exception. In the list of starters there was material for a great race. In all respects it was the finest lot of fast horses that have ever been named to start in this event for many years. These included Fashion Plate, a fast miler; Stanley Fay, one of the best horses in the west last year; Firestone, Jack Atkin called the "Handicap King"; Priscilla, a gelding that had an unbroken record until he made his ill-starred trip to England; Masette called the greatest filly since the day of the peerless Artful; King James the hero last year of the Metropolitan and Restigouche, a fast horse and kept constant for many events in the last two years.

Horsemen were divided before the race between James R. Keene's great mare Masette and the holder of entries, King James, Restigouche and Firestone. Though promoter Ted Rickard is plainly apprehensive that the opposing fight factions may not be able to agree on a referee at Monday's conference, both Johnson, and his manager, George Little profess confidence in a settlement of the problem on the appointed date. Johnson said last night that he was certain to put one of his own choice in the much-mooted place, intimating that Jeffries would give in, but reports from Ben Lomond fall short of bearing out the negro champion's expectations. Jeffries apparently is as firmly resolved to stand by his own selections as Johnson is by his, and unless the situation changes surprisingly in the interval, a deadlock is likely to be reached. It is expected here today that Rickard is planning to bring about a preliminary conference between Jeffries' manager and Johnson in the hope of adjusting the difficulty.

"I believe," said Rickard, "that if I can get these two together before Monday they will come to an agreement. There is no reason why they should not decide on a California man. Californians have refereed most of the championship fights for the last ten years and I am strong for having one of them this time."

SHOT OFF THE IN QUEBEC MEDAL CONTEST
The Calgary Miniature Rifle club's shot for the Quebec medal was shot on Thursday. Excellent scores were made, resulting in a tie between H. A. Crofton and F. Kaye, their score being 146 out of a possible 150. The tie was shot off on Friday, and target being agreed upon by H. A. Crofton, first, making a poor score of 64. F. Kaye was on and in his usual steady style put on 48 out of 50. F. Kaye is a young and promising shot, and bids fair to make another champion for Calgary. This completes the season for miniature shooting. It is certain that next winter a larger and better range is expected after the splendid work of the members. It is safe to say the membership will be tripled. All members wishing to join the Calgary Rifle club had better do so at once, as the season is just commencing, and good clean sport is anticipated.

THE AUTHORITY OF THE KING

"The King reigns but does not govern" is a quotation often used in connection with the authority and power of British sovereigns.

It is true that at times during the reigns of the Tudors and Stuarts, Kings did assume to govern by "Divine right" but every student of history knows what was the result in the case of King Charles I. who was beheaded on a charge of waging war against his people, and in that of James II. who was driven from the throne for infringing on the rights of the people.

Even in later times when George III. following the advice of his mother to be a real King, came into conflict with his advisers and his parliament, he was compelled to yield and respect the rights of the people as guaranteed by Magna Charta, the Petition of Rights and the Act of Settlement.

The British Constitution has been a thing of gradual growth, and in its clear definition of the relation between King and people lies its strength.

Even among the Anglo-Saxons the powers of the King elected by the Witan were clearly defined and that body had the power to depose a bad King and elect a better one in his stead.

What has, however, been recognized as constituting a part of the rights of the Crown, since the time of Henry the first king of a united England, has never of itself been considered sufficient.

It may be noted that the first of every dynasty recognized this fact. William the Conqueror, the first Norman King, took the precaution to have his accession to the throne ratified by the people over whom he was to rule.

And so with the Plantagenets and Lancastrians. The House of York and the Tudors claimed the throne by right of descent and conquest. James VI. of Scotland, became James I. of Great Britain, by the will of the people of England as expressed by parliament.

The title of the Guelph line is entirely parliamentary and rests on the Act of Settlement, which settled the crown upon Princess Sophia, of Hanover and her heirs. It will be seen that while King George V. is King by virtue of descent he reigns by parliamentary title only.

It is often stated that the Kings of Great Britain has less power than the President of the United States, and that the British Empire is a republic in everything but name. This is true to the extent that in no country in the world is the will of the people recognized to such an extent.

No rulers of any country ever recognized this principle so clearly as did Queen Victoria and King Edward VII. and it was largely due to this and to their strong sympathy with the common people that they owed their great popularity.

On a few points of government, however, a certain discretion rests with the Crown. In the event of no single man being the undisputed leader of his party, the King may exercise his judgment as to who should be invited to be prime minister.

In 1894 Queen Victoria selected Lord Kimberlin in preference to Lord John Russell, the nominal leader of his party, and Disraeli was her choice in 1895 and Lord Rosebery in 1894. In 1899 the Queen would have preferred Lord Hartington to William Ewart Gladstone, but the former refused to accept the premiership.

The influence of the Crown on the government of the country depends largely on the personality of the sovereign. "The Crown," says Bagehot, "has three rights—the right to be consulted, the right to encourage and the right to warn, and a King of great sense and capacity, would want no others."

Up to the time of George I. the sovereign attended all cabinet councils and was virtually his own prime minister. Since the death of Queen Anne the British sovereign has attended a cabinet council.

The declaration of the new King that he will follow in the footsteps of his father is a guarantee to the British people throughout the world that

The Constitution will be maintained inviolate and that the prestige of the British Empire will be kept up to its present high standing.

EDITORIAL NOTES

Fine weather and two good ball games were features of yesterday's holiday enjoyed by many Calgary citizens.

Nothing has ever shown the ties of kinship and friendship that bind together the two great Anglo-Saxon nations so much as the messages of condolence and sorrow sent from the United States to the British Royal Family on the occasion of their great sorrow. The leading newspapers and statesmen of the great American republic have vied with each other in their expressions of appreciation of the character of the late King and of the great loss that not only the British nation, but the whole civilized world, has sustained in his death.

A returned missionary from China told a Toronto audience that "if China is ever to be Christianized it must be by Chinese." The Chinese will never be Christianized as long as they are Chinese. The Mongolian character does not harmonize with the teachings of Christianity and while here and there may be examples of Christianized Chinese, not much faith can be put in the genuineness of their conversion.

They have for so many centuries been steeped in the superstition of their own religion and cling so tenaciously to its philosophy that Christianity offers little attraction to them. The result of missionary effort in China has not been entirely satisfactory and will require to be modelled on new lines before much will be accomplished.

The tenth anniversary of the Young Men's Club will be celebrated on Sunday evening in Central Methodist church, when five minutes' report of the work done during the year will be given and a special address by Mr. J. Brownlee, B.A. The service will be short, with appropriate music.

AMBIDEXTERITY IN GERMAN EDUCATION

It is Said to Develop Memory and General Intelligence Remarkably.

Berlin, Ohio, May 13.—A movement has been started in Germany for the cultivation of ambidexterity. The idea is that the development of the power to use both hands equally well means the development of the intelligence in general and the memory in particular.

The advocate of the movement states the case thus: "While right handed people have the language center on the left side of the brain, people who are ambidextrous have two language centres, one on each side of the brain. The infant begins life with two speech centres, but as the right hand is gradually trained and the left neglected, one speech centre gradually grows ineffective and useless. It is argued that by the cultivation of the left hand the capacity of the right speech centre of the brain can be revived and that the intelligence can be broadened as ambidexterity increases the utility of a human being's hands."

Instances are cited by supporters of the movement in which practice with the left hand has resulted in a power of speech until then paralyzed. A patient was stricken with paralysis of the left centre of speech and along with it paralysis of the right hand. The doctors started to teach the patient to write with the left hand, with the result that the power of speech was awakened in the right center of speech.

Another case was that of a boy who at the age of 13 lost his left hand, but soon learned to do fairly well with an artificial member. At the age of 19 he suffered a stroke of paralysis which robbed him of the power of speech. By means of a small ring with a pen attached to it fixed to his nose he practiced writing and not only recovered his ability to converse in German but also in French which he had forgotten.

As a matter of fact, ambidexterity is necessary in several professions and occupations. Surgery and piano playing may be given as examples. Many military authorities are strongly in favor of teaching soldiers to be ambidextrous in the use of the pistol, lance and sword.

AVIATION MEET AT LONG ISLAND, N. Y.

Many Foreign Aviators Are Expected to Challenge This Year For the Big Prize.

New York, May 13.—America's first international aviation meet for the championship of the world will be held on Long Island. The last international meet, at which Glenn H. Curtiss of Hammondsport, New York, won the Gordon-Bennett trophy, was held last year at Rheims, France.

St. Louis, Indianapolis, Los Angeles, Seattle and Washington and Baltimore have all been bidders for the contest, but the Aero Club of America selected New York, because it believes the transportation lines here are better equipped to handle large crowds, and because foreign aviators are not inclined to undertake the expense of a long land trip after crossing the ocean. The exact site for the course has not been definitely chosen, but it will be somewhere near Hempstead Plains, Long Island, just outside the limits of New York City. It will be triangular shape, three miles long over all, and a huge grand stand will be built for the enormous crowds that are expected unless the Belmont Park race track—one of the sites on Hempstead Plains under consideration—should be chosen. In that event, the grand stand would be close to hand.

The races will be conducted by the International Aero Club, of which the Aero Club of America is a member, and will last for a week. The prize in contest for the world's championship and the Gordon-Bennett trophy has been scheduled for October 23, but the dates for the minor events have not yet been set.

The Gordon-Bennett trophy, the distance is 20 kilometers or 12.4 miles. Curtiss covered it last year in the record time of 15 minutes, 50 3/5 seconds, defeating Bleriot, Lefebvre and Latham of France and Cockburn of England.

Many foreign aviators are expected to challenge this year, as under an agreement entered into between the Aero Club of America and the Wright Brothers, the latter have agreed to license all aviators competing in events of this kind. The contest for the Gordon-Bennett trophy of the club, has reported from Europe, whether he went recently to complete arrangements for the meet, that the time of his departure has been well received there, and that there will be foreign entries in plenty.

BRITAIN'S KING WAS GOOD SEAMAN

"During the manoeuvres of 1889," he added, "a small squadron was sent to defend Lough Swilly and as an attack by the enemy was hardly expected, three attached torpedo boats were sent to sea one night to reconnoitre directly after dark, with orders to return into harbor at daylight. It was a rough night, and while returning toward the harbor, just after daylight one of the three broke down and had to anchor close to a lee shore where a nasty sea was on. No. 73 immediately went to rescue her comrade and the third boat returned to the harbor to report the situation, as the disabled boat was round a corner and not in sight from the senior officer's ship."

"Shortly afterward No. 73 returned and reported that she had carried away her only hawser and had failed to tow the disabled boat out of danger. The situation was critical, and immediately preparations were made for rescuing the disabled boat, but the commander of 73 was so keen to have another try, notwithstanding the fact that he had been up all night that he decided to give the young sub-lieutenant a chance of winning his spurs; so he was provided with a brand new hemp hawser, and was sent out to rescue his friend, which he did, and towed him safely into harbor.

ROMANCE OF MINING IS NOT YET DEAD

Nelson Boy Is Presented With Claim by Capitalists of Vancouver

Nelson, May 13.—One could not desire a more delightful illustration of the romance of western mining life than has just arisen in connection with the bonding of the Elsie group of claims in the Kootenai district, which William Maher, the famous prospector, Vancouver capitalist, and miner of Nelson and the Sheep Creek country.

About two years ago Eddie Doolan, son of Larry Doolan, one of the old-timers of the promotion and construction of the C.P.R., and a well-known time well known and respected in all parts of the Kootenai, was out for a holiday with William Maher and his partner, Angus Murray. Along toward August, 1908, they were away up in the wide spaces amongst the lakes, glaciers and peaks about the Bayoune group. The ground about them looked promising, and an examination proved it was far better than its appearance. A group of five claims was marked off, the Elsie, Wilson, Tennie, Ore Hill and Gold Nugget, they were away up in the staked in the name of William Maher.

"This claim is for you Ed," said Maher to young Doolan, who was with him. "You're the one to run it, and I'll keep the claim for you."

Without a line of writing there the matter stood on the bare word of William Maher, but he comes of the stock of the Mahers of Tipperary, Ireland, who are renowned for pluck and loyalty to the death. The whole thing had almost passed from young Doolan's mind when his attention was pleasantly recalled to it by the receipt of a letter from William Maher, dated from Vancouver on April 29, and running as follows:

"Dear Eddie,—Enclosed please find bank draft for \$225, being twenty-five per cent of the price of the Elsie, the claim I staked for you. I have bonded the group, hoping you are prospering. Yours, William Maher."

Which means that William Maher has made young Doolan, who has barely turned his eighteenth year, a present of \$4,500.

TEN HOURS IN THE TAIL OF HALLEY'S COMET

Astronomer Says it Will Take Earth That Time to Pass Through.

San Jose, Cal., May 13.—Director Campbell of the Lick Observatory today issued the following statement:

"Halley's comet is the most conspicuous comet since that of September and October, 1882, and the chances are good that in a few days it will surpass in appearance the great comet of 1882. Astronomer Curtis photographed thirty-three degrees of its tail, but not nearly that extent is visible to the unassisted eye. The diameter of the tail at a point 15,000,000 miles out from the head was about 1,900,000 miles.

"As the earth and comet will pass each other on the evening of May 18 with a relative velocity of between forty and fifty miles per second, the earth will be approximately ten hours in passage through the tail provided present dimensions remain essentially unchanged.

"The observer should have no difficulty in obtaining an excellent view of the comet, a short distance above the east point of the horizon just before the break of dawn. During the remaining mornings of this week the best view of the comet may be obtained at 3:15 a.m. in the morning local time for all situated in approximately a latitude of San Francisco.

"Observers near the northern edge of the United States, Canada, in Central and Northern Europe will get their best views earlier than 3:15 a.m., and those situated in the southern part of the United States in similar latitude should look a few minutes later than 3:15 a.m. Tomorrow morning the comet will be 40,000,000 miles from the earth."

STANDARD OIL CO. WAS GOLD BRICKED

Interesting Budget of News From the Orient—Japanese and Chinese Have Trouble

Victoria, May 12.—The steamer Kamakura Maru which reached port this morning, brought 122 passengers, and 1027 tons of cargo including 744 bales of silk worth \$70,000. United States Consul General Selmdore arrived from Korea on the steamer.

Work is progressing on the Mukden-Kangai railway, the pier for the big steel bridges across the Yalu are in, but there is some delay over a question of jurisdiction with China. Development is progressing at the American mines at Ussuri and it is reported a smelter will shortly be built.

Nobody Wants Street Railway

New York, May 13.—At the foreclosure sale of the Metropolitan Street Railway today, no bids were received for the property. The foreclosure proceedings will now go back to the courts and Judge Lacombe will set another date of sale.

Trouble Between Japs and Chinese

News was brought by the steamer of the trouble between Japanese and Chinese in the Antung-Mukden railroad section, a number of collisions having occurred recently between the Chinese and Japanese railroad guards. The Chinese sent 200 soldiers to the scene and this was immediately followed by the despatch of Japanese troops. Some Japanese refugees from Changsha who arrived in Japan before the Kanakura Maru sailed, say that speculation by the officials was the cause of the recent outbreak. Mr. Suzuki, a Japanese postmaster, said that when the steamer was killed, he denied. He hid himself in a poor Chinese house. A servant who put on the fugitive's clothes, was killed in mistake for him. The Japanese refugees had stirring stories of narrow escapes to tell. They got away only with the clothing in which they stood. Advice from Peking by the Kanakura Maru stated that a widespread anti-dynastic revolution is feared by the government. Belligerents have established themselves in Shanghai, Tientsin, Hankow, and other places to carry on a propaganda of revolution. The state council has voted a large sum of money to trace down the leaders.

Standard Oil Company "Gold-Bricked"

News of how the Standard Oil company was "gold-bricked" by a Japanese who claimed to have invented a method of converting old bones into refined petroleum was brought by the Kanakura Maru. Meanwhile the "inventor" went from his country home to Tokyo with two alleged scientists, who vouched for the discovery, and demonstrations were given during which by clever consultation, Rikinsonke managed to represent real keroseene as artificial. The manager in Japan for the Standard Oil made a contract with him to purchase the patent rights and the first payment was made. Meanwhile the "inventor" buncoed numerous Japanese and foreign firms into buying shares in the invention and secured many thousands of dollars before his fraud was discovered and he is now under arrest.

Enforcing Legal Option Law

Owen Sound, Ont., May 13.—For violation of the local option law the Pacific hotel was fined \$100; the Central paid \$125, and the Connelly hotel \$100. Other cases are in progress.

HOW ARBOR DAY WAS OBSERVED

Not Much Tree Planting, But the Holiday Was Enjoyed in Other Ways.

There was not much tree planting yesterday in celebration of Arbor day, but the holiday was generally observed and if the people did not go in much for doing the thing for which the date was set apart, they at least had a good dinner. Government and municipal offices were closed all day, and the banks. This was also true of some of the mercantile establishments, particularly the wholesale houses, but the majority kept open until noon. In the afternoon practically no business was transacted.

Nearly everybody in town went to the ball games, or at least it seemed so from the appearance of the grand stand and the bleachers, and those who went in the afternoon had the pleasure of seeing Edmonton walloped by the Calgary boys by a score of six to two.

Automobile parties were much in evidence, not only at the ball game, but all over the city and the suburbs, and although a few real estate men could be seen around outlying subdivisions trying to sell land, the majority seemed to think it proper to give buyers a rest for one day.

The schools were closed all day. The theatres were open and were liberally patronized. In the evening a large throng attended the May Festival given at Sherman's rink under the auspices of the local Sunday schools.

HON. FRANK OLIVER TO VISIT THE WEST

Minister of Interior Will Spend Most of the Summer Travelling in Western Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., May 13.—Hon. Frank Oliver will spend the greater part of the summer in a week or so and will spend the greater part of the summer there. If he can spare the time, he intends making a trip from Edmonton to the Peace river district and down the Mackenzie river, right to the Arctic ocean, and thence overland to Dawson City. From there he will go to Prince Rupert and Vancouver. He will be accompanied from Edmonton by a detachment of Northwest Mounted Police.

OLD TIME RIVALRY WORK TOGETHER TO TRAIN JEFF

Corbett and Choynski in the Same Camp Recall Incidents in the Lives of the Two

San Francisco, May 12.—With Bob Armstrong helping to train Jim Jeffries and with Billy Delaney likely to take charge of the Johnson camp, it was as though the color line is beginning to run, doesn't it? It certainly interferes with the belief that the coming fight is to be a "clash of titans." It looks indeed, as though the clash had occurred already and has left a magic effect upon the opposing ranks.

There is no harm, I suppose, in telling the story in abbreviated form. Jim Corbett and Joe Choynski were twenty-one years ago, and many arguments regarding the way the feud developed, ripened, had its climax and left Corbett master of the field.

Jack Dempsey was Choynski's use ordinary street gloves with the principal second, and it is said that before the spectators were admitted the contest began.

It was largely a Corbett function. Jim, with his left jab and left hooks, had Choynski bleeding profusely early in the encounter, and about the most damaging wallop inflicted by Choynski was a right-hander in the fifteenth round. Corbett suffered from the effect of the blow, but "stalled" for a couple of rounds, and then went back to this task of the blood-letting.

It was claimed that Corbett's right hand gave out again, and that in addition, he injured the knuckles of his left hand. He whispered to Billy Delaney at the close of the sixth round: "My left is gone." Delaney told him to keep the matter to himself and do the best he could. After that, it was said, Corbett was able to infuse very little force into his punches, and that delivering a blow with his left hurt him as much as did the receipt of the punch by Choynski. Jim hit hard enough at that to make the blood flow and Choynski was conquered in the twenty-seventh round.

Corbett and Choynski kept up their coolness for years after the contest, but now it is said they have forgotten all the past bitterness and are friends again. The fight between them was a notable one on account of the way the Corbett and Choynski factions were arrayed against each other, and "the scrap on the barge" will be remembered long after other fights have been forgotten.

Wage-Workers' Symposium

PARAGRAPHS RECORD RELATIVE TO THE TOPICS, PROCEEDINGS, EFFORTS AND LESSONS LEARNED BY THE WORKERS AS THEY PLAY THEIR PART IN THE WORLD'S GREATEST MOVEMENT.

While the "labor market" exists, the term "white slave traffic" will include much more than the prostitution of women.—Wiltshire's.
Just now it is rather a difficult task to convince Milwaukee politicians of the old parties that Socialism is nothing more than a dream.—Wiltshire's.
A number of the building trades unions at Vancouver, Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg and Toronto are still bargaining with the job-owners over what the wage shall be.
"Half a loaf is better than no bread." But the only practical way to get a half loaf is to demand the whole blooming loaf. Ask for half a loaf, and you will be lucky if you get a crumb.—The Call.
Canned goods companies in Canada have formed a merger with a capitalization of ten million dollars. Its avowed object being to limit competition. Sixty factories are involved in the combine.
Vancouver Building Laborers intend going after more money. At present the schedule calls for an eight-hour day at 25 cents per hour. The union is still looking for an international to affiliate with.
After a strike of 48 hours the Bakers' union of Vancouver, B. C., has won for its membership. The union shop, nine-hour day, increase in wages, sanitary workshop and the right to be men!
"Our natural wealth" partakes of the appearance of wealth by virtue of its potentialities for exploitation. It is valued not for what it is, but for what it may become when labor power is applied to it.—Western Canada.
May Day and its significance was universally celebrated throughout Canada as Labor Day by the membership of the Socialist party. In Toronto and Vancouver mass meetings were held in the afternoon and evening.
"Independence must come through political action. Until labor owns its own machinery, until it works for itself, it is dealing only with a miserable makeshift. You must advance on political lines."—Clarence Darrow.
The new Vancouver Teamsters' Union has placed a business agent on the job. In the recent adoption of the card system by the Building Trades Council the teamsters promise to be an important factor in its enforcement.
Of the Socialist movement in Great Britain, J. Keir Hardie says: "Its faults and failures are but a reflex of the faults and failures of the class which has called it into being, and it, like its creators, will grow in wisdom as it gains experience."
There are two hundred and twenty members of parliament elected in the various constituencies of Canada. As yet not one seat is occupied by a representative of the working class. It will not be the case after the next federal election.
The British Labor party has made it impossible for trade union officials or labor leaders to go on the stump on behalf of either Liberal or Conservative candidates or parties. This of itself is a great gain to the working class movement.—J. Keir Hardie.
Burt R. Campbell, Vernon, B. C., a member of the Typographical Union, has been commissioned as a voluntary American Federation of Labor organizer, and will at once take up the formation of a federal union of civic employees in the Okanagan valley capital city.
The first unionized flour mill in Canada is located at Lethbridge, Alta. The Taylor Milling and Elevator Co. Ltd. Every sack of its flour bears the union stamp of the International Union of Flour and Cereal Employees. Did the last sack of flour you bought have the union label on?
The Western Wage-Earner, a 28-page monthly, owned and published by the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, will remain a monthly pending the completion of the new \$50,000 labor temple on a 120,000-acre site. Then the central body executive propose making it a semi-monthly or weekly.
Winnipeg, Canada, has decided to erect a municipal slaughter house with cold storage facilities, for meat. The municipality has also taken steps to secure electric power and will erect an immense plant for its development. The Winnipeg river will be utilized for sixty thousand horsepower will be generated from the current.
The settlement of the Philadelphia strike was on the terms practically dictated by the company. The strike lacked the necessary federation to make it a success. It was the lack of solidarity among the employees of all the industries that forced the striking car men to accept the terms of settlement as presented by the company.
The building, No. 71 Broadway, the home of the U. S. Steel Corporation, within its confines about \$2,000,000 worth of railway and industrial corporations. That is to say: These corporations hold the title deeds to enough jobs to compel enough employes to surrender enough wealth to pay enough interest on a capitalization of \$2,000,000,000.
The much heralded Labor Exchanges recently established in England do not seem to promise much toward the solution of unemployment. Up-to-date there have been 27,000 applications, and less than seven per cent of these have been found employment.

Worker got into a mixup and had to appear before Judge Jeffries. After hearing the evidence and assessing a fine of \$10 for assault the recalcitrant was given \$100 worth of advice. Listen: "If you people would only take the proper action at the ballot box, instead of using violence, your efforts would get you more."
In an official letter to Calgary, Alta. Taxpayers' association last week Commissioner Graves proves that the city can save \$13,000 by laying five miles of sewers and three miles of water mains by day labor, instead of by contract. Tenders for the work were recently called for. By comparing the figures submitted with those representing what it cost the city to do the same kind of work last year, Mr. Graves shows that contract work is not always the cheapest, even supposing it is done as it should be.
In the great strike of the United Mine Workers against the Dominion Coal company in Nova Scotia, the mine-owners have not only secured a blanket injunction against the men, but efforts are being made to import 2,000 strikebreakers from Great Britain. This latest move has been brought to the attention of the British Labor party, and an attempt will be made in parliament to checkmate or at least expose the villainous schemes of the Dominion Coal company, which is said to be controlled by United States capital, notably the Morgan interests.
Says Max S. Hayes: "It is not strange that the great capitalist politicians and editors have become imbued with ill-concealed contempt for the workers. I know a unionist who upon numerous occasions has intimated pretty strongly to some of the plutocrats that labor will soon wake up and sweep them out of power, only to be met with derisive laughter and sniggering sneers and open boasts that capital can bring bulldoze or fatter enough big and little labor leaders to divide the workers, and remain in the saddle until the crack o'doom. It looks that way!"
The International Typographical Union has long argued that its huge defense fund, largely accounted for by its many union agreements. Now comes the Boot and Shoe Workers' International Union, which makes the claim that its system of twenty-five cents per week dues saves it from the fear of strikes, and in such emergency does away with the necessity of calling upon sister crafts for financial aid. The officers further urge that high dues also enable the union to prosecute more successfully its campaign for the union stamp. The boot and shoe workers have \$100,000 in bank.
Amid all this "prosperity" the real wages of the wage workers, measured in the necessities and comforts of life which they will buy as swiftly and steadily declining. The production of gold, in which all prices, including the price of labor power, are measured, has been wonderfully cheapened by new machine processes for extracting gold from ore. With this cheapening of gold, the prices of all the things the laborer must buy have risen by fifty per cent within the last ten years, while his money wages have increased but slightly.—Excerpt from proposed United States platform.
It is none of the worker's business what the railroads charge, and the sooner he finds that out, quits howling under the wrong tree, and moves the rusty contents of his pockets in an effort to find out what is his business, the better for him. His trouble is that he has got to work. That's all. Just got to work. He has got to work for people who own railroads, steamships, mines, mills, everything in sight, in fact. He has got to work for them and he ought to work for nobody but himself, which he has got to do by getting his tribe together and owning those things among themselves.—E. T. Kingsley.
In Regina, Sask., where union officials hold old-party government jobs, the daily press treats the unionists with well-merited contempt. "Here's the way the Labor party treats the strike of the building trades: 'Inquiries only elicited the fact that building contractors were giving the matter little consideration, and some of them seemed inclined to let matters take their course.' Surely to labor Regina wage-workers will soon awaken to their slavish and political folly, and get to line with the international labor movement. The eyes of many Western Canada 'live ones' are watching Regina."
The Independent Labor Party of Great Britain held its annual conference in London, with 350 delegates in attendance. It was voted to call a national convention of all Socialist bodies, and endeavor to establish a straight-out Socialist party. It was pointed out that practically every active Labor party worker in parliament is a Socialist, that the Labor party as such should take firm footing on the International Socialist program, and that those Labor party members who have liberal tendencies should go over to the Liberal party if they preferred to do so. It was agreed that the Labor party could under no circumstances engage in fusion tactics with the Liberals.—Cleveland Citizen.
The "cost of living" is increasing faster than we can expect to keep up to with wage scales. It is education along economic lines we want, not "labor" parties. Such education will soon show us that the only reason why we have got to keep up this continual struggle about wages is because we, as a class, do not own the means of wealth production, and consequently we do not own the products we produce and have no control of the fruits of our labor. It all goes to the capitalists as owners; therefore, if we want to hang on to what we create we must own those things which we use to create the wealth. Then the worker will go the full social product of his labor, and this is what the Socialist party in Canada stand for—no more, no less.—A Vancouver unionist.
Fort William, Ont., Trades and Labor Council at its last meeting unanimously passed the following resolution: "That the secretary be instructed to write the city clerk and the secretary of the board of trade that we go on record as standing out for a clean-cut, municipal owned and operated gas plant." The secretary was also instructed to write the American Federation of Labor that an organizer be placed in the territory. It was decided to levy a tax of 50 cents per month in each local connected with the council to defray the expenses of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada convention, which meets in September at the Twin City. The plans for the erection of a labor temple in Fort William are moving along slowly but surely.
