



The order instances nine specific cases of cruelty. In one of the drills the men were compelled to present arms 500 times. Another case was where a soldier was compelled to raise a can of burning coffee until he betsme so exhausted that he allowed the contents to run over his head and shoulders. Another case was where a sergeant named Polug habitually kicked the men, struck them with his sword, and wantonly streed them with his sword, and wantonly streed them to perform hard tasks. He also tortured them until they screamed with agony. Cases are instanced where men were paraded and drilled, at midnight, in the depth of winter, wearing only their shirts, until they fainted. In addition, many cases of blackmailing are mentioned. The guilty sergeants have been sentenced to imprisen ment from two to five years each. The revelation of these cruelties has caused much indignation among the public. The Yorward sentions some cases where men were kept at knee drill till they had performed the movement nearly 200 times, or until they fainted. In one instance, when a recruit who became bathed in sweat in consequence of the exertion was unable to continue, the sergeant poured cold water over him, then thrashed him until the whip broke. The recruit's legs were covered with welts, and he had to be placed in the hospital, where he lay in a high fever.
