PARLIAMENT PROROGUED.

SPEECH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE

The Civil Service Measures—A Buoyant Revenue-Treaties with France and Spain-Throwing Off the Yoke of Tax-Отгаwa, May 17.—The fourth session of

the fourth parliament of Canada was prorogued this afternoon by the governor general. At 5 o'clock his excellency proceeded in state to the parliament buildings, where, the weather being fine, a large assemblage of people had gathered. A detachment of the Foot Guards formed a military escort, and the usual booming of canon was heard from Nepean point, across the river from the parliament buildings. The

following was the SPEECH OF PROROGATION : House of Commons.

I desire to convey to you my best thanks for the earnestness and assiduity which you have shown in the performance of your parliamentary duties, and I am glad to believe that on returning to your homes you will find the country everywhere en-

believe that on returning to your homes you will find the country everywhere enjoying a large measure of prosperity.

The civil service act will, I trust, be productive of the best results. It will improve the organization and add to the usefulness of that service already so efficient.

The measures relating to the extradition of furgitive offenders, to the winding up of insolvent banks, winding up of insolvent banks, insurance companies and trading corporations, and for amending the criminal law, are all of an important nature. The appropriation in aid of railway enterprise will tend greatly to open up vast tracts of fertile country hitherto almost inaccessible to the settler.

The annual grant for the encouragement of the sea fishermen will be of great value to that important branch of the national industries.

The removal of the duties on tea and coffee will lessen the cost of those important articles of food to the people and the repeal of the stamp tax on bills of exchange and promissory notes will be appreciated by the commercial community as a relief from an irksome burden, while the transmission of newspapers and periodicals free from post. newspapers and periodicals free from postage will be accepted as a boon by the whole

A VISITOR FROM THE SEPARATE BOARD COMPARES

The Examiners and Examinations— Sale of School Property—The Kinder-The public school board met last night in the board room at York and Richmond streets, Chairman Galley presiding. All the

members were present except three. Mr. James Britton of the separate school board attended the meeting to get a few "pointers" on how business was conducted in the public school board and compare it with the proceedings of the separate board. Mr. Britton was asked to occupy a seat beside the chairman and after the meeting was over he expressed to The World his approbation of the smoothness in the business of the meeting as compared to his board.
