REE SUGAR MEANS A DEFICIT

The Senate Takes Up the Sugar Billand Lays It Down Again without Action—The New Tariff and Business.

Washington, Aug. 15.—To-day the House bill to place sugar on the free list was taken up in the Senate from Secretary Carlisle to Senator Harris (Dem., Tenn.), acting chairman of the Finance Committee, giving figures to show that with sugar on the free would be a Treasury deficit of from \$28,000,000 to \$30,000,000. Despite that communication motion was made by Mr. Berry (D., Ark.) that the Senate proceed to the consideration of the bill he referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Harris argued in support of his motion. Speeches were made in favor of the passing and against a reference by Messys. Berry, Yest and Mills. Mr. Vest's speech was made in the execution of his promise to turn the calcium light on the theory of the bill in the Finance Committee, the Democratic caucus and the conference Committee. As usual he was earnest and impassioned, and there was an lack of frankness or plain speaking in his remarks. 





YORK TOWNSHIP AFFAIRS.

eve Humberstone Gives His Opinion of Men and Affairs.

A special meeting of the York Township Council was held yesterday, at which all the members were present.

At the previous meeting a motion was passed instructing the clerk to notify Messrs. Humberstone and MacDonald to appear before the Council and give an explanation regarding the receipt of certain moneys which Special Auditor Neff reported as being illegally received by these gentlemen while members of the Council.

In response to the letter of the clerk, Mr. Humberstone wrote that his usual fee of \$10 per day would be charged while engaged giving instructions to the Council. He also reminded the Council that his time is not public property and his first duty is to attend to his own business.

Mr. MacDonald replied to the effect that he would have much pleasure in informing the Council that he would be on hand, on the understanding that his attendance would be paid for, court allowance, and he hoped that the defamers and blasphemers of March, 1893, would also be on hand.

Mr. Hamberstone on being called upon denied in toto the whole statement of Auditor Neff. He questioned the legal appointment of Mr. Neff, and said that after the Council had adopted the report of the regular auditors, Mr. Neff's report was valueless. He never took a dollar he believed he was not entitled

Mr. Humberstone grew very hot at this stage, and said he thought it dishonorable for a body of men to imagine they could elevate themselves by charging their predecessors with taking money they were not entitled to. He claimed the special report is false from start to finish and a libel. He said, "Mr. Neff, the special auditor, is either an arrant scoundrel or an ignoramus."

The reeve objected to the language of Mr. Humberstone, and said that his language, in Mr. Neff's absence, was nothing less than cowardly.

guage, in Mr. Neff's absence, was nothing less than cowardly.

The ex-Reeve was considerably riled at the retort of the Reeve, and replied that the language of the Reeve in calling him a coward was unbecoming the dignity of a man occupying the position of Reeve of York Township.

Reeve Hill then said that it appeared to him that Mr. Humberstone was more anxious to create a sensation than to explain what he was called on for.

Mr. Humberstone went on to say he d charged for nothing except what his licitor said he was entitled to. He clined to give any further explanation, d concluded by stating that the Councould take whatever steps they saw

in reply said he defied any man to he ever took a cent he was not enhim. He admitted that at the last Jahurary meeting he had rendered a bill for work performed in 1892, and had it not been that he was charged on the public platform with being a thief, the Council of York would never have had to pay a cent for it. He merely did it to show the people he had not charged for all he was entitled to. He did not find fault with the present Council for their action. he was entitled to. He did not find fault with the present Council for their action and said they would not be doing their duty if they believed anyone had taken money illegally, if it was not enquired into. He was glad of this opportunity of explaining his action. He did not want his name tarnished, and if the Council believed he had committed an error the courts were open to them, and they should proceed against him. Mr. MacDonald, in reply to a question from the Reeve, admitted that he had received pay in 1894 for work performed in 1892.


