THE BEAVER LINE GETS IT
THE COUNCIL PASSES THE \$25,000
SUBSIDY.

More Speculation as to Cabinet

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—At today's meeting
of the Council an Order-in-Council
was passed granting a subsidy of \$25,000
to the Beaver Line Steamship Co.
for a fortnightly service between
present winter between St. John
and Liverpool. The contract stipulates
that preference is to be given to all freight
coming from the western provinces
and that the rates shall be as low as
on any port in the United States.
Another condition is that the steamship
shall be able to handle the steaming
of an average 400 head of cattle, or
the equivalent thereof of horses and sheep.
It is understood that none of the other
offers came up to the requirements of
the proposed service. Indeed, the Alton
and Dominion lines did not submit
a tender, confining their representations
to a protest against the proposed
subsidy to the Beaver line. Messrs.
Barnes and Huggill submitted an offer
on behalf of the Dominion line to
furnish a service between St. John
and Liverpool, but they wanted a contract
for five years. As the design of the
Government is to make the service
this winter a test of the possibilities
of the route, it was not thought
advisable to enter into a contract
for such a long term of years. The

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THE SEALING OF RESPONSIBLE NON-SECTARIAN SCHOOLS.

Despatches from Sir Julian Pauncefote
and the Earl of Kimberley
Published in London.

London, Nov. 13.—The correspondence
between Sir Julian Pauncefote,
the British Ambassador at Washington,
and the Government from May 8, 1894,
to August 2, 1895, respecting the claims
of the United States for the seizure of
fisheries, has just been issued. The

resolving the proposed fishery treaty
is mainly formal and without special
interest. It contains Sir Julian's letters
to Lord Kimberley stating the
amount of the claims with interest at
\$700,000, and the compromise at \$250,000,

Winnipeg, Nov. 13.—At the meeting of
the Presbyterian Synod of Manitoba
and the Northwest-day Rev. Dr.
King, Principal of Manitoba College,
gave notice of the following resolutions:
1. This Synod, being opposed on the
one hand to an absolutely secular sys-
tem of public education, and on the
other to the bestowment of public
moneys in support of denominational
or sectarian schools, embarks on this
occasion to express its general approval
of the unsectarian public schools sys-
tem as now in operation in this pro-
vince.
2. The Synod would strongly deprecate
any interference with the exist-
ing system by the Federal Govern-
ment or any legislative action on the
matter of public education in this
province by the Parliament at Ottawa,
and would urge the Government to
these grounds: First, the subject of
education belongs properly to the
Provincial Legislature, and second,
such action, besides probably falling
in the accomplishment of the end
contemplated, is certain to endanger
to an extent not easily calculated the
peaceful relations which should exist
between the different provinces of
Dominion, and third, that it cherishes
the hope that the "Provincial Legisla-
ture when left to deal with the ques-
tion freely and on its own respon-
sibility will endeavor to satisfy all
reasonable demands of any section
of the people.
3. The Synod, while deprecating any
legislative interference on the part
of the Central Government, would re-
joice to see an effort made to settle
the difficulties by a conference between
the authorities of the Dominion and
the provinces, and would not desist
until a solution in large measure sat-
isfactory to the interests of the
Dominion and the provinces had been
reached. It would be glad to see
steps taken to the end that the
Provincial Legislatures should be
enabled to secure for their subjects
the best possible system of public
schools as might be found consistent
with the maintenance of the general
system and with the great im-
portance to the community, of the
moral and religious character of the
teacher, the Synod would urge the
members of this Church to have
constant and large regard to the
character in the appointment of teach-
ers.

CORNELL VS. CITY OF TORONTO.
 The City's Appeal Being Heard at Osgoode Hall—A Mixed and Interesting Mortgage Suit.
 Osgoode Hall, Nov. 13, 1895.
 Mitchell v. Mitchell occupied nearly all day at the non-jury sittings yesterday as an action to restrain the infringement of a patent for using transparent celluloid over colored fabric in the manufacture of collars, cuffs and shirts. The learned Chief Justice dismissed the action with costs, with leave to plaintiff to mention to Divisional Court upon appeal that he desired them to dispose of the question of costs. BURNS V. KENNEDY. An action against a married woman on a promissory note was then taken up and not concluded when court rose. Wallace Nesbitt and R. McKay, plaintiffs; D. Macdonald for defendant.
Chief Justice Meredith has given judgment in Harrison v. Jackson, a case of interest to inventors. The plaintiff invented a machine for pointing butcher skewers and sought to restrain the defendant from manufacturing, vending or using such machines. The learned Chief Justice held that an inventor has no cause of action in such a case until he obtains a patent, unless there is a user by some one in breach of a contract or trust regarding the invention, which there was not in this case. N. W. W. for plaintiff. J. G. Ridditt for defendant. Interim injunction dissolved and motion to continue dismissed without costs.

Manley v. London Loan Company. heard before the Court of Appeal, in a case of interest to mortgagees and mortgagors. The facts appear to be as follows: David Martin, being the mortgagor, mortgaged to the London Loan Company in 1879 to the Bristol and West of England, etc., Co., the principal of which was registered before the court. In 1881 Martin made another mortgage to the English Loan Company on what he had in the instalment plan, repayable in 20 yearly payments of \$144. In 1881 he mortgaged a third mortgage to one Reynolds, who assigned to Pollard and Johnston. The third mortgage was made in rear, Pollard and Johnston sold under the power of sale contained in it to the plaintiff. The English Loan Company went into liquidation, and their office was sold and assigned at its face value to the defendant. The plaintiff now brings an action for redemption and claims that the defendant is not entitled to require him to pay the amount of the face value of the mortgage, but only the amount actually due under it, because the company did not advance the amount stated, but only sufficient to pay the interest on the mortgage from the time to time, as the latter received it according to the terms of the security. The defendant, however, claims that the mortgage was not assumed by the English Loan Company of the Bristol Company, but that the latter was a mere agent for the plaintiff to indemnify him against it, and points to a clause in the mortgage, that in the event of the company's failure, the mortgage should be assigned to the plaintiff.
