(3) No applicant in the Extra Hazardous Class can be initiated, after passing his fifth birthday.

(4) An applicant in the Ordinary or Hazardous Class who has passed his fifty-fifth birthday, may be admitted to Beneficiary membership as provided in the one hundred and twenty-sixth sub-section six.

Sick and Funeral Benefits.

The Sick and Funeral Benefits as already stated, are optional, and are \$5 per week during 12 weeks of any one illness and \$50 on death towards funeral expenses.

The rates for the Sick and Funeral Benefits are, besides an Enrolment Fee of \$1, which is paid but once, as follows:

State when the order was given, how many were ordered, and how much was paid therefor, and to whom the order was sent.

3. If any Court instituted since 1st September last has not had the new Constitutions delivered to them, please write to the Supreme Chief Ranger, and give name and number of Court and number of Charter Members.

4. Some Financial Secretaries still send Orders or Drafts payable to John A. McGillivray. One or two send them made payable to Bank of Toronto. Please make all Drafts, P. O. Orders and Express Orders made payable to THE MOLSONS BANK, TO-

RONTO. The words "The Manager of" may be left out.

5. One or two Financial Secretaries still make their Drafts payable to the order of Brother E. S. Cummer. If this is again repeated in any case, we will invite the Court to hang the Financial Secretary to the nearest post, and we will pay the Endowment with the utmost satisfaction, and regard the Order as a great gainer thereby.

6. If any member who is entitled to have it has not a policy or certificate of membership, write to the Supreme Chief Ranger, and state all the facts. If you have not sent previously an application for membership, be sure and do so.

PROCLAMATION

IN THE NAME OF

Liberty, Benevolence and Concord.

To all our loving Brethren, Greeting:

By the Providence of God the works of our hands during the past year in connection with our beloved Order have been prospered, as in the past, beyond all expectations.

Last year when inviting you to assemble together in some place of worship and devoutly return thanks for the manifold blessings we had, as an Order, received at the hands of a kind Providence, I said:

"We have been so favored of Providence as an Order that though we are not yet eight years old, our membership has already risen to nearly 14,000. We have during that period carried consolation to many a heart-broken widow and sorrowing orphans, and have afforded hope and administered relief to thousands of our brethren, and though we have disbursed in the payment of the various benefits of the Order over a quarter of a million of dollars, yet there remains in our treasury the magnificent sum of over \$140,000. To-day with our membership growing at the rate of about 500 per month, and our surplus funds being augmented month by month, there seems no limit to the possibilities for good which may be done to our fellowman through the instrumentality of our Independent Order of Foresters.

Since that time, notwithstanding the fact that we have now paid the widows and orphans and the sick and distressed of our Forestric household the munificent sum of \$455,136.95, our surplus has grown from \$140,000.00 in June of last year to \$198,626.48, and our membership which stood at 13,415 a year ago has increased to

19,898 at the present time. When we bring to our minds the fact that in some of our sister societies two and three extra assessments have been made to meet the extra losses caused by the epidemic which prevailed during the past winter, while we have been able to pay all our death losses from our ordinary monthly income, with the exception of the month of March, when our losses and current expenses exceeded our monthly income by \$1,266.13, and in April when we paid \$4,806.34 in death losses and current expenses more than our monthly income, in the Endowment Department we have reason indeed to be thankful for having been so wonderfully spared by a most merciful Providence. But when we remember further that during the month of May just past, we had only five deaths in the Order, calling for \$5,000, while our ordinary income in the Endowment Department during that month amounted to the sum of \$18,545.90, thus giving us a surplus for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of \$13,545.90 for that month alone, we ought with one accord to return thanks to our Heavenly Father for the manifold mercies vouchsafed to us as Foresters. And for that purpose I do hereby appoint Sunday, the 22nd day of June, 1890, as a special day of prayer and praise to God, the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, and I earnestly enjoin upon all our brethren to assemble together upon that day in some place of worship and devoutly offer thanks and ascribe praise to God from whom all blessings flow, and humbly to pray that our officers may be ever guided by Divine Providence, so that they may administer the laws of our beloved Order with wisdom and discretion to the end that the works of our hands may continue to redound to the glory of our Father in Heaven and the good of our fellowmen.

Official Circular, High Court of California.

RIVERSIDE, CALIFORNIA, 1st May, 1890.

To all Subordinate Courts:

At the institution of the High Court of California, Independent Order of Foresters, I had the honor of being appointed High Chief Ranger for the coming year

I therefore address this circular letter to each Chief Ranger of the various Subordinate Courts of this Jurisdiction, asking you to cause it to be read in your own Court.

Until the organization of the High Court of California, and the arrival of Brother Oronhyatekha, Supreme Chief Ranger, it was impossible for that perfect organization (which is absolutely needed), to be properly effected. The need of a proper authority near at hand, to whom questions could be referred, was very much felt, and a great many of the Courts were apparently working in the dark.

Proper organization having now been effected, the High Chief Ranger, and the High Standing Committee will be glad to assist any Court in any way whatsoever, either by personal visit, (especially if there are matters which the Court is not clear upon), or by correspondence. To this end and for the proper working of our Order, we invite correspondence upon any point which may require light thrown upon it.

I would especially urge the various Courts to be prompt in all departments of their work, especially in remitting to the proper persons the dues and assessments.

It is only by promptness and strict attention to the Constitution and By-Laws, that we shall, as an Order, achieve that success which we are all striving after in this jurisdiction.

The Independent Order of Foresters is essentially a poor man's Order, although we do not exclude the rich. It is one of the best fraternal societies in the world, and one which appeals to all that is manly and noble in man's nature. Many a widow, who otherwise would have been left in abject want and penury, has arisen to call the Order blessed. To my personal knowledge, the small monthly assessments, are as nothing to the majority of Foresters, compared to the security they feel that their loved ones at home, will, by their forethought, be placed beyond poverty. No true man should neglect making provision for his family in case of death; hence each brother can not only be doing good for the Order, but also for humanity.

The Order is destined to grow. Official Circular, High Court of Michigan.

LANSING, MICHIGAN, 4th June, 1890.

To all the Subordinate Courts of Michigan,
I. O. F.:

BRETHREN,—Owing to changes in the new Constitution, regarding election of representatives to the High Court, and to the fact that we wanted, at least, the 2,500 members promised at the last High Court meeting, for this coming one, the High Standing Committee have fixed the time for holding the Third Annual Meeting of the High Court of Michigan, at Port Huron, on Thursday, 14th August, next, at 2 o'clock p.m., sharp. The headquarters of the High Standing Committee will be at the Huron House. The Committee on Credentials will meet at 11 o'clock a.m., 14th August, at which time every credential must be in.

Blank forms will be sent to every Court on or before 1st July, next, to be filled out immediately after election, with the name and address of each representative and alternate, and then signed by the Chief Ranger and Recording Secretary, the seal of the Court placed upon it, and returned to the High Secretary. By doing this, much delay and annoyance is avoided. At the same time

the Semi-Annual return and High Court Dues must be sent.

The Honorary Degree of the High Court will be conferred on all members of the Order, in good standing, who attend this meeting, which will entitle them to a seat in the High Court during the deliberations of that body. Friday there will be an excursion on the river, and other festivities, and the High Court of Ontario is expected to visit our High Court in a body, and we hope delegations from other High Courts will also be in attendance.

It is therefore suggested that you organize an excursion to Port Huron, and come in a body. Act upon this matter at once, and notify the High Secretary, so that he can know how many to expect and get rates on the railways accordingly. If enough go, one fare for the round trip can be obtained, and you will receive due notice of the rate and how to obtain it.

The beautiful silk banner offered by the High Standing Committee as a prize will be presented, at this meeting, to the Court entitled to same.

We also expect several Encampments of Uniformed Royal Foresters to be present Friday, and altogether this promises to be a meeting long to be remembered in the annals of Michigan Forestry.

We have made wonderful strides this year so far. Our membership has increased from 1,250, to over 2,300, and now every Forester in Michigan is expected to put his shoulder to the wheel and boost the membership to over 2,500 before 1st July, next. We must not break the record, boys. Every year, so far, we have doubled our membership, and we must do it this year.

The eyes of the High Court officers will be on every Court from now out, to see how well they perform their duty in this important matter.

If every Court in Michigan will bring in only THREE new members, the feat will be accomplished, and everybody happy.

You can do it! You know you can! The question is, WILL YOU?

The appeal is to YOU; to every member who hears it read; and to every Court who receives it. It is no perfunctory thing, but means business. Every Court is expected at this juncture to do its duty.

From time to time we have endeavored to point out some of the causes, and if the membership generally, and Financial Secretaries in particular, would take notice of same, a vast amount of unnecessary labor would be saved.

Here is one instance:

Upon inquiry we find that the brother withdrew from Court Victoria three months ago, and was promptly cut off from that list. As he did not advise us of the Court he joined after leaving Court Victoria, we could not send him THE FORESTER. All we can now do is to send the back numbers and write the brother to give us the name and number of his Court, so that his name can be placed on the proper list. *If his name had been reported by the Financial Secretary of the Court in which he deposited his card, or if he had notified us himself at the time, he would have had no cause to complain.*

Another one just to hand is a fair sample of a number which have been straightened out after considerable correspondence:

Multiply the above nearly 600, the number

of our Courts, and you will have some idea of the amount of trouble and annoyance that is caused by disregarding our simple instructions.

We also receive a large number of notices from Postmasters in regard to non-delivery of papers, the principal cause being the removal of the members to whom the paper is addressed. About 15 papers were returned to us from the City of Toronto last month from this cause alone. We cannot possibly rectify these errors unless the Financial Secretaries will do their duty. In future all such names will be taken off until the correct addresses are furnished.

In the April number we made a pathetic appeal to Financial Secretaries in this respect, which produced good results, but there are scores of Courts to which it still applies, and we would be pleased if they will give their attention to the matter, and

1. Give us promptly the name and P. O. address of every one who joins the Court.

2. Give us the names of all those who have left the Court.

3. If you remove from one place to another write and tell us your former address, your present address, and the Court of which you are a member.

New Constitutions.

The first American Edition of the New Constitutions, after about nine months' of worry and hard work, is at last out and being distributed by Brother Harper, of Cleveland. We note one or two errors have again passed unnoticed. One being on page 161, Section 237, Subsection (2), for "fifty years of age" read "fifty-five years of age." The other error will be found on page 105, Section 141, Subsection (4). This should have been harmonized with the Supreme Court Law as found in Section 14, Subsection (2). The changes required are to make the first line of said Subsection (4) read as follows: "A bonded officer may be installed but he cannot enter upon the duties of his office, &c."

To all Subordinate Courts :

BRETHREN,—We are about closing another prosperous Forestric year, with a membership that will be considerably in excess of 20,000, while our surplus will without doubt exceed \$200,000, notwithstanding the epidemic through which we have recently passed.

The Executive Council are desirous of beginning the second year of the term by an advance all along the lines. Accordingly a dispensation is hereby granted to all Courts, desirous of availing themselves thereof, to initiate at Charter rates during the months of July and August.

The Executive Council will present a set of officers' badges to each Court which will increase its membership by twenty, by initiations or re-instatements, between the 30th June, and the 1st September, next. If any Court secures a prize and has already a set of officers' badges, it can have instead 15 members badges, or an equivalent in sashes.

To the Court that secures the largest number of members the Executive will give a set of new officers' sashes.

This is to intimate that the thirteenth Annual Session of the High Court of Ontario, Independent Order of Foresters, will be held (D.V.) in the City of Guelph, on Tuesday, the 12th of August, 1890, commencing at 10 a.m.

Every Court of fifty members or under in good standing is entitled to two representatives, and one additional representative for every twenty-five members or fractional part thereof above fifty.

The credentials of representatives must be forwarded to the High Secretary, Brother J. B. Halkett, 347 McLaren Street, Ottawa,

not later than the 5th day of August, 1890, duly signed by the Chief Ranger and Recording Secretary of each Court, and having the seal of the Court attached. A full attendance of representatives is hoped and expected.

It is a matter for congratulation that many Courts in arrears last August have since then paid their indebtedness, but we regret a few have failed to respond to the frequent and urgent appeals made from time to time. This being of the utmost importance, we desire to impress upon delinquent Courts the necessity of at once balancing their accounts with the High Court, so the franchise of their representative may not be endangered.

Arrangements will be made with the principal Railway Companies for carrying delegates at reduced fares. To enable a representative to travel at the reduced rate, he must present one of the enclosed certificates to the agent at the station where he purchases his ticket, buy a single ticket and have certificate signed by the agent before starting. Prior to leaving the High Court, the High Secretary will sign the certificate as proof of attendance, and on presenting the certificate so signed to the railway agent at Guelph, a return ticket will be given at a one-third fare.

A reduction in the usual hotel rates will be obtained.

The headquarters of the High Standing Committee will be the Royal Hotel.

Letter from the Supreme Treasurer.

The following letter from the Supreme Treasurer explains itself:

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL,
TORONTO, 23rd May, 1890.

To the Editor of the *Monetary Times*, Toronto, Ont.:

SIR,—My attention has been called to a letter in your journal referring to the payments made to our Supreme Chief Ranger during the month of March, and published in THE INDEPENDENT FORESTER of April.

I trust you will permit me to make the following explanations: We pay the salaries of our chief officers monthly, while other employes are paid weekly. The Supreme Chief Ranger did not draw his salary for February until March; the second cheque includes his regular monthly salary for the month of March and his quarter allowance as editor of the official organ of the Order; the third salary cheque for \$401.01 was the balance of salary due him ever since last year, but which the Supreme Chief Ranger had allowed to remain in our treasury till March of this year.

During the time that this sum has remained in our treasury the Order has had the advantage of the interest thereon. The three cheques, though issued in the month of March, were in payment for nearly four months' services of our Supreme Chief Ranger, and a portion of which, as already pointed out, was due months ago.

With regard to the cheque for \$300, in payment of the expenses of our Supreme Chief Ranger to California and elsewhere on the Pacific Coast, I might observe that already we have received nearly twice that sum as the direct result of the work done by our Supreme Chief Ranger on the Pacific Coast, with the prospect of our realizing a much larger sum in the near future from such work. Looking at it, therefore, from merely a monetary point of view, the visit of the Supreme Chief Ranger to the Coast has been of great advantage and profit to our Order, and has helped to swell our already large surplus.

Immediately after the installation of the officers at nine p. m., the High Court took a recess in order to attend the reception at the Opera House, an account of which we take from one of the Grand Forks dailies, as follows:

THE RECEPTION.

The opera house was filled with an interested audience, including a large number of ladies. Chief Ranger Carothers, of the Grand Forks Court, presided in his usual happy manner.

The first number on the programme was a piano solo rendered by Miss Hattie Woodworth, who delighted everybody by her magical handling of the keys.

City Attorney O'Keefe welcomed the High Court in behalf of the city, and extended the freedom of the city to the Supreme Chief Ranger in a brief but eloquent address.

The response by High Chief Ranger Twamley, of Minto, was also brief, but interesting and embellished with numerous happy hits in Mr. Twamley's peculiarly happy and interesting style.

The ladies' quartette, consisting of Mrs. Geo. Bliss, Miss Amundson and the Misses Elder, sang one of their sweetest selections, which was received with the greatest enthusiasm, and an *encore* was insisted upon.

Hon. Senator Montgomery, of Ardoch, welcomed the Supreme Chief Ranger in a very brief address. He said he was a classmate of the doctor in Toronto University. He alluded in an interesting manner to several incidents of their school life.

Dr. Oronhyatekha responded and addressed the audience at some length. He said never in the entire extent of his work had he been more highly honored than here in Grand Forks, and he was overwhelmed with the honors conferred upon him. He discussed in an interesting manner the objects of the Order. One of the features which distinguished this from other Orders is the fact that medical attendance is furnished free to members of the Order. Another

feature was sick benefits. Members are entitled to \$5 per week for twelve weeks. The principal attraction of the Order is the insurance system. Members are entitled to \$1,000, \$2,000 or \$3,000. Provision is made whereby at 70 years of payments cease and the member receives one-tenth of the amount of the insurance. In case of total and permanent disability the member ceases payment and receives a portion of his insurance. There is also a funeral benefit of \$50. The speaker gave many pleasing illustrations and his address throughout was greatly enjoyed.

Miss Clara Robinson gave a humorous recitation entitled "The Jiners," which nearly unsettled the Foresters for further business. She received a most enthusiastic encore and recited "The Masons." Another song by the ladies' quartette closed the programme.

The Foresters returned to the Lodge room after the reception and finished the business of the High Court.

About 11 p. m. the High Court was again called to order by the Supreme Chief Ranger, and the election of the representatives to the next meeting of the Supreme Court to be held in Detroit, Mich., in 1891, was proceeded with and the following, after a ballot, were declared duly elected:

After the adjournment of the Encampment the Supreme Chief Ranger met with the High Standing Committee and arranged details for a vigorous campaign in the State. At about 3.30 a. m. final adjournment was had of a most pleasant and among the most successful of the series of meetings held by the Supreme Chief Ranger.

The Supreme Chief Ranger, after an hour's rest, took train for the South.

Electrical Structures and Machinery of Various Kinds.

There is a notable tendency in industrial enterprises in recent times not only to concentrate capital into large concerns, but to have structures and machinery of the largest possible kind, and to drive it with extreme rapidity. This is pre-eminently the day of big things, using the word in its ordinary sense to mean large, massive, heavy, and bulky. Ocean steamships are growing larger and more powerful. Locomotives, cars, railway tracks, bridges, are all made heavier. Blast furnaces have increased in size, and their output has increased enormously, so that a product of 300 tons a day is no more uncommon than one of 300 tons a week was twenty years ago. A Bessemer steel works has recently made the record of 30,000 tons of steel in one month. Open hearth furnaces are now erected with a capacity of 30 tons, or three times the capacity of those of ten years ago. In rolling mills the same progress has been shown. A plate was rolled in Pittsburgh 30 inches wide by 85 feet long, $\frac{7}{8}$ inch thick, weighing 7,480 pounds.

In steam and electric engineering the same tendency is seen. At the Homestead Steel Works, Pittsburgh, there is about to be placed one of the largest Corliss engines in the world, with a horizontal cylinder 54 by 72 inches. The fly-wheel will weigh 200,000 pounds. The whole weight of the engine will be over 500,000 pounds, and it is expected to develop 3,500 horse power. The Corliss engine, the largest in the world, was built at the Soho Iron Works, Bolton, England. It is of 5,000 horse power, of the vertical type, and stands 48 feet high. It is designed to drive the Farranti dynamos, 45 feet in diameter, mentioned below. The West End electric railway station in Boston is to have thirteen engines of 1,000 horse power each. They are to be triple compound, with cylinders 21, 36, and 52 inches in diameter. The power is transmitted by

two belts for each engine, each belt five feet wide. Steam will be furnished by twenty-four water-tube boilers, each rated at 500 horse power. The new cable railway station of the West Side Cable Railway, in Chicago, has two Greene engines, each 36 inches by 72 inches; each engine weighs 238,000 pounds, and has a capacity of 1,200 horse power. We recently described the large Belpaire boilers and Leavitt hoisting engines at the Calumet and Hecla mine, and now we have a description of a new water-tube boiler designed by T. F. Morrin, of Jersey City, which is located at the Westinghouse electric light station in twenty-fourth street, New York City. It contains 600 3-inch water tubes of a peculiar bent shape, expanded at each end into an internal cylinder 48 inches in diameter. The aggregate length of the tubes is 7,200 feet, or about a mile and a half, and the boiler has 6,000 feet of heating surface, and is said to be capable of developing 1,000 horse power.

In foreign countries the same tendency to ward bigness is shown, and in electrical engineering they have even surpassed us. The Farranti dynamos used in the Deptford lighting stations near London weigh 500 tons each, stand 45 feet high, run at 60 revolutions per minute, and can each supply about 200,000 incandescent lights.

Two dynamos of 10,000 lamp capacity are being made for Berlin, each of which will require about 1,000 horse power.

There are no data now existing which will enable any one to predict what will be the size of boilers, engines, dynamos, steamships, bridges, cars, locomotives, office buildings, and other structures ten years hence. Everything in the engineering line seems to be changing at a more rapid rate than at any previous period. Certainly the limit to increase of size does not yet appear. When the single engine reached its limit in ship-building, the compound engine came in. When shafts and screws seemed to have grown as large as they could be made, twin screws and shafts were used, and at the same time facilities for making still larger shafts and screws were perfected. So it is in every branch of engineering as soon as a limit is fixed some one finds a way of overleaping it, and the limit is placed further ahead.—*Engineering Journal*.

"Then he offered his arm again to his wife, and took her to her seat without saying a word to us, because we had not been presented.—*Ledger*.

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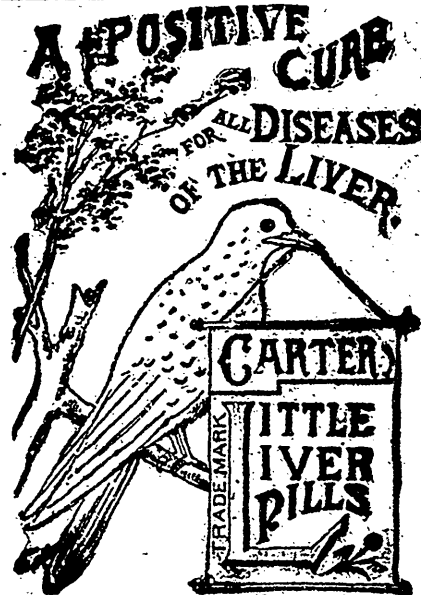
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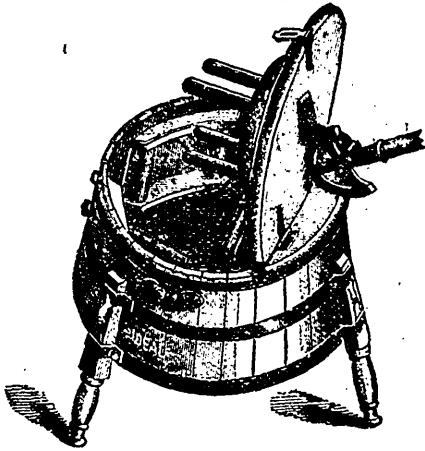
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
