House nest meets. The Binl deals with the taxation of personal property in municipalities governed by the municlpal code, as we find it in the Revised siatutes.
From our standpoint it is a wise measure, for lt may help to ameliorato 1he conditions affecting us at present, als residents of the leading city of the frovince, and, because commercial, made the Durden-bearers of frequent emwrent taxation inflicted to restore coin to a depleted Treasury. Mitherto, our prosperous country merchants and farmers have been free agents after sending their candidate to the degislature; one, it may be, whose reckless votes have increased the extravagent expenditures of the Provinee, while we in the elty have had to make these expenditures good.
Mr. Mackett sees the unfininess of luis, and with commendialle brondmindedness would add certain clauses 10 the eode so that well-to-do resinlents ill :municipallites not governed by speeiai charters, as we, and others, are, will no longer escape their share of taxalion, but whether country merchants or filmers winl be asked to contribute that share out of every asset beyond theome derivable from land or other real property. There will be an assessment, at actual values, of their investments in stocks in Wanking and other inmacial corporations, their mortgages, promblabory notes, and sundry cash assets. Thus they will have a new interest in the welfare of the Province.
There is nothing like thrusting responsibility upon men to make them conservative and cautious. Freedom from faxation has made the country electors heedess of their responsibilities. These ceased to exist in their minds when Whey registered their votes at the poll. But they should extend to the vilme when the balauce sheet of the Province is struck, so that in case of need they.
may be pade to respond, as city men linve to do, to any defiefency of revenue.
The Hackett Bhl may cause country clectors to realize the full responshili. ty of thela votes.
It is not lor us in the city to interferc.

## THI MONETARY SITUATION.

Advicos by man to hand, dated London, the 23rd September, are, as mighit have bomen expected, chiefly occupled Withe tho tumble in the Bank of Eng. land rate, It was an utter anomaly for the bank to try to maintain the 5 per cent, when dificounts were freely accepted jut the open marlict at about half that rate, but yo sooner had the Bank of Eugiand lowered its figure; than the rates in the open market im* mediately lell further, making matters worse than they were before; hence another rellaction to $3 / 2$ per cent became inevitable. The open market, however, had dropecit to about 2 per cent, leaving, as the financial papers term . Lt, "the balle still high and dry." It is Dut rarelf such a sudden dip in the rate has takel place.
The impression at the centres of monetary and buginess affoirs is that although thade is very bad, it is tikely to continuefo for some time to come, and that the vaiue of money will besteady at its present value. The fear that exJsted of a general crash in the U.IS. hass nearla all passed away. The gold phipments have ceased, and the supphics artanged for some weeks ago, when the demand was so urgent, have not ceascal to pour in and to affect the market.

The Feneh Goverument, which is about to madertake the converstion of the $4 \nmid 2$ per cents is iikely to do every. thing in atts power, through the Bank of Franee, to keep the whole of the money milalkets casy. We have referred elsewhere to the Sherman Wh, and the
probable attitude of the Senate in respect of it. The European, finauclan journais are hazarding opinions as to the probable effect, in case the U S. Senate shond repeal the abyoxious act. It is within the bounds of possibintity that some scrious fallures may follow, aiter such a crash as that withessed ditely, and significant warnings and indications are not wanting in the faidures of such concerns as the Equittable Mortgage Company and others. There must be more or vess lengily liquidation of business restinting from these trowbles. The U.S. 'Ireasury is about 7 per cont. below ftes 400 minlions limit, although it is the kecper of the wimate banking roserve of the whole country, and in ordinary Zimes heretofore, has deemed prudent to keep a very Jarge amount of gold in its vaults. "Is it not posshile," says one of the London pupers, "that President Cleveland may be only wating for the repend of the Sherman Act to borrow gold?" It were well that people should wear this possible contingency in mind-to tike precautions lest danger should arise.
The ...Senate's detay, according to Olews of New York, has haxd a disiastrus effect in monetary centres in the U. fi. "Lt has nipped in the bud revived confidence and put a fresh check upon a rencwal of operations." That the relapse has not ween more sevcre is taken as an evidence of hope that the Senate may finally adopt the Repeal 13111:
"There are two points of view from which the alsappointing attitude of the Senate may to considered. There is that of the ordinary, observer, who understands littie about the . methode and tricks of parlimentary warfare, or the complications of party interests and of legislative policies. Tyese people are led loy the external appearances of the moment and eashy mistalse weals
parliamentry feints for real streugbl, and they are consequently decply bupressed by the durige hostinty of the minority in the sunate. Let it is this very ehass that maln! make the body of stantipent we call public upiulom. It is therefore not surprising that the at. tibude of the brained porbicul warriors, known as "Lhe sillyer leadere," showid have created some dismay and much dis. appointment among preponderant purt oi the puivite. And it is neat to be supposed that the opparelous of his ciass are unimportant de callse they are bused upon haperied observation; for ophifus influence ation in practient afiaits, and in this case they carry a chinl of apprehemsion Horough every branch of business."
"'ine uther polat of view is that oce Gupied by men converstan with the ins-and-outs of politics; familiar with the tricks, the timitations and the lieunses - of dubate; versed in the mysterfes of log-rolling; had acquainted with the party jealotasies and lite conflicting policias invoived in the present political situations. To these ubservers, there is nothing in the present attitude of the Sumate that is really fincousistent with a confident expectation that the upper house will riauly adupt anconditional repeal. They cammol contede the posbilility that the United states Senate widf finally dace to carry affront to tate almost unipersal publice will to the exzent of atsolute disobsdiente. They bnow thate, white it may de good parHamentry tactics to give the minorily irope enough to haug themselves, yeto the majorlty is made up oi men who ate conscions of theis power and will fain to use it to a purpose when a ripo opporimuty ocents. They understand how it mity be prodent to give watelt minority semator a chanee to set himself right with his constitutents or on His record; dut they know that to the party now in power suceebs in their issue is a matere of llie or death, and that, having prudently done all they can to aroid offences to their op. ponents, they wial then unite with the lephubltean repeaters in earying the measure by a majority that whar sur prise the country by its magnitude.
. . . . . . . . "The steady recircment of Olewing House Certifleates is another fropefin symptom. Until recenty, there had ween a marked dilsposition among the wanks to eling to fhat sumport untio all donbt was removed as to the metion of the seunte. Out of the total lastue of $\$ 38,000,000$
however ouly $\$ 26,000,000$ is now stand-!ng-which is a signifficant expression of the estimate of the dayks on the prospect. To the same effect is the fact that banks are lending and diseounting much more frecly, and without discrimInation as to loug loans."

Ltaly also is Ikely to we a factorin .the demand for gold. The state of the currency in that country is most deplorable, and has a demoralizing cifect upon busincess. People who go shopping in any of the Italians towns and tender "paper money," fludit impossible to get chauge, execpt in the muitiple notes of the same character. Shop-kecpers profer maklige a purchaser a present of smanl articles rather than change a juire note. The latest advices from Australia say, that negrotiafious are going on among some of the reorganized Hanlis for amwlgamation.' That countiry is over-furuished with Danks, and a severe competition botween them deads to wad business. Were the number reduced by one hall there would be great savings in stalfs and pranches, and other medmmy of expenses, besides having the more import. ant cffect of dessening the compets. tion all round.
In Canada wo are so inhluenced by the foreign mariets, that there is littie chauge to note and thatlitule dsice Nected in the mon'thly statements of Wanks, eurcady reviewed. An active stock-list must follow the action of the U. S. Scnate.

## BANK CLBALINGS.

It is a matter for congratulation, that aloug with an improved credit abroad due to the stability of our banking system, and to the statesmandike quarties of our Govermment Leaders as displayed betore a recent tribunal in a question of supreme magultude, the total volume of trade transacted in the Domiaion for the nine months of 1893 stinl shows an advance over the corres. ponding period of 1802 as we may pbserve by the Olearing House ReturnsMontreal to date slows $\$ 7,600,000$, of an increase and the other Oleariar Houses at Toronto, Hambion and Halifax also maintain an advance.

As regateds the United states the issue of Olearing House certificates durnig the recont emorgencies to settio daily Wewneas aworked well locally as an expedent. But the slow adjustinent of the Silver difficulty und the payment of the forty-five millions of grold borrowed abroad during the summer betore that adjustment has been complete, may
agala compei a resort to these certifi. cates which whi be a regretabion an ternative. Already they have had a slguificance in Europe calculated to inin. pair rather than strengthen Americay creditas tiney have been understood to Hullate in questlonable solvency. There Jas been a closer study abroad of the cash and cash assets of yoth National banks and Private bunkers with tho same result as in England aiter tha, Baring fuilure direded attention to simhar holdings there namely that they have not been a sufficient reserve against liabilities to the publle.

## REDATE IN PATENT MEDICLNES.

The anumal mecting of the Natlonal Wholesule Drugylsts' Association, to do deld in Detroit this month, has agah for its chief topic of discussion the 1 is bate plian in the supply of proprietary artieles,-or rather what would we the effect of au mbandoument of the system. It is claimed dy the "Drus Reporter" that it would result disastrously to the wholosale trand all round, as 50 to 60 per cent of their sules comprises this cluss of goods. "On this proportion under the rebate pifan, the dealer makes it gross proitt of 10 per cent. As the cost of doing dusiness is approximately ten por cent. this leaves very litule as net curnings on fully one hall of the value of the goods handed, and this part of the dusizess, even with the ten per cent. assured, is not regarded as satisfactory. Should this assurance we removed through the abondonment of the rebate pian, the wholesale druggivists contend, the trade would very soon drift hack to the old order of things in vogue before that plan has adopted, and the trade knows full well how unsatisfactory and unproiltable at that time was the handling of "patents." Under the previous conditions this class of goods was sold on a mar, gin of from two and one-half to five per cent. gross profit, and therefore on fully onc-hatif of the sales there was an actual loss of from five to seven and one-half per cont. (assuming the cost of cont: racting business to be ten per cent), which would have to be made up by the proflt on the other half of the sales and whieh, it is contended, would pre: duce the net proflts on the total busi. ness to such a small figure that few would eare to continue in the busi. ness.
Another effect of the abandonment of the rebate plan would undouivtedly be that on finding the handing bof this.
class of goods unprofltable the influenthal jobbing houses would turn their atiention ln the direction of selling prepurations of their own to take the places of the popular advertised remed. ins. In thls they believe they would be asslated by the retain druggists as the goods could be kept out of the hands of department stores and notorious cutters. Not only would the wholesaler thus become a competitor of the manufacturer, wut instead of, as heretofore, givius his active co-operation in defeating legislation which threatens proprictary interests, he would find it to lis advautage to ignore the same.
The effect of a return to the old order of doing business, it is claimed by those who have stualed the subject thoroughly, would prove espectally disustrous and would doubtless be the means of driving many out of thobusiness. It is asserted tilat as soon as the rebate plan went into effect it placed the swall town with a small jowner on identically the same plaue as the large jobler; and the result was that the proprictary medicine business became localized, and small jobbing houses were established all over the country. Their business, so vargely comprising proprictary goods on which they make a gross profit of ten per cent. under the rebate plan, would be ruined, as few could stand the strain of conducting fully one half-of their dusiness on a margin of ouly two and a hall per cent. gross proilt. The sinaller jobbers woudd have to go to the wall and we would see a fresh exemplification :of the daw of "the survival of the fittest."
It has been asserted by somp who do not indorse the rebate pian mat it would de an easy matter to raipe the prices on drugs in order to make good the losses on proprietary goods. This is shown to be impossible by some of the larger houses, as competition on all classes of goods is too keen to admitt of more than a fair return ta the way of proflt. Many of the artieles composing the stock carried by the wholesale druggist may we elassed as staples and the margin on these is already reduced to a point whick leaves little, and in some cases no proftr. The number of suell articies is constantly growing, and for the very reason that there is no "rebate plan" to apply to these, cemspetition for trade tonding to continually pure the prices."
Any discussion of the subfect were incomplete that did not take into consideration the great cost of advertising,
indlspensable to popular: bellef in the artieles, an expense which is doubtless amply capitalized in the conduct of the business. A correspondent once asked if we believed the medical fraternity were in league with their great and successind rivals, as the former iguored wil advertising except that gratultously given them by their female patients. It was quite beyond us.

THE NLNANCLAL OUNLOOK.
Too much relianes is not to be placed upon the generul expectation that the U. S. Senate will repeal the Sherman (sillver) Act-following the example sett by the lower house. . Eyen Hough it should conduct itself thus fairly and usensifibly, it does not follow that all danger is past. • Nevertheless English journaits have began to advice thelr readers that "Amerlean Rails" may now be invested in-"with caution and judgment" as they say-in face of the wanling send out lately. People often forget that the universal distrust rife for some time past has erippled or ruined. large numbers of people, that it has depressed trade and brought heavy losses to many others. Recovery does not come in a day, and it is to be feared that some time must elapse before confidence is properly restored. The American journals are apparently very hopeful and keen on whiptiling to sustain theip courage.
There ls, to be sure, quite a folling off in failures, the number in the d.S. and Canada for the last three weeks being 385, 346 and 341 respectively, but the least of these compares discourag. lugly with the 172 of the corresponding week of 1892. The share borne by Canada then was 28 , or about 16 per cent of the total, against 27 , or about 8 per cent in the week ending the 160 m wit. It does not follow that because we hear of no more bank failures among our neighbors to the south, that many more have not been very much weakened, and anl more or less affected in thell constitutions. Assistance stminar to that rendered Baring Brothers by the London Banks three years ago-and whech has since been generally admitted to have been a milstake-has leept a yarge proportion of U.S. Danks afloat during the last time months. Some thome must therefore clapse before recovery is fully estoblished; aud without at all ventaring on the domain of prophecy, we believe that securitics are as dikely to recede as to advance during the winter.

As regards D.S. railroads, it may io sald genarally mpeaking that as they are "bunde out of the proceeds of bouds, the shares betug thrown in an a tind of bonus, or watering," the wise plan is to shun shares and to touch bonds ony. In these bonds there is also a distinc. Lion: "income bonds" are prationly, "preference shares," and are entived to interest ouly when the money is carned. Lucome bonds give no right of foreelosure; they have been created to compensate bondholders who have agreed to a reduetion on minir intereat, or shareholders who have seen obliged to pay up installments, or purchase an new issut of bonds to keepy or tale the com. pany out of bunkruptey. Any bonds in repted in showid be secured upon the property of the company and carry. with them the right of foreclosure, and the investor wind do well to conilue himself to such bouds abs rank ion tupterest either before other bouds on which juterest is paid, or shares that carry dividends in well managed companies.
Mlthough Camada has escaped such cisasters as those which have overtaken the United states, the infinence is fett bere to a degree more or less injurious; and this is not to be woudered at, comsidering our harge international trade. We purchase goods exeeding $\$ 50,000,000$ in value yearly irom the U.S. and sell them of our produgts sompewhat over $\$ 10,000,000$ worth. A therettend distount egual to the deprecintion in silver, even under the Enfluence of a maintenance of the Sherman Bial, cannot fail to laye some degree of auxlety for our people.

## A FAST ATLANTIC SBLVICE

The quick fall passages which have been made by the best steamships of the Meadiag Canditan lites, have tended to keep up the interest in this subject always of paramount jmportance to the travelliug public, and the commerelal classes of our population.
It wowla not be casy to enumerate we advantages, to thif country, of a five days'system from Dominton to British soin.Naturaily these would be great, but it remains to be seen whether the country, in its present stage of development, cown afford the outlay andsacrified involved. Not long ago the lower province press made a youd outcry, against the proposition that one of our Canadian roads sloould take over the In lercolonial from the goverument, and make first class winter councetions on
our Abantice semboart. And yet this seems to be the only cousse, unlessathe govermment is mepared to make a greater onthay, than the comatry ean, at present abford. Experienced steam ship and forvarding men speak of a dowhle tmak, imponed dock fachilies, and a stratightentige out, mad shortening, of the present route as absolute essentials. Their advice would be, not to give the rond away, Jutt to elose a fair bargaln, and leti the purchasitug company make the improvements at its own expense.
There can be m emmphint about the manarement of we road under Mr. Maggait, but a henty-four hours' rum from Montrea to Imalifix would necessitate close fuming arrangements with oblher hanes, and a heary outlay on dombe tracks, etc., which the government camot readily wndertake. We are told of expenditures for steel valls and locomotives, and the substitution of from mildges for wouden ones, but whine this is gratitimge it dow mob Wring our ronte un to the full state of effielency requibed, it we are to mainfain that fash compeditive, formign service avithin ow own terbitory, so ardendy looked forward to dy many interested in promoting the indusibies and commeree of the conntry.

As Cmada hereases in popmation mol wenth the question of speedy transit, will wecome more pressligg, thut wo can, ab veast, congratulate ourselves thatit whine our resomees werestill moderate a pood weg:maing was mate to take allantage of whe geographican postlion, athe to rombat ilue disadvantages arising from the doss of the Matae sea-board. On the l'atfie an improved rain and sea service soon led to a large diversion of Ameriean tratile, and tike results mity we expected here.

When considering the location of the proposed new Reformatory for Juvenilles, it would be well to constider also, phace it in the midest of a trate of kaux whether it would not be advisulble to which could be eallivated by the ins. mates.

The trabing of youths in handierafts at the publie cxpense, is not desimble. The present stock of artisat lubor in Guntia is In excess of tite country's pheeds. The work most called for here Is tilling the soil. More men are wanted at the plough till, and not at tha puwil, bench, or needle.

The hads who drift into such institutions need detaching wholly from city dife. 'Incir plysical constitutions are nsumbly in drest ned of renovation. Jurenile erhminals are almost invariably tainted with the vees of dissipation, either interited, or acquired by keeping vicious company. The first atep in their reformation is to bring their seanth un to the average standard of inheir years.
To secure thls, no more effectual method can foe adopted than putting them in contuct with their mother earth by handing the spade, or the plough, or other forms of farm labor. To train such lads in some factory occupation, to give them mere deftness of fingers, is a poor makeshlft for what they need to malse them good citizens. They should be encomraged to industry by a round of daily life that is more attrach tive han a workshop.
Criminals are usually somewhat. volatile: steady applicsution the day through lhey cannot endure. We are giving the judgment of many of the greatest authorities in Thurope, in sayIng, that young criminals are not, as a rule, idle, but they have a morbad love of varied employment. Their fault is not indolence, wut instability. Where is a feverish element in their wlood, which can best le tamed down by agricultural worle, which develops muscle, and quietens the nerves. That has been proved in Belgium, in France, and in England, where it has ween found that the characteristic erraticism of youthin offenders, is more effectually: subdued by outdoor dabor than any other disclpline.
One of the formost of Euglish muthorities on Prison discipline once said to pas, that, the men and boys who worked on a prison farm so much mòre enjoyed eating and sleepling than those cooped up inside the workshops, that this animal pleasure made them moro docille, and industrious. He argued What this tanght them to associate work with enjoyment; and when that is done a loug mareh has been taken towards reformation.

Another point is this, as a rule criminals are cruel, and this defect of nature is corrected by having dally duties to diseharge in the care of anlmals, in whom they become interested, and by learning to understand, learn also to treat humanely.

We trust then the Governiment will not locate the new Reformatory solelly
nt any place for polltical reasons. 'but will par supreme attention to the odject of such an institution, and bund it with such surroundings as will best secure succeess.

## TMOUBLESOME RENITTIANCES.

It is beginning to be recognized that the art of selling goods may be vastly inferior to the art of getting paid for the same. Many a merchant would bo wealthy if he conld only recover what was justly due to him, but year difter year aceounts, perlangs engerly filled, have to he written off as bad and, in time the financial status of the unlucky seller is imparilled.
The past six mouths have been peculid arly trying to the wholesnle trade, and many must have been compelled to lean more hearily on their bankers for support, than is usunl. The constant excuse from the comtry has been the low selling price of produce, hut there aro many well able to pay who havo kept their creditors waiting, thus needlessily ndding to the pitriugency. Anything in tho nature of a erisis chuses timid ones to hoard un their means, and shrink from further expenditure, and this appears to have been a common practice this summer. Confidence is essential to the successful carrying on oi the credit system of trading aud once shaken is not easily recovered. As the fall seasoin advances it is gratifyjug to note a revival of confidence forluwed by increased trade. Apility to puy has been strengthened by an abundant harvest aind hardening prices for the new crop.
Couditions in the city are somowhat diffiereut. There has been abundant work for the laboring mases, in the employ of the eity, and of various great corporations, and yet meny, storekeepers have complained to us that there is no money. "We go to make collections," said onc, "and find four or five collectors there before us." Of late, the instahment system has been the craze among the poorer classes, und, in addition, the city is overrun with peddlars. Many of these are foreiguers, speaking every tongue but French and Euglish, of which they have only a smattering. Probably hali are employed in the day time and solicit orders at night. The temptation to purchase what they don't pay for all at once, is all powerful, and buyers become possessed of too much furniture, and too many clothes, for their means and position. Par't of this peddling is probably fostered by the lasge retail instalment concerns themeelves, which furnish everything a houschold contains, from common
crockery to parlor furnituro nad ornaments. on conditions of weekly or moalhiy payments. The sonsequence is that when staple necessities come to be paid fo:, the grocer, baker, hatcher and fuel dealer find themselves forestalled ly the instalment colpector, who lins got his vietim down in writing to pay regularly. The rapid growth of this kystem has, needless to any, wade remittances seant and troublesome, appially as it is inelined to sprend among the hifher class of wage earuers. With a full kiowledge of the facts before him the honest trader will not be slow to adopt means for his own protection. So long as business cannot be confined to ensh transactious a sharp cye must le kept on the ruming accounts, the accumulation of look debts being a fruitful cause of disaster.

## FAILORTAS JB PROVINCES.

The number of failures by Provinces in the drominion the week ended the 28th ult., as compared wilh previous weeks, is as follows:


If we compare the number of traders in ench Province with these figures (from Dun's Bulletin), some idea maiy be gathered of the teudency in the several divisions. The number of pages in Chaput's book devoted to the wames and ratings of tralers is: Ontario 457, Quebee 227, Nova Scotia 63, Manitola 42 , New Brunswick 41, British Columbia 29, Prince Edward lshand 1i. There are on average about 100 uames to a page. This woukd give 1. trader to thout every 55 of the whole population of the Dominion. Surely there are too many traders for the business.

## REAL DSTATE TAXATION.

The power acquired by the eity a few years ago of borrowing up to 15 per cent. on the total assessed value of our real property, showed to what an extent the citizens were indifferent to their orn interests-how short-sighted as compared with the clever men who constitute the controlling element in our civic Parliament; and it is needless to say that the indifiemence has not in an degree become less under the a wokening causes re-
cently brought home to them. Here aud there lately mumurs were henrd, but our civic fathers were not unprepared. The ferment that arose when it was freely announced in the local press that a grent advance was being made in assessment values, put enchowner on the stretch and to a degre that for a time led him away from a cousideration of the gengral danger. The astute operators threw the blame on the awesors-convenient seapegoats that they were-and when the ordinary owner looked for himself and found an argument, ready-made for him, in the division of land and buildings, and the so-called autoerats so amenable to reason, he heaved a sigh of relief and went home satisfied, pleased that the cry was out of all proportion to the wool. It was only after some leisurely consideration it began to dawn upon him that the business partook of a wholesale rather than a retail character. He saw that largo areas of property which pay no taxes whatever were valued, at rates they could not sell at to legitimate purchasers, for the purposes of that 15 per cent. limit; that the property which pays taxes must bear a double burden-that the 15 per cent. levied in this manner mised the proportion on the taxable property to a figure equal to fiftecu per cent. on the untased properties. It is needless to point out that property bearing no revenue to the horrowers is no suitable pledge for a. lonn-that those who pay taxes must shoulder the additional burden.
'The broader question is coming home to our pople-the increused cost of living in this Province and the tendency to hamper tradr. If it not high time that our taxpayers weok for means to reform this parliament-out of existence-and persuade some honest citizens to come forward for the purpose? But everyone is so intent upon his own affairs that be prefers submitting to being burdened or robled in a small way ruther than wasto moro valuable time in endeavoring to keep rogucs in order.

## THE TRUDIE OUTLOOK.

Our tariff' was left untouched during last Parliamentary session awaiting developments at Washington. Staguation in certain lines of trade matirally ensued, and we are now in the last quarter of tho year with no symptoms of betterment. The increased number of failures in Canada and Newfoundland noticeable until quite lately, will terit to keepp enterpriso at low water mark. In the United States they are begimning to conjective as to the aspect trade will wear after the Silver Repeal Bill has bean passed for we hope the sound common-sense of the Senate will pass it) and it is with tho realization that trade has received a sevcre blow under the MeKinley taviff. A return of confidence on the part of Europern houses which the Silver Repeni Bill will at ouce induce, will only be the first bush of returning prosperity for it is evident that heroic efforts must be put forth to restore trade to that condition where exports will again prepondernte over imports, a condition which has not existed during 1893.

A more disappointing yenr conld not have been anticipated. Those who have studied the currency problems in the United States aud the evils of their system lave drended a shock to trade ever siuce 1SS1, but the gloomest calculntor could never lave selected the World's Fair year as the one in which these evils would ent. minate, and in which a general paralysis of trade, and bank failures by the hundreds, should be its uppermost features.
In Canada we must for a considerable period suffer sympathetically; and possib. bly in an aggravated degree with any prolougation of trouble in the United States.
The whole ontlook must be enlled grave and difficult, and if the only drawbert which Cannda will suffer from it bo swaller profits in trade for another 12 months bhe will have heen fortunte indeed.

## What Sir chardes satp.

Sir Charles Tupper, our High Commissioner to England, arrived in Montreal early this week from a trip to the Northwest, of which he spenks in glowing terms. With few exceptious Sir Charles saw mothing lut gemernl prosperity. Ho explains that much of the difficulty expryienced hy settlers in the Northwest is owing to the free sinking of their capital in making improvements, all of which, however, must bring good returns in time. As regaids the statement that some of them had allowed their hands to be sold for taxes, Sir Charles points out that this is not at all impromable here and there, as owners are allowed to redeem their land lyy a payment of 10 per cont. additional to the amount of arrears. The cost of horrowing this money for ashort time would be higher, and this induces crofters and other settlers to endure such a course, but the number is a very small proportion. Sir Charles has no doubts, however, that the taxes will all be paid and the land redemed. The hale old lanonet is being dentt with invorably by his weight of years. Sir Churles, with Llessrs. Duncan MeIntyre und R. B. Angus attended the recent meeting of directors of the Strathyre Mining Company in B. C. and the Nickel Mining Company of SudIJury, Ont. $\qquad$
canadian traje with jamaica.
The U. S. Consul at Kiugstou, Jamaica, in his late report makes refereuces to the trade done by Canada with her sister co lony which is all the more valuable, coming from our rival in that market. His argument that Canada cannot do alarger tade there until she buys more of what Jamaica sells is reasomable, but has $n$ more limited application than he admits. It is not the case that the extent of tade possible between two countries is measured by their capacity to exchange equal quantitics of goods. The pointis, however, agood hint to us. The trade in waggous and curriaget is said to bo small, and principally supplied by the United Stateş, Canada being the closest competitor. Complaint is made that tho dimerican manufacturers do not attend to this banich with sufficient care. "Can: ada virtually controls the fish market."
" Host of the furniture of wood comes from the United States." In general trade, with Jamaica, Canada shows a gain of 12 per eent. in 1801 and 26 jere cent. in 1892. : The report suys lhat one noticeuble thing is the incense in imports from Canadn; this is the result of great efsort; both on the part of Cumda and Jamaitu, to build up trade between the two colonies. It is noticeable in the fact that of nearly every item imported by, Jamica, a suall guantily was this last year brought irom Cumada, even oi the varions diads of wines, but the resulte show it to be ugporitable on most items, and many meachants who have tried Canadu the last year will nut repeat the experimeat, anci until Camada can show an ability to use a large amount of Jamaica produchs, and give a grood quatity of goóds as cheap nes can be had elsewhert, she canaul expeet to find Jamaca a pro? fitable makes for her products. Probably the greatest effort has been made on flour, amd white in 1890 she unly sold 47 Dacrels, in 1891 she suceeded in getting in 1,203 bumels, but on this she can offer no inducement either in quatity or price, over the Aumbean artiele; in fate buth are rather apainst her. The fact of it'is, as long as the United states contimac to take over $\overline{0} 0$ per eent. of the product of the island and show the advintage in the exchange of money and low freighte in colisequence of veselts rethandg dght for follit hey have it right to expect werr lull share of teade, and the average damaica merchant ios williug to grant $i t$, for lhey camot expeet a combtay to atways continat to bay thed pioducts if she camol sell them the products of her own fieds and habor. Tha consul piediets lhat it faill be mauy yours bolure banada will again show any materias adrance in the amomat of her imports nito the isiand, and he fooks for a relative juss of percentages the coming your.

## HOP RELORTS.

The defieient supply of hops is causing purchates to be restricted to immediate wants. it is reported from the statess that lighter stocks were never hold than those of this seasoms. The number of bales held is only about one-sixth of what wero on dand a jear ago. Prices have beent unprecedently steady, ranging in United States from 20 to 25 cente per lbe, whercas from 20 to 45 cents has been customuryf The English crop is entimated at about $326,000 \mathrm{cwt}$., which falls below that of lust year by auarly 00,000 ewtige As, no stoclis of hops of aty account are held in Bingland, there will be active call for a supply from this side. The Luroperan crops are also reported to be light and not improving. The consumption of hops in England is about 050,000 evts., so the deficiency is to per cent. As the continent will bo a buyer, there is a tolerable certainty of hops ruling higher for 1803-94b Gorman buyors ate in the Pacific const market paying more than United Statos brewers will give. Wo ferr the effect of costly hops will not be sueh as to be gratifying to beer-drinkers, as no chemical substitute is known that equals this pro-s duct in flavor or healhifuluess.

## "FIRSI CATCH YOUR HEIR."

That grand creature, the American heirpess, who is now geverally admitted to have been specially created for the relief of embarrussed nobles, has attained almost to the height of her ambition. She has not (spectator) wou a throne yet, thourl she may il the King of servin is a wise man; but she hus almost approached that burpassing altitude. Aecording to the Pall Mall Guzette, Priace Lseaberg-Biadsteill has been aceepted by Miss Pullman, of Chicago daughter of the lord of the olepping and dining cars, and the here. ditary prince is not only eldest son oi a modiatised priuce, one of the even-bory Who uight marry a: Aapsburg, but vis himself an lmperiap lighness, his mother laving been an Austrian archduchess. At least, so says the Blmanach de Gotha, which is a limal andiority. American brides who have only won Colonnas, Borgheses, or Luglish Dukes, will feel thamselves quite eclipsed, and take no further pleasure in diamonds. The passion for rank is certainly not contined to Eughland, though there it is so strong that tren the Queen felt promoted when she was sulutpd Empress.

## PRODUCELS AND CONSUMERS.

A point is well taken; and well put byt He Halifax Herald in commenting upom statistics designed to show the respective amabers of producers and consumers in Great britain. It says: "One of the most tumsing fallacies of Cobucnism is that the world is divided into two great clagses. -consumers and producers, the first named class being the larger, and consequently, the more important. Wo hear the ordinary free trade otator diseant on the "interests" of the "consumer," and expatiate on the injustice that protection did to that class, one would naturally infer that the "cousumers" were a class by themselves wholly distinct from the producers, with intereste quite antagonistic. To say that sưch a theory is ridiculous is stating the truth in its mildest form. There is no such division of the population of any civilized country. The whole people are cousumers, and the whole people, except the smallest fraction, are anso producers. To appeal to tho "consumers" to protect their "interests" ayginst the producerrs, is simply to abk the people to protect themselves against themselves."

## ONE LEGISLATURE.

The slowness with which the Silver Repeal bill has advanced in the Americau' Senate has led some to wish for the abolition of 'Uhis Upper House as not representing the feelings of the people, just in the enme way as the defeat of the Howe Rule measure calsed similar comment on tho action of the House of Lords. Expensive as we have fodnd, the maintenance of Upper Houses to be in our own country, no one on sober reflection will do otherwise than admit that they have acted as checks rupon the rashuess and passion of the Lower Chamber. Were it not for the existence of an Opper House no opportunity would time and again have been granted to business men outside of political cire
cles, or the lobbies of the House, to overthrow unwise or ill-considered measures. Notwithstanding the deadlocks caused by legislators who set themselves athwart the common-sense of the majority, we should be the last to recommend either Englund, the United States, or our own people, to do away with their second chambers.

## PUBLISHING PRICESS.

It is agreed that it does not pay to let rivals see tho prices at which one selle, because that teads to underbidding. Tho sonable groods ure and invito inspection on the epot. Quite so, but there is a large propiortion of would-be purchasers, who like to know beiorehand and in condensed form exastly what they will have to pay for an article, Lhey, will sooner not visit a shop mercly to ascertain prices on arrival, for that predicates making a purchuse, willy-rilly.If they already know the price, however, from an advertisement, they go boldly, knowing exactly. what they want, and what they have to pay: bloreover, says a defender of quotation, if catalogues give prices, why not mewspaper advertisements also? In fact, the balance seems to lie on the side of quoting, for if one abstains, that does not restrain his competitors, and they will probably reap the bencfit from the class of customers mentioned. And they or their represcutatives can soou get to know his priceg.

NEW LIGHT.
" Bucmy in the camp," is given as the cause of the comparative lull in operations on the part of those conducting tho new light invention in this city. An assuciation similar to that of the fire insuance companies bas been organised with Mr. Lyun T. Leet, of the Canada, as president, and Mr. Parkins, of the Travelless' becretary treasurer, with Mossrs. Patins and Ellis (Mamulacturess') as Laxecutive Committec. a penalty of $\$ 500$ will be inposed for every infringement of the by-laws. The companies, who were ably represented at the meeting, are to be cougratulated upon the new departure.

## POVERTY CHECRS SPECULATION.

The Boston Bulletin accounts for the duiluess in stoèk operations thus: "Tho fact is, poople are poor and must attend strietiy to legitimate business to catch up with their delpte. Until people have a surplus and are in easy condition financially, it is doubtful if they pay much attention to speculation. It is indeed a [usstiou, if events of the past thee years have not palsied the speculative tendencies of the Christian world, and how loug before a return of this spirit takes place, no man knows." If the effect of poverty is to keep yeople to leritimate business aul to cause them to pay their dobte, a
dose of it docs no harm. Speculation is a mouster that ents up its own offspring ; it is self-destructive too for it makgs. wen poor and thus cuts away the source of its own nourishment. No greater blessing could happen to the States than for such a graerar-impression of poverty to prevail as to inspire the whole people with a passion for attending to legitimate business, ancupaying debts.

Potter, said, when a particular line of black tea was troing lopr, one of the really best bargains of tho sale, 22c : That's worth 40c (and it was) and remember that any statement I muke in this house in this piesence, acting officially for Dessrs. John Duncan \& Co., must be accepted as true, beyond question; believe mo implicitly. There have been rare, very rare occasions when under extreme pressure and provocation an auctioneer has, perhaps, been $1 \Omega$ ther economical of the truth and too genorous with his adjectives, but never here. It would not be permitted to even strain the truth.

## IHE UNIMED STATES TARIFR.

It is still impossible to spoak with any certainty with reference to the details of the new bill, otherwise than that the reduced duties will continue to afford $a$ fail measure of protection. Wool may be placed on the free list and there will be a reduction in woolens and woolen fabrics. There is doubt as to whethen coal and iron ore will bo made free of duty. At one time the Now Eugland Demociats confidently expected that both coal and inon ore would be placed on the free list, but now they do not feel tby any means so confident that this will bo done. There is a strong sentiment in favor of placing a duty on sugar so as to repair the deficit which it is generally: agreed Cougress will be called upon to face by the end of the next fiscal yenr. A duty on sugar, an increase of tho whiss key tax, or the imposition of an incolico tax appear to be the only means by.

Which this deficit can be overcome. The piacing of a duty on tho sugar and tho repal of the bounty would enrich tha Treasury over $\$ 50,000,000$ a year, but it would meet with ifeat opposition, and even if the committee should reconimend it, it would doubtlesss be determinedly lought in the House. Tho proposed increasb of the intermal revenue tax on whiskly is not egarded lavorably by all of the committee, and there are many members of Congress who look upon it as bad polities and unwise legishation. In some quaiters the nacreado 1 s being urged witha great deal of persistence, but it is meetag with opposition equaly as determaed, and the question is stin an open one and remans la a good deal of douibt.

## DURATION OF HRON BRIDGES.

The life of an irou bridge deponds entirely on how it is kept and the material with which it is painted for its preservation. I may say that in my experience I have examined a considerable number of iron bridges, and one I examined was up. for fifty years, and the parts of it which were properly looked aiter wero practically as good as on the day they left the works. Some three months ago I examined another bridge over a river; it had bean up thirty years, and had not bean painted for fifteen years, but there was very little corrosion; the parts that were rusted were parts where drips of water had fallen and had not been properly attended to. Then, agrain, I examined another a few weeks ago which had been up thirty-cight years, and every part of that bridge is practically as good as on the day it was put up. A few years ago I bought the material of the old Hammersmitle Bridge, London, for the purpose of using it as temporary plant in tho erection of the Forth Bridge. 'It liad been up lor sixty two years, and at great many, of the parits had not been printed sinco its ercecion, as it was impossible to get at thein; yet these partis were in a good state of preservation, in fact, quite as good as whicu they left the works, "I took some
of the material with whieh it had lera pained, to ancertain the reason for dhe phinted, to ascertain the reason for whe
yood state of preservation it whs jn, mad prood state of preservation it why in, nud
the vesult of the nualysis was that the materinl with which it hall heen painted was genninie white lemd. You ean see from these sumplos that an irom bridge properly taken care of by those responsilile for it will fast puctically for any length of time. The Bomar Bridge, which we have just repheed, was carried away by the strong floods; it hat been up for prighty years. The iwo phrt of the Mridge, which was 150 feet span, was perbiectly wood, but, the masomy piers got scoured out and washed : way, therefore the ironwork foll into the bed of the river and was dusiroved.-Sir John Errol, in " Iardwaye Jommal."

## THE FUEL OF THE FUTURE.

Wa guote from "Jine Itardware Trade Jourmal": Under the nowe hending, a writer contributed recently to the coltums of the SE Jumes's Garntte an excellent article, which we reproduce here. The amplogment of hiquid fuel is gradually being recognised as one of the possibilities of the future, and there can be little doubt that if we have many repetitions of the colliery strikes of late years, the attention oi all steam users will turn to this new combustible. As it is, the use of petroleum or its products is extendiug over a rapidly inerousing area, and, as will be secn from the following particulats, engineers in this combtry, as well as in those regions where minoral oils are under ground wating to be drawn off for consumption, are begine ing to test the value of the new melhod of steam risimg.
After saying that the leaders of the Miners bederation are loully jnsisting jusi now hat the cont owners could keep up pices, and with thim wage it they chose to tho so, the writer of the article goes on to say that, ats a mater of lact, very strenions diots bave beedi made for years pust both to lind substitutes for conl and to burn its secondary p.ofluels; and so muelh success has athented some of these experiments in the very indusbries where coal is buost largrely usel, ithat colliery-proprietors are now quite ative to the lact that a trifling rise in prieves not only limits consumption loat ande bring their cond into competition wifh pefrotern and other vils. As yet, indecel, the supply of liquid fued in bughand hats not been property brganised; lout, in site of disis, there are indications that ic wiil probably at no very distant date onst its fival, for locomofives, at loust, and poss? hly for atcamships, to say mothing of ordinary mantacturing purposes. At Chichyo at the present moment the furnees of the vasi lixposition machinery are foll with petroleum oil, pmpod nlong a listan:" oî murly a hundred and fifty miles from its source in Ohio. In lussian and in South America-combries to which we should mot usumbly look for new developments in cugineering enters mprise-petroleum is hargely used on the milways, owing to its being cherper thero than cons. In linghad ligutid fuel is dearer than it will be when the demand for it is greater and the facititios for supplying it luave multipliest; but in spite of this at least one milway-hae Greal Enstern-has alopled it: on a dazan of its locomodives with cminntly satisfuclory manles. Some of our readers may have olserved that it was an oil-burning engine which was selected to draw bu special train convering the Duke of York and his bride to Sundringlam lately.
The system ruphoyed on the G. B. R. was introduced by the head of the contphay's locomotive works, Mr. James Holden, who, diter lalf-n-dozen years' trim,
thating which he has introduced important improvements in bumers and tiru-burs and other mednaical details upon whieh we need not enlarge, has bougith it to what experts atree to be a high state of efriciency. Learing aside for a moment the question of cost, we may give the reader arough notion of the practical advantages of liguid over solid mel, by mentioning that they are somewhat the same as those which result fiom burning gas in a stove instead of coal; no waste of lime, labor, or fuel in lighting or extinguishing; casu of regulation of heat ; simplicity and cleanlinest In Mr. Holden's system the ois is carried on the tender in wo targe cylinders, which continin enough to hast three or lour times as long as a tender londed with coul; it is introduced by pipes into the usual locomotive fire-box, and burnt there in combination with air in two patent barnors over a thin hyer of incandes. cent solid fuel, which may bo slack or cinlers or sawdust, and can be dispensed with ii neecssary. The present writer, travelling on one of theso engines, wat immedidiately sitruek by the faet that the stoker's occupation is patetically gote. "Its a bloowin loy lor'im, that's wot it is," remurked the curbedriver in response to an observation to this effectu Lookityr after atap or two takes the place of the laborious conling and raking, and, as a consequ-ave the steam-pressure and speed can be regulated with a nicoty and case hitherto quite impossibjer a "dirty" fire - i.e., a furnace choked with ashes- is a driver's bete noire, and no cunuing device has yel succeeded in preventipg a ine getting "dirty" after a 'lougish run. It is impossible to go on making steam, cnough When the fire gets into this condition (as the poor buchetor seeking to boil a kettle knows well), and consequently arrangements have to be made for changing engines at due intervals; if it happens, as it often will, that a stiffish incliae has to be faced after the fire is choked, another engine bas to be telegriphed for to lend a delpixar wheel, and delay and inconvenience ensue; sometimes, too, an attempt to build up the furnace when "dirty" je-sults-in-a too impetuous firemun's piling, up coal and absolntely extinguishing it: With !iquid fuel all this is impossible-as impossible as with the domestic gas-stove. The worst that can happen is the fouling of a lumer; but ench engine is furnished with a supply of these, and tha old one can be taken out and replaced by a new one in a minute. Similaly, the waste oceasioned by the necessity of kecping up a conl-fire to its full height till the enid of the run, and then letting it dio down, is obviated; when you have finished using your oil futhace you simply turn off the supply. One other advantage ought to. comnerd the oil system to the public, if not to the consumers; there is practiently no smoke; the gitmy belching of an engine getting up stenn is unknown whero diquid fuel is ised.
But, of course, the great question ony which its general introduction depends is the cost. So far the G. E. R. lans fome it slighlly chemper than conl; but then conl costs them more than more favored lines which run to the pit's month: The saring in labor to all consumers woild be immense if ammements were made on a large senle. Conl, oll its arrival in trucks, las to be (1) monded mul stacked by hand, (2) put into trucks again as it is wanted for the conliug staige, (3) Jonded thence into looxes for supply to the enginos, nul (4) Transported in hoxes to the engines :und lischarged into tender. Now oil can be supplided by pipss and hose direct into the tender-tanks just as water is; and ther comomy of since is also a very weighty consideration. It is further clamed that maine-tubes, fire-boxes, etc., undergo less wear and tear, and last longer.

As regards marine engines, there are; no doubt, cortain difficulties which do not apply to locomotives. But oven if thel system be not more economical than conl-
burning, there is at least one class of wip to whicll, one would think, it could be applied with advantage. Lomgine the gratitude oi the Nary il the horrors of coaling were done away with, and the advantages. that would aecrue in war-time from absenee of the delays and grave inconvenienees 1hat accompasy the present method.
A fen words as to the nature of tha fuel used. Mr. Holden butas mainly a kind of tar, which results irom the ollgas manuhactured by the Great Lasterp halway for lighting their carriaged. This, of course, is a product of cual; but it is a produet formerly valueless. It is because it depends chicliy on its own supply of this liquid rued ratat the Company hata not adopted the system more extensively. But laere can be litile doubt that petro leum-or, rather, the residue from distilled petrolemm-arill in time bo put on the market at a much lower rate than is now the cast. It may be bud for coil and colliers when that comes aboat.
The article above quoted, able as it un* doubtedly is curionsly chough omits one very important use of oil ats a fuel in torpeoo boats. These little vessels are, indeed, ulmost impossible without it, ior they cannot hold suificient coal to give them an extended radius of action such as wijl bo found necessary, bay in a war witl Prance. They can, however, carry a quar tity of oil, which will eniable them to wake a reasonable cruise, the oil being generally mixed with waters ’his mist ture burns better than oil by itself, and it has, moreover, an additional claim to regard because it is non-explosive. A shell fired into the tank containing a mifixture of oil and water will be instantly put out, so that this tails is as effective as a coal bunker to act as a buifer, and is an extinguishor into the bargain. The mixture of water with the oil has another advantage in the fact that it gives off no dangerous and explosive gas as the tank empties.
leferring to the experiments made by Mrr. Lolden, as mentioned above, a few particulars may prove interestings His first test was made in 1887 witil a sumll Cornish boiler, in which he gave a week's trial to both coal azid the liquid fues With coul the final result was:-Cost for 100 hours, buruing $12,130 \mathrm{lls}$. of coal at 11s. per ton-£2 10s. 7 㖃d. Using coal, coke and tar ("Holdea's system") the cost lor 100 hours worked ont to $£ 115 \mathrm{~s} .21 \mathrm{~d}$ In a subsequent experiment with two lo comotives of precisely similar dimensions but one of which was fitted to burn liquid fuel, the result at the end of a train mileage of aearly one thousund miles was that the ordinary cugine cost $£ 9 \mathrm{ds}$. $10 \% \mathrm{~d}$. in fuel, and the oil-burning engine 1918. sd., showiug a difierence in faror of liguid fuel of 3 s . $\mathrm{E}_{1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}}$.
On the Grazi and I'saritsin railway in Russia, the engineer, Mr. Urquart, lak obtained some valuable datay One test made in summer time with similar eugincs yielded the following lour results:-Cost of fuel per train mile, bituminous codl, 10.590d. ; petroleum refuse, 3.581d. ; and thracite 9.621 d ; and petroleum refuse again, 3.530 d . In this case it may be mentionel that the price of conl on that railway is 27 s .3 a . per ton, and of potroleum refuse, 21s. per ton. In comparing Rus sian petroloum refuse with anthracite, Mr . Urquhart says that "the former has a theoretical evaporative power of 10.2 lbs . of water por 1 lb . of fuel, and the latter of 12.2 lbs., at an effective pressure of 8 atanospheros, or 120 lbs. per square inch, hence potroleum las, wiight for weighits 33 per cent. higher evaporative value than nuthracite. Now in locomotive practice, $n$ mean evaporition of from 7 to $7 \frac{1}{2}$ lbs. of Water per lb. of nathmacite, is about what is gerierally obtained, thus giving aboul 00 per cent. of efficiency, while 40 ner cent. of the heating power is unaroidably. lo'st. But with petroleum an evqporation of 12.25 db . is practically obtained, giring 75 per cent. efficiency. Thus, in the
first place, petroleum is theoretically 33 per ceat. superior to anthracito in evap. orative power, and secondly, its useful ef fuct is 15 per cent. greater, being 75 per cent. instead of 60 per cent., while, thirdly weight for weight, the practical evapor weight far weight, as at least from 68 per cent. to 75 per cent. himper than that of anthracite."
It must be remembered, however, in consideriny Mr. Urquant's figures, that in South Hussin petrolemm is plentiful and cheap; anl coal is comparatively dean. Over in this country the difficulty to contend with is that there is a seareity of oils at it price that would compare fororably with coal; and oven should a good supilly oi liquid fuel become available, a genral use of it would tend to raise the market value to a higher price than would prove its superiority over coal. These are dificomities that at present appear in the way, hut who shall say that they may unt be far less real than they seem?

Business has been moderate, but there is a larger turnover than for some months wind remittances are coming ing with more regularities Buyers reaLize that the fall is closing in and that new goods have been steadily pouring into the city warehouses. As before stated, the disposition to buy lightly, and often, is pecoming more populns every year, as losses through stale and shop worm stock are theroby lessened. The advanee in rates of freight at this season still causes a brisker movement in certain groods, suthe as hardware, chemicils, boots and shoes, ete., prior to the close of unvigation. Last yeur, at this date, the Hansa line withdew its steamers on account of the serious delays caused by the cholera quarantine, and fall shipments were generally delayed. Our shipowners, this year, are fairly busy and are enjoying an immunity from the cholern seourge.
Ashes.-Receipts continue light and price higher. First pots \$4.40 to $\$ 4.45$ Second $\$ 3.80$. Pearls nomimal at $\$ 6.25$ to $\$ 0.50$ for first sort. Receipts since 1st January 1,218 brle. pots, 87 brls.pearls; deliveries 1,248 brls. pots, 131 brlspearls; in store 5th Octoler at noom 65 brls.pot's, is ibrls. pearls.
Butter and Cheese.-Trading in butter is limited owing to high prices asked, Local folbing tades are mentioned at full prices. There is not at great deat of dajry in sight and many present hopders are likely to long for present prices later. Cheese is nominally firm but quiet. Supplies are going forward hoavily but they aro from store. Fall make firm and there is little on sale cast of Toronto. The Liverpool public cable quotes 50 s but private adrices put the figures for choice fall goods 2 s to 3 s higher. Finest Ontario white aud colored may be quoted at 110 бrsc to $3-4 \mathrm{c}$.
Dry Goods.-Mnumfacturers of both woolcus and cottous report a steady inereaso of their onipat, and that too, on orders. An advance hats been paid, in some instances, for maw cotton, and the price of wool is firm, lutit no aldition to cost of manufactured goods have been made There was a grood wedk's business in the suburbs, an improvenent on the same wedk last year; and eity shop keopers are busy. Buyers from the Easteril Townships and other points have been in the market, and our wholesale friends seem satisfied with what has been done, up, to the hour of our writing. Country traders are satid to have bought lightly preferring to let wholesalers hold stoeks, so that they can visit the market frequently and piek out what they require. As the week advances reinittances improve and, it is hoped, this month will show larger receipts than those preceding. Thero is certainly an ansious lookont lor a freer discharge of money obligntions and we trust, retums will le satisfinctory.
