CANADIAN NORTHERN IN TORONTO.

It has purchased 1000 acres in the neighborhood of Leaside for terminal purposes, including a station, shops, sidings, car storage yards, and a great big section for high-class residential purposes.

It proposes to make its main passenger depot in a new union station at North Toronto, at the southeast corner of the present crossing of Yongstreet by the C. P. and has entered into an arrangement to that effect with that road for Joint usage. An extensive tract of land has been bought for this purpose.

It has settled that its Parry Sound, or rather its Winnipeg line, will come into this North Toronto station and not to the Union Station on the Esplanade by the Don Valley, which latter lands at the level of the lake, but the first of which by a short cut-off from Duncan via Leaside to North Toronto saves this unnecessary descent of 150 feet. From Duncan to North Toronto is five miles; to the Union Station on the waterfront is ten miles. This cut-off is indicated by the barred line in the accompanying map.

It has also in view a similar cut-off for its Montreal line from some It has also in view a similar cut-off for its Montreal line from some point in Scarboro to North Toronto, but just where that is to be is not yet determined.

But all the trains of the Canadian Northern east, west, north, in a very short time will leave from the new Union Station at North Toronto, and it may have some arrangement at North Toronto for joining up with the radials controlled by Canadian Northern interests.

The Leaside layout for building purposes will be up-to-date in every respect and will have in view the extension of Rosedale and the creation of a greater Rosedale on the hill. The swell residential section is to be to the northeast of Rosedale.

The Canadian Northern's headquarters are now in Toronto and will be continued here, and most extensive plans in that direction are under way. A whole block has been secured downtown for head offices. Toronto is to be made the centre for connecting the traffic of Ontario with the Canadian west and especially for making provision in Toronto and other portions of Ontario for handling the manufactures of this province, based on the fact that Ontario is to become the great manufacturing centre for the western Canadian provinces, just as New England is to-day for the American western states.

The World herewith presents a map giving a pretty good idea of the big movement of the Canadian Northern Railway in connection with Toronto and clally in regard to its recent purchase of 1000 acres at Leaside immediate-

north of the C. P. tracks. The Canadian Northern have agreed with the Canadian Pacific for a union station at North Toronto at the southeast corner of the crossing of Yonge-street by the C. P. R. It will be a modern station in every respect, and these two companies have arranged for a joint elevated track from Dufferin-street in the west to Leaside in the east, where they have made a big purchase of land, shown in the map, for terminal and residential purposes. They have also practically acquired the right of way for a cut-off Station at the water front. The moral of the whole story is this: on the water front up the Don Valley. Duncan is the head of the valley grade from the lake to the upper level. From Duncan to Union Station, as said above, is ten miles and is a winding proposition in the valley with a very good and plan for a great big future at the same time.

(1) Railway congestion is caused rather by lack of terminals in the big centres and lack of sidings in the little places than by lack of ordinary trackage. (James J. Hill was the first man to discover this proposition in connection with his railroads in the west.)

(2) Railways can only get proper terminals in the big centres by the exercise of foresight in securing plenty of land at the time when it can be had in acreage and not as a street frontage proposition.

(3) Railways that exercise this foresight are entitled to a share in the uncarned increment that comes from such foresight in the purchase of a large acreage and, when they do so such acreage and such extensive terminals greatly improve the securities of the railway from a financial point of view.

(4) A railway is only exercising foresight when it secures not only

It is absolutely impossible almost for railways now to get suffient land for terminals in cities where congestion has taken place. More than 500,000,000 is being spent on terminals in New York City, and \$50,000,000 will ave to be spent in Toronto before railway terminals are secured sufficient for the three systems that are centred here. Toronto will become a; immense city a city not of a million, but much greater in view of the remarkable trade that now exists between Ontario and the West and the prospect of a still greater increase.

Ontario with its cheap power, both electric and as the product of coal, and with its easy supplies of iron and lumber, and the start it has already made, is bound to be the manufacturing base of the western provinces, just as New England and all the states east of Ohio constitute the manufacturing base of the western states of the adjoining union. Nothing can now stop the trade between the Canadian east and the Canadian west and Toronto will be the headquarters of that trade so far as the Province of Ontario is concerned. Toronto will not only have the trade of the west but it will have the trade of an evergrowing Ontario centred within its limits. Its population is bound to double rapidly and the only thing is for the city to be as big as the railway in its can best be done.

Further particulars in regard to the development of the Canadian Northern n the direction of a new line from Toronto to Hamilton and the Niagara River, and from Hamilton to the Detroit River, taking in all the main centres and linking up with a lot of local radial propositions, may be expected later on.







# Favorable Reports From McIntyre Mill---Markets Erratic &

The most outstanding event of the day was the strength in Hollinger, which scored a further advance at \$12.45 on the curb. A consistent buying demand was in evidence throut the day, but holders were not disposed to liquidate, and consequently very little stock came out. At the riose, bids were put in only a slight distance removed from the top for the session.

Directly opposite to the price trend in this issue was the action of Dome Extension and Swastika. The former sold down below 50 for the first time in upwards of a month, but regained most of its less before the close. Swastika was the centre of a bear raid for some unaccountable reason, and the shares dropped back to 19 1-4 again.

Such firm spots as Rea, Pearl Lake and Vipond did much to relieve the situation. The movement in Rea was hased on the expectations of a better outlook on account of the recent turn over in the directors. Fearl Lake improved on the rumors of a successful financial deal, and in expectation of a reopening of the mine shortly. Vipond was bought presumably for the short interest.



There were also advices at hand confirming more fully the impression that the harvest in the big soft winter states will be so meagre as to have an important effect on supplies, especially in Chicago.

Corn displayed heaviness always. Commission house selling was too persistent. Big shipments from Argentina had a depressing effect. July went from 76%c to 77%c, closing weak at 76%c.
