MR. BENNETT ON THE STAND

He Gave No Evidence That Could be Construed Against Him.

public approval of the agreement arrived at between the Mayor and the Railway Company through the intervention of Mr. Bertram. Under that agreement the rights of the employees are amply safeguarded, and tickets are to be sold at seven for five cents. The objection has been raised that these tickets, being good only on one day of the week, will be liable to get lost, that they will be a nuisance in one's pockets, and that but few people will purchase them. To overcome this objection tickets will always be accepted in lieu of the eight-for-a-quarter tickets on week days. This provision would go a long way towards meeting that objection. In our opinion, the seven-for-a-quarter arrangement is preferable to the regular tickets would be of no use whatever on Sunday morning, and the limit for using them in the evening closes somewhat too early for church-goers to be advantaged by them. The seven-for-a-quarter arrangement is as good a compromise as the public can expect. Why then should we delay any longer the settlement of the question? Why not let the people pronounce upon it? If the people do not approve of the agreement it will be voted down. If they do approve of it, it is proof that the agreement is a proper one. Let the Street Railway Committee wind up this matter to-day and refer it to the Council for final approval. The Sunday car question should be eliminated from the coming municipal campaign and the duty was to do it is for the present Council to ratify the agreement that has been accepted by the Railway Company.

MR. CAMERON'S RESOLUTION Presented in the United States Senate.

NATURE OF THE NEXT STEP

To be Taken to Secure the Independence of Cuba.

Mr. Cameron's Report is Very Lengthy and Covers the Progress and American Precedents in the Matter of Intervention. The Report Claims that the American People Have Always and Unanimously Supported the Monroe Doctrine...

Washington, Dec. 21.—The report from the Committee on Foreign Relations on the joint resolution acknowledging the independence of Cuba and offering the friendly offices of the United States Government with Spain to bring to a close the war between Spain and the Republic of Cuba, was presented by Senator Cameron in the Senate today. It is a document of very great length, and deals thoroughly, though briefly, in its opening with modern precedents of European intervention where independence was the issue involved...

EUROPEAN PRECEDENTS. After referring to numerous European precedents, the report goes on to say: "Not only Greece, Montenegro, Bulgaria, Roumania, Servia, and Egypt have been the victims of such intervention, or the objects of its restraints, but also Samoa, Cuba, and even the Lebanon over their island status to the same source."

THE TREATY OF BERLIN. In 1878, was a broad assertion of the right of the European powers to regulate the affairs of the Ottoman Empire, but the treaty contains no statement of the principle of jurisdiction on which the right rests.

From this body of precedents it is clear that Europe has invariably asserted and practiced the right to intervene, both collectively and separately, amicably and forcibly, in every instance except that of Cuba, where a European power has resorted to intervention to obtain independence.

MODERATE INTERVENTION. The report then continues with a description of the experiences of Asia and America. America, both North and South, it is stated, has always aimed to moderate European intervention and to restrict its exercise.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE. From that day to this, continues the report, the American people have always, and unanimously, supported and approved the Monroe doctrine. They needed no reasoning to prove that it was wise and to their safety.

THE SOUTHERN REBELLION. The letters of President Jackson following the initiative are elaborately referred to, and the very friendly feeling on the part of Great Britain and Mexico is pointed out.
