DR. NOBLE MAKES A STIR. At Last Night's Meeting of the Public School Board—Adjourned for Want of a Quorum.

There was but one trustee absent at last evening's meeting of the Public School Board. Chairman Douglas presided.

A paper by Lawrence Baldwin on the Ontario educational system and voluntary schools was received, after which Dr. Noble submitted a batch of notices of motion, touching the question of transferring pupils.

Trustee Starr's superannuation scheme was left with the Finance and Teachers' Committees, as a special committee.

Dr. Noble made a stir when speaking to his motion that the solicitor's salary of \$1000 be reduced to \$500, by observing that the latter had been \$1000 last year, not because of any work he had to do, but because he had influence with the directors of the school.

Trustee Starr thought that the solicitor had more than his salary. A vote was taken and the motion lost.

Clause 8 of the management report was amended to read that Miss H. Johnston, now teaching the third book class, be appointed principal assistant in Phoenix-street school and clause 10 was referred back.

Want No Medal. The request of the Temperance League that they be permitted to present a gold medal to the pupil passing the most successful examination, was not granted.

The Property and Supply reports were passed. When the Night School Committee statement was presented, the trustees had divided down until no quorum existed.

Hon G W Ross sent word to the board last evening that he would be unable to attend the reception to be held in the Armories in honor of the cadets.

FIRES REPORTED. A fire that broke out Wednesday night at Akron, Ohio, destroyed the plant and office building of the Thomas Building and Lumber Company. The property loss will amount to \$100,000, or more, largely insured.

Yesterday morning fire broke out in the Palace Skating Rink, Paris, Ont., and in a short time reduced the entire building to ashes. The cause of the fire is a mystery, and some suspicious are entertained that it was the work of an incendiary. The building was insured for \$100,000.

Want the Board's Help. The Secretary of the extra rush yesterday morning received a letter from A. E. Lewis, Canadian manager of the Atlantic Refining Company, stating that the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways have advanced the freight rates, both through and local, on American petroleum and its products ever since the Standard Oil Company gained control of Canadian refineries. Figures are quoted to show that the rates have been advanced 50 per cent, and the Board asked to take steps to preserve legitimate, independent competition. The Council of the Board will deal with the matter at its next meeting.

The money goes to bondholders \$1000 going to the town. F. E. P. Peplar, Q.C., appeared for the Waterworks, A. Bruce, Q.C., for the bondholders, and Strachy, G.C., for the town.

Witten by a Dog. Samuel Dingman, who lives at 64 Hayter-street, was attacked by a dog yesterday morning in the rear of a store on Yonge-street, near Bloor-street, and had his hand badly lacerated. The wound was catered for at St. Michael's Hospital.
