GUESTS AT DINNER

Delightful Evening Provided
by Board of Trade —
Graceful Speeches.

Wives of the members of the Con-
gress of Chamber of Commerce of the
Empire were guests of the Toronto
Board of Trade, the ladies' committee
acting as hostesses at the club
premises last night when the spaci-
ous dining hall looked very inviting
in its handsome table appointments
and floral decorations. The guests
representing different parts of the
empire were distributed amongst the

sentimental representatives, who
from time to time had visited this
city. The war, said Miss Church, had
brought out a better feeling thru
showing that the thing worth while
was the strength of manhood, of
womanhood, and of children in ser-
vice for humanity.

In reply, Mrs. Stanley Meechan
spoke briefly, but eloquently, stating
that the welcome everywhere given
the delegates had been overwhelming.
She had never enjoyed herself so
much in her life, as during the short
time she had been in Canada. They
had also seen much of interest, and
she thanked Miss Church and all who
had contributed to make their stay
so delightful.
