 - VI. A Total Eclipse of the Moon December 27th, partially visible, the eclipse beginning before the Moon rises. Middle of eclipse 6.42 p.m. Magnitude of eclipse 1.33. (Moon's diameter=1').

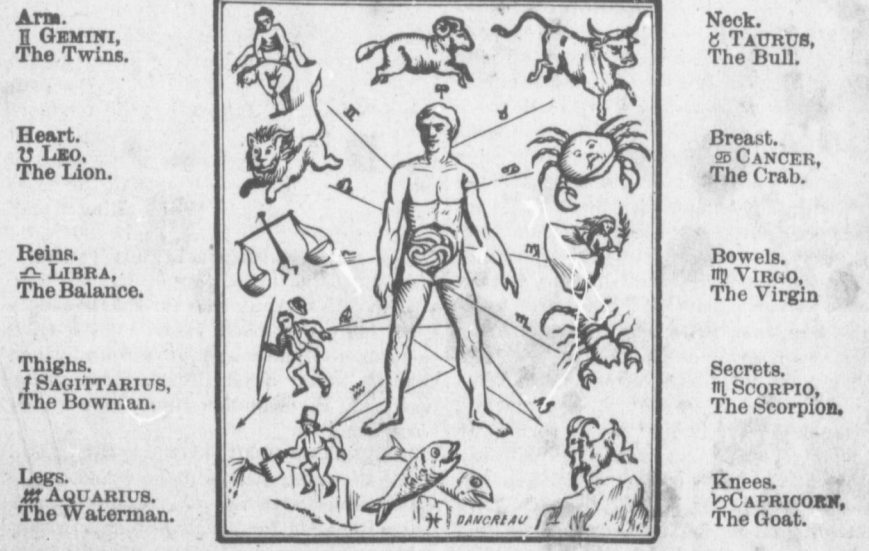
MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

VENUS will be Morning Star to February 15th, an Evening Star to December 1st, then a Morning Star. **MARS** is a Morning Star throughout the year. **JUPITER** is a Morning Star to March 25th, an Evening Star to October 13th, then Morning Star. **SATURN** is a Morning Star to May 29th, an Evening Star to December 6th, then Morning Star. **MERCURY** may be seen in the morning about January 29th, May 28th, and September 21st, in the evening about April 10th, August 8th, and December 3rd. **VENUS** will be at its greatest brilliancy October 27th. The Satellites of **JUPITER** will be invisible from September 15th until November 12th, **JUPITER** being too near the Sun

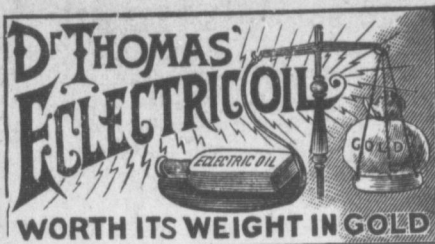
