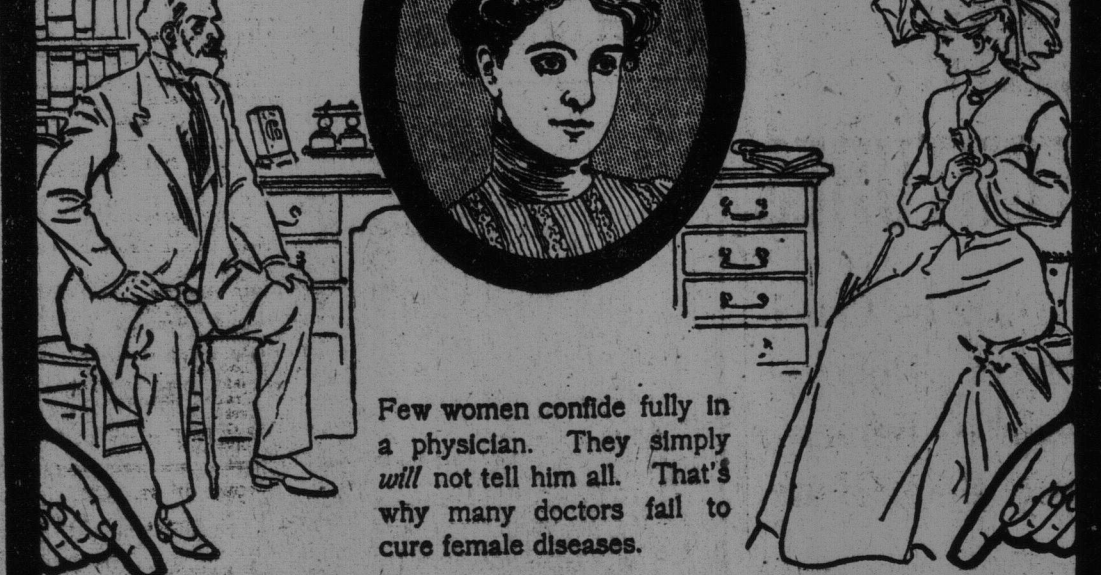

If there is any pitiable picture in life it is that of a good man gone wrong. To see a man who has started on the fringe of success give up the struggle and slip, step by step, down the hill which he has climbed so persistently is a sorry commentary upon the weakness of human character. Yet there are scores of such men in every field of endeavor. For a time they have climbed, feverishly and energetically. Lulled by the success they have won, they have stopped, as though uncertain about their balance, and then, ceasing themselves upon the ragged edge of things, they have gone sliding down.

Of course it is difficult to assign any general cause for this display of timidity, and yet, in many cases, the trouble may be traced directly to the door of "success" itself. Pleasant as success is to achieve, and anxious as all of us are to achieve it, there is no circumstance in life that is so trying to the soul as this same "success" for which we are striving so assiduously. To attain this condition men will undergo many trials and privations. He will not sleep at night, and far into the night will win the plaudits of the people. Bowed by ambition, he will tirelessly to attain the goal that he has fixed for himself, and, like all who work hard enough to accomplish a single purpose, he will usually make some progress towards the attainment of the object for which he is out. Because of his own earnest efforts a day draws at last when he awakens to the realization of the fact that the more he is talking about him.

The first sign of success is a more serious test of character than a decade or two of glory would be later in his career. Applause is not enough. These men stand too long to listen to it are certain to find that it dulls the sense of other

DRUNKARDS IN MASSACHUSETTS

(Boston Transcript.)

No feature of the recent annual report of the Massachusetts Prison Commissioners is more deeply significant than the statistics of drunkenness. The fact that during the past fiscal year 73,972 arrests for intoxication—an average of over two hundred a day—were made in the Commonwealth, while 20,648 persons were committed to penal and reformatory institutions for inebriety, indicates the failure of the liquor question. Translated into terms of ratio, these arrests represent 2.4 per cent of the total population of the state. One out of five hundred men in the cup fell more than once into the clutches of the police during the twelve-month period. The number of arrests exceeded the number of persons arrested.

The late Henry M. Boies of Pennsylvania, an eminent student of penal problems, used to say that Massachusetts furnishes the best example of how laws fail to enforce themselves in many respects, is deficient at points. The fact that the total body of persons committed for drunkenness last year 12,810 last year reveals all the difficulties with which the situation bristles and the insufficiency of the methods which are in vogue.

Impressively, these grim figures of recurring drunkenness disclose the magnitude of the problem of the under and administrative machinery, has been accomplished toward its solution.

Efforts to block the making of followers of Bacchus been inadequately comprehensive, on the one hand, and has our policy toward the alcoholic excess. It seems unduly heroic, on the other hand?

Wholly apart from sentimental considerations, the unadvised restriction of the drunkard, as laid bare from year to year in the bald penal statistics of the state, is a matter of common sense. The burden which it imposes on the tax-paying shoulder, the disturbing influence which it injects into industry, the stimulus which the grog habit imparts to the commission of crime, and the part which it plays in weakening the productive capacity of the individual—in short, its varied relations to financial and social economy—are painfully familiar aspects of the momentous evil of alcoholic excess. It seems as if people had become calloused to the notion that the situation is either a trifle to be taken for granted or a conundrum to be given up.

The conclusions which Dr. Charles L. Dana draws from his recent extensive inquiries into the liquor problem and which, in part and in brief, are that inebriety begins before the victim is twenty years of age, and that if a person has not indulged to excess before he is five and twenty, he is not likely to do so later, are profoundly significant. They teach the vital importance of employing all available agencies to educate minors in the physical and moral perils of acquiring the alcohol habit either in the saloon or at the club or in the home. Preventive efforts are more fruitful and helpful than repressive or correctional effort. Upon this phase of the problem too great stress cannot be laid.

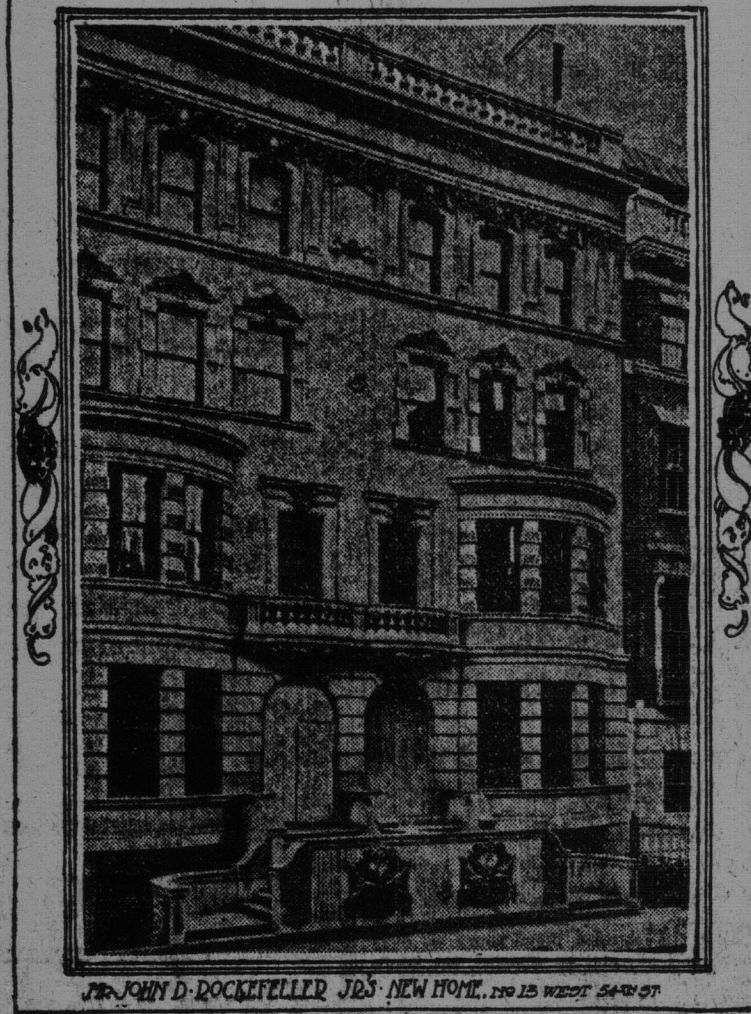
