

CITY AGHAST OVER A BRUTAL MURDER

Berlin Shop Keeper Killed in Flat and Youth He Befriended is

Berlin, Oct. 3—Berlin is aghast over a murder committed with a deliberation and callousness indicating complete indifference to the sanctity of human life. In the early hours of the morning the concierge at a house, one of the main residential thoroughfares of the West End, reported at a police station that cries for help had been heard from a flat occupied by a retired grocer named Fuse. A conetable accompanied him back to the house and demanded admittance to the flat, which was, however, refused by an unknown voice from within.

Noting suspicious was found until the dining-room was reached, but here someone is de the apartment attempted to hold he door to, and, finding it beyond his trength to do this, pointed a revolver through the widening gap and snapped it wise at the police. Fortunately both hots missed fire, and a bold rush overowered the owner of the weapon. Beneath the window of the room was bund the corpse of Herr Fuss, bleeding from many deep gashes in the face, neck, and ichest. The murderer, a sickly and independent of twenty, Pietruczerski by name, being unable to deny his suit, endeavored to extenuate it with the bject of saving his head. He pretended hat his fatal blows had been preceded by quarrel and a struggle, and if he can ersuade the jury to believe this he cannot be condemned to death. The police, owever, say that they have evidence to rove that the crime was premeditated. Herr Fuss, it appears, formerly had a rocer's shop in Schrimm, near Posen, and there came to know the prisoner, who as employed in a similar business. Some me later, happening to be stranded in erlin, Pietruczewski sought out his old quaintance, who advanced him \$2.50. He easily discovered that the woman who waited on Herr Fuss selept out of the house, and on Friday night he waited until she had taken her departure and until Fuss had come home. He then knocked at the door of the flat, obtained admission, and, it is believed, persuaded Herr Fuss to sit down and write him out a letter of recommendation.

While the doomed man was thus employed Pietruczewski, who was standing behind him, took a noose from his pocket, and, slipping it over the other's head, drew it tight in the hope of silently strangling him. Unfortunately for the murderer, the cord broke before it had done its deadly work, and Herr Fuss, sejzing a small desk knife that lay beside him, made a show of defending himself.

The assassin drew his own more formidable blade, and with it showered blows we upon the elder man. One of these cut through the neck right to the spine, and must have proved almost instantly fatal.

This is the theory which the police have pieced together from the prisoner's own admissions, and from the circumstantial evidence. Pietruczewski shows no trace of remorse.

MORGAN SAYS HE

Simla, Oct. 3—According to a report just published here, the number of wild animals destroyed in India in 1911 was 25,-360, as compared with 19,282 in 1910. This total included 1,428 tigers, 5,352 leopards, and 4,251 wolves. Nearly 172,000 snakes were destroyed, as against 91,000.

This increase is largely accounted for by the offering of rewards by the Burma government. That this action was impossible.

Altogether, 1,947 persons were killed by wild animals and 24,264 by snakes. JUDGE IN DOCK INSTEAD OF SEATED ON BENCH

German Jurist on Small Salary Cultivated Expensive Acquaintance of Stage Women

Berlin, Oct. 3—The unusual spectacle of a judge standing in the dock instead of being seated on the bench is reported from Dresden. Dr. Walker Snell, the prisoner, bears the high-sounding title of Landgerichtsrat, but so poorly paid is the judicial profession in Germany, that his salary in that capacity amounted to only \$1,200 a year. As he had no other source of income, and cultivated the acquaintance of actresses, it is not surprising that he got into debt, but it was precisely because he had no apparent prospect of repaying the loans which he had contracted, amounting altogether to about \$15,000, that he now stands charged with fraudulent borrowing. Waiters were among the persons from whom he obtained advances.

His defence was the familiar one that his "social standing" was itself a capital which, judiciously invested in matrimony, would have placed him in a position to clear off all his obligations. In support of this contention, he mentioned that at a time when he was in the doplomatic service and acting as vice-consul at Chicago he introduced the Prussian ex-finance minister, Baron von Rheinbaben, into the houses of several millionaires. He declared that he never, had any intention of marrying anyone but a lady with money.

"But do you think you would have got such a lady," inquired the bench.

"Oh, yes," replied the defendant. "That isn't difficult."

One of Judge Snell's actress friends testified in his favor that his relationship to her had been purely one of friendship, and that the question of matrimony had never entered into it. She mentioned incidentally that he once gave her a check for \$50, but it turned out that he had no funds in the bank on which it was drawn.

The president of the court here observed that the accused had an account at another bank, and that at present it showed a balance of one cent.

He read from the code and explained that, although Lea actually killed himself, if they were the cause of his death, and bore malice and ill-will towards him, it was murder; if there was no malice or ill-feeling, man-slaughter. The prisoners' evidence was contradictory to the crown's, therefore they must decide which to believe. But if there was any reasonable doubt the prisoners must get the benefit of it. 

Again, in the early summer when the young grass is plentiful and juicy, the amount of water will be somewhat increased, thus reducing the proportionate amount of the "solid" contents, butter among the rest. Because of milk containing these solids, it is considerably heavier than water, with which latter all liquids are compared as regards weight. This is known as "specific gravity." Milk, as contrasted with water, has an average weight of 1,032, water being taken as 1,000. This, of course, is for equal bulks.

It is quite important to know this, as milk very rich in cream will be lighter, that is, its specific gravity will be less than one not so well supplied. On the other hand, milk poor in cream will have a weight greater than normal, provided its watery content is not increased. Should the latter happen, the specific gravity may not be other than normal. A good and ready means to ascertain the "richness" of milk is to measure the cream which it will produce. This may be done by nearly filling any narrow glass vessel having the same inside size throughout, with milk and sitting it aside in a 6501 place for 24 hours.




