

RESISTANCE

Resistance may be defined as the opposition to the flow of current through an electrical circuit. 



Women Backers of a State Compulsory Law Have Yet Wider Aims - See Prejudice Vanishing.

New York, Feb. 16—Long standing public antipathy to finger printing as a means of identification has been greatly lessened according to Mrs. Mary E. Hamilton of the Police Department, in the recent adoption by the New York City Federation of Women's Cluss of a resolution recommending compulsory legislation. So strong has the antipathy been, finger printing and crime having been always associated, that the resolution was almost laughed out of a hearing when first presented. Mrs. Hamilton undertook the fask of changing the women's attitude, by presenting scores of cases, from her own experience as police-woman, in which a positive means of identification would have presented. The resolution states that fingerprinting "would save relatives of victims of sudden disease or accident expense, intense suffering and great anguish of mind" and "would prevent forgery, fraud, mistaken identity and would greatly facilitate the settling of estates." All these benefits would be vastly increased, it is pointed out, if compulsory fingerprinting were nation-wide, which is the ultimate aim of those backing the present campaign. HALIFAX PRAISES US; WANTS BIG TIME NEXT YEAR

Newspaper Suggests They Have "Bluenose Winter Carnival"
