PRESIDENT HINDENBURG.

The election of the former Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as President of Germany over the Republican candidate leaves a very bad taste in the mouths of most civilized countries.

It is at once a defeat and a reaction step by the German people, sharply increasing suspicion and setting fresh difficulties in the way of European tranquillity and security.

Whatever the Germans may say, whatever the new President himself may say, the fact is that Germany has favored the soldier rather than the statesman.

In the face of this election, France, naturally enough, will find all its suspicions confirmed, and the tendency of the French will be not only to maintain a great standing army but to keep troops in German territory pending the making of a new security pact.

It is another instance of German folly, but since it reveals to the world the full strength of the reactionary element in Germany it is perhaps as well that the demonstration comes now rather than later.

It was the prime minister who dealt with the famous Curzon bearing in the fullest and most illuminating way. He said that it was a "facade" which Lord Curzon had erected about himself, which misled many people, but which was really the product of a natural shyness and an intense and exquisite sensitiveness.

"I want before I set down, to say one or two things that no one but I can say. A prime minister seeing human nature hard to the bone, and it was my chance to see him twice when he was great disappointment—at the time when I was preferred to him as prime minister, and at the time when I had to tell him that he could render greater service to the country as chairman of the committee of Imperial defense than in the foreign office.

With possibility of attack from the air and under the sea, the small silver streak of the Channel no longer constitutes in these days a rampart, as Shakespeare put it, against infection and the hand of war.

France sees a new challenge in Hindenburg's success. No government will be able to live in France for some time to come unless it makes French security the first of its policies.

CHANGES IN N. B. CABINET, REPORT AT CAPITAL SAYS

Hetherington Mentioned for Senate; Hill Likely to Get Portfolio

DYSART AND MAGEE NAMED FOR MINISTRY

Veniot Likely to Quit Public Works and Join Hydro Board.

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 26—With the session of the legislature nearing its close and an election in the offing, rumors of cabinet reconstruction by Premier Veniot are becoming more persistent.

That Premier Veniot will make many changes in his cabinet before he appeals to the people this year is a foregone conclusion. At the present time, Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington is holding two portfolios, that of provincial secretary and minister of lands and mines. The Premier in addition to his arduous duties of leading the government, is also minister of public works, and it is generally believed that he will also become a member of the newly formed New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, when the bill before the House providing for a personnel of seven is finally adopted.

HILL MENTIONED FOR POST.

Burton M. Hill, provincial road engineer, is almost certain to be minister of public works in the reconstructed cabinet, according to the prediction of political observers here. Mr. Hill is not a novice in politics, having been a candidate in Charlotte county a few years ago on the Liberal ticket. The plan is now being arranged to have Mr. Hill as one of the Liberal candidates in the new rural constituency of Charlotte and he will go to the people as minister of public works, this relieving Premier Veniot of the post he has held since 1917.

It is said that the Premier is ready to lay aside the portfolio as minister of public works, in order that he will have more time to devote to the work of framing the policy of the newly-constructed power commission.

Unless the political prognosticators are very much astray Hon. Dr. Hetherington is to leave the provincial arena and go to the Dominion red chamber. He is said to have the best chance for the appointment to the New Brunswick Agency in the senate and the provin-
