## Complete Surrender of Austria-Hungary; Terms Open Whole Country To Allies For Use In Operations Against Germany

Washington, Nov. 4-Terms of armistice under which the land and sea forces of what once was the Austro-Hungarian empire have laid down their arms, were announced today simultaneously in Washington and the allied capitals. They accomplish complete surrender and open Austrian and Hungarian territory for American and allied operations against Ger-

From this drastic document, it may be stated, may be gleaned an accurate outline of the conditions nearing completion in the supreme war council at Versailles under which Germany may have a cessation of hostilities.

The terms of the Austrian armistice with parenthetical explanations of minor errors in cable transmission were announced by the state department today as follows:

p. m. (9 a. m. eastern American time), include complete demobiliaztion of Austrian torces, surrender of one-half of all artillery and military equipment; occupation by American and ailied forces of such strategical places as may later be selected; use of Austrian railroads for operations against Germany; evacua-tion of all invaded territory, leaving behind all equipment and supplies including coal; surrender of a portion of the Austrian surface and submarine fleets and disarmament of others under American and allied control; surrender of all Ger-man submarines in Austrian waters and repatriation of allied and American

prisoners without reciprocity.

Evacuation of Austrian territory roughly corresponds to the boundary lines claimed by Italy under the Italia Irredentia or treaty of London programme. The right of occupation by allied forces is reserved, local authorities to main FOCH TO DIRECT.

The terms of the aemistice are to be carried out under the direction of Marshal Foch, who will designate material to be turned over and supervise the movement of Austro-Hungarian forces to the rear.

All German troops in Austria-Hungary, Italy or the Balkans must be out

Destruction of any property by retreating forces is specifically forbidden. Ships to be surrendered include lift teen modern Austrian submarines, three battleships, three light cruisers, nine de stroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine layer and six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies. All other war

craft are to be concentrated and disar med under allied direction, Free navigation of all Austrian waters by both the war and commercial fleets of the Allies is provided for.

All enemy naval aircraft are to be put out of commission and concentrated under allied control. All Austrian harbor and other equipment in occupied

Italian ports is to be left untouched. The Danube route is to be kept op en by the occupation or dismantling of fortresses to be selected by the allied commander. The existing blockade of the Allies against Austria remains unchanged, Austrian ships being liable to capture where found except where a commission, to be named later, provides

All fortresses protecting Austrian naval bases or stations are to be occupied and the arsenal at Pola is specially sur rendered. All allied craft held by Austria are to be returned immediately.

The only organized military force Austria is permitted to retain is limited to that necessity to maintain order on her own borders,



THE ARGONNE
CLEAR OF ENEMY.

With the French Army in France, Nov. 3—(Evening, by the Associated Press)—The pocket created by the advance of the Americans toward Dunsur-Meuse and by Gouraud's army north of Vouzers was emptied today, and the Argonne Forests are clear of the enemy. Gouraud's men are hustling the German front prench hands with their machine guns, and occupied various villages as far north as Chatillon-Sur-Bar.

The French now have under the fire of their guns the important railroad leading north along the German line of retreat, as well as the main road leading eastward to the Meuse, from Lechesne, which is only 1,000 yards north of the line Gouraud reached today.

Families arriving from around Valenciennes and Conde tell stories which leave no doubt that the Germans during the last four years of teror have systematically looted the country. In the following month he was tried on the charge of attempted high treason, gross insubordination and resistance to the authorities. The trial was held behind closed doors, and resulted in the Socialist leader being sentenced to thirty months' penal servitude and dismissal from the army.

This sentence caused great disorders among the Socialists of Berlin, Stuttgart, Leipsic and other cities. An appeal was taken as a result of which the court sentenced Dr. Liebknecht to prison for four years and one month, in addition to forfeiting his civil rights for six years.

It has been alleged that Dr. Liebknecht was in possession of important documents showing that Austria was forced by the German leaders into war against the wishes of Vienna and Budapest.



### EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIM-SELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUES-TION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPEC-TION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.





In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ended Oct. 31, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following observations:

The warehousing business in Canada is surely coming to the point where it works in rather uncertain channels. For a long time material of less than one-eight inch in thickness was not included in the embargoed list, and firms that had a good connection at United States rolling mills had little trouble in "carrying on." Even when the War Trade Board turned down an application for the release of certain material—particularly plate—they often did so with the recommendation to "use some lighter material." This provided an easy way out, but now this lighter material is under the same ban. Canadian shops maintain a very high standard of efficiency on shell work. A party of French mechanical experts are in Canada at present, under the guidance of an interpreter from the dominion government. They have been in the United States for some months in connection with French orders. They state positively that in point of production and the well-planned arrangement of the sequence of operations, Canadian shell shops are absolutely the best in the business.




