REPORT OF SESSION.



TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF CALVIN CHURCH CONGREGATION:

* BRETHREN,—It seems to us desirable to recall from time to time the definition of the Session's constitution and duty, as laid down by the General Assembly. As all are not in possession of the "Rules and Forms of Procedure," we quote from the lagest edition (1889) as follows:

"The Session consists of the minister, or ministers, and elders of a congregation.

"The duty of the Session is to watch over and promote in every Scriptural way the Spiritural interests of the congregation; more particularly to receive applicants for admission into the Church; to admit those who have been baptized into full dommunion, and to receive persons bringing certificates of membership from other congregations; to grant certificates to members leaving the congregation; to watch over the Christian deportment of the members of the congregation; to exercise discipline by admonition, rebuke, suspension, or exclusion from membership; to restore to privileges; to care for the religious instruction of the young, including the oversight of Sabbath Schools; to determine all matters touching the order of public worship, including the service of praise; to arrange for the dispensation of the sacraments; to appoint congregational fasts or thanksgivings; to appoint the time and mode of making special collections, and where there are no deacons, to provide for the necessities of the poor; to call congregational meetings; to examine and judge of the qualifications of persons elected to the eldership and the deaconship; to receive and judge of petitions; to transmit papers to the Fresbytery, and to do whatever else may, in their opinion, promote the religious interests of the congregation."

Brethren of the congregation, these are our functions and duties as defined by the highest Court of the Church. They are based upon the principles laid down by Christ and his Apostles for the government of the Church. Their rightness and utility are apparent and for the efficient and profitable discharge of them we need the prayers and hearty co-operation of the members of the Church.

The work of the Church has gone on quietly during the year without any

specially note-worthy feature. In the year preceding there was an unusually large addition to the membership (181 in all), thus almost exhausting the constituency whence members by profession are drawn, leaving the work of instruction and edification very onerous, while reducing the number of those likely to unite with the Church by profession of faith. The main work of the minister and Session thus varies with the changing conditions of the congregation.

There are now 189 families connected with the congregation, with seven others to whom pastoral attention is given. Fourteen new families were added to the congregation, and seven removed beyond the bounds, leaving the net increase seven and the total number of families 189

There were 23 communicants added to the roll during the year, 13 by certificate and 10 by profession.

There were 20 removals; 17 by certificate, 2 by death, and one was dropped. The number on the roll at the beginning of the year was 466.

During the year the Session held 18 meetings, which were generally well attended. The ordinance of the Lord's Supper was dispensed four times, and there were 17 baptisms - all infants.

The attendance at the regular diets of worship continues to afford ground for thankfulness, and the regular prayer meetings are well attended, although there is still room for improvement as in former years.

The Sabbath School, we are pleased to say, was never in a more efficient state than at present. We have a good staff of teachers and officers who are regular in attendance, as a rule, and do their work with fultifulness. There appears also to be a greater interest in the work of the Sabbath school on the purt of the people generally. We carnestly hope that this interest may continue and increase.

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor has continued its work regularly during the year, and has, we believe, accomplished results in fields hitherto but little cultivated. We commend this department of Christian effort the congregation generally, and especially to the younger people not yet identified with Christian work.

The Session desire to repeat the observation of last year to the effect that there is still room for improvement in the matter of liberality to the Mission Schemes of the Church. This is an object to which all should deem it a privilege to contribute. The Church at large does not ask for anything unreasonable or impracticable in this connection, and if each one will do a little this year we can easily exceed the givings of former years. An average of one dollar per member would give us a goodly increase over the contributions of the year just closed.

Two of our members were taken from us to the Church above—Mrs. Hugh Francis and Mrs. James Hamilton. Of both we can speak in the language of comforting assurance. Mrs. Hamilton, in particular, bore, through years of suffering, a testimony of unspeakable value to the goodness of God and the

consolations of His Gospel Our prayer is that the mourners may share in the comforting grace which sustained these departed members.

REPORT OF TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.



TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF CALVIN CHURCH:

The report of the Temporal Committee for the year 1895 is as follows:

Thirteen meetings were held during the year.

All necessary repairs have been made to the church and manse property. As the building of the manse has been completed, we relieved the Manse Building Committee of their duties, and authorized Mr. Alexander Millar to continue to act as Treasurer of the Manse Building Fund.

We have contracted with the Electric Light Co. for 1896, at the same rate as for 1895, namely, \$100.00, the company agreeing to put two lamps outside of the main entrances to the church without any extra charge.

The Committee have had under consideration the renewing of the furnaces in the church, putting shutters on the manse, and putting inside windows on the church, and are of the opinion that we would save the cost of inside windows in fuel in three or four years at the most by doing so.

It is a matter of regret to us that the ordinary revenue has decreased about three and a-third per cent from what it was last year; but we are pleased to report that our expenditures have also decreased about ten per cent. as compared with last year; so that we are enabled to report a balance on hand of \$251.63 (as the report of the Treasurer will show) after all accounts are paid.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF CALVIN CHURCH, PEMBROKE.

In presenting the Sabbath School Report for the past year, we have pleasure in testifying to the good work done. As will be seen by the annexed report the average attendance of scholars and teachers has been good and the work faithfully performed. The teachers report that the lack of home preparation of the lessons by some members of their classes'un kes the teaching more difficult than it otherwise would be if parents would assist them by having the lessons prepared at home. We regret to report the collections for ordinary as well as mission schemes are not up to former years-especially to the Mission Fund on the first Sabbath in each month. The first Sabbath of this year (1896)we, took the voice of the school as to what should be done with the moneys given for missions during the year. The school proper was unanimous that it should go to support a pupil at Point aux Trembles as in former years, the cost of which is \$50. The Bible Class decided to give their monthly unission collection to Home Missions. If the Sabbath School proper fulfil their obligation to Point aux Trembles it will be necessary to increase the collection, and in this matter we would also respectfully ask the co-operation of parents and others interested.

At the beginning of the year we had 50 Active and 42 Associate members; now we have 51 Active and 20 Associate members. Although this shows an increase of but one Active member and a falling off in the Associate membership of 22, yet we have been much encouraged during the past year by the earnestness shown by the Active members in the performance of their various duties in connection with the Society, and the increase of interest taken in the prayer meetings, which have been held every week during the year.

Although our meetings are specially designed for young people, yet we want all, old and young, to come. The annual meeting of the congregation of Calvin Church, Pembroke, was held in the basement of the church on Wednesday evening, January 15th, at seven p. m.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises, conducted by the pastor.

The minutes of the last annual and special meetings were read and approved and signed by the chairman.
