The story goes that a dinner was being given at the Hongkong hotel by one of the men, who had been at the front, and who had apparently had considerable success as a loot collector. One of the guests, "overcome by the heat," passed the Admiral as he was being taken out of the hotel. When interrogated as to who had given the dinner the man's memory suddenly failed him. An examination was subsequently held on board ship, but still the information sought for was not forthcoming. Accordingly, in stead of the Barfleur men being allowed general leave on Christmas day, this privilege was curtailed.
