THE MOVEMENT FOR PLAYGROUNDS. (Bangor Commercial). Since the editorial on the need for public playgrounds was published in the Commercial of last Saturday, we have received two reports which give much information on the condition and uses of the playgrounds in Bangor for last year. One of these is the report of the board of commissioners on the public parks, while the other is the report of the superintendent of the public schools. The park department of Bangor gave over to the school board the entire control of 24 parks for the use of pupils as public playgrounds. These parks vary in size from one-fourth of an acre to that of 77 acres. Frank's Field, which is the largest playground in the Bangor park department. Sites of the various playgrounds are as follows: 14 and 18 acres respectively. On these parks all summer, but are flooded in winter. People enjoyed themselves on Saturday afternoon and on holidays, cheering and giving support to their friends, contestants in games. The expenditure for the parks and playgrounds in the city for the year 1907 was \$25,144.

The report says: "Additional playgrounds are needed and additional time to make more available those we now have. We call the attention of our public-spirited and benevolent fellow citizens to the enduring value of a present of a public playground to the city. No one could desire or obtain a better or more lasting monument than such a gift." We wish we had room to transfer to our pages what the special report of the committee of the Bangor school board has to say of the schoolyard playgrounds—what a revelation it is to the superintendent. Besides the 28 schoolyard playgrounds, the school committee also had charge of 24 public parks, portions of which were set aside for playgrounds. These playgrounds were located in the crowded centers of the city proper, South Bangor, East Bangor, Charlestown, Roxbury, Dorchester and Brighton. In addition, playgrounds were established in 15 parks, many of them equipped with apparatus, and all supplied with material useful in playground work. During the months of May and June the daily sessions were from 9.30 to 5.00 o'clock on each school day, and from 9 to 12 o'clock on Saturdays. During the months of July and August the daily sessions were from 9 o'clock to 5.00 o'clock, except on Saturdays afternoons. When the schools opened in September the playgrounds were again in use in summer—with a change of hours—and they are in use now.

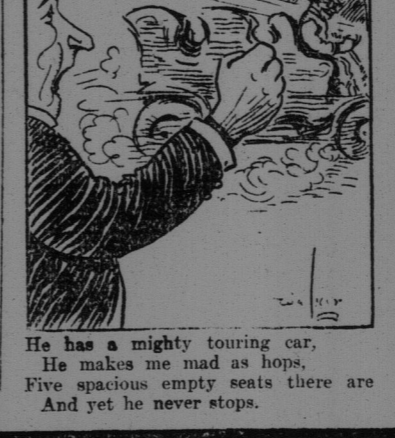
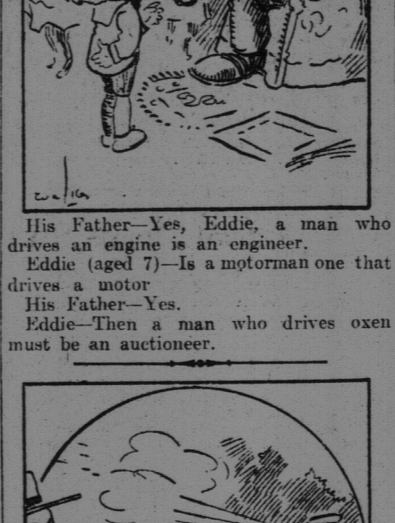
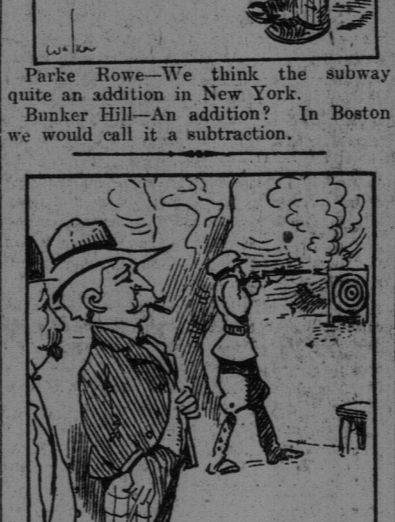
