CHICAGO, June 22.—An order for 1,-000,000 pounds of beef was received from the British war department in London yesterday by one of the large stockyard firms. 

# BETWEEN SEA MONSTERS

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his horaestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead.

Since churchmen ceased to be the schoolmasfers, scholars, statesmen, diplomatists, and general advisers of mankind, the materalization of international politics has everywhere impoverished the soil of Europe for the growth of pure religion. The actions of Britain are nominally governed by religious sanction, but, if the doctrine of the Sermon on the Mount were applied in practice to the spheres of administration at home and of diplomacy abroad, national credit, law, order, and Empire would collapse "instanter" like the Campanile at Venice. It is not our fault that we do not act on the principles of the religion that we profess. It is our destiny that we cannot but compromise.

The modern spirit is not irreligious, but it revolts against theological captolery no less than the Reformation kicked against spiritual coercion. 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


