AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.

Passed the 30th day of March, 1847.

WHEREAS, a number of persons have associated themselves under the name of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of Education, and have raised by private contribution sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said College, and the Collegiate School, at Windsor, connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and to manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly: that John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said society, and their successors, shall be and are hereby appointed a body, politic and corporate, in deed and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor, and by that name have succession and a common Seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity, and in all courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess, and enjoy, lands, tenements, hereditaments and rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also goods and chattles, and all other things real, personal and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same, as shall or may be thought necessary or proper; and also shall have from time to time and at all times full power, authority, and license to constitute, make and establish such Bye-Laws, Rules and Ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said society, the establishing of officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration, and

authority of the offices and officers of the society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the society, provided such Bye-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances, be not contrary and repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the Laws and Statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such Bye-Laws, Rules and Ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act; and provided, also, that the said society shall not hold at any time, lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattles, property or effects, of greater value than ten thousand pounds.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons paying an annual subscription of twenty shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of twenty pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said society, having been duly admitted, pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof, provided that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the society, and provided that no person now a member of the said society, or who, hereafter, may become a member of the same, shall, at any time hereafter, continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said society a donation of at least twenty pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of twenty shillings or upwards: and if such annual subscription, or payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a member of the said society, under some Bye-Law or Rule thereof.

III. And be it enacted that the said society shall be governed, and its affairs managed, by a committee of nine, comprising a President, Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other officers as the said society, from time to time may think proper.

IV. And provided and be it enacted, that John T. Twining, D.D. now the President of the said society, shall after the passing of this said Act, be the President of the said society; that the Hon. Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice-President of the said society, be the Vice-President of the said society, after the passing of this Act; that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary

and Treasurer of the said society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof, after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor, James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon, and Charles Twining, now the Managing committee of the said society, shall after the passing of this Act, be the executive committee of the said incorporated society, until an Executive committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted that all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiment, may be and at any time hereafter become members, of the said incorporated society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said incorporated society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof, any thing contained herein, or in any Rules, Regulations, or Bye-Laws of the said society, to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. And be it enacted that the said society, incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice-President, and executive committee, at some general meeting of the said society, by a majority of the members of the society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any Bye-Laws of the said society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VII. And be it enacted that the secretary and treasurer of the said society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the management of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the Bye-laws and Rules of the said society, to be passed by virtue hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted that all donations to the said incorporated society, to constitute life members or otherwise, of not less than twenty pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the executive committee as a permanent fund for the benefit of the said society, and that the funds of the said incorporated society shall from time to time, be laid out and applied by the executive committee in such way and for such purpose only as any general meeting of the said society may direct or appoint, and that the executive committee shall be bound and are hereby required annually to account to the society for all their acts, receipts, expenditures, and doing whatsoever, in the said office, and to make a report annually

to the said society, at its general meeting, of the progress and state of the said society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted that a general meeting of the said society shall be held once, that is to say some time within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or Bye-Law of said society.

X. And be it enacted, that the executive committee of the said society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.



BYE-LAWS

OF

The Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

PASSED AT A GENERAL MEETING HELD AT HALIFAX HOTEL, JUNE 27, 1948

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the association, upon giving seven days notice in the public papers, to call a special general meeting of the association, specifying the purposes for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts, and papers of the association shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the members, and the secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the association whenever required by the Committee.

III. That the treasurer and secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the incorporated society, shall be annually appointed by the executive committee.

IV. That at the annual meeting of the association, the president and vice-president shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI. That the funds of the association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lecturers, and one or more scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or

more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni professorships and scholarships respectively.

VII. That the association will scrupulously apply such donations as may be made to them, to such specific objects in aid of King's College, as may be directed by the donors respectively.

VIII. That all meetings of the incorporated society shall be opened with prayer.

IX. (*Passed at general meeting of June 21st, 1849.*) That the elections for members of the incorporation shall be by ballot.



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RULES AND REGULATIONS

PASSED AT DIFFERENT TIMES, AND NOW ORDERED TO BE PUBLISHED.

THAT no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or modifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting, be entertained by the executive committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.

That a corresponding committee of three residents in Windsor, or its neighborhood, the chairman whereof shall be, if possible, a member of the executive committee, be appointed to meet on the second Wednesday in every month, and at such other times as may be expedient, upon summons of the chairman, to confer with the officers of the College or Collegiate School upon any subject to be submitted to them either by such officers, or by the executive committee in Halifax, in reference to the College or School, and to report thereon to the executive committee.

A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members, or creating new offices or salaries.

No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate, unless he be authorised by a parish meeting.

All annual general meetings of this association shall be holden at Windsor.

That the treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.

All undergraduates, resident at College, shall be competent to compete for the prize or certificate for modern languages.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor, June 29, 1859, Dr. King moved the resolution, notice of which was given at the last annual meeting by the Rev. Dr. Twining, in reference to the mode of election of Governors, viz : that the present mode of voting for each individual separately and in alphabetical order be discontinued, and that the usual mode of putting all the names proposed on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected, should be adopted; which motion was seconded by Dr. Almon. After considerable discussion, Mr. A. M. Cochran moved in amendment that the following proviso be added: " Provided that no person

shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast." The amendment was seconded by Nepean Clarke, Esq., and carried. The original resolution of Rev. Dr. Twining, as amended by Mr. Cochran's proviso, then passed.

At the general meeting, October 17th, 1856, it was resolved, "That the right of voting by proxy be in no way interfered with."

The following resolution was passed at the general meeting, 24th June, 1857:

Resolved, That the ballot be not sent round for any officer of this association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of the persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor, June 27, 1860, the following resolution was proposed by Dr. Almon, seconded by Rev. Dr. Robertson, and passed:

Resolved, That a prize of £5 be given to the student passing the best examination for matriculation, in June next. The day of examination and other details to be settled by the President of the College.

At the annual meeting held June 25, 1862, this grant was discontinued from the want of funds.

At the same meeting the Rev. G. W. Hill moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Dr. Almon, and passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Associate Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the Incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them.

Rev. Professor Hensley moved the following resolution:

Whereas, The funds of this association are pledged, and consequently no funds are left for providing the alumni scholarship and the usual prizes.

Resolved, That honorary certificates be granted in the several departments instead of the prizes as heretofore. Which passed.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor on Wednesday, 28th June, 1865, the following resolution was proposed by A. M. Uniacke, Esq., D. C. L., seconded by Col. Poyntz, and passed:

Resolved, That any member of this society whose annual subscription shall remain and be unpaid for three years, shall cease to

be a member of this society, and can only be admitted as a new member by being proposed and seconded and duly elected pursuant to the bye-laws.

At the same meeting P. C. Hill, Esq., D. C. L., moved the following resolution, which was seconded by T. B. Akins, Esq., D. C. L., and passed:

Whereas, The present circumstances of the College call for increased efforts on the part of its friends to sustain its position and add to its efficiency.

Resolved, That the Committee of this Association be requested to prepare and circulate an appeal to the members of the Church throughout the Province, inviting them to make a vigorous and united effort to raise a sum not less than £500 per annum towards its support; and that the clergy be respectfully and earnestly requested to make collections in every parish of the diocese either by an annual sermon on behalf of the College, or in such other mode as may be deemed most expedient.

At the same meeting, the following resolution was proposed by Dr. Almon, M. A., seconded by J. C. Cogswell, Esq., D. C. L., and passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the Associated Alumni of King's College take the necessary steps to make the following amendment in the Act concerning the government of King's College, Windsor:—That no person shall be re-elected to the office of governor of King's College, Windsor, until he has been out of that office for at least eleven months.

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REPORT.

THE Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, have again the pleasure of meeting the members of the Incorporation at the accustomed time, and of presenting to them their Eighteenth Annual Report.

The object of these Reports is to furnish the members with a synopsis of the business that has been transacted during the year, and this your Committee will now endeavor briefly and succinctly to do.

As has been the case for the last three years, the position of affairs connected with the new collegiate buildings has been the principal matter which has engaged the attention of your Committee since the last Annual Meeting.

In their last Report, your Committee informed the Association that three months after the building had been handed over by the contractors as complete, they would be called upon to pay the sum of £405 12 0—to meet which they had no available funds; and they then endeavored earnestly to press upon the meeting the necessity for making some provision to meet the demand when it should arise.

Beyond the mere passing of a resolution authorizing the Committee to borrow the money, by pledging the funds of the Association, (which they had already unsuccessfully attempted to do,) nothing whatever was done to meet the emergency.

Matters remained in this position until, in January last, your Committee received a communication from the Rev. Geo. Hill, secretary of the Building Society, accompanied by a certificate from Prof. Hensley, to the effect that in his opinion the building was completed, and calling upon them to provide immediately for the balance due the contractor.

As this was the first official notification your Committee had received that the building had been completed, and no information whatever was given as to whether the terms of the agreement made with the contractor for the settlement of all disputes had been fulfilled, or whether a certificate to that effect from a competent person had been received; and feeling that they were entitled to receive three months notice before being called upon to pay any money—as agreed upon, the secretary was directed to call the attention of the Building Committee to these points, and to request to be furnished with the required information, which he did on the 30th January last.

No answer was received until the 7th March, when the secretary received a letter from the secretary of the Building Committee, which did not furnish the information sought for, but contained a peremptory demand for the immediate payment of the sum of £82 to the contractor, and the further sum of £200 to a member of that Committee, who, it was stated, had advanced the same to Mr. Lang.

It would seem that by the collection of a few outstanding subscriptions, the debt had been reduced from £405 to £282, since the last financial statement had been handed in.

As your Committee felt that they had no right to be thus suddenly called upon to meet heavy liabilities without having received the notice which had been distinctly agreed upon, and in the absence of any authentic certificate from a competent professional person that the work had been properly finished, the secretary was again directed to seek information upon the points mentioned in his first letter, and to remind the Building Committee that the Executive Committee expected to receive the proper notice of the building having been handed over by the contractor, which he did by letter dated 13th March last.

On the 3rd April another letter was received from Rev. Mr. Hill, which did not reply in any way to the queries contained in the secretary's two letters, but threatened that unless the balance alleged to be due the contractor was immediately paid, the matter would be placed in the hands of Mr. Ritchie.

The secretary was directed to state in reply, that until the information sought for in his previous letters was furnished, the Committee did not feel justified in taking any steps in the matter; and further, that when that was done, they would endeavor to meet any just claims that the Building Committee might have against them.

The next and last letter of the correspondence was one from J. W. Ritchie, Esq., as solicitor of the gentlemen composing the Building Committee, informing your Committee that he was instructed to prosecute the claim in a court of law unless the amount due the contractor was paid.

Except a personal interview between the President and Mr. Ritchie, no further step has been taken, and this is the position in which the matter now stands.

It appears from the Report of the secretary of the Building Committee, to which your Committee beg to refer, that there is now due the contractor the sum of \$1120.40. To meet this, the Building Committee have in hand the sum of \$227, which, together with \$40 uncollected subscriptions, will leave a balance of \$853.40, which is the amount your Committee will have to provide for.

It will be remembered, that at the last annual meeting, your committee referred to the position of the stock held by the Association in the Merchant's Bank of Boston, and sought for direction as to the withdrawal of dividends, which had been accumulating for some years, and the propriety of transferring the principal to some more eligible investment.

A resolution was passed, authorizing the withdrawal of the dividends, and a committee, consisting of the hon. M. B. Almon and A. M. Uniacke, Esq., appointed to arrange the transfer of the stock into such United States Government or State securities as they might deem most advantageous.

Acting upon the advice of these gentlemen, and in accordance with the above resolution, and also a resolution of this Committee, the President forwarded a power of Attorney to the cashier of the Merchant's Bank, Boston, empowering him to draw the dividends, and to sell the shares held by the Alumni in that institution, and

from the proceeds to purchase four thousand dollars Massachusetts State 5 per cent bonds, the dividends and principal of which are payable in gold.

This has been done, and the bank shares were sold at 108 $\frac{1}{4}$ nett 101 = \$4,320; and the Massachusetts State bonds purchased at 99 = \$3,960; and the treasurer has now in his hand Massachusetts State bonds to the amount of \$4,000, bearing 5 per cent. interest.

The dividends which had accumulated since October 1862 amounted to \$860, Nova Scotia currency; and the sum of \$270.56 was realized by the transfer of the stock—making in all \$1130.56. At the rate of exchange then current, these sums realized \$771.90 N. S. currency, which amount is now to the credit of the Association, as appears by the treasurer's account.

Your Committee are therefore in a better position than they were in last year to meet the demands made upon them by the Building Committee; and they respectfully recommend that the amount realized from the sale of dividends be appropriated towards paying the debt due upon the new building, and thus relieve your Committee of a responsibility which has caused them great anxiety and uneasiness for some time past.

In addition to the ordinary monthly meetings of your Committee, a special general meeting of the Alumni was called, on the 10th September, in compliance with a requisition from ten members of the Association, to take into consideration the financial condition of the college, and the propriety of making an alteration in the mode of electing the governors of the institution. At that meeting Dr. Almon proposed the following resolution: "That the Associated Alumni of King's College take the necessary steps to make the following amendments in the Act concerning the government of King's College, Windsor:

"First—That no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of King's College until he has been out of that office for at least eleven months.

"Secondly—The governors be required to submit, at the Annual General Meeting of the Associated Alumni, the minutes of all of their meetings during the collegiate year then ending."

After some discussion, an amendment moved by Dr. Hugh

Hartshorne to defer the consideration of the subject until the Annual General Meeting, passed; and it will be for this meeting to decide what action shall be taken in the matter.

The sum of \$400, realized by the transfer of Higgins' mortgage, which has been for some time on deposit receipt in the Bank of N. S., bearing interest at 4 per cent., has been during the past year invested in good real estate security in the Town of Dartmouth, yielding interest at 6 per cent. But it must be borne in mind that this interest is specially and solely appropriated by the donor towards the salary of a Professor.

The Treasurer's account on the 30th April last, the time prescribed by the bye-laws, exhibits a balance to the credit of the Association of \$950.

The immediate business for the consideration of this Society is the election of two Governors, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late hon. Judge Stewart, C. B., and in place of S. P. Fairbanks, Esq., who in the order of his election goes out of office, but who may be re-elected; and of a President and three members of the Executive Committee, in the place of Nepean Clarke, Esq., Dr. Gossip, Dr. Cowie, and Dr. Cogswell, who retire by rotation, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

FINAL REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE,

Submitted at the Annual Meeting, June 25th, 1865, and published by order.

HALIFAX, June 24, 1865.

THE Building Committee of King's College Hall and Library, beg leave to report, that since the last general meeting of the Associated Alumni, the contractor for erecting a building, to be held and used as a Hall, Library and Chapel, has put new window frames as proposed, replaced the slates (two or three being overlooked by the workmen) and pointed the masonry as required. The Committee found it necessary, for the preservation of the foundation, to remove a good deal of earth which was lying against it, and ordered this to be done, as also that the ground in front, on each side and in the rear should be levelled, and, finally, that a carriage road should be made. This work was done during the autumn of last year by contracts at an expense of \$100, and the Committee are fully satisfied with the manner in which it was performed.

The Committee very much regret that another contract for building a tower has not been fulfilled, but as this is entirely separate from the original contract and the expense of it wholly borne by the liberal donor whose name it bears, they deem it unnecessary to enter into particulars further than to say that they hope to have it completed, as far as possible, in the course of the present summer.

With regard to financial matters, the Committee have to announce that every sum subscribed in the list has been received (except one of \$40, which was only applied for a few days since, and no doubt will be paid immediately). The total amount, including a small sum of interest from money deposited in the Savings' Bank a few years ago, amounts to \$8896.75.

The sum to be paid Mr. Lang according to contract was \$9620.40. Of this sum he has been paid \$8500, leaving a balance due him of \$1120.40. To meet this sum we have in the Bank only \$227.09; the sum of \$169.66 having been expended in drainage, road, engineers' reports, &c., &c.

The Committee are exceedingly desirous that the accounts should be closed in order that they may formally hand the building over to the Governors, and feeling that it would be next to impossible to collect any further sum towards this particular object, they are compelled to fall back upon the agreement of the Associate Alumni to indemnify and save them from loss, and hereby request them to discharge the debt.

Of the \$1120.40 owing to Mr. Lang, the Chairman of the Committee many months since advanced \$800. The Committee feel it their duty to press the Alumni to reimburse him the money advanced to the contractor from his private purse.
