## NOTES AND NEWS.

### UNITED STATES.

The latest imposition at Niagara Falls is the enclosing all the ground along the river, on the American side, from which any one can obtain a view of the falls, and charging fifty cents admission to the inclosure.

A new style of restaurant is in successful operation in New York. The principal diet is milk and cream, with oatmeal, wheaten grits and kindred food. No liquors are sold, nor ale, nor wines, nor cigars, nor tobacco of any kind.

Considerable of the inventive ingenuity of the day is directed to the destruction of cats. A man in Washington is trying to devise a terrier dog that can run along the top of a fence and climb a tree, and succeeds in his unfeeling design the feline race is doomed.

A divorce case in St. Louis the other day took a very singular and mysterious turn. The respondent, a Mrs. Hill, testifies that it had been agreed by herself and the plaintiff that they would get a divorce they would marry again, anyhow. We shouldn't suppose that judge or jury would have much difficulty in disposing of such a case as that; but the ways of married people are really past finding out.

Since the selling of liquor has been strictly prohibited in Boston the dealers have sometimes to resort to peremptory measures to collect pay for drinks. Two men getting into a quarrel in a bar-room the other night about paying the bill, the proprietor just drew a pistol and shot them both by way of pressing on their minds that the little bill must be paid.

An old man eighty-five committed suicide at Smithville, New York, last Saturday. His domestic life, we are told, was full of trouble, and he couldn't stand it any longer. No wonder, poor man; he had had three wives and twenty-five children. Some of his numerous children looked on while he hung himself, and expressed his grief as low as the lowest.

Give us Boston for new notions. Now comes a Washington street shop keeper who offers to dispose of his stock of carpets and furniture, just as the piano and sewing machine dealers do, by a system of leasing on partial payments.

That is, they deliver goods, and make taking payments on account from time to time, and managing a final relinquishment of ownership when the account is closed. And they protest that the prices charged are as low as the lowest, and that the system carries with it its own protection.

Jack Hurley, telegraph operator, is in the Worcester (Mass.) jail for a little indiscretion, illustrating the peculiarity of his business. Jack was receiving in the Framingham office and once or twice had to seek Worcester to report on the wire.

Worcester did so, and volunteered the information that Framingham was full of whom it would be delightful to put a head. Straightway the wire from Framingham spoke, "It is coming," and, unable to wait for a passenger train, the impetuous messenger took a freight train presently arriving gave Worcester a great drubbing, for which he was imprisoned as above.

It is not safe to give unlimited orders for anything but you may get too much of it. Some years ago a firm of druggists in Cincinnati told an old fellow who supplied them with "roots and herbs" to send as much "sassafras" as he could get, and expensive article—as he could get. He tried in Kentucky and in his own country, and women and children he could get and stripped the woods of the region round about of this romantic herb, the druggists were astounded one day by a consignment of three tons of "sassafras" and a bill for \$5,000, which they refused to pay. The case has been in the courts for seven years, the sassafras was rotted away, and the root and herb vendor is a mere shadow of his former self.

Here is a curious story of the old state, very times, which we pick up from a Western Carolina newspaper. In the gold mining regions of Burke County lived an indolent man named Nancy Boyce. He was engaged to marry Jack, a slave, and in order to have everything pleasant, the put her hand in her pocket and bought him of his master. But she was shrewd enough to take a bill of sale of him, fortunately, as it happened, for Jack turned out to be utterly worthless, and a perfect sot. But little need was there for Nancy to go to the courts for relief by divorce. She had a better way than that. She owned her man, and the simply sold him to a slave dealer, who carried him off to the far South-west, so that the sharp Nancy was never bothered by him again. Her husband have been badly sold before, though not in this particular way.

GENERAL. Mr. Edward Lockroy, just elected to the French National Assembly, goes from jail to the Legislature, he having been imprisoned for abusive language addressed to the Assembly and published in the *Reppel*.
