

A PREPARATORY SERVICE on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbath's at 7, 30 p. m.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS for the poor are taken up on the FRIDAY EVENING and SABBATH MORNING, on every sacramental occasion, separate from, and unconnected with the envelope system.

The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE of the Missionary Association meets in Session Room, on the last Wednesday of every month at 7 p. m.

STATED MEETINGS of the Managers, are held in their room on the second Monday of every month at 8 p. m. and in the Church on the same evening at 7, 30, for the purpose of allocating pews.

The ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation is held on the third Wednesday of January.

MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS leaving the Church are requested to give notice to the managers, in order that their sittings may be again allocated.

WHEN members change their residence they should give notice either to the Pastor or the Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

# THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

## MANAGING COMMITTEE

# KNOX CHURCH,

In presenting this their THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT, the Managing Committee acknowledge with devout gratitude the goodness of God to the Congregation during the past year, for the measure of success that has attended all departments of the Congregational work and for the harmony and good feeling that have existed among its members and adherents.

By reference to the Treasurer's printed statement, it will be seen that the net revenue of the Congregation during the year amounted to \$5615 11 to which must be added the amount collected by the Sabbath School, amounting to \$261 52, making a total of \$5876 63. This is an increase of \$284 11 on the previous year's revenue, which in face of the hard times must be admitted to be satisfactory.

In last year's Report the Managers recommended the consolidation of the floating indebtedness of the Congregation and the adoption of a different system of raising the Revenue. Both these recommendations were adopted and took effect from April last.

The sum collected under the envelope system during the nine months it has been in operation averages about \$96 per Sabbath, this equals the expectations that were formed of the scheme when it was adopted, and the managers regard the system as having been successful, and confidently expect still more marked success during the ensuing year. There is one gratifying feature of the envelope system which should not be overlooked, that is that the Treasurer has been enabled to pay the pastor his stipend, and the church officers their salaries on the first day of every month, and the congregation enters the new year freed from all financial liabilities except its consolidated mortgage debt.

The committee beg to recommend to the congregation the formation of a fund for the extinction of this debt. The ordinary expenditure of the church is about \$5,000. No difficulty should be experienced in raising at least \$3,000, or say \$120 a sabbath. By investing this surplus even at 6 per cent., for five successive years, it would amount to a sum that would about pay off the whole mortgage debt. In order to set this \$1,000 free for this purpose, the committee are of opinion that the missionary organization which existed prior to the introduction of the envelope system should be revived, and that the sabbath day offerings of the congregation should be wholly devoted to defraying the annual expenses of the church, and the extinction of the debt.

loss they and the congregation have sustained in the death of JAMES WILLIAMSON, who was connected with the church so long, and who for many years was chairman of the committee. In his deep-felt, kindly, and zealous devotion to the interests of the congregation, he has left an example worthy of imitation by those who are left behind him.

JAMES HAMILTON was elected to fill Mr. Williamson's place, as manager. WILLIAM MARSHALL, who for so many years acted as manager, and whose services were so valuable as the efficient secretary of the Board, left the city during the year. The managers elected WM. FOREMAN to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of Mr. Marshall.

W. P. STURT owing to the nature of his duties, finds it impossible to act as manager, and his place has now to be filled by the congregation.

The managers whose term of office expires, are A. A. WYLLIE, MICHAEL BRENNAN, JAMES MCMENEMY, and C. J. WILLIAMS, these gentlemen are all eligible for re-election.

In conclusion the managers ask the Congregation to unite with them in asking the blessing of God on all the operations of the Church during the coming year.

## Address from the Session.

*To the Members of Knox Church Congregation.*

DEAR FRIENDS AND BRETHEREN,—As the time for our Annual Reports has again come around, we deem it right that you should be advised of the position of the Congregation in relation to the changes that have taken place during the year which has now been closed. Since 1st January last there has been added to our Communion Roll thirty-three by profession of their faith, and twenty-nine by certificate from other Churches, in all sixty-two, we have lost five by death, and by removals from the city and otherwise sixty-eight, leaving us at this date a bona-fide membership in full communion with the Church of four hundred and seventy-two, all as more fully set forth in a tabular statement hereunto subjoined and referred to. Three of our departed friends had arrived at a ripe old age, but we have to mourn the loss of two whose sun went down at noon, and the interesting family of one, and the widows of both have a claim on our deepest sympathy.

It is noteworthy that a large majority of those who have joined us last year by profession are the children of members of long standing in our own Church, and who have been trained in our own Sabbath School and Bible-classes. Since the commencement of last year there has been added to the Church by Baptism two adults and thirty-nine children of members, forty-one in all.

As a report from the Sabbath School will be printed along with your other reports, we need say nothing about it, except that we would embrace this opportunity of urging upon parents and guardians the necessity of punctual and regular attendance at School, and especially in the Bible

class, it is to this class we have to look for our young communicants, the lessons are generally taught in a series or chain, and it is obvious to every one, that when a pupil is absent a day, that pupil losses a link of the chain, and while this is disheartening to the teacher, it is an important loss to the learner. It will doubtless be remembered that in our address a year ago we had directed our attention to the practicability of doing profitably some mission work among some of the neglected of our city, and believing that from the Geographical position of Knox Church, the north-west portion of the city lying north of the Great Western Railway (where there are many of the lapsed classes of our community) naturally fell under our care, we procured a room at 315 James street, held meetings every Sabbath morning and Sabbath and Thursday evenings, attended to and presided over by our zealous and untiring Elder Mr. John Mc-Millan, assisted occasionally by some of our brother Elders and our Pastor attending on Thursday evenings as often as his other duties would permit, after persevering for over six months, it became evident, that although doing some good, our labours fell far short of effecting the principal object in view, namely, reclaiming the lapsed classes of the community; the class benefited being only those who could attend church and the parent Sabbath School; it was therefore considered better to abandon the scheme rather than to deprive the parent Sabbath School of the services of the bretheren engaged in the work, or to deprive the bretheren themselves of the services of the Sanctuary every Sabbath day. As to the spiritual condition of the congregation and its growth in grace, we would leave these to speak for themselves, you are all well aware that the glorious gospel of the blessed God is faithfully proclaimed from our pulpit every Sabbath day, and earnest appeals made to us

to accept the great salvation, and we believe that God will not suffer his word to return to him void, but will accomplish that which he pleases, and prosper in the thing whereunto he hath sent it. In fine dear friends and brethren, at the commencement of another year, we would commit and commend you all to God and to the word of His grace and unto Him that is able to keep us from falling and to present us faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God and our Saviour be glory and honor, dominion and power, now and for ever, AMEN.

## FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

## Inox Church Sabbath School,

—FOR THE—

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1879.

The Sabbath School Association beg leave to submit the following Report of their operations for the past year.

The average attendance for the year 1879, was 261 in all, as follows :—Girls, 129 ; Boys, 98 ; Female Teachers, 19 ; Male Teachers, 15. This we regret shows a slight decrease from the past year, which was 277, or a falling off in the total average attendance of 12. We would strongly urge parents and guardians to see that their children are sent to the Sabbath School, and let them take advantage of the instruction imparted to them, which tends so much to the formation for the christian in life, and we also hope for their eternal welfare.

The Psalmody of the Sabbath School is still conducted by our Precentor, Mr. JAMES JOHNSTON, and is still a prominent feature of the School, but if the scholars would attend promptly, say fifteen minutes to three o'clock, and take advantage of the instruction then imparted by our able leader, a very marked improvement would still be made in this very pleasant part of our service.

The Wednesday evenings, at the close of the prayer meetings, are still devoted to the study of the lessons for the coming sabbath, and under the guidance and instruction

of our worthy President, the Rev. JOHN JAMES, D. D., a most thorough knowledge of the lessons can be obtained, and we would earnestly recommend every teacher, as far as possible, to attend these meetings regularly, that they may not only receive the benefit themselves, but be enabled the better to impart the instruction to those under their care.

The Library of the Sabbath School not having had any new books added to it for the past year, and as most of the Scholars have read all of the books now in the Library, the teachers have found it very difficult in keeping up the interest of the children in the books at their disposal, so it was decided at a meeting of the Sabbath School Association, held in August, to close the Library, until an appeal be made to the congregation, at the Annual Meeting, to enable us to procure a new Library, which we trust may be liberally responded to, so that this important part of the Sabbath School work may not suffer; the number of volumes in the Library is 540, the number of pupils who made use of the Library is 265, of whom 183 are constant readers. During the year a number of volumes were donated to the Knox College Students Missionary Society, which were very gratefully received and acknowledged by the Society, and aided them materially in prosecuting their mission work.

The Treasurer reports the amount collected for the year to be \$258,92, to which add the interest on deposit \$2,60 or a total of \$261,52 being an increase of \$42,47 over the receipts of the previous year, the disbursements are as follows: Home Missions \$70,00: Our Own Mission \$19,09: Sabbath School Papers \$20,00: Hymn Books \$13,00: Catechisms \$13,60: Roll Books, Minute Book and Cards \$14,74: Schemes \$5,00: Expenses of Delegate to Sabbath School Convention 75 cts.; total \$156,18: leaving a balance on
