Downingville 13th May, 1835.

DEAR LOVING COUSIN SAM,
I got your letter to-day from uncle Ethan who told me he got it from Sir Gardner's teamster that had been down to Sackarap with a load of birch brooms and some yaller turnips. I coudn't make it all out and so got Master Jonson to read it to me after he came from Schule, he says you have improved in your writing and that what bothered me so much to make it out, according to your letter you think there is a good chance to make money in them Provinces, but I'll be darned if it comes up to Downingville yet, why Sol, the Land Speculation is enuff to make us all sick, you didn't hear that uncle Zeke had bonded his farm and all for the sake of the little patch of woods in the corner near cousin Josias, Abel Ketchum's older son Silas has gone in the speculation all holler has got a bond from his father of the alder swamp above the kearding machine, machine and all, in fact Downingville is all bonded and sold out, since I showed my letter they are all a hy for down east and they heard that some grate merchants were going to cut out a road to Woodstock and that the governor was going to give the lands for settlers and wood survey the road if the people would make it, uncle Ethan says he will take his team but them played down is too hy, the Deacon says he knows the Governor and them other folks would give them lands after the road is cut so poor folks can settle on them, aunt Serepta vows she will not go down east cause she lost her sassafras and socks arter taking so much pains to make em good, she was disappointed I tell you, she sent em to get money to pay the first payment on the bond from Abil Ketchum's farm; there is some hints about that she is consarned with Silas in the speculation.

Ruta Baga—Seedish Turnip—Lapland Turnip—different names applied to the same vegetable, was introduced into this country since the commencement of the present century and like most other innovations was frowned upon by the generality of our farmers. It soon however got into good company by the influence of Messrs. Lowell, Prince, Ruel, Derby and others, and maintains its standing among the more intelligent agriculturists in N. E. and the Northern States. Like other kinds of turnip it does better in the northern than in the southern sections of the Union. Our own State has produced greater crops than any other. There is nothing but a little enterprise and observation wanting to make it a most valuable acquisition to our stock growing community. Maine is destined to become one of the first if not the first state in the Union for Stock. We can never compete with other sections in grain; but we can become successful competitors in the different races of animals, and wool will

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During the past winter, an immense quantity of timber has been cut down in the woods of UPPER CANADA, and nearly the whole of it as well as what was left over from last year, has been successfully got out, and set afloat.
The amount of timber destined for the Quebec market will in all probability be more than has been seen for some years past. The high prices obtained last season appear to have encouraged one half of the Upper Canada merchants to embark in the business. We much fear that many of them are destined to meet with a serious check. The preparations for emigration on the other side of the ATLANTIC are not, so far as we can learn, on a

very great scale, and we need scarcely say, that should a small or even an averaged sized Fleet arrive this spring, freights will rise to such a height as to affect materially the prices of all descriptions of lumber.

THE PRESENT PARLIAMENT.
A Play upon Names.

The present House of Commons can hardly be considered a terrestrial paradise, yet it is certain that in it is Adam, to distinguish between good and evil. Hope, that comes to all, also comes to the present Parliament. A solitary Plant remains. There is a Wood, with a Forester, and it is adorned with a Lock and two Blackburnes, while to vary the scene, there are two Hills, a Cave and a Grate. The whole has several different Barings, and two Tyntes. On the middle ground stands a Hutt, (though with only one Diet) yet possessing a Locke, with Tupps, and Knox, a Wall and Dykes. The house is not deficient in Manners. How far its property may extend is not yet ascertained, but there are two Miles (one Long) North and East. There is a Kirk, with a Chaplin, Clerk, and a Bell. There may be seen peeping out occasionally a Rock, a Fox, a Pasty, Hanches, Martins, a Parrot, and a Heron. The prevailing colours are Brown, White, Grey, Green, Red, and Scarlet. There is a Barron with a Hall, a Baillie six Stevarts, a Tennant, one Guest, and a Butler. Those who like the member for Old-ham) are averse to potatoes and ardent spirits may feed upon Rice and Peas, or squeeze a Lemon without dread of Cookes. There are two Prices, but both are moderate. There is also a Hogg to be had when wanted, and two Bruers are provided for the thirsty. Various professions abound—A Miller, three Coopers, six Smiths, two Turners, a Cartwright, a Carter, a Potter and a Collier. A Chapman also walks the ground. Various nations and representatives—the Scotts, French, Fleming, and Jermyn, with different Folkes and Fellows. Three of them always continue Young, and never ceases to be Wilde—one is always Prime, another Wyse—one is Blunt, and one Sharpe. We have Hay all the year round, Mangles dividing every night—Cots above ground, a Leader following, two Walkers with one Strut, Peat quite free from the Orange, and other curiosities. The well known Joseph, is now of the Middlesex, for he here resists the Addresses of the King as well as those of the Queen. Wallace still fights with the English, in the midst of Gore, aided by two Powers; while Bruce is always Cumming. As a farther protection there is a Fort with a Trench, a Marshall, a Dannerman, and Speirs. A King presides—a faithful Shepherd—who has already been favored with two Grants, one honorable and the other right honorable.—Eng. Paper.

The Commissioner of Highways for the Town of Saint Andrews, begs to call the particular attention of all persons liable to perform Statute Labour, to the 22nd. Section of the late Road Act, which he has caused to be republished for their information as follows:—

XXII. And be it enacted, That if any person or persons when so notified to labour as aforesaid by the Surveyors of their respective Districts, shall neglect or refuse to appear and labour agreeably to such notice, and shall also neglect to pay the sum of two shillings and six pence for each days' labour as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of such Surveyor, within six days' after such neglect or refusal to make report of such delinquency to some one of the Commissioners, who shall without delay make complaint in their own names to a Justice of the Peace against every such delinquent; which Justice shall, on conviction, adjudge every such delinquent to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he has so neglected to appear and labour, together with costs of suit, to be levied by Warrant of distress and sale of such offender's goods and chattels, under the hand and seal of such Justice, directed to any Constable in the Town or Parish to which such offender may belong, and in case no goods or chattels can be found, it shall and may be lawful to commit such offender to the Common Gaol of the County for a space not exceeding Six Days; and if any person who shall appear agreeably to such notice, and being under the direction of such Surveyor, shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor; shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor, he is hereby empowered to dismiss such person from the work and shall forthwith make complaint against him to some one of the Commissioners, who shall immediately proceed against him in the same manner as is hereinbefore directed to be done against persons neglecting to appear and labour after being duly notified, and the person so dismissed by such Surveyor, for such delinquency, shall be adjudged to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he shall have neglected or refused to work to the satisfaction of such Surveyor, agreeably to such notice or be liable to imprisonment, not exceeding Six Days in the manner hereinbefore mentioned.

The due improvement of these, and other natural advantages, is capable of giving riches and every reasonable enjoyment to her present, and a vastly increasing population.

The importance of Agriculture to Canada, must be obvious to every one capable of forming a sound judgment on such matters. In Agriculture that must afford the direct supply of all her greatest wants. It must in this, and in every other country be the parent of Manufactures and Commerce, and the best means of promoting civilization and population; consequently it ever will be the most universal and useful of arts. In almost all nations, the most powerful individuals derive their wealth and consequence from their property in land, cultivated and managed by the husbandman.

Agriculture, therefore, and agriculture alone can support us without the help of others, in certain plenty and real dignity. While our ground is covered with corn, and cattle we can want for nothing. Manufactures and delicacies that we may require from without, Corn and Cattle, will purchase, if we will only raise them in abundance, and excellence.

From the importance of Agriculture and the great interest that is consequently felt on the subject, in the British Isles, and other countries of Europe, a varied and voluminous mass of knowledge has been accumulated, which would be most useful to every one who would wish to practice the art with success; himself, or understand when well practiced for him by others. To combine as far as practicable the knowledge of this knowledge which I conceive to be most useful and necessary for the study of the Canadian Agriculturist, is the object of the treatise which I have now nearly ready for the press, and the plan of which I submit with great deference to the consideration of all those engaged in the art. The sources from which I have made selections are the modern British and French Authors, of decided reputation and merit, with my own observations and experience, during my early years in the occupation of extensive farms in Ireland, chiefly as a Grazier, and for a period of nearly seventeen years that I have been a farmer in Canada. Several years of the latter period I have had the honor to be in the District and County of Montreal, Agricultural Society.

I propose to publish the work in four or five parts. The first part will give a short view of the origin, progress, and present state of Agriculture, among some of the ancient and modern nations particularly Great Britain, France, Flanders, the United States &c. I am aware the past state of Agriculture can do little to gratify the curiosity. Not so its present state, which is calculated both to excite our curiosity and affect our interests. There is probably no country which I shall refer to, that does not possess some animal or vegetable production, or pursue some mode of culture, or management, that might be beneficially introduced into Canada; but with the exception of the country I have named, and parts of Italy and Switzerland, there are no very interesting Reports of the Agriculture of other parts of Europe, with which I am acquainted at present. The second part will exhibit a concise view of the science of Agriculture, and the principles which govern the operations and results thereof are founded. The third, and remaining parts, will apply these principles to the practice of Agriculture, adapting them to the climate and other circumstances of Canada, and concluding with a few observations on the operations of the trade and commerce of this country in which farmers may be directly or indirectly interested.

Convinced as I feel, that the progress of Agriculture is the only riches that the people of this country can call their own, and which they never can be deprived of, it has often astonished me, that men of liberal education should, in general, appear so little to regard its improvement or prosperity—in fact, it is treated as a subject quite remote from the serious thoughts of all who are not immediately engaged in it. They, perhaps, cannot allow themselves to believe that Agriculture alone can furnish the means by which trade and commerce can be carried on successfully in Canada. I earnestly hope to induce all who may take the trouble of reading my book, to reflect on the subjects I shall submit for their consideration, and that they will join heartily in promoting necessary improvements, and thus advance the wealth and prosperity of the land of their birth, and of their choice.

As a work of this description cannot be published in English and French without incurring considerable expense, it would be necessary for me to have arduous subscribers as would incur my expenses.
