Downingville 13th May, 1835.

DEAR LOVING COUSIN SAM,

I got your letter to-day from uncle Ethan who told me he got it from Seth Gardner's teamster that had been down to Sackarap with a load of birch brooms and some yaller turnips. I coudn't make it all out and so got Master Jonson to read it to me arter he cum from Schule, he says you have improved in your riding and that what bothered me so much to make it out, according to your letter you think there is a good chance to make money in them Provincs, but I'll be darned if it comes up to Downingville yet, why Sol, the Land Speckelation is enuff to make us all sick, you didnt hear that uncle Zeke had bonded his farm and all for the sake of the little patch of woods in the furder corner next cousin Josias, Abel Ketchum's older son Silas has gone in the speckelation all holler has got a bond from his father of the alder swamp above the kearding machine, machine and all, in fact Downingville is all bonded and sold out, since I showed my letter they are all a by for down east and they heard that some grate merchants were going to cut out a road to Woodstock and that the governor was going to give the lands for settlers and wood survey the road if the people would make it, uncle Ethan says he will take his team but them played Josias is too by, the Deacon says he knows the Governor and them other folks would give them lands arter the road is cut so poor folks can settle on them, aunt Serepta vows she will not go down east cause she lost her sassaegers and socks arter taking so much pains to make em good, she was disappointed I tell you, she sent em to get money to pay the first payment on the bond from Abill Ketchum's farm; there is some hints about that she is consaried with Silas in the speckelation.

Downingville is all in a buz arter reading your letter about them are spruce trees, and mill priviledges are bewitching things I tell you, and uncle Ephrim says them are dooty on flower will cum off in spite of all the luxuries in the world, and them there whalers where they have so many men, uncle Zeke says they must eat as well as other folks and he thinks they will want potatoes and turnips and a great deal other sassa to carry with em, but the Major came along and said he would tell just what they wanted and so he pulled a single out of a bunch on Jonathan Bussills cart, and then he figured all over one side and then the tober side and took another wide single out of the top of the bunch, this made Jonathan mad and he swore he shudent have another, arter he figured all over the wide single, he give it and the tober one to Master Jonson to add up and next Saturday arter schule he will tell what it amounts too.

be our great staple, and hereafter supply factories, standing, where now is heard only the rushing of waters and hootings of the night birds!!!

Soil. Any soil suitable for corn will answer for the Ruta Baga. The greatest crops grown in the State were on what is called our rocky upland, such as is seen on all our hills free from ledge. A sandy or clayey loam answers very well, if not very light or stiff. The crop of H. Warren, now in this city, was grown in 1833 on rocky land, one fourth of an acre producing 375 bushels. That of Mr. Lane of Anson, 1834 same soil, 288 bushels on one fourth of an acre. My own in 1835, more than 1350 on an acre and a half and on a part of the field more than 1100 bushels per acre was in part on a light clay loam. Either of these crops is, I believe greater than any, for which a premium has been awarded, by the Mass. Ag. Society.

Seed Time in Maine. As soon as the season is suitable for planting corn, sow the turnip. If sown sooner, the garden flea will devour the leaf, before the third one starts and blights your hopes, it delayed much after the first of June, the crop will not attain maturity. A few rows, sowed the 25th June along side of some sown the latter part of May did not yield so much, by more than half.

Preparation of soil. If you cultivate on a stiff soil, plough 6 or 8 inches deep the fall previous. In the spring cart on 20 cords winter manure, not very coarse, to the acre, cross plough, 4 to 6 inches and harrow well. Sheep manure I have found better, than that from neat stock, I have grown 600 bushels to the acre on sandy loam by carting on the sward 6 carts manure and spreading it even, then ploughing 5 inches deep turning the sward as smooth as possible, and laying on the furrows 5 cords leached ashes, and harrowing length ways of the furrows. If the soil is quite wet, ridge by turning two furrows together with a horse plough, which will bring the rows a good distance from each other. The practice of riding on a dry soil is a bad one in this climate. I prefer spreading the manure because the fibrous roots run all over the ground in search of food, and if it is only given under the plant, they will not find so much, as if evenly distributed in the soil.

Sowing Seed.—Every cultivator in a large way, should have a drill, which may be made by a joiner for two or three dollars, and with which a man will plant cover and roll an acre in two hours.—About two and a half feet is a good distance for the rows apart in this climate. If sown so far apart that the plants do not wholly cover the ground, when grown the roots are not so large. The roof does best in moisture with shade. My general practice has been to sow the seeds in the drills where they are to grow. Some prefer transplanting, and I am not quite sure it is not as good a way. It saves one hoeing, which is as much work nearly, as to transplant, and the roots are more uniform in size. About one pound of seed is the right quantity to the acre—this will allow the insects a liberal supply and a chance to transplant into vacancies.

Subsequent Culture.—When the weeds begin to annoy the plants, which will be the case when they are six or eight inches high, give the first hoeing, avoid wounding the plants or hilling them up. Examine the field—and when you find the cut-worm has run his race, thin the plants, so that they may stand from 9 to 12 inches apart, and fill vacancies by transplanting, first twisting off all the large leaves from the plant. Not one in a hundred will fail. When the weed appears again, hoe. In general two hoeings are sufficient.

During the past winter, an immense quantity of timber has been cut down in the woods of UPPER CANADA, and nearly the whole of it as well as what was left over from last year, has been successfully got out, and set afloat.

The amount of timber destined for the Quebec market will in all probability be more than has been seen for some years past. The high prices obtained last season appear to have encouraged one half of the Upper Canada merchants to embark in the business. We much fear that many of them are destined to meet with a serious check. The preparations for emigration on the other side of the ATLANTIC are not, so far as we can learn, on a

very great scale, and we need scarcely say, that should a small or even an averaged sized Fleet arrive this spring, freights will rise to such a height as to affect materially the prices of all descriptions of lumber.

THE PRESENT PARLIAMENT.

A Play upon Names.
The present House of Commons can hardly be considered a terrestrial paradise, yet it is certain that in it is Adam, to distinguish between good and evil. Hope, that comes to all, also comes to the present Parliament. A solitary Planter remains. There is a Wood, with a Forester, and it is adorned with a Lock and two Blackburnes, while to vary the scene, there are two Hills, a Cave and a Grate. The whole has several different Barings, and two Tyntes. On the middle ground stands a Hutt, (though with only one Diect) yet possessing a Locke, with Tapps, and Knox, a Wall and Dykes. The house is not deficient in Manners. How far its property may extend is not yet ascertained, but there are two Miles (one Long North and East. There is a Kirk, with a Chaplin, Clerk, and a Bell. There may be seen peeping out occasionally a Rabcock, a For, a Pusey, Hancles, Martins, a Parrot, and a Heron. The prevailing colours are Brown, White, Grey, Green, Red, and Scarlet.—There is a Barron with a Hall, a Baillie six Stevarts, a Tennant, one Gust, and a Butler. Those who like the member for Old-ham are averse to potatoes and ardent spirits may feed upon Rice and Peas, or squeeze a Lemon without dread of Cookes. There are two Prices, but both are moderate. There is also a Hogg to be had when wanted, and two Bruers are provided for the thirsty. Various professions abound—A Miller, three Coopers, six Smiths, two Turners, a Cartwright, a Carter, a Potter and a Collier. A Chapman also walks the ground. Various nations and representatives—the Scotts, French, Fleming, and Jermy, with different Folkes and Fellows. Three of them always continue Young, and never ceases to be Wilde—one is always Prime, another Wyse—one is Blunt, and one Sharpe. We have Hay all the year round, Mangles dividing every night—the Cots above ground, a Leader following two Walkers with one Strat, Peel quite free from the Orange, and other curiosities. The well known Joseph, is now of the Middlesex, for he here resists the Addresses of the King as well as those of the Queen. Wallace still fights with the English, in the midst of Gore, aided by two Powers; while Bruce is always Cunning. As a farther protection there is a Fort with a Trench, a Marsholi, a Dannerman, and Speirs. A King presides—a faithful Shepherd—who has already been favored with two Grants, one honorable and the other right honorable.—Eng. Paper.

The Commissioner of Highways for the Town of Saint Andrews, begs to call the particular attention of all persons liable to perform Statute Labour, to the 22nd. Section of the late Road Act, which he has caused to be republished for their information as follows:—

XXII. And be it enacted, That if any person or persons when so notified to labour as aforesaid by the Surveyors of their respective Districts, shall neglect or refuse to appear and labour agreeably to such notice, and shall also neglect to pay the sum of two shillings and six pence for each days' labour as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of such Surveyor, within six days' after such neglect or refusal to make report of such delinquency to some one of the Commissioners, who shall without delay make complaint in their own names to a Justice of the Peace against every such delinquent; which Justice shall, on conviction, adjudge every such delinquent to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he has so neglected to appear and labour, together with costs of suit, to be levied by Warrant of distress and sale of such offender's goods and chattels, under the hand and seal of such Justice, directed to any Constable in the Town or Parish to which such offender may belong, and in case no goods or chattels can be found, it shall and may be lawful to commit such offender to the Common Gaol of the County for a space not exceeding Six Days; and if any person who shall appear agreeably to such notice, and being under the direction of such Surveyor, shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor; shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor, he is hereby empowered to dismiss such person from the work and shall forthwith make complaint against him to some one of the Commissioners, who shall immediately proceed against him in the same manner as is hereinbefore directed to be done against persons neglecting to appear and labour after being duly notified, and the person so dismissed by such Surveyor, for such delinquency, shall be adjudged to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he shall have neglected or refused to work to the satisfaction of such Surveyor, agreeably to such notice or be liable to imprisonment, not exceeding Six Days in the manner hereinbefore mentioned.

English News.

London, April 13. A feeling appears to prevail in the public mind that we have arrived at a stage of ordinary importance in our history. For some years two principles of government, each compatible with the other, have been contending for supremacy in almost every part of Europe—the principle of physical power on one side, and of intellectual power on the other.

But the gigantic growth to which intellectual power has attained recently in England, in consequence of the accelerated march of knowledge, and of the new facilities for acquiring it which it creates at every step it advances, has enabled opinion to combat against arms with miraculous success.

We have received the Paris Papers of Friday and Saturday, and those of Madrid of the 3d, with a letter from our Madrid Correspondent of that date.

The debate on the question of the American Claims has occupied the Chamber of Deputies already several days, and promises to be stormy and long. On the first day, the question itself was totally, and from the outset forgotten. The Duke of Fitzjames began by a violent diatribe against the Government and the system in power since July, 1830.

The original document was shown to the members, and must have proved a new and strong argument in favor of the treaty.

We have received Brussels and Dutch papers to the 11th and German papers to the 7th instant. The Brussels papers announce the announcement of the Queen of the Netherlands, who was safely delivered of a male child on Thursday evening.

This happy event is announced to commissioners of districts, the magistrates, and the towns, &c. by the Governor of the Province, and to the citizens of Brussels by the Burgomaster.

THE TITLE OF ASHBURTON.—The Barony of Ashburton, in the county of Devon, under which title Mr. ALEXANDER BARRING was originally conferred upon the celebrated lawyer, JOHN DUNNING, who married a daughter of JOHN DARRING, Esq. of Larkbeare, Devonshire, and sister of Sir Francis Baring, Bart.

THE LATE PRINCE AUGUSTUS OF PORTUGAL.—This young Prince was probably one of the richest individuals in Europe, his clear yearly income from his landed property in the Roman States and in Bavaria was above 618,000 guilders, or 2,690,000 sterling.

The Reverend the Presbytery of New Brunswick will meet in St. Andrews on Wednesday the 10th of June; the Rev. R. WILSON, A. M. Moderator. Divine service will be held in the Kirk on Thursday the 12th at noon.

REJOICINGS AT ST. GEORGE. In consequence of the expected announcement of the Part of MICACADAVIC being opened as a Port or Entry for dutiable goods, expectation was on tip-toe, and preparations making for some time to do honor to the occasion.

The official document having made its appearance, on the opening of the Custom House on Friday last much gratification was expressed at the handsome manner in which the officers of H. M. Customs at Saint Andrews had acted in forwarding the order in Council so promptly.

The Volunteer Artillery Corps, under Captain JOHN MOWAT, at one o'clock commencing firing a Royal Salute of 21 Guns, from the New Batters, "starting the slumbering echoes in their caves," and at sunset it was repeated.

A number of the Gentlemen of the Town, had provided a handsome Luncheon at Ruggles Hotel, which went off in excellent style.

The health of His Majesty was drank with great cheering, and an animated speech delivered by one of the gentlemen on the promptitude and liberality of the Home Government in attending to the wishes of the people of these Colonies.

Boundries and a general illumination of the village in the evening, closed the rejoicings, which throughout were conducted with the most praise worthy attention to decorum.
