"An Act respecting the Customs," that the importer of any cattle or swine may slaughter and cure and pack the same in bond, under such itsegulations and restrictions as the Governor in Council may from time to time make for this purpose.

And whereas it has been found expedient give effect to the said Section 58, in so far as regards the importation of swine, and to alter the terms of the Regulations for this purpose, adopted by Order in Council of 22nd of May, 1868:
His Excellency, on the recommendation of the donorable the Minister of Customs and underthe provisions of the said Act has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order inCouncil of the 22nd day of May, 1868, and the Regulations thereby establised be and the same are hereby repealed, and that the following Regulations be and are hereby adopted and established in lieu thereof—that is to say.

1 Upon the importation of swine for the purpose of slaughter, the Importer shall enter the same for Warehouse, upon the usual form of such entries, stating upon its face, the number and value of the herd, and also the quantity of pock bacon, hams and lard; which the ...mber tasts will produce when slaughtered and dressed at 113 pounds weight for each live hog so imported, and the amount of duty to which such produce i or may be liable under the rate prescribed by the tariff in force at the time being as the proper duty on meat of that kind. Such Importer shall them execute a bond to the Queen, in double the mount of such duty, the condition of which bond shall be, that upon the due exportation within one year of the said products of the swine so ir, ported and converted into pork, bacon, hams and lard, or pa ment of the duty secund by the said hond, then the sald bond shall be and become na ard void, otherwise shall remain in full force and virtue.
