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CRIMSON AND GOLD

Beautiful as are the Canadian woods when the fresh green of spring clothes them and when they are in the full glory of their summer foliage, it is in the fall, when the crimson and gold are blazing in the forests, and when the hills are covered with a carpet of many-colored, low-growing reeders and grasses, that their full loveliness is apparent. At this season of the year it is worth while to go out, away from the town, and climb to the top of the mountains that overlook a wide expanse of the Valley. From practically any of the mountains a view can be obtained of the Annapolis Valley, which is a riot of color these autumn days.

It was no doubt the wonderful color of the maple leaves in the fall, as well as their beautiful summer green, that made Canadians choose the maple leaf as their emblem, for its "foliage" as well as for its place as one of the most noteworthy trees of Canada.

Dean Howe, of the department of forestry in the university of Toronto, states that the coloration of the woods is not due to the effect of frost, as is generally supposed. "In fact," he says, "we have our most brilliant coloration in the seasons when we do not have frosts early."

"The requirements are warm days and cool nights. The leaf manufactures in the warm days more sugar than can be transported. The transportation of the sugar from the leaves to other parts of the tree requires a comparatively high temperature. When the nights are cool, the excess of sugar accumulates in the veins of the leaf. This excess sugar, in the presence of tannic acid, which is a natural ingredient of all plant cells, forms the anthocyanins. These are of various colors, mostly some shade of red. This material is in solution in the water of the cell sap. You know the green coloring matter of a leaf is enclosed within the small protoplasmic bodies. These bodies also contain yellow coloring matter."

"When the leaf begins to die in the fall, there is a retardation and finally a cessation in the formation of the green coloring matter. The yellow coloring matter, which has been there all the time. That is the reason that leaves turn yellow. These same maple leaves, if they are killed by a hard frost, will turn yellow before they die."

IT'S COMING—AS USUAL WITH A RUSH

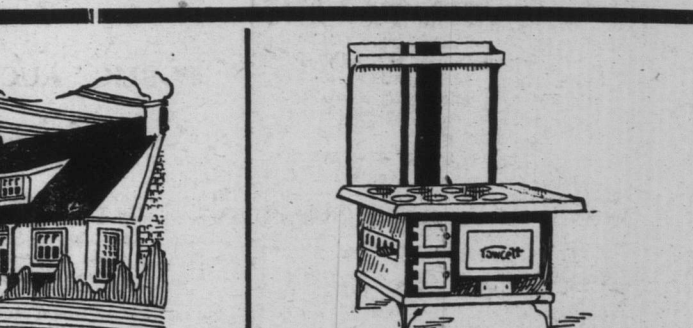
