



Replying to Mr. Puttee, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the matter of extending aid to the famine-stricken districts of India is under consideration by the

Before the orders of the day were salled, Mr. Gilmour (East Middlesex) called attention to the famine in India. He read a resolution passed at a meeting held in his constituency, expressing regret that the war in South Africa had so engrossed attention that the most terrible famine that has ever occurred in India had not received that attention which it ought, and urging that the government undertake the re-sponsibility of forwarding assistance in money and in kind to the distressed



Heading for Canada.

The Montreal from Detroit, "Thousands Coming which has been received from Toledo. announcing the wholesale departure of settlers from that neighborhood for the Canadian Northwest. "The movement," the dispatch adds, "is an assured fact, and so soon as the delecates return to make their report, the colonists will leave for their far Northwest homes. In Toledo and vicinity, 162 heads of families have signified their intention of going, making in all about 600 people, who will emigrate from Northwestern Ohio. The new colony will consist altogether of about 2,500 or 3,000 person from Eastern Indiana, Southern Michigan, Western Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Tennessee, and from several different parts of Ohio." From Port Arthur, there is a telegram chronicling the passing per cent in ten years. through there of twelve immigrants. representing twenty families, who, with five carloads of settlers' effects and \$20,0000 worth of stock, are on their way to Slate River Valley, to engage in mixed farming. There is the further announcement that Mr. M. V. McNnnes, Michigan agent of the Canadian Government, has just shipped 108 settlers and ten carloads of stock for Manitoba, and the year's arrivals

are but beginning. The new era in Canada inaugurated three and a half years ago, is thus bearing good fruit. The outlook for the Dominion is so bright all along the line that newcomers are crossing the border to seek homes with us.

The floods have been worse than ever before known.

Toronto Machinists Asking Better Terms-Agitation Elsewhere.

TEACHERS TAUGHT

Cutario Educational Association Members Exchange Opinions.

Toronto, April 19 .- At the meeting of the public and high school trustees' department, an interesting discussion arose over the mode of enforcement of the truancy law. It was found that there was a great diversity of opinion as to the manner in while police officers

carried out the requests of the trustees.
The subject of promotion examinations created stirring discussion. Some trustees wanted no final examination, but that the teachers' judgment be accepted; others wanted weekly examination without a final test; some urged a quarterly examination, the marks obtained during the tained during the year to be accepted in making promotions. The weekly examination proposed was indersed.

At the meeting of the inspectors' section, Inspector Chapman, of Toronto.

urged improvement of grounds, buildings and equipment, larger play areas cities, with more attention to physical training and demestic science.

Several important changes in the law are being asked by the kindergarten section. One recommendation fixes the minimum age of admission for students to kindergarten training at 18 years. Other recommendations were that the standard for admission should be a second-class certificate or its equivalent, and that assistants' certificates should be limited to two years, Miss McIntyre reported that she had education on these points, and that he had expressed himself as being favof the kindergarten section are: President, Miss Edith Anning. In the Modern Language Association section, the Bible-in-the-schools case was presented by Messrs. Wetherell, of was presented by Messrs. Wetherell, of Strathroy, and A. W. Wright, of Galt, the latter declaring that the state should at once undertake the duty of giving Biblical instruction. The whole Bible should be the text-book supplemented perhaps by an outline of Hebrew history. The first 20 minutes in both public and high schools should be devoted to this study. The school law devoted to this study. The school law, as it stood, would permit of the innovation, all that required change being the departmental regulations in a few

particulars.

A resolution to this effect was adopted: "That it was desirable to have the Bible studied in the schools, which are under the control of the educational department, and that the matter be referred to the other sections of the Educational Association."
