Disastrous Fire in a New York Sweater Shop.

Some 250 Employes Make a Mad Rush to Escape.

Three Persons Killed Outright and Many Injured. The Fire Escape Becomes Blocked-Ter-

rible Scenes

New York, June 13.—The six-story building filled with "sweater shops" at Nos. 10 and 12 Mongomery street caught fire at \$5.30 o'clock this morning, and in the mad rush of the 250 sonls working there at the time to the street, several were killed and many injured.

Before the firemen arrived the whole front of the building was alive with men and women. Flames and smoke were issuing from almost every window. Women were shricking wildly, while the people below in the street shouted to them to jump. One would make an attempt to go down the fire escape through a manhole when a dozen would pull him back. The ladder had not been lowered from the first floor to the ground from the fire escape, and there was a blockade. Some girls had lowered themselves through the manhole by their hands and dropped to the street without sustaining any great injury. After awhile the unfortunates began to poorthrough the manhole, one on top of another. They fell on one another as they alighted on the ground and were at times piled three and four deep. From the first floors many of the inmates jumped to the pavement.

A FLAMING FURNACE.

The bursting of the flames through the windows of the second and third floors is described by those who saw it as resembling an explosion, except that there wasno report. The firemen said there was probably benzine in the shops and that when the flames reached it, or the vapor from it, it caused a burst of fire similar ro'an oil explosion. The flames shot half way across the streets. After an hour's hard work the firemen succeeded in extinguishing the fire. The building was a new one, 30x50 feet, rising above the buildings on either side oi it. It was owned by Solomon Altor. Several persons who were on the spot said they had seen men and women fall back into the flames. The firemen made a thorough search, but no bodies were found. The induction and installation of Rev. The induction and instanction of tev-Wm. H. A. Claris as paster of the Southern Congregational Church took place this evening in the church, Horton street. The chairman then stated the object of the meeting and called upon Mr. Cannom, one of the deacons, who made a statement respecting the action of the church in calling Rev. Mr. Claris, of Frome, who on being called upon gave an account of his call to the ministry. When but a babe in his, mother's arms she had prayed for film that God would use him in the ministry, and when in subsequent years the Lord opened up his way he gave himself to this work. He was willing to take any place however humble. He went to Sarnia, where he lalored for thirteen years; then, after he spent seven years in Frome, the home of his childhood, when the call came from London, he sought help of God, and though obstacles were in the way, he felt he was called to this work, and he accepted the invitation in dependence upon God, and felt confident that there would follow the blessing of heaven and that they would have "good success."

3. It was by the study of God's word and faith, prayer and obedience, that men then grew in grace; in that way they grow in

grace now.

4. The Master and his apostles were consecrated; so are ministers of the gospel to be consecrated.

5. The Master and his disciples were full of hope; so do you have hope in God and in

your work.

6. The apostles were loyal to the churches they planted and served; so be you loyal to

they planted and sorved; so be you loyal to your people.

Rev. E. D. Silcox, of Embro, then offered the prayer of installation, after which he gave the charge to the people. He was glad to be present, inasmuch as he and Mr. Claris had been boys together in the same day school, Sunday school and church. Mr. Claris had married his cousin and he had married Mr. Claris sister.

A TRACIC DEATH.

Conductor John Turnbull Suddenly Killed at Windsor.

Both Legs Cut Off by a Yard Engine-Death Results in Ten Minutes-A Highly-Esteemed Conductor -His Railroad Career,

Conductor John Turnbull is dead. His

Conductor John Turnbull is dead. His death was a most tragic affair. He lett here this morning at 5:30 on No. 1 express, and in less than iour hours he was ushered into eternity. The Detroit train had just arrived in Windsor, where he was waiting with his train for the ferry. He was standing near the slip-dock explaining to Engineer John McFadden, of this city, how he had missed connections, when a yard engine came along and struck him, hurling him under the wheels and cutting both legs off at the knees. With a groan he exclaimed, "Oh! my God, Jack!" Ten minutes later be died.

There was no man running on the G. T. R. who was held in greater esteem by his fellow-workmen than Conductor John Turnbull, and the greatest regret is expressed at the sad occurrence. During the last nine years he has been on the main line. For three years previous he was station agent here, and was succeeded by Mr. John A. McHarg. When the change of position took place he moved with his wife and family to Windsor, where he has has since resided and where he was universally esteemed. Before he became station agent here he ran on the main line as conductor. His railroad career extended over a period of about twenty years. He was about 45 years of age. His courteous and obliging disposition won for him the respect of the traveling public.

Deceased was married about seventeen years ago to a daughter of the late David Porteous, of this city. His family consisted of three sons and one daughter, the oldest of whom is about 15 years of age. The greatest sympathy is felt for the bereaved wife and children. Wm. Turnbull, a brother of deceased, resides in Calgary, N. W. T. Another brother, Andrew, a former G. T. R. conductor, was killed in an accident on the road about 8 years ago. Deceased's family is loft well provided for the base several thousand dollare of

a former G. T. R. conductor, was killed in an accident on the road about S years ago. Deceased's family is left well provided for as he had several thousand dollare of insurance on his life. He was a member of the Canadian Order of Choson Friends, in which he carried \$2,000 insurance, besides \$3,000 in London Council, Royal Arcanum. He also was a member of St. John's Lodge, No. 20, A., F. and A., and of the Order of Railroad Conductors.

An Associated Press dispatch from Windsor describes the tragedy and says: "Although the engineer on the engine which struck Turnbull and a brakeman who was near both called to them, Turnbull'sengineer managed to get out of the way in time to save himself but Turnbull was not so fortunate. He was struck by the engine and knocked under the wheels, which passed over him, cutting off both legs near the body and mutilating him in a fearful manner. He only lived about fifteen minutes after the accident. The body was promptly conveyed to Drake & Joyce's, undertakers, where it now lies awaiting the decision of where it now lies awaiting the decision of the authorities and relations. He had lived here fitteen years and was widely known and universally respected.

Ricc first introduced this fantastic character to the stage it made a great impression on young troduced this fantastic character to the stage it made a great impression on young Jefferson, and day and night he was dancing Jim Crow. About this time Rice had a benefit, and, having seen the boy do his imitation, insisted that he should appear in his benefit. Jefferson was rigged out as a complete miniature likeness of the original, and Rice carried him in a bag on his shoulders. This innovation was not down on the bills, and when Rice had sung the first stanza of the song he turned the bag upside down and emptied Jefferson out head first before the eyes of the astonished audience. "Imagine the seene," said Mr. Jefferson. "Rice was six feet high and I was 4 years of age, and as we stood there dressed exactly alike th audience roared with laughter. Rice an I sang alternate verses, and as the excite ment increased showers of pennics were thrown from the pit and gallery. When it was over \$24 was picked up and placed in my hands. The picture of the tall comedian and myself before the astonished audience is one of the most vivid recollections I have of my past life."



TRACTION OF THE TONGUE.

New Method for Restoring Persons Apparently Drowned.

New Method for Restering Persons Apparently Drewned.

Any method which promises success in cases of asphyxia due to submersion, or in cases of asphyxia due to submersion, or in cases of apparent death, is worthy of a careful trial, more especially when this method has proved efficacious both in the physiological laboratory and in actual cases of drowning. A new method, the general principle of which is indicated by its name, "the traction of the tongue," has been introduced by Prof. J. V. Laborde, of Paris. It is exceedingly simple, and, according to the Courier-Journal, has been attended with striking results. In a person who has been long immersed in water, or otherwise asphyxiated, it suffices to seize the tip of the tongue and pull upon the tongue rhythmically so as to cause rhythmical traction in limitation of the respiratory rhythm. The process should be kept up for a long time. If it is successful the person gives a deep sigh—and sometimes voniting occurs—and after that, if the traction be continued, respiration is usually speedly restored. Prof. Laborde has had occasion to employ the process and with almost invariable success in cases of apparent death from drowning, and Dr. Billot has obtained excellent results in testing its efficacy in cases of sewer-gas poisoning. The process has been used by Prof. Laborde for some time in cases of apparent death under the action of chloroform in the cases of animals operated on in the laboratory. It is enough for the public to know that the method is effective, but the learned doctors are still fighting as to its rationale. 


