NEW YORK, June 13.—The six-story building filled with "sweater shops" Nos. 10 and 12 Montgomery street caught fire at 8:30 o'clock this morning, and in the mad rush of the 250 souls working there at the time to the street, several were killed and many injured.

Before the firemen arrived the whole front of the building was alive with men and women. Flames and smoke were issuing from every window. Women were shrieking wildly, while the people below in the street shouted to them to jump.

A TRAGIC DEATH.

Conductor John Turnbull Suddenly Killed at Windsor.

Both Legs Cut Off by a Yard Engine—Death Results in Ten Minutes—A Highly-Esteemed Conductor—His Railroad Career.

THE W. C. T. U.

An Interesting Monthly Meeting—Gratifying Reports—Mapping Out Work.

The usual monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U. was held yesterday afternoon.

Several of the members being a few minutes late the president reminded them that the meeting was opened at 3 p.m. "standard time."

After devotional exercises Rev. W. Rigby gave an instructive half-hour Bible lesson.

The ladies heartily appreciate the kindness of the ministers who have thus far been called upon to assist in this matter.

One new honorary member was nominated. It was decided that the union should donate \$10 to Joe Heas, the well-known temperance worker, who has been very ill and is in straitened circumstances.

Maria Cosford, 25 Cathcart street was appointed to receive private subscription to this fund for so worthy an object.

Reports of superintendents were given. The evangelistic committee reported steady work in the distribution of literature, call upon the sick and in many cases relief given.

Owing to the number of religious meetings already being held in Queen's Park on the Sabbath, the committee have decided not to hold a series of gospel temperance meetings as in the past, but will distribute literature every Sabbath and intend holding two mass meetings during the summer.

The superintendent of franchise reported active work being done, as did also the committee on temperance in Sunday schools.

Emergent efforts are being made to have temperance teaching occupy a more prominent place than heretofore in the Sabbath schools.

Also the committee is negotiating with the Y. P. S. C. E. and Epworth Leagues of the city, that the subjects may receive their regular attention.

They feel greatly encouraged as their efforts have received a hearty response from nearly every quarter.

The Band of Hope was closed for the summer on April 27, with an entertainment of a most interesting character, recitations and singing by the boys, distribution of prizes, and best of all a plentiful supply of cakes and coffee.

Steps are being taken to look after the boys during the summer months, with the hope that more efficient work may be accomplished among them in the coming season.

The Industrial School also closed on June 3 after an eight months' session. The usual annual picnic was held in Queen's Park, 82 children and 13 teachers enjoying it.

The committee wish to express their thanks to the many patrons of this school for the efficient aid they have given, and which has greatly helped towards the success they have had during the past year.

Other reports were given, such as narcotics, hospital, jail, literature, press, Woman's Journal, and petitions, each one showing faithful, honest effort.

The reading of the reports was interspersed with "News from the Field," given by Mrs. Thornley, and contained items of information from different localities regarding temperance movements.

It was announced that the next meeting, to be held on June 27, would be one of more than usual interest. The Bible reading will be given by Rev. Mr. Sage, of London West.

After a short business session four young ladies from the W. C. T. U. will conduct a debate on the question, "Should the Dominion Government prohibit the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage?" A large attendance is expected. Not only members but friends of temperance are invited.

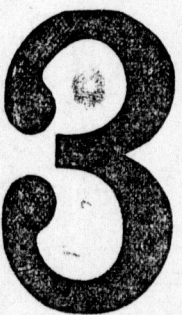

ROTHWELL. A good time is anticipated at the Thorncliffe strawberry festival on Tuesday evening, June 20.

LAMBTON. Early Sunday morning burglars entered the store of Charles A. Wenio, grocer, Christian street, Sarnia, by a coal hatch, and got into the furnace and pried open the door leading up to the store. They secured about \$12 in silver.

MIDDLESEX. The other forenoon a very pleasant and quiet event took place at the home of John Carmichael, of con. 9, Lobo, when his second daughter, Belle A. E., was united in marriage to Angus O. Gray, of con. 1, Iowa, U. S. A. Rev. J. M. Smith, of Poplar Hill, officiating. The bridegroom is a Lobo boy, who is making his mark and his fortune among our southern neighbors.

AN Avon correspondent writes: Mrs. Pullin, wife of Andrew Pullin and a former resident of this place, died on Friday at her daughter's at Salford. She was buried on Sunday. She leaves eight children and a husband to mourn her loss. The husband has been blind for a number of years and was dependent on her, which will make it doubly hard for him.

NEIL McNeil, of Ekfrid, had his leg broken by a fall. His term was extended by the breaking of his right leg, and Mr. McNeil was thrown from the wagon, fracturing his leg at the ankle.

PERTH. Johnston Abraham, a resident of Stratford for 30 years, is dead. He was a prominent merchant and ex-councillor.

BERT Edwards, a young man in the employ of Reeve Smith, of Downs, assisted at a barn raising on David White's farm near Avonport Saturday. The timbers fell and crushed him badly. He may never recover the use of his leg.

W. D. McKim, a Downie farmer, was badly gored by one of his bulls the other day on the St. Marys road. But for assistance he would have been killed. He was seriously injured.

A boy of about 17, named Wm. Rattray, was found in Dupree's bush, just outside of Stratford, Monday, suffering from a shot from a revolver. The ball entered his side, and at last he succumbed to his wounds. The doctors have hope of his recovery unless complications set in. How the wound was inflicted has not been learned as yet. Rattray works in a furniture factory in Stratford and his friends reside in Clinton.

WELLINGTON. An inquest was held on Saturday before Coroner McNaughton, of Erin, on the remains of a child found in a stone creak in the premises of Mrs. Harper, near Hillsburg, rented by Mr. Bingham. The jury found that the evidence that the remains were those of an infant child which had arrived at full term, and that they had been placed there manifestly to conceal the birth, if not for a more serious purpose by some person or persons unknown.

Rivers, is a most expert writer of tender missives, and for some years she has made a good income, thanks to this accomplishment. It was her wont to severance her abstruse in the various matrimonial papers published throughout the country.

Having opened a correspondence with all the lonesome swains who answered her advertisements, Miss Waters or Miss Rivers would proceed to work them into a fine frenzy to love through the mails. When they had reached the proper stage, she would accept the proposition to marry which was always made, and agree to join the seeker after her hand at his home.

But, in order to do this, she informed her admirers she would have to ask them to send her enough money to pay her traveling and incidental expenses, as she was a "poor girl." After a remittance for the expenses came her love would chill at once, and no subsequent letters would be answered.

The postoffice authorities have been receiving complaints from disappointed lovers for some time. Among the latest complainants was Morris Fix, of Hallock, Minn. He had sent the woman \$50.

Postoffice inspectors James got all the letters sent to Fix. They were all signed "Jessie E. Rivers," and had been written from 588 Lansing street, Albany.

Friday Inspector James, assisted by Inspector Kyle, went to Albany, and yesterday they arrested the woman. She is 28 years old, short and brunette. Though very good-looking herself, she was in the habit of making doubly sure of catching her victims by sending pictures of professional beauties and actresses, which she represented as "good photographs" of herself.

She had opened a room at the city street address and also from 76 Herkimer street, in Albany.

In the letters to Fix she addressed him as "My Own Dear," "My Darling" and "My Dearest Friend." After getting the "traveling expenses" to Hallock, which she met him in order to get married, she wrote asking for a "little additional money with which to buy a trunk and a pair of shoes, and a few other small things needed by a woman under the circumstances."

Rosco C. Dolson was found sitting in front of a store window in Detroit in a grievously ill condition at 1 o'clock on Sunday morning. In response to his appeal, he was rushed to the hospital, but he died there at 9 o'clock.

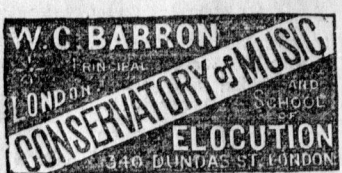
