In refusing to discharge Rudolph Beraulk, a military prisoner, held at Toronto, and in making the conditional remand absolute, Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, whose home is in this city, is reported by the Canadian Press to have said yesterday:

"It should be plain to everyone that in the stress and danger to the life of any nation at war, the courts chould be exceedingly careful not to hamper the actions of those expressly charged with the safety of the nation, careful among other things

not to take up the time and attention of those who should be fighting the enemy in the field, in fighting lawsuits in the law courts over private rights.

"It is not a time when the prisoner is to have the benefit of the doubt, it is a time when in all things, great and small, the country must have every possible advantage, WHEN IT MUST BE THE GENERAL SAFETY FIRST IN ALL THINGS ALWAYS, until the final victory is won, even though individuals may suffer meanwhile.

"Private wrongs can be righted then, while final defeat would not only prevent that, but bring untold

Judge Coatsworth his connection with the German army. In reporting the case the Toronto Mail and Empire of this morning has the following to say:

"The only evidence taken in the police court was that of Arthur Zirzow, the German lieutenant whom Mr. Nerlich is alleged to have aided. He said that he had met Mr. Nerlich at his office, at his home, and at the German Club, and that on one occasion Mr. Nerlich had given him \$10 to pay some debts he had incurred. He said he had also received \$20 from Mr. Peters. He said that he had obtained an exeat from Judge Coatsworth by telling him that he was not a German soldier. It was on that day that he went to see Mr. Nerlich and showed him the exeat he had received. On subsequent occasions he had spoken about returning to Germany, and had spoken about which way he wanted to go. This was at Mr. Nerlich's home, and he was under the impression that both Mr. and Mrs. Nerlich were present. GERMAN BODIES STREWN OVER THREE WHOLE TOWNS

Enemy Made Five Attempts To Capture Town of Bethune, All Unsuccessful-Attack Was Planned By Kaiser Himself.

PARIS, Jan. 28.—6:05 p.m.—After having concentrated large forces between La Bassee and Festubert, says a Havas Agency dispatch from Saint Omer under date of January 25, the Germans attempted to break through the lines of the Allies in an effort to capture Bethune. The attack was commenced early in the morning, the infantry being supported by artillery and armored trains. Five attempts were made but they were all unsuccessful. The Germans even went

Have the stories of Belgian atrocities been exaggerated? Last night, in the Masonic Temple, under the auspices of the Arts Club, Monsieur Yzeux, a lawyer of Antwerp, and an eye-witness of the horrors of

One of the Greatest Blessings Bestowed Upon Humanity, Says D. C. McGregor.

"Parental Delinquency" formed the subejct of a most impressive appeal for a more ideal home life, for homes where a more ideal home life, for homes where the boys and girls would delight to spend their evenings, and where they could entertain their friends in harmless recreation, and for more united sympathy between husband and wife, delivered last night by Rev. D. C. McGregor, before the Union Mothers' Clubs of the city in Aleyandra School. Mrs. of the city, in Alexandra School. Mrs. B. White presided over the large

gathering.
Trend of the Times. The speaker dealt with the various steps which led to the present situation of family and community life. In the generation passing, the boys and girls were kept at home, guarded by home influences, working under the watchful eye of either parent, until they married and moved to homes of their own. Today, things were different. Industrial progress had taken away much of the work girls were wont to perform in the home. Now they went into factories or shops. This meant that they practically left home influence at the age of 14 and came in contact with all sorts of people. The same was true of the boys. As soon as they could evade the truant officer, many left school and began to work. If the parents had not been careful to lay securely the foundations of truth and morality, these young folks were apt to go astray when they met with temptation. This was

parental delinquency. Duty of Parents. The parents' first duty to the child was before its birth. If a child was born physically weak, or with vicious tendencies, it was the result of heredity. Mr. McGregor discussed several instances, and quoted some most convinc-ing scientific investigations along this Parents also owed the child a loving relationship between father and mother. The speaker deplored one side of the moving picture theatre which depicted before children scenes of domes-tic infelicity. Fathers and mothers should settle their disagreements during the children's absence. Mr. Mc-Gregor also believed firmly that chil-dren should be taught to work. It was one of the greatest blessings bestowed upon humanity. Another parental duty was the teaching of discipline. The child must learn to give and ake in the home, or it will have to learn the lesson later in life. The child's right to its parents' time was also emphasized by the speaker, who deplored the attitude of the mother who left her children to the care of hirelings. Home, and home environment, should be made the best place of all for the children.
