

WHITNEY STICKS TO THE PATRONAGE

Mr. Rowell's Resolution For Civil Service Based on Merit Defeated.

SCORES SPOIL SYSTEM

Opposition Leader Points Out the Need of a Reform in Ontario Administration.

Toronto, April 3 .- Mr. Rowell's atlempt to have the Government adopt a resolution calling for reform in the Provincial civil service was defeated in the Legislature yesterday on an amendment introduced by the Prime

The Opposition leader instanced the benefits that had come to the public service in Great Britain. It was the surest way of securing the elimination of the patronage evil in political affairs and would attract a better class of employees into the service. Mr. Rowell was not inclined to accept the Government's statement that spoils system had not been introduced, and pointed out the well-known dismissal of License Inspector Hastirgs in Toronto when the license commissioners resigned, and a Conservative newspaper declared that the "spoils system is in control."

Sir James Whitney characterized the proposal contained in Rowell's resolution as absurd, and asked what kind of competitive examination could be set for a registrar of deeds or a division court clerk. The Resolution.

Rowell's motion was: "That in the judgment of this House the spoils and patronage systems are inimical to the highest efficiency of the public service and to the best interests of the country; that the public interests demand the immediate creation of a non-partisan civil service commission with ample powers, and that all appointments and promotions in the public service shall be by merit after competitive examination, except in those cases where the conditions of the public service render this impracticable." The following is the amendment

substituted by the Prime Minister: "This House congratulates the peo ple of the province on the fact that under the administration of public affairs by the present Government no such system as the spoils system has any place; recognizes the difficulties which would surround the operation of a system of so-called civil service over a small number of officials, and that it would be wholly unwise and practically impossible to bring under such a system the various officials in the service of the province, includ-ing such officials as registrars of deeds, sheriffs, and county crown

'This House recognizes the fact that success in a competitive examination is in no way a guarantee of pre-eminent or ordinary fitness for Government service, and this House recognizes the Ingersoll Ratepayers Have Been wisdom of and fairness with which has dealt with pointments and promotions in the

Merit System Best. In opening his address, Mr. Rowell said the time had arrived when, in the interests of the province, the Government should establish a nonpartisan civil service commission, so that all appointments would be made after a competitive examination, except to minor posts in the outside service. This system had worked to advantage in Great Britain, the United States and at Ottawa. The Indian service today was the envy of every Government in Europe, and the splendid character of that service was in no small measure responsible for the beneficial results of British rule in



THE ANGRY WEST.

Every elector in Canada, particularly In Ontario, ought to have such in formation as Mr. Turriff, M. P., of Assiniboia, Sask., imparted in his adfiress at Hyman Hall. The relations between Eastern and Western Canada constitute the most important question in national politics, and it is essential that people in the East should them. try to comprehend the western point of view. From personal experience the member for Assiniboia gave an unvarnished description of conditions which are too serious to be ignored in the East by the pretence that party politics is behind the angry protests from the prairie provinces. There are today 45,000,000 bushels of wheat still in that country, of which 20,000,000 bushels are unthreshed, and 8,000,000 "wet and tough." All the elevators in the wheat country, and in Port Arthur and Fort William are overflowing. If last year's crop of 175,000,000 bushels, of which 20,000,000 bushels was unthresled, so outstripped the railway and elevator facilities, what will be the plight this year with a crop of 250,000,000 bushels, the estimated yield under normal weather conditions?

But the market problem is as serious as the transportation problem. Where is a crop of 250,000,000 bushels to be sold? The United Kingdom last year imported only 208,000,000 bushels of wheat from the whole world, and will only absorb a fraction of Canada's surplus this year. Other export markets must be found. The nearest, the best, the natural market is the United The price of wheat there is from 10 to 15 cents a bushel higher than the price in Canada nearly all the year round, but the Canadian farmer has been denied the boon by the defeat of reciprocity. A great proportion of the western wheat crop wi! have to be exported to the south because it cannot be absorbed by other markets but every bushel of it wi! have to pay 25 cents in customs duties. The western grain grower willingly purchased his manufactured goods in Eastern Canada, paying his share of taxation for the protection of the industrial interests, but when he asked only permission to sell his own products to the best advantage he was denied the privilege. He is angry and no wonder. As the millions taken out of his pocket by the defeat of reciprocity would have been largely spent upon the products of Eastern Canada, those manufacturers who opposed the agreement were short-sighted in their

Mr. Turriff admitted that the prairie farmers were angry, but he deprecated the use of the word secession, and declared that the grain-growers would eling to constitutional methods of remedying their grievances. When the next election comes, and the prairies will have their just represent. ation, they will strike a blow that will smash the present Government.

A cluster of buildings surround the mills of the Dome. The Hellinger is rearing just as great an equipment, Half a dozen other mines are producing. Underground, there are miles of tunnelling to be traversed. Porcupine as a whole has reached the producing stage.

Dropped at lightning speed down a noist two or three hundred feet deep, the visitors found drifts and cross cuts diverging in many directions Some of the mines had as much as 4,-000 feet of tunnelling, and any that have actually gotten into development work have at least 1,800 feet. Veins of quartz as wide as thirty feet were shown to the inspectors. Some ore body is pointed out as bearing \$100 to the ton, while another will go as low as \$4 or \$5. The average is brought about by taking the different grades and after bulking their values, dividing

The ramifications of the gold mining ndustry at Porcupine have brought 10,000 people into the immediate district. The town has excellent facilities, good railway connection, orderly streets, and there are farmers coming in to take advantage of the rich market the camp affords. Porcupine has many problems ahead, but anyone who comes to see at first-hand the signs of the gallant recovery from the fire of less than one year ago, can scarcely think that the mining camp is fools' paradise, and that the gold will soon "peter out." Rather are the signs that it will be one of the world's richest permanent gold camps.







DEATH OF YOUNG WOMAN

Regard to Demise of Well-Known Character on Clarence Street

"That Mary Jane Dennis came to her death on March 20, 1912, at 99 Clarence street, in this city, from blood-poisoning, due to a criminal operation, not performed, in the opinion of the jury, by a medical practitioner, but by whom performed the jury is unable from the evidence to determine."

Such was the verdict returned last ening by the jury empanelled by Dr. R. Ferguson, coroner, to investigate the fircumstances of the death of Mrs. V. F. Dennis, more commonly known as Miss Mamie Renehan. The evidence was taken at a two-hour session of the police station, and while it appeared for a time that somewhat sensational developments might be expected, the evidence was considered nsufficient to permit the jurors to

That London is in excellent health, and has every reason to be, is shown by the report of Medical Health Officer Dr. Hutchinson, which was submitted to the board of health on Tuesday af-

The Government regulations demand that milk sold by dealers must have a butterfat average of at least .300.Fifty samples have been tested here during

Samples of the city water obtained

the past couple of weeks, and show an average better than .371, some of the milk showing as high as .500. Only four producers selling milk in the city failed to reach the standard and these were cut off immediately. Laundries, butcher shops, bakeries and ther places which might influence the health of the people, were visited, and the majority were found to be in ex-

cellent cond A Detailed Statement. The board asked for a detailed statement of the results of the tests of the milk supply, and this will be pub ished, together with the names of the dealers, for the benefit of the general public. The question of whether or not the city could be made liable should any of the dealers commence action for damages, was raised, but it was con-

sidered safe to proceed.

The dump at the corner of Pall Mall and Waterloo streets, which has caused some complaint among the residents of that section, was inspected by the M. H. O., and found to contain nothing offensive, with the exception of a quantity of wet paper.
